## EVANS, & ATKINSON, AT ATHENS.

To the Star:

To day has been one of  
unusual merriment in Athens. The  
joint bate between Hon. W. Y. At-  
kinson and Gen. Evans was held in  
the opera house. In accordance  
with the rules, agreed upon by the  
committees, Gen. Evans opened  
the debate. He began in a quiet  
manner by attacking Mr. Atkin-  
son's speech at Griffin and criticised  
him in a manner which was  
thought by many unbecomming  
as a minister of the Gospel. The  
balance of his speech was on the  
Income tax, Free coinage, Repeal  
of the 10% tax on state banks and  
his record as a general in the late  
war. On this last topic he dwelt  
considerably but failed to kindle  
much enthusiasm.

The people of Georgia have long  
since learned that because a man  
is a good soldier by no means  
proves that he will make a desir-  
able governor. Mr. Evans openly  
declared that he is greatly devoted  
to his profession as minister and  
prefers the position of preacher to  
that of Gov. For this reason man-  
ny fail to see why he continues in  
the race.

After Gen. Evans concluded Mr.  
Atkinson was introduced. As soon  
as his name was called all the stu-  
dents who prefer him instead of  
Evans arose and greeted him with  
the yell—Hi yi yi yi yi!  
Hip-hoo rap! Atkinson! Atkinson  
U. Ga!! When this yell was heard  
applause ran out from the thous-  
ands and throats and Mr. Atkinson  
came forward and spoke an hour  
and a half in all and impressive  
manner. The manner in which he  
spoke of his college days here in  
1875-6 drew cheers from almost ev-  
ery student and citizen in Athens.

He said it was the town of Athens  
that he met the wife of his bosom  
mother of his children and her  
who hallowed his home and that  
he was more pleased to meet an au-  
dience here. He agreed with his  
opponent on Income tax, Free  
coinage and repeal of 10% tax on  
state banks; but disagreed with  
him concerning the management  
of the soldiers home in Atlanta.  
The able way in which he declared  
himself and defended his position  
in regard to the soldiers home,  
met with with approbation from  
nearly every old con-  
federate present. He is in favor  
pensioning the old soldiers and al-  
lowing them to spend a dollar as  
independent as a king.

Mr. Atkinson's speech from begin-  
ning to end was logical, full of  
thought and frequently elicited  
cheers from the entire audience;  
peroration was grand and patriotic  
clothed in elegant and expressive  
language. He pleaded his cause  
on the ground of merit and request-  
ed that no one vote for him who  
doesn't think him worthy of the of-  
fice to which he aspires.

He ask Evans a few question  
such as why he is so ready to an-  
swer "me too" to so many of his  
(Atkinson's) statements? Why he  
can ride about over the state and  
organize Evans clubs when in 92  
he could not or would not aid De-  
mocracy? To these questions and  
other similar ones Gen. Evans said  
he could not give any reply and  
preferred to avoid them.

Georgia would doubtless be well  
represented by either of the candi-  
dates. But the time has come and  
the day has dawned when every  
section and community of Ga must  
come together and elect the man  
who has been so potent a factor in  
our state for the last 8 years. If  
there be a man who desires the  
high office of Governor it is that  
one who is skilled in legislative  
affairs who has saved the state so  
many thousand dollars during the  
few past years who instituted  
the bill providing for the estab-  
lishment of the normal college at  
Milledgeville for the higher educa-  
tion of Ga. girls, who has succeed-  
ed in increasing the school funds  
and the pensions for those who  
"wore the gray."

Atkinson is the only man that  
can fill the bill this lets elect  
him.  
If merit and a man's legislative  
record are worth anything the  
people of Georgia from the moun-  
tains to the sea, cannot do other-  
wise than unite in harmony by  
placing "curly headed bill" in the  
Gubernatorial chair.

## Third Party Of 1894.

Osborn, Ellington and others are  
on the stump proclaiming their  
dogmas and appealing to the prej-  
udices of the less informed classes.  
Their first round among the people  
is interesting to Democrats only to  
learn what gage of battle they are  
offering. Osborn's speech deliv-  
ered in Valdosta last Saturday is  
briefly reviewed in our local col-  
umns, and from it our reader will  
learn what their line is this year.  
There are three planks in the new  
platform.

