Commissioner's Cup

AASU finished a school-best second in the 2006 Peach Belt Conference Commissioner's Cup standings, which is the conference's all-sports trophy. AASU received 67 points out of a possible 85, for a .788 percentage. AASU was boosted in the standings by three Peach Belt titles - volleyball captured its first, while men's tennis captured its second straight and women's tennis earned its 12th league crown. Columbus State won the cup, while Clayton State finished third. Georgia Southwestern State enters the conference in 2006-07 as the league returns to a 12-school membership, and the Hurricanes will be eligible to compete for the Commissioner's Cup immediately.

NACDA Director's Cup

On the strength of the school's six NCAA championship appearances, the Armstrong Atlantic State athletic department fashioned another outstanding season in 2005-06, finishing with 315 points in the 2005-06 NACDA Division II Director's Cup competition. The competition honors institutions maintaining a broad-based program, achieving success in many sports in both men's and women's, saw the Pirates finish in the top 10 in points accumulated per sport for the fourth consecutive season.

AASU finished tops among Peach Belt schools, finishing 36th in the aggregate standings, but in averaging each school's Director's Cup points earned per sport that it sponsors, the Pirates collected 31.5 points per sport, eighth-best among all schools.

Armstrong Atlantic State University has captured the first-ever Peach Belt Conference Presidential Academic Award, announced by the league at its annual meeting in Hilton Head, S.C. The award recognizes excellence in academics concerning all of an institution's studentathletes.

This spring, the Peach Belt asked each of the league's 12 members to submit an undergraduate student body average GPA and a student-athlete average GPA for the academic year. These two numbers were then used to create a ratio for each school. The award is given to the school with the highest ratio, which in this first year went to Armstrong Atlantic State with a ratio of 1.0641. It is noteworthy that at each Peach Belt school, student-athletes had on average a better GPA than each general student body.

"This special academic award clearly demonstrates that AASU's student athletes are truly committed to excellence as both students and as athletes," said University President Dr. Thomas Z. Jones, who received the award on behalf of Armstrong Atlantic State University at the PBC's annual meeting. "I am extremely proud of these students, their coaches and the athletic department administration."

The Armstrong Atlantic State women's tennis team was honored in 2006 by the Greater Savannah Sports Council with one of three OASIS Generation Awards at the organization's yearly banquet.

The 2005 NCAA DII National Champion Lady Pirates were honored for a three-year period in which AASU won 88 of 90 matches, including 60 in a row at one point, and two out of the three years had all six starters earn All-America honors.

AASU had previously received the OASIS award in 1995, following the school's first-ever NCAA Division II National Championships.

Joining AASU in receiving a Generation Award on Thursday were UGA golfer and 2003 US Junior Amateur champion Brian Harman and Calvary Day School multi-sport star Demarcus Dobbs.

In attendance for the Lady Pirates at the banquet were: head coach Simon Earnshaw and assistant coach Zsofi Golopencza, as well as senior Kristen Kelly, senior Manuela Emmrich and junior Dziyana Nazaruk.

Flyer Festival</u> Christina Flores Leah Schmiedge The Armstrong Atlantic State volleyball squad captured its first-ever regular season Peach Belt Conference volleyball title in 2005, concluding another outstanding season for the Pirates. Head coach Alan Segal's squad dropped just one match in PBC play en route to the league crown.

The Pirates were led in 2005 by Peach Belt Conference Player of the Year Traci Knuth, who continues to dominate on the court in her third season for AASU. Knuth was a three-time PBC Player of the Week honoree and ranked second in the league in hitting percentage and third in blocks per game. A three-time All-PBC honoree, Knuth also collected her 1,000th career kill in 2005, just the fifth player in AASU history to reach that plateau.

Junior rightside hitter Lauren Good also earned All-PBC honors and junior middle hitter Leah Schmiedge ranked among the league leaders in blocks as the Pirates led the Peach Belt and ranked 10th in NCAA Division II in blocks per game. AASU averaged 2.83 blocks per game, its best team average in more than a decade.

