Pirates Band Together As A T-E-A-M

The last two years, the Peach Belt Conference has sent seven teams to the NCAA Championships and recorded one NCAA National Championship, proving the strength of the league regionally and nationally.

This year, however, the race for the Peach Belt Conference title is as wide open as it has ever been. Two teams have left the league, one comes in. Eleven of the top 15 scorers and eight of the top 10 rebounders in the conference from last season have departed as well. Mix in a new 20-game slate in the PBC where every team plays every other team twice and it can truly be said that anyone has a chance at the crown in 2005-06.

Given all that teams have lost around the league, the Pirates stack up pretty well with what head coach Jeff Burkhamer has coming back, and because of that, coach Burkhamer has instilled a T-E-A-M philosophy

this season to help the Pirates succeed - **Together Everyone Achieves More.**

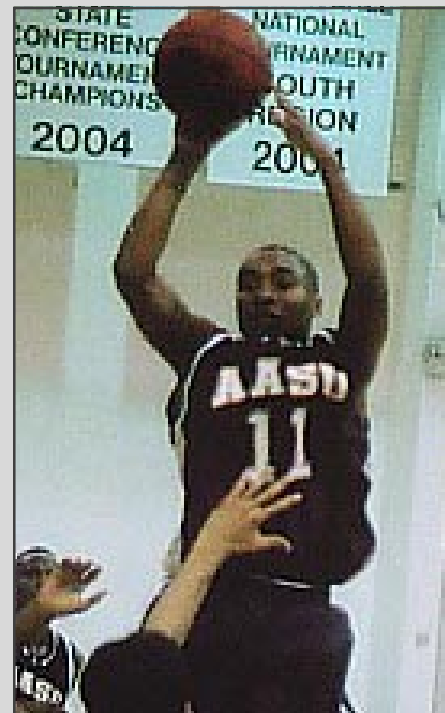
Begin with junior post player **Bryan Taylor** (6-7, 225, Timmonsville, S.C.), who is the only player to rank among the top 15 in scoring and the top 10 in rebounding in the PBC to return for 2005-06. Taylor earned second-team All-PBC honors a year ago, averaging 12.2 points and 8.0 rebounds per contest, and appears ready to secure a spot as one of the dominating post players in the league. Taylor set the Alumni Arena

record for most rebounds in a single game, 18, against GC&SU last season and recorded a team-high seven double-doubles.

Add to that the return of senior swingman **Alex Carter** (6-5, 220, Miami, Fla.), who averaged 11.2 points a game a year ago and ranked among the Peach Belt's leaders in field goal percentage and free throw percentage in his first season at AASU. Carter was awarded the 51st annual Dearing Cup for leading the Pirates in free throw percentage as a junior at 77.7 percent. The lone senior on the squad in 2005-06, Carter will also be asked to help the Pirates play smart on the floor and lead the underclassmen on the roster.

Sophomore guard **Jamaal Galloway** (5-10, 175, Inverness, Fla.) asserted himself as one of the PBC's top long-range specialists in his freshman season, hitting 42 percent of his three-pointers and averaging 6.7 points per contest. He was the Pirates' leading scorer off the bench a year ago and will look to crack the starting lineup this season.

The four other returnees are all post players who will be key for the success of the Pirates this season. Sophomore **Nick Bloemhof** (6-11, 215, Meppel, The Netherlands) and junior **Darly Massamba** (6-5, 215, Marste, Sweden) each sat out last season because of injury but will be counted on for offense and defense this season. Rapidly improving sophomores **Patrick Sanou** (6-6, 205, Ouagadagou, Burkina Faso) and

In Wide Open Peach Belt Conference Race



Sophomore guard William Kane transfers to AASU from Queens (NC) to run the point in 2005-06 for the Pirates. Kane ranked second in the CVAC last season in assists, dishing out 5.4 per contest.

Jimmy Fanning (6-10, 220, Hilton Head, S.C.) will also see significant time this season in the frontcourt.

One of the main problems for the Pirates last season came at the point guard position, where inconsistent play hurt AASU down the stretch in several key games. Enter a pair of point guards who will solidify the position for this year and beyond.

