THE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING . . .

Within the walls of the Administration Building, the vital activities of organization and administration of Georgia Teachers College take place. Occupying a prominent location on the campus, the "AD" Building is to G.T.C. what the heart is to the body. The vital fluids of academic life circulate from this center of activity to all parts of the school.

Contained in the Administration Building are the offices of the president of Georgia Teachers College, the offices of the dean of students, the dean of women, the registrar, the comptroller, and the offices of the divisions of languages, art, social sciences, and home economics. The Public Relations office, and the "Cave," home of the "George-Anne," student publication, are also located here. Not an

incident activity going on within the Administration Building is the conducting of classes in various classrooms. The new McCroan Auditorium is also in the Ad Building and is the gathering place for assembly programs and entertainment of all kinds.

Visitors to Georgia Teachers College invariably begin their tours of campus at the "Ad," while students find the building a source of application forms, data—and education. Even money can be procured from the student bank which is operated in the "Ad" Building.

It is appropriate that in a first view of the campus the Administration Building should stand out as the dominant image. Its prominent location on the G.T.C. scene is not misleading. For, once students pass through the front gates to enter Georgia Teachers College, the Administration Building takes a pivotal part in their college careers.

DIVISION OF LANGUAGES

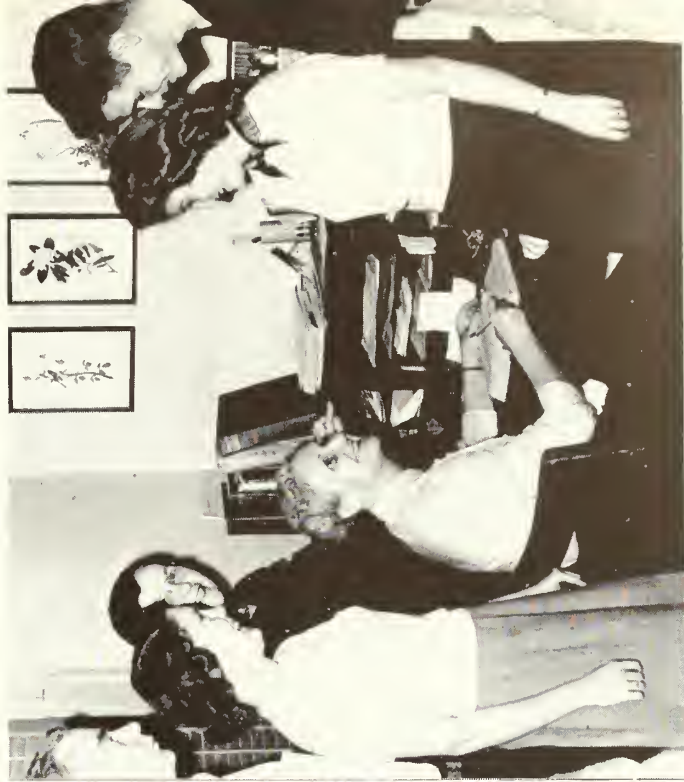

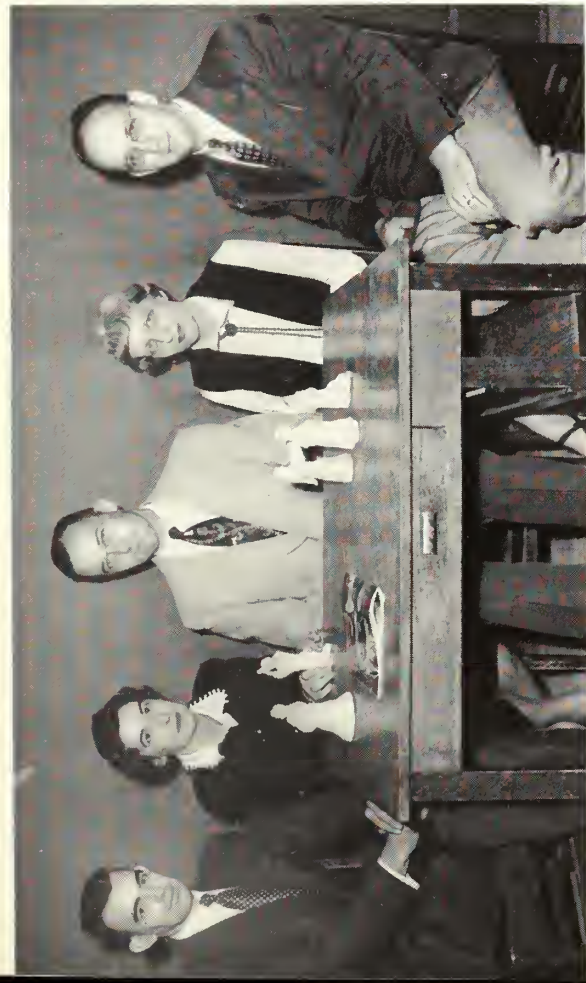

INDUSTRIAL ARTS BUILDING



The Division of Fine and Practical Arts is divided into two departments, Art and Industrial Arts.

The Department of Industrial Arts provides a four year course of study for students who wish to teach the various occupational skills required in private life and in industry. Individuals who follow the industrial arts program enroll in shop and drawing courses as well as the essential courses in general education.

The Art Department, at present, offers a minor in art. Courses such as basic art in life, drawing and painting, art for elementary teachers, creative design, and lettering and poster making are offered in this department.

BUSINESS DIVISION

The Division of Business Education offers degree programs in business education and two-year secretarial and clerical courses for students desiring to follow a junior college terminal program in business.

The business education program features courses in typing, shorthand, business math, and allied subjects.