Junior Christina Flores, a year removed from setting the single-season AASU dig record, again had an outstanding year defensively, notching 380 digs. She is on pace to become the Pirates' all-time leader in digs during her senior season.

The Pirates successfully ran a 6-2 offense in 2005, relying on sophomore Margaret Thornton and junior Stacy Yates to both act as setters on the court - the duo combined to average 11.45 assists per game on the year.

AASU loses just one player from its squad for 2006 - senior rightside hitter Ranay Dato - and returns 12 players for the upcoming season.

The Armstrong Atlantic women's soccer program burst upon the Southeastern soccer scene in its inaugural season, finishing just one point out of first place in the Peach Belt standings and advancing to the PBC Tournament semifinals in just its first year of competition.

AASU picked up the program's first win with a 6-2 victory over former NCAA DII national champion Christian Brothers on August 27, then won a hard-fought 2-1 victory over cross-town rival Savannah College of Art & Design for a win in the Pirates' first-ever regular season home contest on September 6. The season culminated in a 7-1 blowout win over GC&SU in the first round of the PBC Tournament - the second-most goals scored in a PBC Tournament game in league history.

Head coach Eric Faulconer's squad featured a high octane offense all season long that led the PBC in goals per game (3.16), a number that also ranked 12th in NCAA Division II. Freshmen forwards Shana Neves (13 goals) and Lyndsi Stricklen (12 goals) each earned All-PBC honors in their debut seasons for the Pirates and ranked among the league's top goal scorers.

Junior Donna Cheyne, who followed coach Faulconer to AASU from Thomas University, excelled in the midfield as the team captain, dishing out a PBC-leading 14 assists and earning the program's first All-Region honors, being named to the NSCAA's South Atlantic third team.

Senior Claire McCombe, a four-year player for coach Faulconer, enjoyed a fine season as well for the Pirates as she collected nine goals. McCombe, the only senior on the inaugural Pirate soccer squad, finished her collegiate career with 35 goals and 18 assists.

Faulconer and the Pirates return 14 players from its inaugural squad for the 2006 season.

The AASU men's basketball team returned to the NCAA postseason in 2005-06, marking its second foray into the South Atlantic Regional in the last three seasons, and finished the season as the No. 20-ranked squad in the land, the first time an AASU men's basketball squad has finished a season nationally ranked. AASU reached the PBC Tournament title game for the fourth time in school history and entered the regional with a program-best second seed.

The Pirates finished the 2005-06 campaign with 23 wins, the third most in a single season in school history, while leading the Peach Belt in three-point field goal percentage and ranking second in field goal percentage defense.

Junior Bryan Taylor continued his steady improvement for the Pirates, earning first-team All-PBC honors for leading AASU in scoring (13.2 ppg), rebounding (7.4 rpg) and blocked shots (42). Taylor also earned All-PBC Tournament honors and is just the second AASU player to earn multiple All-PBC honors. Senior Alex Carter closed out a fine two-year career for the Pirates by earning All-PBC second team honors, averaging 11.6 points per game, and joined Taylor on the All-PBC Tournament team.

Sophomore Jamaal Galloway waged a season-long assault on the AASU three-point charts and finished the season ranking third in the PBC and 27th in the NCAA in three-point shooting, while also taking home the Ashley Dearing Cup as the team's leading free throw shooter.

AASU loses just one senior from the squad - Carter - and returns 11 players for a highly anticipated 2006-07 season.

The Armstrong Atlantic State women's basketball squad put together its fourth consecutive winning season in 2005-06, finishing fourth in the Peach Belt Conference standings and picking up several key wins during the season.

