Pirates Are Focused On Taking

An argument could be made that the Armstrong Atlantic men's basketball team enjoyed its finest season ever in 2005-06. With the Pirates receiving their first season-ending national ranking (No. 20) and their highest post-season seeding, the 23-8 squad accomplished much that previous AASU squads could not.

Instead of focusing on the past, however, head coach Jeff Burkhamer has the Pirates focused on the present. More specifically, his theme for Armstrong Atlantic this season is focus and concentration - focusing on the opportunity to achieve even loftier goals in 2006-07 and the concentration to see those goals met.

The Pirates return 10 players from last season's squad, including four of five starters, giving AASU a good corps of experienced collegiate players with which to begin the season. Four newcomers join the Pirates for the upcoming season, hoping to provide the

push to take AASU even further on its championship drive.

Perhaps the biggest key to the season for coach Burkhamer and the Pirates lies with senior **Bryan Taylor** (6-7, 245, Timmonsville, S.C.), the most experienced player on the AASU roster and a potential All-America candidate. Taylor earned All-PBC honors for the second time last season - just the second player in AASU history to earn All-Conference honors in consecutive seasons - after averaging 13.2 points and 7.4 rebounds

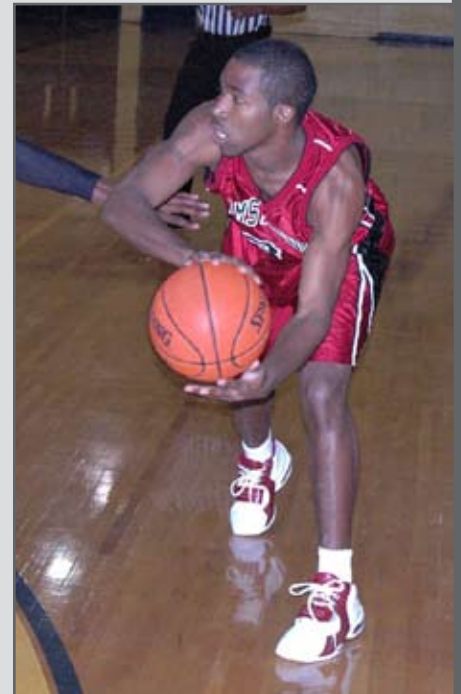
per game and will clearly be a focus of the Pirates' offense in 2006-07. Taylor begins the season just 21 points shy of 1,000 for his career and he has a chance to become AASU's all-time leader in games played during his senior season.

Senior shooting guard **Tory Harris** (6-3, 185, Lakeland, Fla.) made an immediate impact last season, making two game-winning shots in wins over USC Upstate and GCSU, while averaging 8.6 points per game.

Harris will team with fellow shooting guard **Jamaal Galloway** (5-10, 175, Inverness, Fla.) - a junior who became one of the Peach Belt's deadliest three-point shooters last season, ranking third in the PBC and 27th in the NCAA in three-point percentage - to give the Pirates an outstanding 1-2 punch on the perimeter.

Likewise, the point guard position was solidified in 2005-06 by the emergence of junior **William Kane** (5-11, 175, Raleigh, N.C.) and sophomore **Kevin Parker** (5-10, 160, Savannah, Ga.). Kane registered 126 assists last season, the most for an AASU player in a single season since 2000-01, and ranked third in the PBC in assist/turnover ratio. Parker displayed tremendous poise on the floor as a freshman and the two guards combined to hit 46 percent from three-point range (49-of-107), keeping defenses honest with their shooting ability.

Junior **Patrick Sanou** (6-6, 215, Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso) improved tremendously in his sopho-



Senior Tory Harris hit the game-winning shot with 1.7 seconds remaining to give AASU a 74-72 win over GCSU in the PBC Semifinals.

