## Who Are The Masters?

It is the theory of popular government that of all the officials, whether they owe their preferment to election or appointment by other officials, are the servants of the people. It is likely that in the early years of government this theory was recognized by all the official class, from the lowest to the highest. Now, however, both through the indifference of the people to the maintenance of their prerogatives, and through the natural tendency of office-holding to foster arrogance and to lead to usurpation, the office-holding class at least seem to look upon themselves as the masters of the people. Men who, according to our theory of government, are the mere agents of the people, selected because of supposed fitness, to serve them in the necessary departments of government look upon themselves not as the servants but as the rulers of the people. As a rule, they look upon the offices held by them as their personal property; and they resent criticism by the people of their conduct of the agencies held by them as affronts to their dignity and unwarranted interference with their rights. As Shakespeare expressed this very thought:—“Man clothed in a little brief authority plays such fantastic tricks before high heaven as make the angels weep!” And it will be generally found to be the case, that the more humble the office the lordlier will be the airs of the temporary incumbent. If he be the servant of other servants, his strut of self importance and his pompous contempt for the wishes and opinions and rights of the people—the masters of his masters—will be such as to excite the wondering resentment even of the indifferent.

The time has come for the people to assert themselves in their relation to the office-holding class. The office belongs to the people—they should be fit to the interest of the people. They are not the property of the persons who are selected to fill them. They should all be filled by a vote of the people and the incumbents should be compelled to render frequent accounts of their stewardship, with response in personal decency in answer to questions such as:—“How do you return to government of the people, for the people, the people, and to put in this service and forever, to the present government of the official class, by the official class. In this way alone may reforms be accomplished, and the government, Federal, State, county and municipal, be restored to the honesty and simplicity of former times. As matters now go, every phase of government in the United States is a caricature on decent, constitutional, popular government. If they will, the people can force reform to first principles.—Sparta Ishmael.

## THE SEABOARD SOLD.

(From the Savannah News.)

New York, March 9.—The World will say tomorrow:

August Belmont has acquired control of the Seaboard Air Line and devised a close traffic arrangement with the Louisville and Nashville Railroad.

In this new railroad enterprise August Belmont & Co., represented a syndicate of Wall

Street bankers and the Rothschilds of England. The plan is said to have been completed last week in a series of conferences at the office of August Belmont and John Skelton Williams of Richmond, Va., president of the Seaboard Air Line.

On the highest authority it is said that full announcement of the deal will be made this week. It is told that the plan to acquire the Seaboard Air Line grew out of the knowledge that if the Louisville and Nashville did not get control of it at once, its rival, the Southern Railway, would do so. Therefore, in the purchase the Louisville and Nashville takes a big amount of the securities and close connection will be established between the two systems.

## President Williams Indicates the Report—Control of System Is Not for Sale.

Richmond, Va., March 10.—President John Skelton Williams was asked to-day regarding the report published in a New York newspaper that the Seaboard Air Line system has been purchased by August Belmont and the Rothschilds. He ridiculed the story and said:

“The report that a controlling interest in the Seaboard Air Line system has been purchased by parties allied to the Louisville and Nashville or any other system is an idle one, and without foundation. I regret that newspapers should be willing to give credence to such reports. I and my immediate associates own a controlling interest in the Seaboard system. My financial interest in it to-day is larger than it ever has been before. The condition of the system is stronger than ever and earnings are heavier than at any time in its past history. We are satisfied with the property, intend to hold it, and operate it, and a controlling interest in the Seaboard Air Line system is not for sale to anybody at any price.”—Savannah News.

## Texas Deadly Cyclone.

Wills Point, Tex., March 10.—At 11 o'clock this morning a cyclone passed through the west side of this town, demolishing everything in its track. Four people are dead and about twenty injured. Fourteen dwelling houses are entirely ruined and a number of the others are badly wrecked. The cotton oil mill is damaged and the largest gun plant is in splinters. Wires are blown off the poles and fences are leveled and a freight car is off the track.

The property loss is placed at \$50,000, which is considered a conservative estimate.

Black clouds had been hanging in the southwest all morning. The atmosphere was heavy and at intervals there had been blustering showers of rain. It was just at noon when there was a long roar of rumbling thunder, a puff of wind and then the air was thick with flying timbers.

The cyclone came from the south west and held to a straight north east course. Its path was about three hundred yards wide. It struck the northwest quarter of town, in the residence section. No house is left whole, those that are not irreparably wrecked, are in the minority, most of them are demolished—mere heaps of debris that offer opportunity for the junk man. Household furniture and utensils are strewn farther than the eye can reach.—Savannah News.