Sophomore transfer **William**

Kane (5-11, 175, Raleigh, N.C.) joins the Pirates from Queens University (NC), where he ranked second in the CVAC in assists, averaging 5.4 per contest. Kane is a steady ball-handler who has good court vision and acts like a coach on the court as well. Kane could be pushed by freshman **Kevin Parker** (5-10, 165, Savannah, Ga.), a local product from Savannah HS who was a second-team All-Coastal Empire selection as a senior. Parker is another intelligent player who uses his quickness to break pressure effectively.

More help in the backcourt will be provided by junior college transfer **Tory Harris** (6-3, 185, Lakeland, Fla.), who earned All-Mid Florida Conference honors last season for FCCJ, averaging 15.2 points per contest. He'll fight for a starting spot along with fellow junior college transfer **David Lopez** (6-3, 195, Tucson, Ariz.), who finished his sophomore season at Phoenix College strong, averaging 24 points a contest in his last eight games. Both will be counted on to add

to the scoring punch in helping to replace last season's leading scorer, Lorenzo Lawrence.

Walkon freshman **Jesse Eddy** (5-11, 150, Hilton Head, S.C.) could see time at either guard spot this season as well.

In the frontcourt, freshman **Parker Hayden** (6-4, 200, Raleigh, N.C.) is a former high school teammate of William Kane who has a great perimeter shot and will contribute offensively. Freshman **Will Lewis** (6-5, 220, Hinesville, Ga.) is a local product from the same high school, Bradwell Institute, that produced AASU standout Robert Campbell.

To help the Pirates "band" together in the T-E-A-M philosophy, AASU players are wearing maroon team bands around their wrists that say "AASU Basketball" this season.

The Pirates again have a challenging schedule, playing several NCAA Championships teams in both the conference and non-conference schedule. AASU opens the season with a key three-game road trip to Charlotte, where the Pirates will face Queens (NC), Shaw and Carson-Newman. The Pirates will also face Fort Valley State, Florida Tech and two more region foes, Lenoir-Rhyne and Presbyterian, in their annual Chatham Orthopaedics Holiday Classic. The Pirates will open the PBC season against preseason favorite Clayton State on December 3.

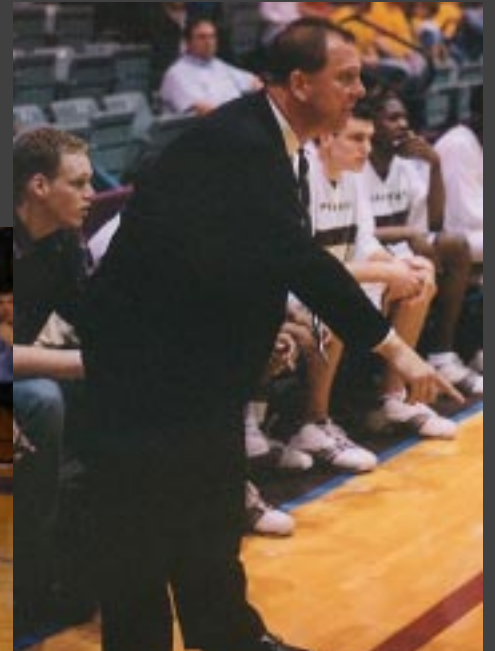

AASU has won two Peach Belt Conference Championships



Jeff Burkhamer Head Men's Basketball Coach

Jeff Burkhamer enters his fourth season as head men's basketball coach at Armstrong Atlantic State University. In three short seasons, Burkhamer has directed the return of the Pirates to NCAA postseason play, leading AASU to a 21-10 record and a berth in the NCAA South Atlantic Regional in 2003-04, and has compiled an impressive 50-38 record in those three seasons.

Burkhamer has also accomplished a couple of feats in his time as the Pirates' head coach - he has had a player earn first-team All-PBC honors each of his three seasons at AASU, a program first, and his teams have shown great tenacity and teamwork defensively, twice setting the school record for fewest points given up in a single game, the latest coming in a 66-39 win over Francis Marion in the first round of the Peach Belt Conference Championships. The win marked the 11th straight year that AASU has advanced past the first round of the league tourney.