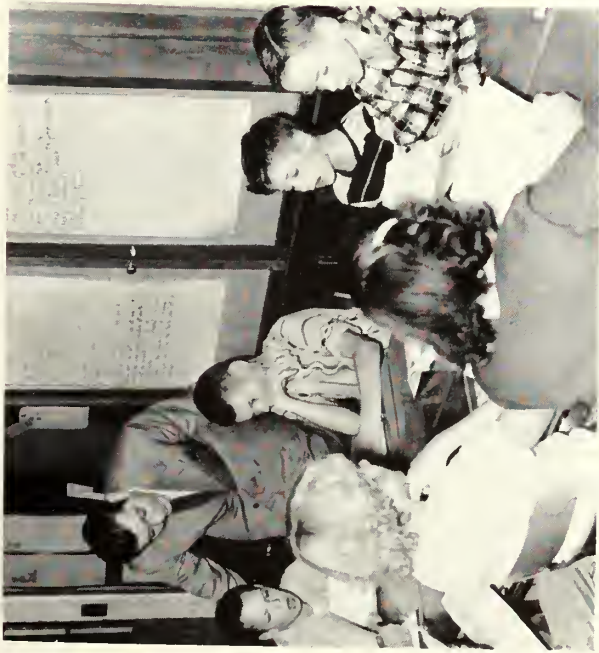

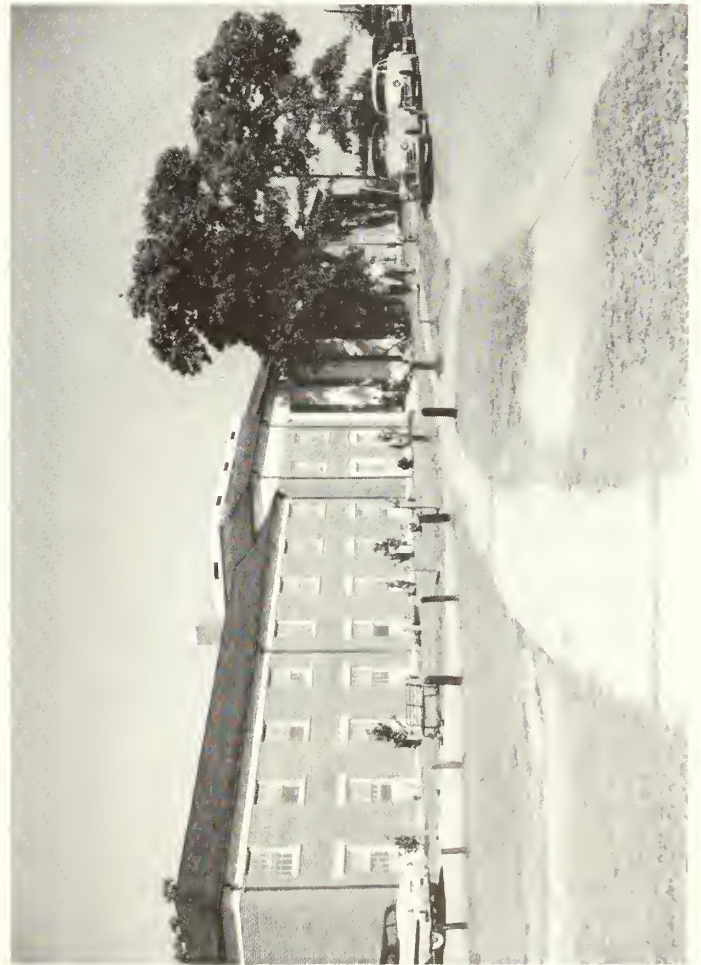
East Hall houses the Sophomore girls and has the distinct advantage of being in the "middle of things."