Head coach Roger Hodge continued an impressive string by knocking off a nationally-ranked squad for the sixth consecutive year as the Lady Pirates defeated No. 19-ranked Carson-Newman, 72-61, in its season-opening tournament in Tennessee. AASU also knocked off the Eagles in Savannah, 58-53, on Dec. 17, and pulled out a thrilling 86-84 overtime victory over Tusculum the previous night.

The Lady Pirates relied on the efforts of two seniors during the season as guard Alicia Durham and forward Audosha Kelley each wrapped up outstanding careers for AASU. Kelley became the third player in the last four years to be recognized as a WBCA All-American for the Lady Pirates as the Savannah native averaged 17.1 points and 7.1 rebounds per game. Kelley also earned All-PBC honors as well and finished her career with a 17.7 career scoring average, which ranks sixth all-time in AASU history.

Durham, perhaps the most versatile player in AASU women's basketball history, also finished her career by making a significant dent on the Lady Pirate charts. The all-time leader in games played, the Macon native scored 958 career points (9th all-time) in her career, grabbed 505 rebounds (7th alltime), hit 94 three-pointers (t5th all-time), made 236 free throws (5th all-time), dished out 285 assists (4th all-time) and collected 268 steals (2nd all-time).

Coach Hodge and the Lady Pirates return nine players for the 2006-07 season, including forward Lavonne Thomas, who missed the entire 2005-06 season with an injury.



Armstrong Atlantic returned to the postseason in 2006, making its 11th NCAA appearance in the last 19 seasons and advancing to the South Atlantic Regional in Milledgeville, Ga. The Pirates also won 40 games for the first time since the 1999 season and began the year with a 21-game unbeaten streak, vaulting themselves into the Top 10 rankings.

The Pirates returned to the postseason for the first time since 2003 thanks to a solid offensive lineup, anchored by outfield production of juniors Brad Bohannon, Truman Marek and Marc Noble. Marek led the PBC in triples with seven and hit .366 with six home runs and 51 RBI, earning NCBWA Honorable Mention All-America honors and ABCA All-Region accolades. Bohannon returned from a broken hand suffered in preseason to flirt with .400 most of the year, settling for a team-leading .393 average, good for second in the Peach Belt. Noble was right behind Bohannon in the race for the league's batting crown, finishing at .392 with a team-high 24 stolen bases.

Junior Daniel Heflin also turned in a fine season as the Pirates' designated hitter, hitting .361 with five home runs and a team-high 54 RBI, earning All-Region honors. Junior Sean Hotzak, despite playing all season with a broken bone in his wrist, set a new AASU and PBC record with 21 sacrifice hits - just two shy of the NCAA DII record - and hit .307 on the season. Senior Miguel Donate capped his career as a Pirate by earning All-PBC honors, hitting .329 with a team-high 20 doubles - the first time an AASU player has collected 20+ doubles since Chris Case had 21 in 1996.

On the mound, seniors Chase Leatherwood and Matt Nalutka concluded outstanding AASU careers with fine seasons once again. Leatherwood went 6-4 with a 3.40 ERA and 91 strikeouts in 92.2 innings pitched, while Nalutka set the AASU all-time saves record (19) by going 4-1 with a 1.51 ERA and seven saves in 2006. Junior John Ducey led the Pirates in wins with eight and also led all starters with a 3.17 ERA.

The Armstrong Atlantic State softball squad returned to the postseason in 2006, culminating with a surprising run in the NCAA South Atlantic Regional in which the Pirates finished third, sending home two nationally-ranked squads, and finishing the season ranked No. 23 in the NFCA's final Division II top 25 Poll.

A key to the Pirates' success in 2006 was a solid hitting lineup from top to bottom. Danielle Bertram took over the leadoff spot in the lineup midway through the season and parlayed that into an All-Conference season that saw the senior hit a team-best .385 with 18 stolen bases. Deanna Beaty led the PBC in sacrifice hits with 18, hitting in the second spot, and finished second on the squad in home runs with 11 and RBI with 36.

