Catalog Description: This course introduces the student to the principles and practice of epidemiology and vital statistics. Students will be exposed to the historical development of epidemiology, concepts of causality, definitions of health and disease, and sources of community health data. Current principles and practices in the cause, prevention and control of diseases in various community settings will be emphasized. 3 credits (3-0-3).

Course Learning Objectives:

1. The student will be able to identify the basic concepts and principles of epidemiology and vital statistics.
2. The student will be able to apply epidemiological concepts to diverse health problems and in various health settings.
3. The student will be able to understand the basic components of collecting, organizing, interpreting, and summarizing vital statistics.

4. The student will be able to operate within the information superhighway in order to obtain and utilize current epidemiological health data.
5. The student will be able to review disease and epidemiological cases in order to solve current, relevant epidemiological case study problems.

Instructional Methods:

Information will be presented in the classroom, through the required readings, and through written & oral assignments. Class meetings will be a combination of lecture, class discussion, and group activities. The instructor will attempt to cover all of the assigned readings; however, failure to cover assigned readings does not alleviate the student's responsibility of knowing the material. Furthermore, students are responsible for all miscellaneous information discussed during the assigned class periods. If you miss a class, you are responsible to find a fellow classmate to get all notes and materials missed.

Assignments:

1. Exams: There will be three exams, each worth 80 points. Exams may be any combination of true/false, multiple choice, matching, short answer, calculations & discussion. You are required to have a scan form 885 (big blue one) and nonprogrammable calculator for each test (240 pts total).
2. Final Exam: The final exam will be administered on Wednesday, Dec. 7th from 5:30 – 7:30pm. This exam is non-comprehensive test and may be any combination of true/false, multiple choice, matching, short answer, computations, & discussion. You are required to have a scan form 885 and nonprogrammable calculator for this test. No early/late finals will be given. If this time conflicts with your schedule, please consider dropping this course. (80 points total).
3. Quizzes. 6 quizzes will be given over the course of the semester. These quizzes will account for 10 points each (60 total points).

4. **Cobra Event Quizzes.** Throughout the semester, we will read a book entitled *The Cobra Event*. If you have reserved a book with me, please do not write, mark or highlight on your borrowed copy. Each student will sign out their reserved copy and are expected to return the copy on the day of the last quiz. Seven quizzes will be given on this book, with the lowest score dropped. Each quiz will consist of ten questions, with one point given for each correct response. (60 points total).
5. **Case Studies.** 3 case studies will be given over the course of the semester. The case studies are worth 15 points each. Case study days are announced in this syllabus. In addition, a case study submission will be requested from each student (15 points). A case study submission includes: a copy of the entire journal article from a peer-reviewed journal in epidemiology, a summary sheet that summarizes all major points of the article (written in your own words) and a question sheet of 10-12 questions about the journal article. On a separate sheet include the answers to the questions. The article should be interesting enough to lead to interesting discussions among student groups. Complete assignment details will be given before submission is due. You may want to have me “ok” the journal article before you start on the summary and question sheets. (60 total points). **Important: There are no make-ups on Case Study Days. If you are not present, you automatically receive 0 points for that Case Study Day.**
6. **Attendance.** At 4:03pm each day, the door to the classroom will be shut. If you arrive after that, you will not be allowed to enter the room. The disturbance to the course is too great. If you disturb the class by knocking on the door and trying to enter the classroom, your final grade will be lowered by a letter grade. Do not drop your personal items in the class and then leave the classroom, you will not be allowed to re-enter to retrieve your personal items until after the class is completed at 5:15pm. Once in the class, please remain in the class. I do not allow students to go in and out of the classroom. If you have a medical reason that you might need the restroom, please let me know and sit in the row nearest the door. Attendance will not be taken but is highly encouraged. **You are responsible** for missed content, announcements, due dates, homework assignments, date changes, etc when you miss a class. Please contact a fellow student who was in attendance that day.
7. **Bonus Points.** Bonus points will be available throughout the semester. Be on the watch for them!

Course Policies:

1. There will be no make-up exams given. Exams are the property of the professor, any exams removed from the classroom by students will result in the score of a “0” be assigned for that exam, and an “F” for the entire course. Exams require a Scantron Form 885. All exams are multiple choice, true/false, fill-in-the-blank, matching, essays, and computations.
2. No make up tests are given except for **an university excused absence with full documentation**. If you miss a test, you have one week to make the exam up. All make-up exams will be a combination of essay questions and computations. If it is not made up **within one week**, you will receive 0 points for the exam. **You have 24 hours** after a test is taken by the class to contact me via email to schedule your make-up exam or a 0 will be assigned to the test.
3. The final exam is mandatory (non-cumulative) and will be given during finals week. Early final exams will not be given. If this scheduled time is a problem, please consider dropping this course.

4. **All assignments** must be typed.
5. All assignments must be given to the professor directly or submitted online, unless otherwise directed. Assignments should not be given to the Office secretary, slipped under my office door, left in my mailbox, etc.
6. Late work assignments are not accepted, please submit all assignments via Folio or as you walk into the class. Assignments are due the first two minutes of class, after that they are considered late and will not be accepted. For assignments due on Folio, they are due according to the times posted on Folio. I will ONLY accept assignments submitted in **.doc or .docx** formats. Any other type of submissions will not be opened and receive automatic “0” points. I do not accept assignments submitted via email. I will not open assignments submitted via email and they will receive an automatic “0” points.

Course Etiquette

E-mail and Folio

To write a **professional** email, follow the instructions under Professional Disposition section. Please be careful of nick names that you have associated with the person because they might show up that way!

Some assignments are posted to Folio. I expect you to seek help for any issues you may have with Folio through the Center for Academic Technology Support (912-478-2287). Except in cases where I can verify systematic problems with Folio, I will not accept technical problems as an excuse for late work. It is my recommendation is to use Firefox or Chrome for work in Folio, although most other updated browsers will work. Students struggle with my absolutely “no late” assignment policy and assignments not being accepted via email or attachments on emails. All assignments are open the first day of class and you always may turn them in early. I would suggest that you set a goal of not going to bed the night before an assignment is due until you have submitted something. You can always wake up the next morning and clean it up and resubmit by 10:59am. Something is better than nothing. Your goal should be no “goose eggs” this semester!

Weather and Internet Outages – Weather and Internet outages are not accepted as an excuse for late papers or unsubmitted papers. The dropbox and all assignments are posted by the second week of class. You have ALL SEMESTER to turn them in. Creating a Positive Environment for Learning:

- Make an appointment with student
- Explain how his/her actions affects you/class
- Listen actively to his/her point-of-view
- Jointly look for ways to prevent problem from happening again
- Offer help—prearranged signal or referral
