Funeral for Zipporia G. Alston, 73, Lawton, will be at 11 a.m. Tuesday at Bethlehem Baptist Church with Gary E. Bender, pastor, officiating.



Mrs. Alston died Wednesday, Dec. 12, 2001, at a local hospital.

She was born July 8, 1928, in Yellow Pine, La., to E.L. Taylor and Eva Winston. She attended elementary school in Yellow Pine and high school in Elizabeth, La. She moved to Lawton from Germany in 1953. She married retired Command Sgt. Maj. James H. Alston Jr. on Jan 23, 1953, in Wichita Falls, Texas. She was a homemaker and a member of Bethlehem Baptist Church, where she served with The Mission and the after-school tutoring program.