Burkhamer joined AASU as its ninth head men's basketball coach on June 10, 2002 and led the Pirates to a 14-14 record in his first season, but a 12-7 mark in the Peach Belt, good for fourth place. A native of Williamstown, West Virginia, Burkhamer had been at Marshall University for four seasons under head coach Greg White, first as an assistant coach and then, in 2001-2002, as associate head coach. While at Marshall, Burkhamer helped the Thundering Herd to a 70-44 record in four seasons in Mid-American Conference play.

Prior to joining Marshall, Burkhamer served as the head coach at Santa Fe Community College in Gainesville, Fla., leading the Saints to two Mid-Florida Conference titles. He earned **National Junior College Coach of the Year** honors by College Sport Magazine in 1995-96 as the Saints set a school record with 28 wins and also won 21 straight games to begin the season, gaining a No. 5 NJCAA national ranking and finishing the year with a 28-4 record. In four seasons, the Saints went 97-31 under Coach Burkhamer.

Burkhamer also served as an assistant coach for three seasons in the Continental Basketball Association (CBA), the developmental league of the NBA, with the Grand Rapids Hoops before leading the Santa Fe program and previously served as a head coach at North Greenville College in Tigerville, S.C., where he went 58-10 in two seasons and earned NJCAA Region 10 Coach of the Year honors twice from 1989-1991. He started his coaching career as an assistant coach at Winthrop University in 1984-85, then moved to Charleston Southern (1985-87) and Morehead State (1987-89).

A graduate of Alderson-Broadus College in Philippi, West Virginia, Burkhamer was a four-year letterman for the Battlers in basketball and baseball and holds the school's all-time assist mark with 646. Burkhamer was inducted into the Battler Hall of Fame in 2001 and was recently honored by the *Parkersburg News and Sentinel* as a member of their silver anniversary team, spotlighting the top high school players from the Parkersburg area over the last 25 years. He graduated from Alderson-Broadus with a bachelor's degree in secondary education in 1984 and earned his master's degree in health and physical education from Morehead State in 1989.

Burkhamer and his wife, Diane, have two children - Melissa (14) and Lindsey (9) - and the family lives in Savannah.

Questions and Answers with AASU Head Coach Jeff Burkhamer

- **What were the most important factors in your decision to become the head basketball coach at Armstrong Atlantic?**

There were a number of factors that went into my decision. First of all, I wanted to be a head coach again and run my own program. I truly enjoy making the tough decisions and love running practices and coaching in games. Second, I wanted to live in the South and in a city where my family would enjoy living. The beautiful city of Savannah, the beach and the weather fulfilled that wish. Third, I wanted to coach at a school where I thought we could be successful and have a first-class basketball program. Our facilities are outstanding, we have scholarship money available and we have beautiful on-campus apartments.

- **What do you feel makes AASU an attractive place to play college basketball and pursue an education.**

Armstrong Atlantic provides the best of both worlds. A college diploma from AASU is a valuable tool. You will be very prepared in your field of study and will be marketable in the work world upon completion of your degree. We have state of the art classroom buildings, outstanding professors instructing in the classroom and, equally important, we have professors that care about the students and are willing to work with them to ensure academic success. AASU is a terrific place to play because of the philosophy of our basketball program. We want good people, individuals that will work to get their degree, and players that will compete on the basketball court. We have all the things a student-athlete needs to be successful at AASU.

- **What are your thoughts on the Peach Belt's new scheduling format whereby you play everyone in the league in a true round-robin format?**

I really like it. I feel you get a true Peach Belt Champion by playing everyone in the league home and home. Yes, it's tough because you have to play at a high level every night and 20 league games are a lot. But, I still feel like it is the right way to do it. It also helps us with filling out our schedule for the year.

- **How did qualifying for the NCAAs in just your second season at AASU help lay the foundation for the future of Pirate basketball?**

I am very proud of our players and our basketball program. Making the NCAA in just our second season was a huge accomplishment and the quickest its ever been done at AASU. I think it proves that we are doing things the right way and with the right kind of people. The bar has been set high and future Pirates must work hard and play with a tremendous passion in order for us to continue to compete in postseason play. Our goal is to win the PBC and play in the NCAA Tournament every year.

