#### 2008-2009 Armstrong Atlantic State University Achievements

• AASU, in conjunction with the Medical College of Georgia, graduated its inaugural class in the Doctor of Physical Therapy program in spring 2009.

- The cardiovascular interventional track in the radiologic sciences bachelor's program graduated its inaugural class in spring 2009.
- AASU has an annual economic impact on the region of more than \$205 million according to a 2009 study conducted by the Selig Center for Economic Growth in the University of Georgia's Terry College of Business.
- Twenty-eight faculty members were instrumental in attracting more than \$6.5 million dollars in grants to the university. The largest of these included \$2M for PRISM, \$1.3M for the Georgia Geriatric Center and \$1M for using research and learning communities to increase STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) majors.
- The men's and women's tennis teams won the 2009 NCAA Division II national championships.
- Faculty service awards were presented to Helen Taggart (nursing), Anita Nivens (nursing) and John Kraft (psychology).
- Pamela Sears (theatre) received AASU's Brockmeier Faculty Award.
- Jonathan Roberts (psychology) received AASU's H. Dean Probst Award.
- Al Harris (student activities) became the first person to win a second Student Government Association Professional Staff Service Award.
- Marilee Cain (finance) was named Staff Member of the Year.
- Frank Twum-Barimah (student housing) received the Spirit of Armstrong Award.
- Peter Mastopoulos (Armstrong Center) received the Volunteer Service to the Community Award.
- Dorothee Mertz-Weigel received the AASU Outstanding Advisor Award.
- Jane Barnard (mathematics) received the 2008 John Neff Award from the Georgia Council of Teachers of Mathematics.
- Charlotte Bates and Chad Guilliams (medical technology) received the American Society for Clinical Laboratory Science (ASCLS) Key to the Future Award.
- Michelle Butina (medical technology) received the ASCLS Contribution to the Profession Award.
- Jose da Cruz (political science) was named the Outstanding Alumnus, Departments of Philosophy and Political Science at Wright State University, and at the Escola Alberto Monteiro de Carvalho in Rio de Janeiro.

• Bradley Sturz (mathematics) was named to the Cambridge Who's Who Among Executives and Professionals in Education and Research,

- Chris Hendricks (history) was listed in Who's Who in America.
- Ed Strauser (middle & secondary education) received a Fulbright Scholar grant to teach and conduct research in Ukraine.
- George Davies (physical therapy) received the National Athletic Trainers Association's Most Distinguished Athletic Trainer Award and was selected to serve in the Parlympics at the 2008 Beijing Olympics.
- Becky da Cruz (criminal justice) was named the Outstanding Alumna for the Department of Political Science at Wright State University and received the International Services Volunteer of the Year Award from the Savannah Chapter of the American Red Cross.
- Books were authored or coauthored by Hassan Aziz (medical technology), Mark Finlay (College of Liberal Arts), Robert LeFavi (health sciences), Y. Daniel Liang (information, computing & engineering) and Daniel Skidmore-Hess (political science).
- Twenty professors authored or coauthored 72 articles in professional journals.
- Faculty serving as editors or editorial board members of professional journals include Richard Cebula (economics) George Davies (physical therapy), Ray Greenlaw (information, computing & engineering) and Gloria Strickland (radiologic sciences).
- Tim Ellis (mathematics) served as president of the Georgia Tutoring Association.
- Sharon Gilliard-Smith (radiologic sciences) was president of the Savannah Society of Radiologic Sciences.
- Michael Mahan (middle grades & secondary education) was elected president of Phi Kappa Phi, Armstrong Chapter.
- John Jensen (art, music & theatre) was commissioned by the City of Savannah to create a porcelain vase to be presented to sister city Jiujihang City China.

Space prohibits the inclusion of many others who wrote book chapters, served on or chaired state and national committees, presented at professional conferences, displayed their art and musical talent or otherwise represented themselves and AASU with distinction in many prestigious venues around the world.