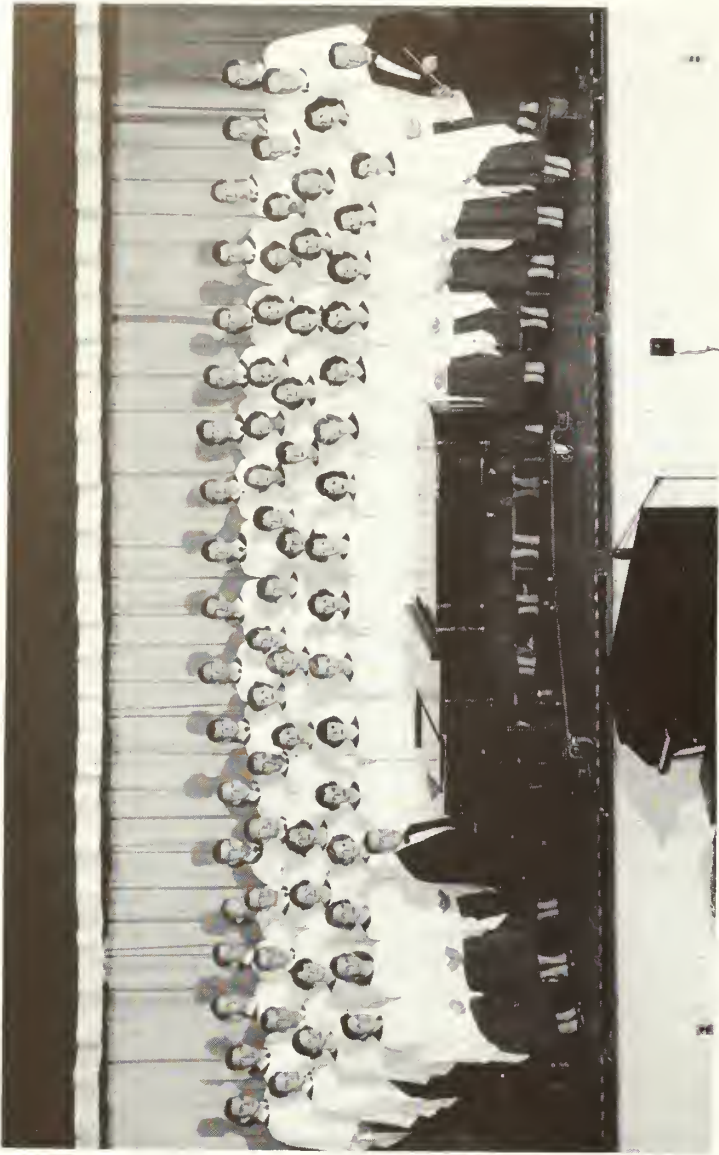

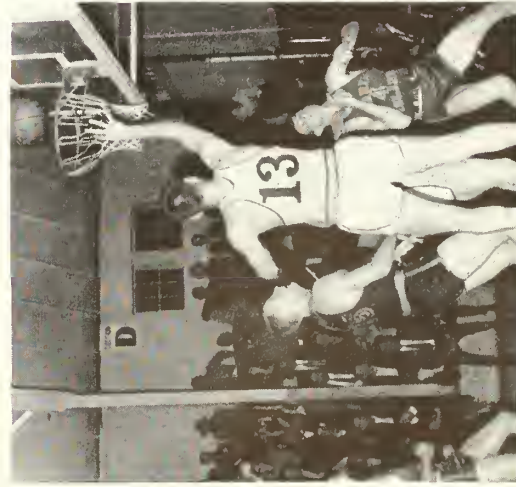