Those two ably set the table for junior slugger Amber Hunt, who hit .350 with 13 home runs and an AASU-record 63 RBI, a total that led the Peach Belt. Hunt not only earned All-PBC and All-Region honors but became just the third AASU player to earn NFCA DII National Player of the Week honors.

As a team, the Pirates hit .302 and set school records for home runs (51), doubles (106) and stolen bases (63). They slugged their way into the South Atlantic Regional, the fifth postseason appearance for the Pirates in the eight-year existence of the program. While there, the Pirates sent home nationally-ranked Columbus State, 3-2, and Wingate, 2-1, to advance to the semifinals - the third time that the AASU softball squad has advanced that far in the postseason.

In addition to the fine senior seasons turned in by Bertram and Beaty, senior third baseman Jeana Short hit .324 with six home runs and 23 RBI while also earning the AASU President's Cup, given annually to the top female student-athlete at AASU. Head coach Ted Evans returns several talented players from the 2006 season for 2007.

No. 7 ITA Mid-Atlantic Region Doubles Titleists Robert Jendelund and Taavo Roos

The Armstrong Atlantic State men's tennis team successfully defended its Peach Belt Conference regular season and tournament titles en route to a 12th straight trip to the NCAA Championships. The Pirates captured the Mid-Atlantic Regional to advance to the round of 16, but again rival West Florida provided an exit for the Pirates, edging AASU, 5-4.

AASU began the spring season with a program-best No. 2 national ranking, but a few close 5-4 losses hurt the Pirates early. In the PBC Championships, the Pirates were tested in a first-round match by USC Aiken, edging the Pacers, 5-3, in a five-plus hour match. The next day, USC Upstate again tested the Pirates, but another marathon match ended, 5-4, in favor of AASU. Resurgent Lander faced the Pirates in the final - the first meeting between the two teams as their regular season matchup was rained out. Again, the Pirates prevailed by a 5-4 margin as Davor Zink bested Stefan Tewes in three sets for the deciding match.

Zink's performance capped a spectacular sophomore season in which he was named the PBC Tournament MVP and the ITA National Player to Watch. The Chilean, who played No. 4 singles as a freshman, ascended to No. 5 in the ITA national singles rankings and recorded six wins over Top 20-ranked opponents.

Sophomore Robert Jendelund and junior Taavo Roos captured the ITA Mid-Atlantic Region doubles title in 2005, then finished the 2006 spring season with a No. 7 national doubles ranking, earning the pair ITA All-America honors. Freshman Paul Bishop enjoyed an outstanding debut season, earning a No. 27 singles ranking and together with doubles partner David Secker earned PBC Tournament Doubles MVP honors.

Secker won a team-high 20 singles matches in his senior season and concludes his AASU career with 127 wins. The only senior on the squad, Secker will step into a coaching role next season as Simon Earnshaw's graduate assistant and the Pirates return six players for the 2006-07 season.

The Armstrong Atlantic State women's tennis team enjoyed another outstanding season, stretching its win streak to 60 matches before falling to BYU Hawaii in the national championship match. Still, the Lady Pirates have put together an amazing three-year run, winning 88 of 89 matches and for the second straight year, all six starters on the AASU women's tennis squad earned ITA All-America honors.

The Lady Pirates breezed their way through the regular season, capturing their PBC-best 12th league title and the tournament title and stayed ranked No. 1 in the ITA rankings all year long. They knocked off the top-ranked NAIA (Auburn-Montgomery) and DIII (Emory) teams during the season and compiled an amazing 142-9 singles record and 88-4 doubles record in the spring.

Senior Luisa Cowper capped an unbeaten spring season by being named the PBC's Player of the Year and the ITA's National Senior of the Year. The Sutton Coldfield, England, native finished the year ranked No. 1 in the ITA's final singles rankings and teamed with sophomore Iulija Stupak to finish ranked No. 1 in the nation in doubles.