- **You've been involved with the marketing and promoting AASU basketball. What changes have taken place from the past three seasons?**

We have worked very hard at getting the word out about Pirate basketball. I feel we are a hidden jewel on Abercorn. We've really tried to get our student body involved in the "Compass Crazy's" student section. Our goal is to have the best home court in the Peach Belt. We've also been involved in the community. Kids are involved in contests and special promotions. We want everyone to have fun and at the same time cheer for the Pirates. We have a variety of events planned again this year. Assistant Men's Basketball Coach

G.G. Smith begins his second season at Armstrong Atlantic State as an assistant coach for head coach Jeff Burkhamer in 2005-06.

A former four-year standout at the University of Georgia and the eldest son of University of Kentucky head coach Tubby Smith, G.G. joined the Pirates in 2004-05 after spending one year teaching in Honolulu, Hawaii. Smith's prior experience includes a one-year stint on the staff at Tennessee Tech University in 2002-03, as well as two seasons as the graduate manager for his father's UK program from 2000-02.

Smith played from 1995-1999 at the University of Georgia and is the third-leading assist maker in school history, dishing out 440 assists in four seasons. He was the 29th player in school history to reach the 1,000 point plateau and finished his career with 1,131 points.

He received his bachelor's of science degree in health and physical education from the University of Georgia in 1999, and also received his master's degree in sport management from the University of Kentucky in 2002.

Smith and his wife, Lorie, a Kingsland, Ga., native, are already familiar with the Savannah area as the couple exchanged wedding vows on Bull Street in 2003.

Coach Burkhamer: "G.G. brings a lifetime of basketball experiences with him to Armstrong Atlantic. He's been in the gym with his dad and around good players and great basketball programs his entire life. I also believe his career as a player at the University of Georgia will give us instant 'name recognition' with high school players in our state. G.G. will be in charge of recruiting, will oversee academics and will be heavily involved with the individual development of our players on the court. I believe G.G. is a perfect fit for our basketball program.

Assistant Men's Basketball Coach

Jason Helton begins his second season with head coach Jeff Burkhamer as an assistant coach at Armstrong Atlantic State in 2005-06.

A native of Savannah, Helton joined the Pirates in 2004-05 after completing his bachelor's of science degree in education from the University of Georgia in 2003. While at the University of Georgia, Helton served as a student assistant coach for two seasons, helping the Bulldogs to the 2002 SEC Eastern Division title and two NCAA Championships appearances.

A lifelong basketball disciple, Helton began coaching children's basketball at the age of thirteen and has not stopped coaching since. He has worked numerous camps, including the Jim Harrick Basketball Camps in 2001 and 2002, and will be directly involved with film exchange, video breakdown and individual work with post players. He will also assist with practices and gameday preparation for the Pirates.

A 1997 graduate of Calvary Baptist HS in Savannah, Helton is currently working towards his master's degree in sports medicine from Armstrong Atlantic State. He is married to the former Posey Ragen, also a Savannah native.

This Is Savannah



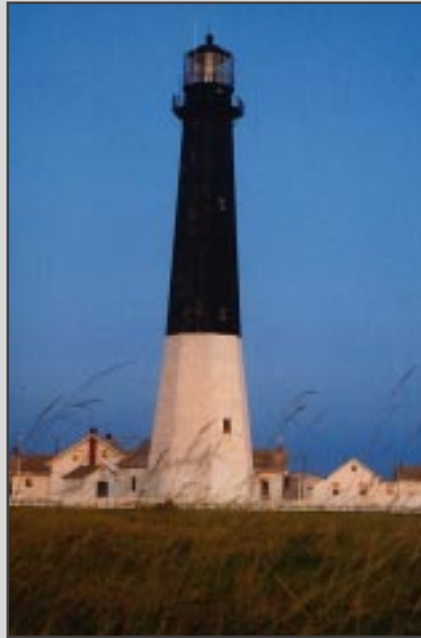
Historic Savannah, Georgia, is located on the Atlantic Coast, at the confluence of the Savannah River and the Atlantic Ocean. Throughout its history, there has been one adjective consistently used to describe Savannah: beautiful.

The reason? There's something about the unique beauty of Savannah that cannot be forgotten. Streets with canopies of moss-laden trees are honored venues for scores of historic homes. The town squares that Savannah's founding father, James Oglethorpe, laid out as public meeting places are now treasured "pocket parks" located throughout the downtown area.