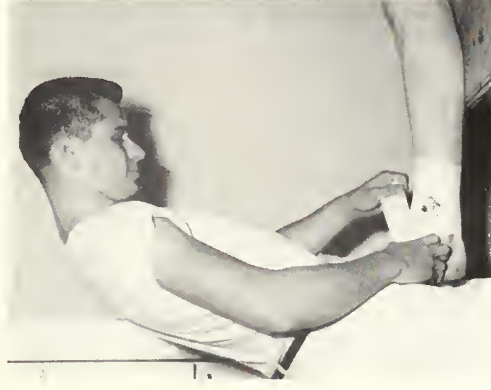

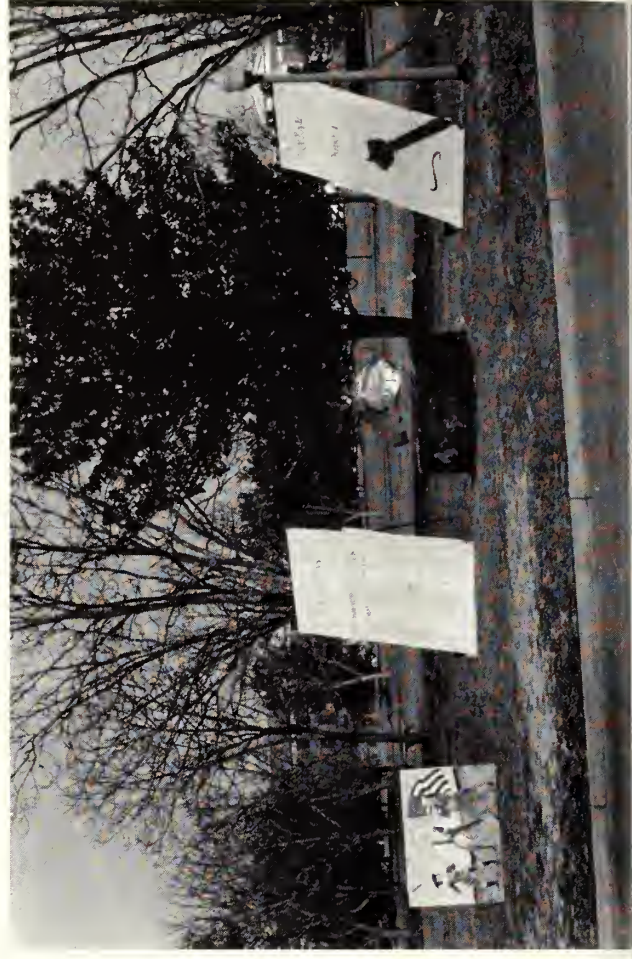