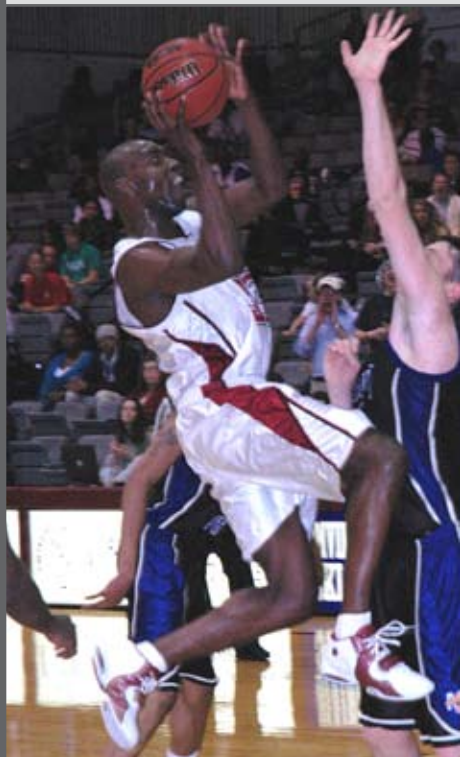

more season, earning a starting spot at power forward, while senior **Darly Massamba** (6-5, 215, Marste, Sweden) proved to be a difficult matchup for opposing defenses with his size and athleticism at the small forward spot.

The Pirates led the Peach Belt and were ranked nationally as a team in three-point shooting. Two more reasons the Pirates could do that again this year are through the

efforts of junior **Nick Bloemhof** (6-11, 235, Meppel, Netherlands) and sophomore **Parker Hayden** (6-4, 200, Raleigh, N.C.), both deadly shooters from three-point range.

Rounding out the returnees for the Pirates is junior **Jimmy Fanning** (6-10, 215, Hilton Head, S.C.), who will be counted on for a bigger role in the AASU frontcourt in 2006-07.

Two of the Pirates' newcomers for this season played previously for new assistant coach Steve Franklin when Franklin was at USC Aiken. Junior guard **Josh Geyer** (6-3, 200, Durham, N.C.) is a pure scorer who averaged 10 points a game for the Pacers in 2004-05. Junior forward **Franchot Brown** (6-4, 180, Washington Wilkes, Ga.) is an athletic post player who the Pirates hope will cause matchup problems with opponents.

Senior guard **Marlon Bussey** (6-4, 210, Augusta,

Ga.) is also expected to give the Pirates a lift after sitting out last season. Bussey transferred from Prairie View A&M and was a standout in junior college for Aiken Tech. Junior center **Craig Robinson** (6-7, 300, Allendale, S.C.) rounds out the newcomers for the Pirates, transferring from Morris College.

A return to a divisional format in 2006-07 means a reduction in conference games from 20 to 16 in the Pirates' schedule. Coach Burkhamer will therefore pit the Pirates against non-region foes in a couple of early season tests - AASU makes its first-ever trip to Missouri to play in the Hillyard TipOff Classic to open the season, facing Truman State and Missouri Western State. A home-and-home series with Sunshine State Conference foe Florida Southern and an early December trip to face Catawba and Lenoir-Rhyne will set the Pirates up for a couple of holiday tournaments, where AASU will host Eckerd, Southern Arkansas and Ferris State.

The Pirates have been picked to finish second in 2006-07 in a preseason vote of the league's coaches, behind Clayton State and just ahead of USC Upstate and Columbus State. This will be the last year of PBC play for USC Upstate, which moves to DI next year, but it will also be the first year of play for new member Georgia Southwestern State.

Jeff Burkhamer Head Men's Basketball Coach

Jeff Burkhamer enters his fifth season as head men's basketball coach at Armstrong Atlantic State University, leading the Pirates back to the NCAA Championships in 2005-06 with a 23-8 overall record and a No. 20 NABC/Division II national ranking. For his efforts, Burkhamer was named the "Whack Hyder" Georgia Collegiate Coach of the Year by the Atlanta TipOff Club, just the second coach in AASU history to earn that honor.