A renovated waterfront area serves as the hub for shopping and entertainment. Nearby sandy beaches draw streams of visitors with persistent cool breezes and the endless lure of the rolling sea. Finally, there's an indescribable - but readily discernible - feeling in the air that pervades Savannah, a kind of "laid back" approach to the world, a "rootedness" that makes living or working in Savannah an experience second to none.

By way of affirmation, *Le Monde*, the leading French newspaper, called Savannah "the most beautiful city in North America."

Savannah has recently captured the imagination of a nation through its history and its appearance in several feature films, including "Glory," "Forrest Gump," "Something to Talk About," "Midnight In The Garden of Good and Evil" and the 2000 hit



film "The Legend of Bagger Vance" starring Will Smith and Matt Damon. Also, Savannah hosted the yachting events of the 1996 Summer Olympics. As a result, tourism has become one of the leading industries in the area.

Savannah hosts over six million tourists each year. Tourism impacts the Savannah area by over \$634 million. The city boasts over 7,000 rooms and more than 100 restaurants as folks have learned that Savannah is more than just a convenient rest stop on the interstate to Florida.

The climate of Savannah features warm, and sometimes hot, weather for most of the year. There are seven months in which the average temperature is 70 degrees or higher. The lowest average high is in January at 60.3 degrees.

The population in Savannah is roughly 130,000 and Chatham County is the fifth most populous county in the state of Georgia.

Savannah also sits centrally located to some of the southeast's finest beaches. Tybee Island, located less than 30 minutes from Armstrong Atlantic State's campus, offers six miles of unspoiled sands, tempting seafood and gracious accommodations. Resort areas such as Hilton Head, South Carolina, are less than one hour away and provide even more relaxing getaway options.

Whether it's the lure of historical settings, the friendliness of a southern community or the beautiful climate of southeast Georgia, Savannah is the place for you.

Armstrong Atlantic State University

Since its founding in 1935, Armstrong Atlantic State University has continued to develop to meet the Savannah community's educational needs. From its first location in Armstrong House in downtown Savannah to its current home on a scenic 250-acre lot off of Abercorn, the university has become one of the finest educational institutions in the Southeastern United States.

Armstrong Junior College was established by the Mayor of Savannah and other public officials in 1935. Housed in the beautiful and historic Armstrong House, a gift to the city from the family of George F. Armstrong, Armstrong Junior College grew over the years to occupy eight additional buildings in the Forsyth Park and Monterey Square areas.

In 1959, as Armstrong College of Savannah, it became a two-year unit of the University System.

The Board of Regents conferred four-year status on Armstrong in 1964 and the college moved to its present 250-acre location, a gift from Donald Livingston and the Mills B. Lane Foundation, in December of 1965. Additional buildings joined the eight original structures as Armstrong added professional and graduate programs and tripled in size.

In July of 1996, the Board of Regents voted to rename the college to Armstrong Atlantic State University to reflect its mission and identity. The university's reputation of excellence is still evident in its dedication to students, with a supportive environment.

Armstrong Atlantic State University was fully accredited as a senior institution by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in December, 1968, with accreditation retroactive to January 1, 1968, and was last reaccredited in December, 2001.

The university offers more than seventy-five academic programs and majors in its School of Arts and Sciences, School of Health Professions and School of Education.

The academic community includes approximately 7,000 students and more than 250 faculty members. Enrollment has nearly doubled in the last 15 years, from 3,700 students in 1990 to its current number.

Across campus, evidence of the university's growth can be found in its facilities. Recently completed buildings include a 115,000 square foot, \$28 million dollar science building opened in 2002; the brand new Student Recreation Facility, which is the

temporary home of the Lane Library while the Library undergoes an 11-month renovation project and phases one and two of Compass Point, the school's first dormitory buildings which opened in 2003. Phase two provides an additional 300 beds to the already existing 275 beds from phase one and campus leaders are in talks for a planned phase three addition to Compass Point.

The athletic department of Armstrong Atlantic State University is housed in the Armstrong Sports Center, completed in 1995. The Sports Center includes offices for the physical education department, training room and weight room areas, basketball courts, indoor track and offices for coaches and athletic department personnel. The building played host to the Peach Belt Conference's basketball tournament in 1998 and 1999 and hosts several in-season tournaments each year. In 2004-05, Armstrong Atlantic State hosted Peach Belt Conference Championships in volleyball and golf, while also hosting the 2005 NCAA Division II Men's Golf National Championships.

