The full extent of those cuts will not be known until a final state budget is approved later in the spring, but the cuts will undoubtedly impact the University in significant ways. 

Women's and Gender Studies Program

March is Women's History Month, and we're celebrating by acknowledging the contributions and achievements of the recipients of this year's student awards, our program faculty, and our Foundation supporters.

The Program will present two awards this spring. Ms. Kristi Winger (Political Science major, Writing and Linguistics minor) is the recipient of the Women's and Gender Studies Research/Project Award for her study of the language employed in court, gleaned from two trial transcripts, in rape cases. She has conducted this research for her senior honors thesis under the direction of Profs. Krista Wiegand and Brent Curry in Political Science. Ms. Anna Allen, a double major in English and Modern Languages (emphasis in Spanish), is the recipient of the Linda Rohrer Paige Service Award. Both students will be recognized for their achievements at an informal reception on March 26, and the Research/Project Award is formally given on Honors Day, April 7.

In addition to our award recipients, both graduate and undergraduate students have been conducting research in women's and gender studies through independent study and internships. Profs. Barbara Hendry and Heidi Altman (Sociology/Anthropology) have mentored graduate students working on health and domestic violence issues, particularly in relation to Latina immigrants. Two of their students presented papers recently at the meeting of the Southern Anthropological Society, held in Savannah, and two students have held internships with the Southeast Georgia Communities Project.

After a highly successful year as Program Director, Prof. Lisa Costello (Writing and Linguistics) stepped down to return full-time to her department. The new Director is Prof. Sandra Peacock (History). Prof. Costello will continue to teach the "Introduction to Women's and Gender Studies" course, the foundation course of the WGS minor and a vital step in the preparation of our students. This interdisciplinary course introduces students to fields of study beyond their own majors and to the value of the interdisciplinary approach that is the basis of women's and gender studies. As evidence of that intellectual diversity, Program faculty represent seven CLASS departments and six colleges, and their dedication and varied expertise enrich the quality of our offerings to students.

Our faculty have also been busy teaching existing courses, developing new ones, and

presenting and publishing the results of their research. CLASS faculty regularly teach courses such as "Sociology of Gender," "Feminist Philosophy," and "History of Women in the U.S." Other existing courses include "Gender, Media and Representation," "Psychology of Gender," "Gender and Politics," "Women and Literature," and "Writing the Body." They have also developed new courses such as "Language and Gender," taught for the first time in Fall 2009.

In History, Prof. Michelle Haberland published her most recent essay, "Look for the Union Label: Organizing Women Workers and Women Consumers in the Southern Apparel Industry," in a collected edited by Jonathan Wells and Sheila R. Phipps, *Entering the Fray: Gender, Politics and Culture in the New South* (Columbia, MO: U. of Missouri Press, 2009). Prof. Laura Shelton's book, *For Tranquility and Order: Family and Community on Mexico's Northern Frontier, 1800-1850* has just been published by the University of Arizona Press. It's been a busy year!

Senior Music Composition Major, a Finalist in GA MENC

Jered McKenna has been named one of two Georgia Music Educators National Conference (MENC) finalists in the BMI John Lennon song writing competition. Jered is a senior music composition major who has studied piano and voice. He and his wife recently released a CD of original music; McKenna is available at soundclick.com/mckennaus.

Forty MENC state finalists from a field of 97 entries were forwarded to BMI for final adjudication in the 13th Annual John Lennon Scholarship Songwriting Program for young songwriters. One \$10,000 scholarship (first prize) and two \$5,000 scholarships (2nd and 3rd prize) will be awarded in June 2010. Yoko Ono established the John Lennon Scholarship Songwriting Program in 1997 in conjunction with the BMI Foundation. The John Lennon Scholarships have been made possible through generous donations from Ono with matching funds from Gibson Musical Instruments and have awarded more than \$220,000 to students from select colleges, universities, and music schools throughout the United States. The program recognizes the talent of young songwriters between the ages of 15 and 24 and encourages students to compose songs of any style and submit them for consideration.

The MENC state finalists were selected from compositions submitted to MENC Collegiate chapter advisors nationwide. BMI invited schools with MENC Collegiate chapters to participate in the program to increase the quality and diversity of entries.