First, fiat money.

Second, a division of the lands.

Third, abuse of the Democratic  
party.

A party without principles  
grounded in human rights never  
presents the same front in any two  
campaigns. Their platform is a  
thing of chance—a thing to catch  
votes—a thing to influence the  
masses if possible.

When this party was in its form-  
ative state its design was to capture  
the Democratic party, take charge  
of the offices, and control the busi-  
ness interests of the country. Lat-  
ter the subtreasury, ownership of  
railroads and other schemes devel-  
oped. But all these vagaries have  
passed away, and now they rest  
their case upon fiat money, a divi-  
sion of the land and abuse of the  
Democratic party.

These agitators are fond of quot-  
ing Roman history, as we have  
shown before. The ordinarily in-  
telligent man knows that more  
crimes were committed among the

Romans in the name of liberty than  
among any other people known in  
history. The secret plots and oath  
bound conspiracies under Catiline  
and others made the streets of  
Rome flow in blood, and caused the  
downfall and death of the bravest  
and proudest nation of the world in  
that age.

These agitators read garbled ex-  
tracts from the histories of that  
time, and resort to Catilinish meth-  
ods to stir up the common people.  
They hold their secret meetings  
and even pass resolutions in public  
pledging "life," "property" and  
"honor" upon the sacrificial altar  
to carry out their schemes.

This movement has reached a  
stage beyond the ordinary political  
movement. Many of the good peo-  
ple who have been misled by it do  
not understand what it means (they  
will quit when they do), but in the  
speeches of all these men there is a  
half-smothered, half-exposed def-  
iance of law and order, and a hatred  
of the legally constituted authori-  
ties from the President down. The  
head of the Government who ought  
to be respected for the sake of the  
high office he holds, if for no other  
reason, is execrated, and denounced  
in public as a thief and robber.

It is time the press was dealing  
more candidly with this question.  
Some of the daily papers handle it  
gingerly, and others crawl on their  
all fours before it, and half approx-  
imately apologize for it.

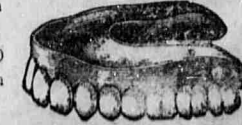

### Turner's Good for Office.

Congressman Turner is receiving sharp criticism from the press in all sections of the state for announcing his candidacy for congress and the Senate. The Lawrenceville News says:

"It is an exhibition of greed for office unparalleled in the history of Georgia politics and absolutely repulsive to the people."

Their Leader Was Formerly a Methodist Class Leader and From Among His Class Has Evolved This New Order Which Has Grown to Pretentious Proportions in Lower Georgia.

Waycross, Ga., March 9.—"Parker's Class" is a very peculiar sect which was organized here two years ago. Its membership has increased from a mere handful to an army of 2,000.

The territory of the organization is throughout South Georgia, extending to several counties in Florida. The founder and president, William Parker, was a class leader in the Methodist church here. His class was composed of the very poor of the church.

Meetings were held once a week at a private residence in close proximity to the city cemetery. The class was called the "graveyard class," "Parker's class," "publican's class," etc.

Finally Mr. Parker professed sanctification, and announced that he had received a divine command to organize a sect for the purpose of inducing the poor and ignorant to live holy lives. The class was reorganized. It was given a charter by the state.

The bylaws and constitution are peculiarly interesting. No preacher will be received into the organization. The services, which consist of prayers, hymns, testimonies of sanctification and short sermons by the laymen and women are held twice a week.

A handsome edifice, resembling a church, has recently been erected here for the purpose of the organization. Annual conferences are held and delegates from the numerous branch classes throughout the country attend. At the class meetings the services are conducted by some one who is moved by the Holy Ghost. Holiness is the password. At the close of a service all the members kneel around the chancel, each making a short prayer, while the others cry amen, shout and cause great confusion.

Then they form a line, a general handshaking commences, they embrace each other and shout hal-lu-lu-lu.

Before sitting down in a church a member is required to kneel in prayer.

The organization is accomplishing much good among the poor in this section who do not attend church.