AASU sponsors ten intercollegiate sports and is a charter member of the Peach Belt Conference, formed in 1991. Women's soccer and women's golf debuted in 2005-06, joining men's and women's basketball, volleyball, baseball, men's and women's tennis, men's golf and softball as sports that AASU sponsors.

Continuing a mission begun in 1935, Armstrong Atlantic State University today serves a rich gamut of traditional and non-traditional students. Sixty percent of AASU's student body are from the Savannah-Chatham area, while others come from around the state, nation and world. All have come to Savannah to experience and thrive on the campus of one of the fastest developing higher learning institutions in the nation - to be a part of Armstrong Atlantic State University.

AASU's 115,000 square-foot state-of-the-art \$28 million science building opened in 2002.

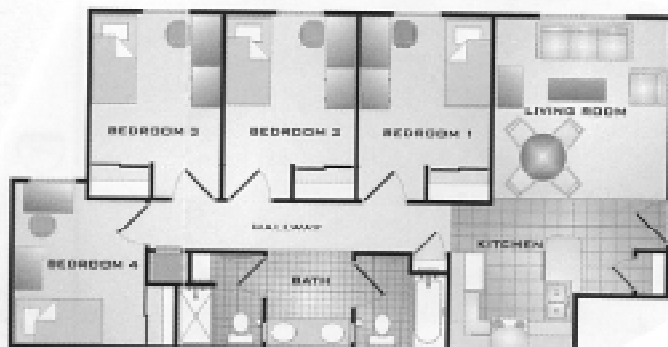

Dr. Aenchbacher received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Armstrong Atlantic State in 1979, where he was a standout student-athlete for the baseball team as a pitcher. He received his Master's degree and Doctorate of Education from the University of Georgia.

Along with his student-athlete experience at AASU, Dr. Aenchbacher also coached the Pirate cross country teams for five years and started the first AASU men's soccer team, which he coached for seven years.

During Dr. Aenchbacher's tenure as athletic director, AASU's athletic programs have had tremendous success in the classroom and on the playing field. Student-athletes at AASU have excelled in academics with 48 percent earning a 3.0 grade point average or better. The overall grade point average of AASU student-athletes is 2.9, higher than the overall institutional GPA. Over the last three years, the AASU athletic department has sent 18 of 24 teams to the NCAA DII Championships, and this past season the women's tennis team captured the school's third NCAA DII National Championship as well as the men's golf team successfully hosting the 2005 NCAA Division II Men's Golf Championships, the first-ever NCAA National Championship ever decided in the Coastal Empire area.

AASU's athletic teams play home events in a 4,000 seat arena that contains theatre-type seating for all spectators, and also plays host to a wide variety of social and sporting events.



2004-05 Season Review



The Armstrong Atlantic State men's basketball team endured an up-and-down season in 2004-05, but still attained several highlights, including a 10-3 start to the campaign and a strong finish, including two key wins late in the year to finish with a 15-14 overall record.

The Pirates picked up several key wins in the Fall, including a six-game win streak during December and January. AASU opened the year with an impressive 89-77 victory over Queens (NC) and followed that up with wins over South Atlantic Region foes Mars Hill and Lenoir-Rhyne. The first-ever regular-season meeting between AASU and cross-town rival Savannah College of Art & Design went to the Pirates in a thriller, 68-66, in the Chatham Orthopaedics Holiday Classic, and AASU entered January with wins over GC&SU and Augusta State to begin the league slate at 2-0.

As Peach Belt play began, the Pirates fell victim to several close contests against higher-ranked clubs. The Pirates dropped five of six home games in the new year, but none of those losses were by more than six points. AASU played defending DII national champion Kennesaw State to

a tough 52-50 contest, led Clayton State late before falling to the Lakers, 63-59, then watched USC Upstate hit a three-pointer at the buzzer to down the Pirates, 71-70.

As disheartening as that stretch may have been, the Pirates rebounded to pull off a huge second-half comeback at Columbus State on the final day of regular season play, shocking the Cougars, 79-70, to gain some momentum heading into the Peach Belt Conference Championships in Augusta, Ga.

