Performing Arts Center season will open with Turtle Island String Quartet

The 2006-2007 season of the Performing Arts Center (PAC) at Georgia Southern University will open with a concert by the critically acclaimed Turtle Island String Quartet.

A singular force in the creation of bold, new trends in chamber music for strings, Turtle Island will perform at the PAC on Saturday, Aug. 26 at 7:30 p.m.

Turtle Island takes its audience on musical journey includes forays into folk, bluegrass, swing, bebop, funk, R&B, rock and hip-hop, as well as the music of Latin America and India.

Tickets for each of the 10 events that will be held at the PAC during the upcoming season will go on sale on Tuesday, Aug. 15.

Turtle Island String Quartet tickets are \$30 plus tax per person for the general public. Georgia Southern faculty, staff and students will receive a 10 percent discount. Groups of 15 or more people from outside the University community are also eligible for a 10 percent discount.

In addition, if any tickets are available 10 minutes prior to the scheduled start of the performance, any Georgia Southern student with a valid University I.D. can purchase one ticket for \$10 plus tax.

Its name derived from creation mythology found in Native American folklore, Turtle Island features David Balakrishnan on violin and baritone violin, Evan Price on violin, Mark Summer on cello, and Mads Tolling on Viola.

Legendary cellist Yo-Yo Ma calls the quartet 'a unified voice that truly breaks new ground authentic and passionate a reflection of some of the most creative music-making today.'

Fusing the classical quartet esthetic with contemporary American musical styles, Turtle Island has recorded more than a dozen albums. The group's collaboration with the Ying Quartet, titled '4 + Four,' was named Best Classical Crossover Album at the 2006 Grammy Awards.

Turtle Island has also collaborated with The Manhattan Transfer, clarinetist Paquito D'Rivera, pianists Billy Taylor and Kenny Barron, and the Parsons Dance Company. The quartet has performed on the NBC-TV show 'Today' as well as the national radio shows 'All Things Considered' and 'A Prairie Home Companion.'

Season subscriptions for the PAC are still being offered for \$267.50, including tax. Subscriptions will be sold until Friday, Aug. 25, but people who purchase their subscriptions after Aug. 15 will not be guaranteed the same seats for every performance.

If purchased separately, tickets for every performance on the 2006-2007 calendar will cost more than \$365, so a season subscription represents a savings of 27 percent.

In addition to the Turtle Island String Quartet, the upcoming season at the PAC will feature the Pilobolus Dance Theatre on Saturday, Sept. 9; Vicki Lawrence on Friday, Sept. 29; 'Jesus Christ Superstar on Tuesday, Oct. 31; 'Cats" on Tuesday, Nov. 21; 'A Viennese Christmas" on Saturday, Nov. 25; 'Romeo and Juliet" on Saturday, Jan. 13; The Capitol Steps on Saturday, Feb. 10; 'Swan Lake" on Thursday, March 8; and Mark O'Connor and The Appalachia Waltz Trio on Friday, April 27.

The PAC is located on the Georgia Southern campus at the corner of Chandler Road and Plant Drive. The box office is open every Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m.

"Operation Move-In" to welcome nearly 4,000 students

Fall semester classes won't begin for a few more days, but Georgia Southern University will still be a very busy place the weekend before classes begin.

Some 4,000 campus residents with belongings ranging from clothes to comforters and computers to clock radios will arrive at the University's 11 residence halls on Friday, Aug. 11, and will be greeted by an annual event that the Department of University Housing has dubbed 'Operation Move-In.'

Check-in for the students is from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Recreation Activity Center (RAC). Classes begin Monday, Aug. 14.

'We've taken a number of steps to make sure that everything goes smoothly,' said Allison Scott, coordinator of occupancy management and assignments. 'We've shared pertinent information and directions with the students and their parents through a presentation we made at Orientation, our Web site and a reminder postcard.

'We've also been working closely with the Office of Public Safety and the Transportation Services people to plan for the flow of traffic on campus,' Scott said.

In keeping with a Georgia Southern tradition, more than 100 administrators, faculty and staff from across the University spectrum have offered to lend a hand with 'Operation Move-In.' The volunteers will assist the University Housing staff by greeting students and their parents, giving directions and even carrying boxes and suitcases.

In addition, Georgia Southern organizations offering to chip in include Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity, the Baptist Student Union, the Student Government Association and the Hispanic Student Organization.

'Operation Move-In' has gotten rave reviews from students and parents in the past,' Scott said. 'The Housing personnel are always well-prepared, and the volunteers are a huge help, too. We are simply trying to continue Georgia Southern's niche as a caring institution.'

The overwhelming majority of the students who will be living on campus will get into town on Aug. 11, to begin the centralized check-in process. The initial group of students is scheduled to arrive at 9 a.m.

According to a schedule that is based on the month of their birth, the students will first report to the Recreation Activity Center, where they will receive their room keys and other important materials. They will then proceed to their assigned residence halls to complete the check-in process.

At each residence hall, there will be designated curbside stations where the students can unload their belongings from their vehicles before taking them on to their rooms.

More than likely, a few students who will be living on campus won't arrive until Saturday, Aug. 12. Those students will report directly to their assigned residence halls.

As they settle into their new homes and get ready for the first day of class, the students will be encouraged to participate in a series of 'Welcome Week' activities that are designed to be fun as well as informative.

'Welcome Week' will include a cookout on Sweetheart Circle, a trip to the Splash in the 'Boro water park, a comedy show in the Russell Union Ballroom and an X-Box tournament.

On the evening of Tuesday, Aug. 22, 'House Calls' will return to the residence halls for the third year.

Sponsored by University Housing, 'House Calls' features teams of administrators, faculty and staff who visit first-year students in their rooms and welcome them to campus.

Wednesday, Aug. 9

What: Fall Convocation.

Where: Students will check in at the Recreation Activity Center and then proceed to the 11 residence halls.

What: First day of classes.

Where: Academic buildings across the campus.

When: 8 a.m. until 5 p.m.

Tuesday, Aug. 22

What: House Calls.

Description: In the latest installment of a program that has been honored by the University System of Georgia Board of Regents, teams of administrators and faculty members will welcome first-year students to the campus community by paying personal visits to the students in the residence hall rooms. The 'house callers' will give each a student a packet containing pertinent information and

answer any questions the student may have about living and learning on campus.

When: 6:30 p.m. until 8 p.m.