In his four years at AASU, the Pirates have compiled a 73-46 overall record, a .613 winning percentage that ranks as the best in Pirate men's basketball history, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament twice in the last three seasons. In Burkhamer's ten seasons as a collegiate head coach, he has compiled a 228-87 overall record (.723) and has earned Coach of the Year honors in six of those 10 seasons.

Last year, the Pirates were the highest-ranked four-year school in the state of Georgia at the end of the season, and AASU entered the NCAA South Atlantic Regional as the No. 2 seed, the highest postseason seeding ever for the Pirates. AASU also advanced to the Peach Belt Conference title game for the fourth time in school history and the Pirates set single-season school records for three-point baskets made (229) and attempted (588).

Burkhamer joined AASU as its ninth head men's basketball coach on June 10, 2002 after a four-year stint at Marshall University under head coach Greg White, first as an assistant coach and then, in 2001-2002, as associate head coach. While at Marshall, Burkhamer helped the Thundering Herd to a 70-44 record in four seasons in Mid-American Conference play.

Prior to joining Marshall, Burkhamer served as the head coach at Santa Fe Community College in Gainesville, Fla., leading the Saints to two Mid-Florida Conference titles. He earned **National Junior College Coach of the Year** honors by College Sport Magazine in 1995-96 as the Saints set a school record with 28 wins and also won 21 straight games to begin the season, gaining a No. 5 NJCAA national ranking and finishing the year with a 28-4 record. In four seasons, the Saints went 97-31 under Coach Burkhamer.

Burkhamer also served as an assistant coach for three seasons in the Continental Basketball Association (CBA), the developmental league of the NBA, with the Grand Rapids Hoops before leading the Santa Fe program and previously served as a head coach at North Greenville College in Tiger-ville, S.C., where he went 58-10 in two seasons and earned NJCAA Region 10 Coach of the Year honors twice from 1989-1991. He started his coaching career as an assistant coach at Winthrop University in 1984-85, then moved to Charleston Southern (1985-87) and Morehead State (1987-89).

A graduate of Alderson-Broaddus College in Philippi, West Virginia, Burkhamer was a four-year letterman for the Battlers in basketball and baseball and holds the school's all-time assist mark with 646. Burkhamer was inducted into the Battler Hall of Fame in 2001 and was honored by the *Parkersburg News and Sentinel* in 2004 as a member of their silver anniversary team, spotlighting the top high school players from the Parkersburg area over the last 25 years. He graduated from Alderson-Broaddus with a bachelor's degree in secondary education in 1984 and earned his master's degree in health and physical education from Morehead State in 1989.

Burkhamer and his wife, Diane, have two children - Melissa (15) and Lindsey (10) - and the family lives in Savannah.

Questions and Answers with AASU Head Coach Jeff Burkhamer

- **What were the most important factors in your decision to become the head basketball coach at Armstrong Atlantic?**

There were a number of factors that went into my decision. First of all, I wanted to be a head coach again and run my own program. I truly enjoy making the tough decisions and love running practices and coaching in games. Second, I wanted to live in the South and in a city where my family would enjoy living. The beautiful city of Savannah, the beach and the weather fulfilled that wish. Third, I wanted to coach at a school where I thought we could be successful and have a first-class basketball program. Our facilities are outstanding, we have scholarship money available and we have beautiful on-campus apartments.

- **What do you feel makes AASU an attractive place to play college basketball and pursue an education.**

Armstrong Atlantic provides the best of both worlds. A college diploma from AASU is a valuable tool. You will be very prepared in your field of study and will be marketable in the work world upon completion of your degree. We have state of the art classroom buildings, outstanding professors instructing in the classroom and, equally important, we have professors that care about the students and are willing to work with them to ensure academic success. AASU is a terrific place to play because of the philosophy of our basketball program. We want good people, individuals that will work to get their degree, and players that will compete on the basketball court. We have all the things a student-athlete needs to be successful at AASU.