In the first round of the league tournament, AASU matched up with Francis Marion. The Pirates played stellar defense, setting a school record in a 66-39 win over the Patriots, achieving a new school mark for

fewest points given up in a single game and advancing past the first round of the league tournament for the 11th straight season.

The Pirates also had several outstanding individual seasons during 2004-05, including senior Lorenzo Lawrence, who scored the most points in a single season by an AASU player since Peach Belt play began, registering 542 points (18.7 per game) and ranking second in the league. Lawrence earned first-team All-PBC honors, the fourth straight year that AASU has had a player be named to the league's first-team all-Conference squad, as well as second-team All-South Atlantic Region honors.

Sophomore Bryan Taylor improved on his fine freshman campaign to earn second-team All-PBC honors, ranking in the top 15 in the league in scoring (12.2 ppg), rebounding (8.0 rpg) and blocked shots (1.62 bpg), as well as ranking 37th in NCAA DII in blocks.

Junior Alex Carter (11.2 ppg) led the team and ranked sixth in the PBC in free throw percentage (.777), winning the 51st annual Ashley Dearing Cup, awarded to the top free throw shooter on the Pirates each season.

Along with Lawrence, senior Travis Wallace wrapped up his collegiate career for the Pirates. The former UNC Pembroke standout played one season for AASU, averaging 5.2 points and 5.2 rebounds per game in 2004-05.

As a team, the Pirates ranked 39th in NCAA DII in scoring defense, allowing just 65.3 points per game to their opponents, and ranked in the top five in the PBC free throw percentage (.680), 3-point percentage (.345) and defense (.343), rebounding (32.0 rpg) and rebound margin (+3.4) as well as blocked shots (3.41 bpg).

AASU ranked 39th in NCAA Division II in scoring defense, allowing 65.3 ppg

Since its inception in 1991, the Peach Belt Conference has worked tirelessly to become one of the elite conferences in NCAA Division II. Now entering its 15th season with 23 national championships and 20 national finalists, the PBC has accomplished that goal.

Starting with only two championships in 1991, in men's and women's basketball, the conference has expanded to 12 championship sports with the addition of women's soccer in the fall of 2000.

The conference traces its roots back to November of 1988 when 11 schools first met in Greenville, S.C. to form a Division II conference. Following a second meeting on Dec. 3, 1989, five of those 11 schools, plus two others, formed the Peach Belt in 1991.

The Peach Belt was less than a year old before capturing a national championship. The Columbus State golf team took the honor by winning the 1992 national crown, the first of three golf championships the Cougars own.

The 2004-05 season may have been the most successful yet with two national titles as USC Aiken won their second straight golf championship and Armstrong Atlantic State won the women's tennis national championship. The PBC also had the second-place or runner-up in baseball, softball, men's tennis and golf, giving the PBC a first or second-place in every spring sport the conference sponsors.

The seven charter members of the

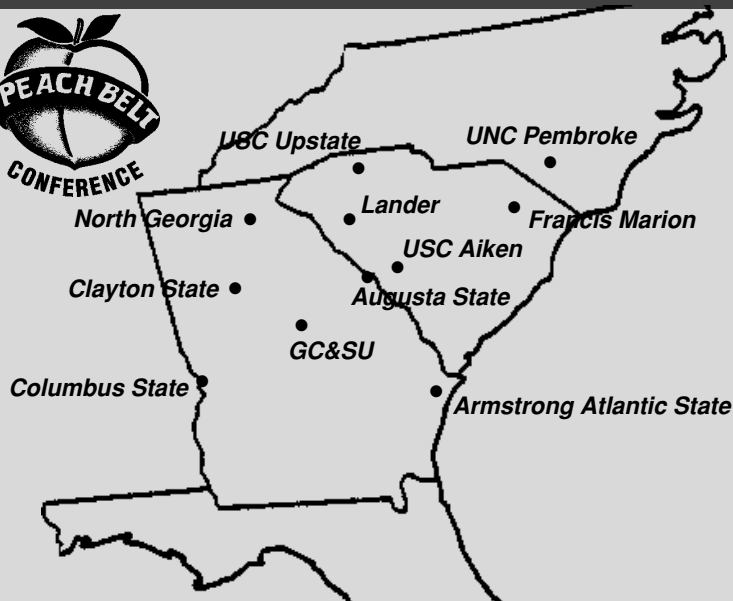
conference were Armstrong Atlantic State University, Columbus State University, Francis Marion University, Georgia College & State University, Lander University, USC Aiken and USC Upstate. The name Peach Belt Athletic Conference was adopted in January of 1990 and modified to Peach Belt Conference in May of 2000.