Stupak was named the ITA's National Player to Watch and earned All-America honors in singles along with Cowper, junior Dziyana

Nazaruk and sophomore Johanna Dahlback.

Seniors Manuela Emmrich and Caroline Grage earned All-America doubles honors and finished their careers as the all-time winningest doubles team in AASU history with 120 victories as a duo.

Head coach Simon Earnshaw, who was named the ITA's Coach of the Year for the second time in his career, has four players from this year's squad returning for 2007.

The Armstrong Atlantic State men's golf team - forced to replace four seniors from last year's NCAA runner-up squad - once again returned to NCAA postseason play buoyed by a lineup of talented newcomers and returning senior All-America player Tripp Coggins.

The Pirates captured two tournament titles during the year, holding off a hard-charging Barry University squad to win the 2006 AASU/Southbridge Pirate Invitational by two strokes over the Bucs. It was the second time in school history that the Pirates have won their annual spring tournament.

Three weeks later, the Pirates would best a field of Division I schools to capture the GEICO Direct Spring Invitational at the Hunter Army Golf Club in Savannah, taking a 13-stroke win over Morehead State. In that tournament, freshman Chris Wolfe birdied the fourth playoff hole to capture his first individual title as the Warner Robins, Ga., native enjoyed a tremendous debut season for the Pirates. Wolfe finished the 2005-06 campaign leading the Pirates with a 74.00 stroke average, the best stroke average for any freshman in the Peach Belt Conference, and Wolfe became the first freshman in AASU history to earn All-Conference honors.

Coggins also earned All-PBC honors for a solid senior season in which the Savannah native collected a 74.48 stroke average. It was the first time that two AASU golfers have earned All-Conference honors in the same season.

The Pirates advanced to the NCAA Atlantic/Southeast Regional in Concord, N.C., the fifth straight trip to the postseason for the AASU men's golf squad. AASU finished fourth in the eight-team Southeast regional, missing out on qualifying for the National Championships by three strokes.

Freshmen Andrew Workman (75.10 stroke average) and Wills Smith (75.55 stroke average) also contributed to the Pirates' success right away and AASU returns an astonishing eight of its nine players for the 2006-07 season.

Armstrong Atlantic State's inaugural women's golf team got off to a quick start as sophomore Danielle Davis captured the individual title in the first-ever tournament competed in by the Lady Pirates. Davis, a native of St. Simons Island, Ga., shot rounds of 75 and 81 to win the Mid-Carolina Golf Invitational on Sept. 17-18, 2005. Hosted by Newberry College, Davis captured the title by six strokes over Newberry's Stephanie Hemann. In the tourney, the Lady Pirates finished third as a team.

Davis wasn't done there, however, as she also captured the SCAD Invitational, contested at the Wilmington Island Golf Club in Savannah, firing an 80 to best teammate Gretchen McLeod and SCAD's Jennifer Vigilante by one stroke. On the year, Davis compiled five top-ten finishes and led the team with an 80.77 stroke average.

McLeod, the only senior on the Lady Pirate squad, had an excellent season as well for the inaugural AASU team. The Richmond Hill, Ga., native compiled three second-place finishes, including finishing runner-up at the NAIA/DII Spring Preview, co-hosted by AASU and SCAD at Southbridge Golf Club. McLeod shot rounds of 80 and 78 to finish with a 158 total, just one stroke off the pace. In addition to the runner-up performance at the SCAD Invitational, McLeod also finished runner-up at the Limestone Women's Intercollegiate in Gaffney, S.C., shooting rounds of 82 and 83 to finish with a 165 total.

As a team, the Lady Pirates recorded four top five finishes in their inaugural season, finishing second at the SCAD Invitational, third at the Mid-Carolina and Limestone Intercollegiate and fifth at the NAIA/DII Spring Preview. AASU returns four of its five starting golfers for 2006-07, including Davis, and will look to make strides towards contending for NCAA Regional competition next year.