#### History of the University

Armstrong Atlantic State University, part of the University System of Georgia, was founded in 1935 as Armstrong Junior College to enhance higher educational opportunities in the community. The college was established by the mayor and alderman of the City of Savannah and was housed in the Italian Renaissance Armstrong House, a gift to the city from the family of George F. Armstrong. Over the years the college occupied six additional buildings in the Forsyth Park and Monterey Square areas.

In 1959, as Armstrong College of Savannah, it became a two-year unit of the University System of Georgia. The Board of Regents conferred four-year status on Armstrong State College in 1964. Two years later the college moved to its present 250-acre site, a gift from the Mills B. Lane Foundation and Donald Livingston. Additional buildings joined the six original structures as Armstrong added professional and graduate programs and quadrupled in size. On July 10, 1996, the institution gained university status and a new name: Armstrong Atlantic State University.

Today, Armstrong Atlantic offers more than 100 academic programs and majors in the College of Education, College of Health Professions, College of Liberal Arts, College of Science and Technology, and School of Graduate Studies. The academic community includes more than 7,500 students from nearly every state and more than 75 countries, and more than 622 faculty and staff members. Armstrong Atlantic State University has been accredited as a senior institution by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools since January 1, 1968, and was last reaccredited in December 2002.

The most recent changes to the campus have been the renovation of Jenkins Hall and the Fine Arts Auditorium in 2008 and groundbreakings in 2009 for a Student Union and for Windward Commons, the university's first suite-style residence hall for freshmen.



#### The University System of Georgia

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia was created in the reorganization of the state government in 1931. The act establishing the Board of Regents became effective January 1, 1932. The board is a public corporation and a constitutional body. It governs, controls, and manages all of the state's thirty-four public institutions of higher education. There are twenty-one universities and thirteen two-year colleges located throughout the state. The board receives the appropriation from the state in a lump sum, based upon an enrollment-driven formula for the University System of Georgia, and determines institutional allocations.

The eighteen members of the Board of Regents are appointed by the governor on a rotating basis to serve a seven-year term. All officers of the board are elected for one-year terms beginning on July 1, except for the chancellor who serves at the pleasure of the board. The chair of the board has the authority to appoint committee chairs and members.

Linda M. Bleicken 2009- present Dr. Linda M. Bleicken joined Armstrong Atlantic State University after serving at Georgia Southern University for 19 years. She becomes the seventh AASU president and the first woman to lead the institution since the establishment of Armstrong Junior College in 1935.

A woman with deep roots in Iowa farm country, Bleicken's experiences in the business arena include a foray into real estate in Atlanta as owner and manager of residential properties and serving as a sales representative for Innerface International. She also spent two years in marketing research for BellSouth and Brittain Associates, both in Atlanta.

It was her experiences in marketing research that led her back to higher education. In 1987, she chose to continue her education on a university campus, this time as a teaching instructor at her alma mater, Georgia State University. Three years later, she earned her academic credentials, a master's and a Ph.D. in management, once again from Georgia State.

She began her career at Georgia Southern as an assistant professor of management in 1990. Over the following years she would serve as acting chair of the department of management, associate dean of the College of Business Administration, vice president for student affairs, acting provost and vice president for academic affairs and lastly provost, a position she held since 2005.

A long-time resident of Savannah—she commuted to Georgia Southern all those years—Bleicken knows and cares deeply about Savannah and the Coastal Georgia region. She has served on the Ossabaw Island Foundation Board since 2007 and is a member of the Savannah Rotary Club.

As the new leader of AASU, Bleicken has strong ideas that will guide the future of university. At the top of her agenda are to continue AASU's tradition of anticipating and meeting the region's workforce needs and elevating the level of student success. Over the coming years, she sees AASU enhancing partnerships with area businesses, education and healthcare providers to build great opportunities for the citizens of the region.





