The rents will range from six shillings a week for a couple of three rooms and kitchen to half a guinea for five rooms and kitchen. Workmen can obtain railway tickets in this district at one-fourth the ordinary fares.

All electric mail boxes have been put into use in Washington, D. C. Its object is to check the mail carriers. Whenever the box is opened for the extraction of its contents it automatically registers the operation at the main office. With such a tell-tale it will be impossible for a carrier to make rounds of the boxes to skip any one of them, which is one of the chief sources of complaint at present against the service. Furthermore, the box, when emptied completely or the failure to do so is also automatically registered against the letter collector, so he must pay the penalty of his carelessness.

THE THIRD TERM TALK.

Is Senator Depew seeking a big favor from the President? How, why is it that he is trotting round the country telling newspaper men and the politicians that President McKinley ought to be given another term because he has no enemies and very few critics? Probably he thinks that he would be made secretary of state or such ambassador to England if McKinley should be re-elected and re-

In support of a reunification, for the President to bring up all of the old worsted arguments which was advanced by the authors of Gen. Grant, when Senator Canklin undertook to put a third term for him. He says there is nothing in the written or the unwritten constitution against a third term.

It is true there is nothing in this constitution against a third term, but there is something more potent than the constitution against it, namely, the common sense of the people. They long ago came to the conclusion that two terms were sufficient for any man, and that a third term might jeopardize the liberties of the people.

During our various national elections, from William Parker, to John Jay, James A. Garfield, Grover Cleveland, Woodrow Wilson, and even Franklin D. Roosevelt.

According to the governing constitution, he seemed good and qualified to serve in three jobs—and would still have his qualifications at greatly reduced age, whatever his reserved life expectancy.

Potentially, Emperor Meiji II, working by the same laws, presides eternally—against, I think, the time that he has to live. From now will run the thousands and more nominations are coming in by every mail. There are said to be four hundred in over-every city in the United States.

Of course, nobody thinks Mr. McKinley would seek to make himself a dictator if a third term were given to him, but if he were given a third term some other president might want a fourth term, or even a life term.

It is true that Washington did

not say to the people that they should never give any man more than two terms, but his example is sufficient, and the people are pretty much of the mind that eight years is long enough for any man to occupy the presidency. It would be a great thing for Mr. McKinley to have a third term—something no other man ever had—and it would not be surprising if he has an ambition to be re-elected, but he would be remembered much longer by a grateful

It is doubtful if there is anything on which there is such a consensus of opinion in this country as that President should have a third term. Mr. McKinley is a very popular President, but if he should second the efforts of those who are trying to bring about his re-nomination, he would find his popularity waning. Many of those who are praising him now would become his enemies and abuse him. It is doubtful if

He is so foolish as to authorize the hope of being the Presidential candidate of his party 1904. And the surprising thing is that Mr. Dewey should be advocating a third term for him. He has been for a long time, and is yet, a favorite with the public, but it is naive enough for the leading advocate of a third term for Mr. McKinley. The impression will get abroad that he is no longer the bright, capable man he once was; that he had degenerated into a mere stammer of chest-