- **Explain your offensive and defensive philosophy for Armstrong Atlantic basketball.**

Flexible would be the best way to describe our offensive and defensive philosophy. Offensively, we will change to take advantage of our most skilled players. We want to run in transition to put pressure on our opponent. If transition is not available, we want to be efficient with our offense and with our set plays. Defensively, we are a little more consistent. We want to play solid man-to-man defense in the half court and full court. We want to contain - contest - and close out possessions. We will trap some and play some zone. We will also adjust to certain situations depending on our opponent.

- **What do you feel is the most important ingredient in building and maintaining a successful basketball program?**

Players! You have to have good players. Recruiting is the lifeline of our program. To be great, we must be able to recruit against people in our league. Recruiting is always a tremendous challenge. We look for three things: First, we want a good person. This person should have some direction and goals for themselves as a student and as a player, along with a tremendous desire to succeed. Trust is also very important. Second, we want a person that can succeed and excel academically. Getting their degree and graduating must be important. And third, the person must be an outstanding player. They must possess basketball skills and have a love and passion for competition.

Steve Franklin Assistant Men's Basketball Coach

Steve Franklin begins his first season at Armstrong Atlantic State as an assistant coach for head coach Jeff Burkhamer in 2006-07.

A former player and coach for Burkhamer, Franklin joins AASU from USC Aiken, where he served as an assistant coach for six seasons and as the interim head coach for 18 games during the 2004-05 campaign.

Franklin graduated from USC Aiken in 1994 after a stellar two-year career in which he led the Pacers to the Peach Belt Conference regular season and tournament titles in 1992-93. Following his playing career, he assisted coach Burkhamer at Santa Fe Community College in Gainesville, Fla., where the Saints attained numerous national rankings - including a No. 1 ranking among Florida junior colleges - and won two Mid-Florida Conference titles. He served as an interim coach for the Saints in 1998-99, leading the Saints to an 18-12 record, before he returned to his alma mater to serve as an assistant coach to Mike Roberts in 1999.

During his coaching tenure with USC Aiken, Franklin was named the AFLAC National Assistant Coach of the Year award in 2003.

A native of Aiken, S.C., Franklin first became acquainted with coach Burkhamer at North Greenville College from 1989-91, playing for the Mounties and helping lead them to a 58-10 record, two regional titles, two NJCAA tournament appearances and two top 20 national rankings. At South Aiken HS, Franklin was a two-time All-Conference and All-State player for the Thoroughbreds. Franklin will be in charge of recruiting, overseeing academics and will be involved with the individual development of the players on the court.

Coach Burkhamer says, "Steve is a former player and former assistant of mine, but even more importantly Steve is a close friend that I know I can trust and know will be loyal to our program. He is an outstanding recruiter, and will provide tremendous on court coaching to our post players. Steve will be in charge of recruiting, will oversee academics, and will be heavily involved with the individual development of our players on the court."



Joel Lecoeuvre Assistant Men's Basketball Coach

This Is Savannah

Damon. Also, Savannah hosted the yachting events of the 1996 Summer Olympics. As a result, tourism has become one of the leading industries in the area.

Savannah hosts over six million tourists each year. Tourism impacts the Savannah area by over \$634 million. The city boasts over 7,000 rooms and more than 100 restaurants as folks have learned that Savannah is more than just a convenient rest stop on the interstate to Florida.

Armstrong Atlantic State University

Since its founding in 1935, Armstrong Atlantic State University has continued to develop to meet the Savannah community's educational needs. From its first location in Armstrong House in downtown Savannah to its current home on a scenic 268-acre lot off of Abercorn, the university has become one of the finest educational institutions in the Southeastern United States.

