"Southeast Georgia on Our Minds" explores regional culture

From Aug. 28 through Nov. 27, humanities faculty members from Georgia Southern University will present an eight-part series of community programs on the people, history, culture, and literature of southeast Georgia. The series, titled 'Southeast Georgia on Our Minds,' will take place every other Tuesday evening at either Screven County Library in Sylvania or Jenkins County Memorial Library in Millen. All sessions are from 7-9 p.m.

The first program in the series is on Tuesday, Aug. 28, at the Screven County Library, 106 S. Community Drive in Sylvania. It features David Dudley, a former Lutheran minister and specialist in African American literature, who heads the Georgia Southern Department of Literature and Philosophy.

Dr. Dudley, author of the prize-winning book, *The Bicycle Man*, will open discussion by talking about how the heritage of Southeast Georgia has challenged and inspired him to tell the stories of some people who otherwise might never find a voice.

The second part of the series, 'This Georgia Rising: Education, Civil Rights, and the Politics of Change in 1940s,' is set for Tuesday, Sept. 11 in Sylvania.

The 'Southeast Georgia on Our Minds' series is sponsored by the Georgia Humanities Council and facilitated by Georgia Southern University in partnership with Screven-Jenkins Regional Library System. It is free of charge and open to the general public, with refreshments provided by the Friends of the libraries involved. Saturday course provides prep for engineering exam

Seven Saturdays in a Georgia Southern University classroom can help give engineering graduates their next step up the career ladder.

'Fundamentals of Engineering Exam Review: A Refresher Course' runs every Saturday from Sept. 1 through Oct. 13 in the College of Science and Technology Building on campus in Statesboro.

The course is only for individuals who have already been exposed to the topics in their undergraduate degree training in engineering or engineering technology.

Passing the Fundamentals of Engineering (FE) exam, given annually in April and October, entitles recent engineering graduates to be called engineers-in-training or engineering interns. It also is the first step toward becoming a licensed professional engineer.

The National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying, which runs the FE exam, calls it 'a measure of minimum competency to enter the profession.'

The course reviews key topics from 10 fields within the engineering sciences: mathematics, statics and dynamics, strength of materials, etc., covering one or two fields in each day-long class. Using the recommended textbook (not included in the course fee), participants review practice problems and go step-by-step through the processes in each field.

Registration is \$599 per participant; registration closes Aug. 27. Class runs from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. with a one-hour lunch break (no food is provided).