#### Distribution by Rank





#### **Distribution by Tenure Status**





#### **Distribution by Highest Degree**










# Undergraduate Georgia Enrollment by County of Origin




# Graduate Georgia Enrollment by County of Origin

#### Office of Institutional Research

The Office of Institutional Research supports Armstrong Atlantic State University's mission by providing accurate, timely, and consistent data for administrative strategic planning and facilitation of administrative decision making. The Office of Institutional Research plays an integral part in evaluating the effectiveness of the university through the assessment process and dissemination of assessment results to improve institutional effectiveness.

The Office of Institutional Research oversees the administration and analysis of numerous surveys at all AASU campuses. Annual surveys include the entering student survey, exit survey, non-returning student survey, and faculty and course evaluation (FACE). (AASU periodically participates in NSSE, the National Survey of Student Engagement, and the Office of Institutional Research analyzes the data from this survey and writes reports addressing the results.) The Office of Institutional Research also compiles reports based on results of the Measure of Academic Proficiency and Progress (MAPP) test, an assessment of general academic knowledge and skills. This test is administered to all graduating seniors at AASU. These surveys and assessment measures provide data for assessment and evaluation purposes to facilitate university planning and development, as well as assessment of the university's mission. The office also provides data for the completion of numerous external surveys.

Institutional Research publications include an annual *Fact Book* and a *Data Digest* for each term. An informational newsletter called *Compass Points* is also distributed each term to all faculty and staff on campus. Every department receives a copy of the larger publications. The Fact Book and Data Digest information, as well as other publications and data, are available on the Institutional Research web page at http://www.ir.armstrong.edu.

Various reports are compiled for the Board of Regents and the federal government, including the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System reports, benchmarking reports, program review data, and NCAA reports. Other reports are regularly distributed to campus administration, including grade distribution reports, annual department review information, and survey analysis results.

## Lane Library

Lane Library, built in 1966 and extensively expanded in 1975, supports the academic programs of Armstrong Atlantic State University. The staff combines the traditional repository responsibilities of academic libraries with newer concepts of librarianship, including course-integrated bibliographic instruction, computer-assisted information retrieval, and media production/circulation.

The library collection consists of more than 900,000 total items, including 232, 588 book volumes, close to 700,000 microforms, records, slides, motion picture kits, and videotapes, and 990 periodical subscriptions. The Florence Powell Minis Collection contains university archives, material of local color, and a special collection of first editions by Conrad Aiken and other Savannah authors. An automated interlibrary loan service permits access to the resources of other libraries throughout the United States.

Lane Library utilizes state-of-the-art technology to improve its services and operations. Cataloging is enhanced though membership in a national bibliographic utility. The reference services are reinforced with computerized bibliographic searching, and media services encompasses distribution and presentation of materials in a variety of formats.

AASU 1100: The University Experience, and AASU 1101: Strategies for Success.


## The Armstrong Center for Professional and Continuing Education

- Extending the unique resources of Armstrong Atlantic State University as an urban university to promote lifelong learning and serve the needs of Savannah and southeast Georgia.



## **Armstrong Atlantic State University Athletics**

Armstrong Atlantic State University competes at the Division II level of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and is a charter member of the Peach Belt Conference, the premier NCAA Division Ii conference in the nation. Armstrong Atlantic State University has gained a reputation of excellence for the quality of its programs as five of its athletic teams advanced to the NCAA Championships in 2008-09. The Pirates have also excelled in the classroom as 52 percent of Armstrong Atlantic State University's 138 student-athletes maintained a grade-point average of 3.0 or better, while four student-athletes earned ESPN: The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District III honors, including two Academic All-America honorees.

The Armstrong Atlantic State men's and women's tennis teams each captured the 2009 NCAA Division II National Championship, just the second time in NCAA history that the same school has earned back-to-back men's and women's tennis titles in the same season. The two titles brings the total number of NCAA National Championships at AASU to seven, with five belonging to the women's tennis program and two to the men's tennis program.