Armstrong Junior College was established by the Mayor of Savannah and other public officials in 1935. Housed in the beautiful and historic Armstrong House, a gift to the city from the family of George F. Armstrong, Armstrong Junior College grew over the years to occupy eight additional buildings in the Forsyth Park and Monterey Square areas.

In 1959, as Armstrong College of Savannah, it became a two-year unit of the University System.

The Board of Regents conferred four-year status on Armstrong in 1964 and the college moved to a 250-acre location, a gift from Donald Livingston and the Mills B. Lane Foundation, in December of 1965. Additional buildings joined the eight original structures as Armstrong added professional and graduate programs and tripled in size.

In July of 1996, the Board of Regents voted to rename the college to Armstrong Atlantic State University to reflect its mission and identity. The university's reputation of excellence is still evident in its dedication to students, with a supportive environment.

Armstrong Atlantic State University was fully accredited as a senior institution by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in December, 1968, with accreditation retroactive to January 1, 1968, and was last reaccredited in December, 2002.

The university offers more than seventy-five academic programs and majors in the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Health Professions, College of Education and School of Computing. The



academic community includes approximately 7,000 students and more than 400 faculty members. Enrollment has nearly doubled in the last 15 years, from 3,700 students in 1990 to its current number.

Across campus, evidence of the university's growth can be found in its facilities. Recently completed projects include the nearly 30,000 square foot Armstrong Center for Continuing Education and Community Engagement, which opened this fall; a \$5 million dollar renovation of the Lane Library; a brand new Student Recreation Facility and a 14,500 square foot Dental Hygiene clinic and Communicative Disorders Center. Campus life is abundant with Compass Point, University Crossings and University Terrace offering on-campus, two- and four-bedroom furnished apartments for 856 students.

The athletic department of Armstrong Atlantic State University is housed in the Armstrong Sports Center, completed in 1995. The Sports Center includes offices for the physical education department, training room and weight room areas, basketball courts, indoor track and offices for coaches and athletic department personnel. The building played host to the Peach Belt Conference's basketball tournament in 1998 and 1999 and hosts several in-season tournaments each year. Construction of a women's fieldhouse for soccer and softball began in the fall and should be completed in Spring 2006.

AASU sponsors ten intercollegiate sports and is a charter member of the Peach Belt Conference, formed in 1991. Women's soccer and women's golf debuted in 2005-06, joining men's and women's basketball, volleyball, baseball, men's and women's tennis, men's golf and softball as sports that AASU sponsors.

Continuing a mission begun in 1935, Armstrong Atlantic State University today serves a rich gamut of traditional and non-traditional students. Forty-three percent of AASU's student body are from the Savannah-Chatham area, while others come from around the state, nation and world. All have come to Savannah to experience and thrive on the campus of one of the fastest developing higher learning institutions in the nation - to be a part of Armstrong Atlantic State University.

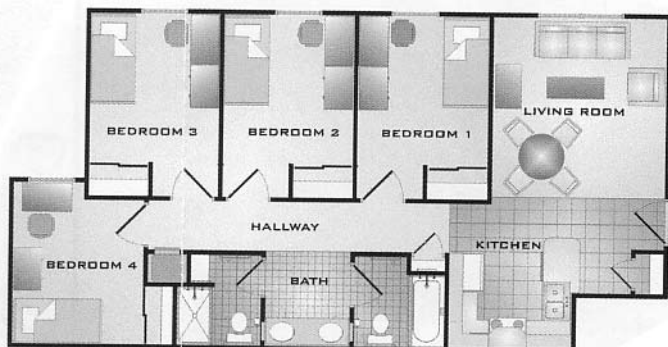

Thomas Z. Jones, the sixth president to serve at Armstrong Atlantic State University, begins his sixth year at AASU. Hired on August 1, 2000, Jones was selected by the Board of Regents and University System of Georgia Chancellor Stephen R. Portch after an exhaustive national search.

