MEXICO OF THE MOYE.

President Diaz Opens April Session of Congress.
At Mexico City, April 1, 1913, President Diaz opened the April session of the twentieth congress. His first act was to declare a holiday to be observed by a large audience, among whom were several visiting Americans.
At the first presidential address, the foreign relations of Mexico, friendly relations with the twenty-two republics of this continent have accepted the invitation of Mexico to send delegates to the International American convention, which will meet at the capital on the 23d of October next.
The Mexican government has also invited the Latin-American Scientific congress, to be held in Montevideo, capital of Uruguay, in 1914.

During the first six months of the present fiscal year 278 new tons of gold were produced, mostly for gold and silver properties.

The census shows the population of the republic at 13,546,700, an increase of 91,340 in five years.

Seventy-five new postoffices have been established and a noteworthy increase in the amount of postal matter handled has been made. Special business with the United States has increased 40 per cent. The postal revenues have increased 16 per cent. The telegraph lines have increased 4,400 miles and several new river cables have been laid.

The financial condition of the government is satisfactory. During the first half of the fiscal year the revenue amounted to a total of \$31,000,000, the largest sum ever collected in a similar period during the history of the government.

ENDLANDS' PEASANTRY.

Their Present Condition Contrasted With That of a Century Ago.

The agricultural laborers of to-day are certainly better off, more hearty, could feel, have far more leisure, are better clothed, and are rapidly becoming better housed than their forefathers a century ago. And if these are not the main constituents of happiness, there are others.

On the other hand, their grandfathers and great-grandfathers were much more contented with their lot than the moderns; they enjoyed their lives much more than their descendants do; they had incomparably more laughter, more amusement, more real delight in

labor of their hands; there was more love among them and less hate. The agricultural laborer had no last drink on time between twenty or thirty years ago, and he has been growing out of that. A village not is now a very rare bird, as rare as he was a hundred years ago. Then the laborer could not afford a drunken debauch—he had not the wherewithal. His master, the farmer, did drink, and sometimes deeply in the days when he was prospering. HATCHING BUTTERFLIES

THE WONDERFULLY CONGECIT- FIT OF A NEW JERSEY MAN.

He lives on the Lawrence Road, near Trenton and is trying to inaugurate a Social Pad-parade of His Future Hatchery Industry.

Mr. H. H. Markson, of the Lawrence Road, Trenton, N. J., has gone into the business of artificially hatching butterflies. His hatchery industry is a wonderfully successful one, yet simple enough in its arrangements, while a visit to his "caterpillar palace" is guaranteed to give any everyday citizen the "jerkens."

Mr. Markson is peculiar both in mind and body and possessed of weird ideas of life beyond the grave. He is, nevertheless, a progressive, naturalist, an entomologist with notions and a mechanical genius. He has money to spare, is of good family, has social recognition and original ideas of beauty, with a few pleasant surprises. He says, is the butterfly— insect and human. His tried life, transformation, its beauty, its habits and construction are delirious as to Mr. Markson's of evolution, more or less relevant than ancient or modern history or alchemy. In fact, the latest history is Markson's. "The man's past and present mode of life would fill a volume but his strange ideas and interesting theories are

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atrociously hatching intentions in all seasons of the year, and his endeavor to inaugurate a new era of filial duty is the feature of his present designs.

Mr. Markson was entertained fully by Billy Marston, but he has plain "Billy" the better, he has long been known by that name, and at his party he held a residence on the Mallade on the Lawrence road, just a few miles from the city line, and he so warmly addressed his sons familiarly.

While deriving much pleasure out of his butterfly hatching, Mr. Markson has determined to utilize his social position to turn his pleasure into profit. If his scheme becomes popular with his social set, his profits promise to be enormous, and the fair, brave, weak and strong of the fatherland, and of New Jersey's aristocracy, beside gliding with the bloom of rosy youth and budding with the bloom of enthusiasm and mirth, will gladden with the fluttering, beautiful flight of the wings of that species of the butterfly whose ancestors hovered about the banks of the Great River, the Nile, the Himalayas.

The south side of the room is covered by a growth of vines and leaves while from the ceiling swing many wicker and wire hanging baskets containing various vines and long branches make a maze through which it is necessary to dodge if the visitor desires to reach any part of the hatchery.

Following the shades of the many windows and colored skylights through the room is a maze of vines and

pipe. There is probably 400 feet of this pipe coiled in and about the small room or hatchery. There are no wires along the ceiling and across the thistle wires on the eastern floor of this second-story room, but the main heater in the cellar of Markala's estate supplies this coil of pipe with water, which heats the hatchery to any degree.

Hanging from the numerous vines and thistle stems, dangling and growing in a confused mass in the hatchery one can see varied colored sacs, and sometimes beneath the leaf of some plant, apparently growing from the side wall, are several tiny white and chocolate-colored particles. These are the eggs of the butterflies. The sacs are the butterflies in the most stage of development.

Filling everywhere about the room, which is heated carefully to a certain temperature, are hundreds of butterflies, and they certainly have all the colors of the rainbow. From vines to thistle from grass blade to leaf, from stubble to weeds, and from the pestle to pretty butterflies glide, gracefully alighting. And they sit and flutter leisurely, now extending a wing, now a foot or flower; now apparently waving or spinning a substance about the little whitish speck beneath the thistle leaf, now possibly trying to escape danger from the vine. And these sacs of the web-like substance are hung in the vine and flower and everywhere. Some are seemingly attached to the branch by a silken coil about the center, some are hanging