Augusta State joined the conference in 1991 and UNC Pembroke became the ninth member on July 1, 1992. They were followed by Kennesaw State University on July 1, 1994, Clayton State University on July 1, 1995 and the University of North Florida on July 1, 1997. Kennesaw State and North Florida departed for the Division I ranks in 2005 and the conference welcomed in North Georgia College & State University as its 11th member in the fall of 2005.

Former Augusta State basketball coach and athletic director Marvin Vanover was named the interim commissioner in April, 1990, and served in that capacity until his appointment as the conference's first full-time commissioner in July of 1991.

Dr. Daniel Ball, president of Lander University, is the president of the Peach Belt in 2005-06.

The conference currently holds championships men's and women's cross country, men's and women's soccer, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's tennis, baseball, softball and men's golf.

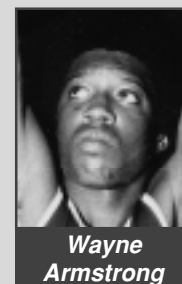

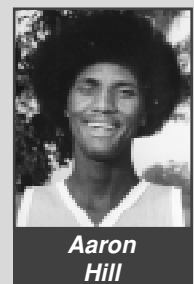

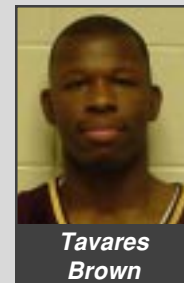

Two-time Peach Belt Conference Player of the Year Robert Campbell made an assault on the all-time NCAA Division II steals record in 2000-01, collecting a school-record 113 thefts and finishing just four steals shy of the all-time mark, held at the time by Oronn Brown of Clarion. A two-time DII Bulletin All-America selection, Campbell finished his four-year career as the Pirates' all-time leader in steals and games played and was the third leading scorer in school history, tallying 1,587 points.

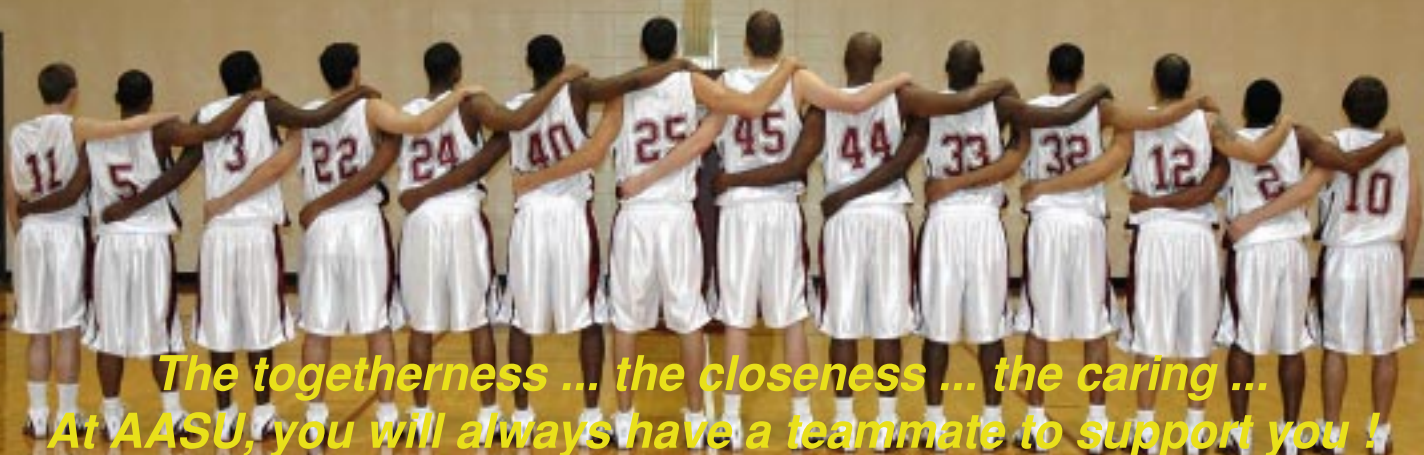