Dr. Jones served on the faculty and administration at Columbus State University, as its vice president for academic affairs from 1988-2000, prior to coming to Armstrong Atlantic State. A 30-year veteran of university teaching and administration, Dr. Jones has taught at Indiana State University, Emory and Henry College and the West Virginia Institute of Technology. While at West Virginia Tech, Dr. Jones served as the Westmoreland Professor of Mining, an endowed professorship, and vice president of academic affairs.

Dr. Jones received his bachelor's degree in physics from Fairmont State College, his master of arts degree in geology from West Virginia University and his Ph.D in Geology from Miami (Ohio) University.

From 1980-1988, he owned and served as president of Technical Evaluation Consultants, Inc., a privately owned business specializing in providing science, technical and engineering services for business, industry, government agencies and the legal community.

Dr. Eddie Aenchbacher Athletic Director

Dr. Eddie Aenchbacher begins his eleventh full year as the athletic director for Armstrong Atlantic State University.

Dr. Aenchbacher's responsibilities include overseeing the entire athletic department and promoting Armstrong Atlantic State athletics in the community of Savannah.

Dr. Aenchbacher received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Armstrong Atlantic State in 1979, where he was a standout student-athlete for the baseball team as a pitcher. He received his Master's degree and Doctorate of Education from the University of Georgia. Along with his student-athlete experience at AASU, Dr. Aenchbacher also coached the Pirate cross country teams for five years and started the first AASU men's soccer team, which he coached for seven years.

During Dr. Aenchbacher's tenure as athletic director, AASU's athletic programs have had tremendous success in the classroom and on the playing field. Student-athletes at AASU have excelled in academics with 49% earning a 3.0 grade point average or better. The overall grade point average of AASU student-athletes is 2.84, higher than the overall institutional GPA, and in 2005-06 the AASU athletic department captured the inaugural Peach Belt Conference Presidential Academic Award, given to the league athletic department whose student-athletes record the highest overall GPA compared to the student body. AASU also sent six of 10 intercollegiate teams to NCAA championship play and six of 10 teams also finished the 2005-06 season ranked nationally.

Dr. Will Lynch Faculty Athletic Representative



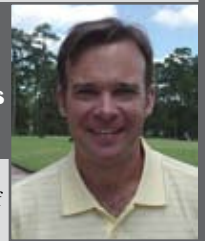

The Armstrong Atlantic State University's athletic department prides itself on having one of the finest athletic facilities not only in the conference, but in the region as well.

AASU's Sports Center, completed in July of 1995, immediately became a top basketball complex by hosting the 1998 and 1999 Peach Belt Conference basketball tournaments.

This 82,000 square foot multi-purpose building provides expanded academic offerings in spacious, modern surroundings. Students have a three-station computer lab; a 1,965 square foot weight training/fitness center with more than 30 Cybex machine exercise stations, stair climbers, treadmills, upright and semi-recumbent bike, elliptical trainer and a free weight area; four new classrooms and two 3,535 square foot activity areas.

AASU's athletic teams play home events in a 4,000 seat arena that contains theatre-type seating for all spectators, and also plays host to a wide variety of social and sporting events.

2005-06 Season Review



The AASU men's basketball team returned to region and national prominence in 2005-06, compiling a 23-8 season that saw the Pirates earn its second NCAA postseason berth in the last three seasons. AASU also achieved a program first - finishing the season ranked nationally as the Pirates completed the season with a No. 20 national ranking in the NABC/Division II Coaches' Top 25 poll.

The Pirates also reached the Peach Belt Conference Tournament title game for the fourth time in school history and entered the NCAA South Atlantic Regional with a program-best second seed.

The 23 wins tallied by the Pirates represented the third most in a single season in school history, while AASU led the Peach Belt in three-point field goal percentage and ranked second in field goal percentage defense. The Pirates ranked 11th in NCAA Division II in field goal percentage defense (.393), 28th in three-point field goal percentage (.389) and 30th in won-lost percentage (.742). AASU also ranked 22nd in scoring defense, giving up just 63.5 points per game, the second straight year in which the Pirates have ranked nationally in that category.

