AASU Names New Vice President of Student Affairs



Vicki L. McNeil has joined AASU as vice president of Student Affairs. She assumed office January 16. McNeil filled a position left vacant by Joe Buck, who retired from Armstrong Atlantic last spring after serving for 38 years.

McNeil's career spans nearly 30 years in all areas of student affairs. She has been fortunate to work directly with students in such areas as orientation, advisement, counseling, residential life, and leadership.

Her career began at Oklahoma State University in Stillwater in 1978 as a graduate research associate in the Office of Teacher Education, where she counseled students regarding education programs and teacher certification requirements.

In the early 1980s, she joined the University of Oklahoma's main campus in Norman, where she served as career counselor in the Career Planning and Placement Office and as adjunct assistant professor in the Department of Communications.

From 1982 to 1987, McNeil served as director of the Student Assistance Center at Temple University in Philadelphia, PA.

In 1988, McNeil accepted a position at Loyola University in New Orleans as assistant vice president for student affairs. In 1994, Loyola promoted McNeil to associate vice president for student affairs.

McNeil directed the extraordinary effort, with the eyes of the nation fixed on New Orleans, of evacuating Loyola students before the fateful Monday of August 29, 2005, when Hurricane Katrina slammed into the Gulf Coast crippling the city and shutting down the campus for the entire fall semester.

AASU Team Wins Moot Court National Championship

In what amounts to be a first for any college or university in the University System of Georgia, a team from Armstrong Atlantic has brought home the 2007 American Collegiate Moot Court Association National Championship.

Seniors Brian Dotson of Pooler, GA and Adam Morrison of Savannah, both political science majors, defeated 63 other moot court teams from across the nation to claim the championship. Regent University Law School in Virginia Beach, VA hosted the event January 19-20.



The AASU team dethroned top-seeded, two-time consecutive national champion Patrick Henry College, a private Christian school in Virginia that fielded eight teams, the maximum allowed.

Among the judges and lawyers serving as judges in the competition was former U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft. In the final round, Dotson and Morrison argued in before Ashcroft who served as the chief justice of the round.

AASU fielded a second team, composed of Mary Melton and Melissa Williams, who finished in the round of sixteen.

John Kearnes, associate professor of political science and originator of the moot court program at AASU was one of the faculty coaches. Faculty members Liz Desnoyers-Colas, assistant professor of speech/communication, and Becky da Cruz, assistant professor of criminal justice, also served as faculty coaches.

The Savannah-based law firm of Hunter Maclean Exley & Dunn, P.C. has provided coaching and financial support to the moot court program. Other members of the legal community who have served as coaches include: Judge Michael Barker, Chatham County Magistrate Court, and Joe Steffen with Miltiades & Steffen.

Agreement Signed with Federal Law Enforcement Training Center in Brunswick

The Federal Law Enforcement Center (FLETC) and Armstrong Atlantic (AASU) entered into a Cooperative Research and Development Agreement after two years of extensive planning. FLETC Director Connie Patrick met with AASU Assistant to the President for Strategic Initiatives William Megathlin in December for the official signing of the agreement.

FLETC's Computer and Financial Investigations Division and the School of Computing will undertake a joint training delivery and evaluation project to determine the feasibility of including certain educational components of computer science and information technology security fundamentals in law enforcement-oriented computer forensics training programs. This program will foster the development of investigative methodologies and tools relevant to Internet investigations, computer forensics, and cyber security.

Savannah-Ogeechee Regional Science and Engineer Fair to be Held at AASU

Armstrong Atlantic will host the Savannah-Ogeechee Regional Science and Engineering Fair on February 20-22 in the Sports Center.

Students in grades 6 through 12 are invited to participate. The event is open to public and private schools in Chatham, Candler, Bryan, Bulloch, Effingham, Evans, Liberty, Long, Screven, Tattnall, and Toombs counties.

This year, more than 150 students from 35 schools will participate. They will compete in several project categories, including engineering, environmental science, and chemistry.

The fair provides a forum for teachers and academics to encourage students to investigate science and engineering problems and ways to solve them. Through their projects, students learn organizational and logistical approaches to solving complex problems.

Students performing in the top 10th percentile will go on to represent the region at the March 2007 Georgia Science and Engineering Fair in Athens. Two students will be selected to compete at the International Science and Engineering Fair to be held in May in Albuquerque, NM.

Honor Society Inducts 39 New Members

The AASU's Circle of Omicron Delta Kappa Leadership Honor Society inducted 39 new members during a recent ceremony on the campus. Among the new inductees were Christopher Baker, languages, literature & philosophy, Helen Taggart, nursing, Dean Raymond Greenlaw, School of Computing, and Melanie Mirande, enrollment services.

Center for Regional Analysis Gauges Savannah's Economy in 3rd Quarter

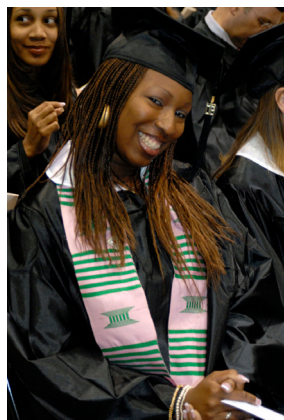
The 2006 third quarter issue of *The Coastal Empire Economic Monitor* is now available at www.econ.armstrong.edu/cra/monitor.htm.

The *Economic Monitor*, published by the Center for Regional Analysis, presents quarterly economic trends and short-term economic forecasts for Savannah's Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA).

The findings for the third quarter bode well for the local economy.

"The regional economy continues to expand at a pace substantially faster than the rest of the state," said Michael Toma, director of the Center for Regional Analysis. "The economic strength was widespread, with particular strength in manufacturing, tourism, and port activity."

Four former faculty members and two former administrators were recently granted emeritus status. **Marian Conway**, professor of nursing, **Deanna Cross**, professor of nursing, **Keith Douglass**, professor of psychology, and **Kenneth Relyea**, professor of biology, were recognized by AASU President Thomas Z. Jones and other colleagues during a luncheon on campus. Two former administrators were recognized earlier in the year with emeritus status: **Joseph Buck**, vice president for student affairs, and **William Megathlin**, assistant to the president for strategic initiatives.

Each fall and spring the university bestows emeritus status on distinguished faculty members who have served for at least 10 years before their retirement. The recognition brings with it certain lifetime benefits granted by the university such as inclusion in important campus activities and events, parking privileges, and continued teaching opportunities.

Gail Rountree, director of development, has received a Distinguished Service Award presented by the Georgia Education Advancement Council (GEAC). The award, given in November during GEAC's winter conference, recognizes leadership and service to the advancement of higher education in Georgia. GEAC is a statewide organization supporting professionals working in the areas of advancement, alumni, development, and public relations in higher education.