The AASU men's tennis program finished the 2009 season with a 30-1 overall record and edged Barry, 5-4, in a five-hour National Championship match that concluded when sophomore Rafael Array defeated Barry's Roman Werschel, 6-4, 5-7, 6-3, at No. 5 singles to clinch the title. The Pirates also captured the PBC Tournament title for a fifth straight season. Freshman Eudaldo Bonet was named the PBC Player of the Year, the PBC Freshman of the Year and the ITA DII National Rookie of the Year, finishing the season ranked No. 1 in the nation in singles. Bonet, senior Paul Bishop and sophomore Mikk Irdoja each earned ITA All-America honors.

The Lady Pirate tennis program avenged an earlier in-season loss to Lynn by defeating the Knights, 5-2, for the program's fifth NCAA DII National Championship. Freshman Sona Novakova went undefeated in singles play in the spring, earning PBC Player of the Year, PBC Freshman of the Year and ITA DII National Rookie of the Year honors. Juniors Martina Beckmann and Gabriella Kovacs, as well as sophomore Alida Muller-Wehlau, all earned ITA All-America honors. Simon Earnshaw was named the PBC Coach of the Year, with assistant coach David Secker earning ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year honors for his work with the men's and women's programs.

AASU Volleyball became the first Peach Belt Conference school to advance to the NCAA Division II Elite Eight by capturing the NCAA Southeast Region championship with a 3-0 win over Catawba. The Pirates finished the year 28-7, captured the Peach Belt Conference regular season and tournament titles and won three straight in the NCAA Regional, including overcoming a 14-9 deficit in the fifth game against Lander to win in five against the Bearcats. Sophomore Hannah Segebart became AASU's first-ever AVCA All-American honoree, earning Honorable Mention honors, while senior Rindy Vidovich was named the PBC Player of the Year and freshman Torrie Bevolo earned PBC Tournament MVP honors.

The AASU men's basketball squad advanced to its fourth NCAA Championships in the last five seasons, finishing 23-7 overall and achieving its highest national ranking in the Peach Belt era, climbing as high as No. 12 in the NABC/Division II Top 25 poll. The Pirates finished the 2008-09 season ranked No. 25. Head coach Jeff Burkhamer resigned his position in March and he was replaced by former Newberry College head coach Jeremy Luther on May 5.

AASU Men's Golf advanced to the NCAA Southeast Regional for a sixth consecutive season in 2009 and senior Chris Wolfe earned GCAA All-America honors for the third time in his career, becoming AASU's first three-time All-American in golf.

The AASU women's soccer team finished 11-6-3 overall, led by PBC Player of the Year Kristin Burton, who also earned ESPN/CoSIDA Academic All-American honors, as well as Daktronics/CoSIDA All-American honors. Burton led the Peach Belt Conference in goals scored and ranked among the Top 10 in NCAA Division II in goals and points.

AASU Baseball notched its 30th straight winning season, going 38-18 overall and finishing the year ranked No. 25 in the final Collegiate Baseball NCAA DII Coaches' Poll. The Pirates set a new NCAA DII record for sacrifice hits in one season with 101, shattering the old record of 78. Senior pitcher Cody Walden earned NCBWA Honorable Mention All-America honors and senior Juan Dorado set the NCAA DII single-season record for sacrifice hits with 38.

The AASU women's basketball squad finished 17-11 overall under first-year head coach Matt Schmidt, who took over the proram in September. Senior Lacey Willis earned All-PBC and All-Southeast Region honors, while also earning PBC Player of the Week honors four times during the season.

AASU Softball finished third in the Peach Belt Conference standings, compiling a 27-23 overall record and an 11-7 mark in the PBC. Senior Jessica Strong became softball's first ESPN: The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America honoree, making the third team, while also earning the AASU President's Cup award.

The AASU women's golf team completed its fourth season of competition by compiling three top five finishes during 2008-09, while three golfers earned Top 10 finishes throughout the year. The team fashioned its lowest stroke average since the program began varsity competition in 2005-06 (338.47).