AASU opened the 2005-06 season with a trip to North Carolina. The Pirates knocked off Queens, Shaw and Carson-Newman in a four-day span to tip off the season on a positive note. A home-opening victory over Clayton State and wins over Lenoir-Rhyne and Presbyterian in the Chatham Orthopedics Classic sparked a nine-game win streak that stretched into mid-January. The Pirates closed out the season strong, winning five of its last six games, and finished the season with a sparkling 12-1 home record.

In the PBC Tournament, the Pirates staged furious comebacks, erasing an eight-point halftime deficit to Augusta State in the opening round to defeat the Jag-

uars, 76-69, then getting a game-winning shot from junior Tory Harris with 1.7 seconds left to upend GCSU, 74-72, to earn a berth in the Championship game.

Junior Bryan Taylor continued his steady improvement for the Pirates, earning first-team All-PBC honors for leading AASU in scoring (13.2 ppg), rebounding (7.4 rpg) and blocked shots (42). Taylor also earned All-PBC Tournament honors and is just the second AASU player to earn multiple All-PBC honors.

Senior Alex Carter closed out a fine two-year career for the Pirates by earning All-PBC second team honors, averaging 11.6 points per game and 6.2 rebounds per game. Carter and Taylor were each named to the All-PBC Tournament team as well.

Sophomore Jamaal Galloway waged a season-long assault on the AASU three-point charts and finished the season ranking third in the PBC and 27th in the NCAA in three-point shooting, while also taking home the Ashley Dearing Cup as the team's leading free throw shooter.

For his efforts in directing the Pirates to the NCAA Championships, head coach Jeff Burkhamer was named the "Whack Hyder" Georgia Collegiate Coach of the Year by the Atlanta Tip-Off Club, just the second AASU coach to earn that honor, joining Griff Mills (1994-95, 2000-01) in being honored by the organization.

The Pirates also excelled in the classroom in 2005-06 as sophomore Patrick Sanou was awarded with the AASU President's Cup, given to the top student-athlete each year, and AASU placed four players on the PBC Presidential Honor Roll - Sanou, Parker Hayden, William Kane and Darly Massamba.

The Peach Belt Conference

Since its inception in 1991, the Peach Belt Conference has worked tirelessly to become one of the elite conferences in NCAA Division II. Now entering its 16th season with 24 national championships and 22 national finalists, the PBC has accomplished that goal.

Starting with only two championships in 1991, in men's and women's basketball, the conference has expanded to 12 championship sports with the addition of women's soccer in the fall of 2000. The conference traces its roots back to November of 1988 when 11 schools first met in Greenville, S.C. to form a Division II conference. Following a second meeting on Dec. 3, 1989, five of those 11 schools, plus two others, formed the Peach Belt and begin play in 1991.

The Peach Belt was less than a year old before capturing a national championship. The Columbus State golf team took the honor by winning the 1992 national crown, the first of three golf championships the Cougars own.

The 2005-06 season continued the tradition of excellence the conference has established. USC Aiken became only the second men's golf team in Division II history to capture three straight national titles with their win in the spring of 2006. The Columbus State men's golf team finished second in the nation to USCA while the Armstrong Atlantic State women's tennis team also reached the national championship final.

The seven charter members of the conference were Armstrong Atlantic State

University, Columbus State University, Francis Marion University, Georgia College & State University, Lander University, USC Aiken and USC Upstate. The name Peach Belt Athletic Conference was adopted in January of 1990 and modified to Peach Belt Conference in May of 2000.

Augusta State joined the conference in 1991 and UNC Pembroke became the ninth member on July 1, 1992. They were followed by Kennesaw State University on July 1, 1994, Clayton State University on July 1, 1995 and the University of North Florida on July 1, 1997. Kennesaw State and North Florida departed for the Division I ranks in 2005 and the conference welcomed in North Georgia College & State University in 2005 and Georgia Southwestern State University in 2006.

Former Augusta State basketball coach and athletic director Marvin Vanover was named the interim commissioner in April, 1990, and served in that capacity until his appointment as the conference's first full-time commissioner in July of 1991. Vanover will step down as the conference commissioner in June of 2007.

Dr. Thomas Jones, president of Armstrong Atlantic State University, is the president of the Peach Belt in 2006-07.

The conference currently holds championships in 12 sports, six for men and six for women. They are men's and women's cross country, men's and women's soccer, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's tennis, baseball, softball and men's golf.

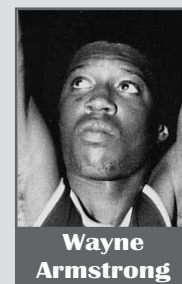

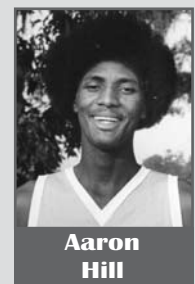

Two-time Peach Belt Conference Player of the Year Robert Campbell made an assault on the all-time NCAA Division II steals record in 2000-01, collecting a school-record 113 thefts and finishing just four steals shy of the all-time mark, held at the time by Oronn Brown of Clarion. A two-time DII Bulletin All-America selection, Campbell finished his four-year career as the Pirates' all-time leader in steals and games played and was the third leading scorer in school history, tallying 1,587 points.

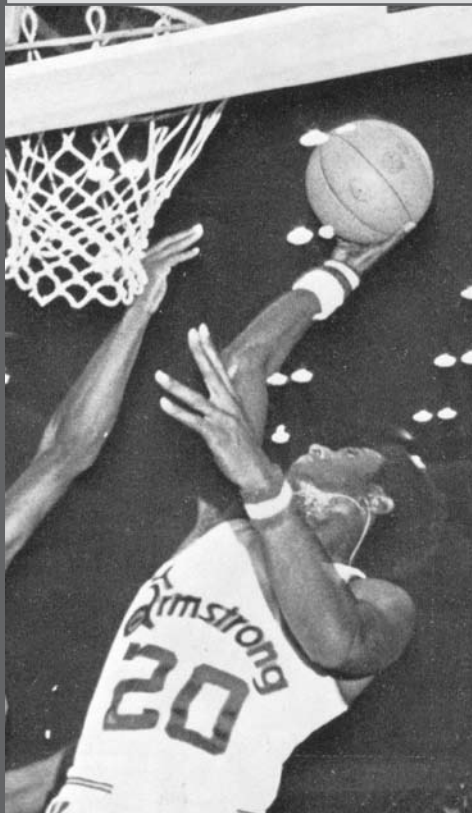

The Dearing Cup

With a history as long as the existence of basketball at Armstrong, the Dearing Cup has become a symbol among the Pirate faithful for dedication, preparation and execution on the basketball court. Named for longtime Savannah and Armstrong Atlantic State basketball supporter Ashley Dearing, the Dearing Cup is awarded to the AASU player with the best free throw percentage each season. Listed below are the winners of the Dearing Cup - an award that has been given for more than 50 years.

Last year, sophomore Jamaal Galloway (right, pictured receiving the award from Ashley Dearing) captured the Dearing Cup by hitting 55 of his 65 free throws for an outstanding .846 free throw percentage. Galloway has also excelled from long range, ranking among the Peach Belt Conference's leaders in three-point field goal percentage each of the last two seasons and hitting 84 three-pointers in 2005-06, second-most in a single season in AASU history.

The list of former winners of the Ashley Dearing Cup reads as a who's-who of Armstrong Atlantic State basketball - from AASU Athletic Hall of Famers Foy Ballance and Danny Sims to All-Americans Ike Williams and Danny Stell to current Savannah Country Day head boys basketball coach Mike Harner.
