## EDITORIAL NOTES.

Commissioner Jones reports that there are in Indian Territory about 150,000 white children who will have little incentive for self-improvement unless Congress makes provision for their education.

In fifty years the words and phrases of the English language texted under the letter "A" have increased from 7,000 in 1800 to nearly 60,000. Science and invention requiring new terms are largely responsible.

Professor A. D. P. Hamlin pleads, in the Forum, for the devotion of more attention to architectural studies as a means of general culture. He emphasizes their importance as a basis for the study of political and social history, as well as for that of the fine arts in general.

New York leads all the other States in the predominance of its city or cities to its country population. Of every 100 city-dwellers in the Empire State, 95 are in New York City and its suburbs. The percentage of the population living in cities and towns for the whole country is forty-seven only.

The Court of Appeals of Maryland in ordering a new trial in a disputed will case recently said: "The tendency to assail last will with the ground of mental incapacity and by frivolous and inconclusive evidence, whereby the testator is not disposed of his property in a way to suit disappointed and often distant and distasteful relations, has grown to such an alarming proportion in late years that it is the plain duty of the courts to give them no encouragement when the assaults are groundless."

The world has at present an actual shortage of sailors available for naval service. Two of the crack new ships in the British navy—the *Cressy* and the *Belgic*—recently commissioned at Portsmouth, have been named with what is officially termed "allusion," a conspicuous nautical term derived from the merchant marine, which means "callings" or inferior. All other naval powers are said to be suffering from the scarcity of qualified sailors, and some of them are doing a lot of training of raw material in the endeavor to make-up the deficiency. There seems to be a growing distaste among the rising generation for "a life on the ocean wave."

The possibilities of the immediate future in the direction of submarine navigation seem almost limitless.

Mr. Holland, the inventor of the submarine torpedo boat, has recently pointed out that navigation under water may be used in a variety of ways in the promotion of commerce, water travel and scientific research. He believes that submarine navigation will become the common method of transportation by sea, as it will prevent the inconvenience of storms, choppy seas, fog and the danger of collisions. He will soon attempt to cross the Atlantic in a submarine boat he is building, the engines of which are planned to have tremendous power. This experiment will be watched with the keenest interest on both sides of the Atlantic, because of its bearing on future navigation, observes Success.

Chemistry has invaded the realm of dietetics to disturb our gastronomic joys. No matter what the chemists might discover "baking" in other vegetables, we have felt a comforting reason in the thought that nothing but harmless sugar in the shape of starch and sugar lurked in the meek and lowly tuber which Sir Francis Drake introduced to civilization after one of his voyages to South America, states the Chicago Record-Herald.

After all other vegetables were crossed off the list we thought we would offer the delicious "mushrooms," the dietary glory and strength of the "rolling rack." But now comes a Washington scientist with the announcement that he has discovered large quantities of "solanin" in potatoes, a chemical that is poisonous to the human system. It is claimed by this scientist that 357 soldiers in a battalion of the Austrian army were poisoned a few years ago by eating potatoes in which the deadly "solanin" was present.

# DEPORTING STRIKERS

Enraged People of Tampa Adopt Effective Role of Kidnappers.

## AGITATORS ARE SPIRITED AWAY

Their Final Disposition is Kept a Secret By Members of Vigilante. Uncompromising Proclamation Issued.

The strike situation at Tampa, Fla., is one of awe and bewilderment on the part of the citizens. No word has been received from or about the Restolena leaders who were deported Monday night, and the vigilantes are sworn to secrecy, further than that they admit they will never return to Tampa. The exact number of the men deported is not known, further than that every prominent leader of the union is missing. It is said that other less prominent leaders have been arrested and their deportation may take place at any moment.

The kidnapping of Monday night had been well planned for days. A great open air meeting had been arranged, to which all the Restolena leaders had been invited, the purpose being to catch them all in a bunch. They were all present. Men had been lined up with thousands of people, shortly before the posse of citizens reached the place the men reached the strike leaders and the quickly dispersed. The crowd was not daunted, however, and commenced a man-to-man search through the street and snatched the men from the crowd. They were placed into cars which had been provided, between heavily armed guards and driven away.

The captured leaders were at once driven to last with upon the ground of the Restolena leaders, who were kept in the cars for a few minutes. They then disappeared from there and have not been seen or heard of since. Various rumors are being circulated about the city, it being generally reported that they were taken into the Gulf in an unknown vessel. All of the deported strike leaders were Spaniards and Cubans. The boldness of the whole affair and the accomplishment of the deportation without bloodshed is one of the remarkable features.

It develops that twelve more strikers, who were among the subleaders, were deported Tuesday afternoon and night. Some of the strikers held a number of meetings during the day and were secretly conferred with a number of lawyers with a view of taking some action. No one would take the case, all being engaged in the interest of international union.

A proclamation was issued Tuesday afternoon signed "The People of Tampa," which says in part: "We, the undersigned, American and Professional Labor Activists. We say that your days in Tampa are at an end. We cannot and will not permit you to destroy this prosperous city. If you have regard for your safety, you will make it out from your feet. In conclusion, we notify the manufacturers that the movement of citizens is not in their interest, but in the interest of the entire community."

Strong Room of Big Smelter Works at Valjeo, California, Relieved of \$250,000 in Gold.

## Preamble and Resolutions

By Poplar Springs Baptist Church

Whereas, the Scriptures enjoin upon  
all Christians the duty of "preaching  
the Gospel in all the world, to every  
creature;" and,

Whereas the System of Conventions  
and boards which has been in use for  
about one hundred years among  
Baptist people is without Scripture war-  
rant, and has failed to develop and en-  
list the mission spirit and energies of  
the churches at home or reach the  
world's necessities abroad, and,

Whereas in the past ten years many  
missionaries sent out and sustained by  
Baptist churches, on both the home  
and foreign fields have been denied  
the right of giving the churches all the  
facts concerning this important  
work in regard to methods they deem  
wrong on their respective fields, and  
have been dismissed, humiliated and  
injured for conscientious refusal to  
submit to arbitrary and unscriptural  
rules, to the injury of missionaries  
and the mission cause; and,

Whereas, those connected with the  
management of missions continue to  
multiply inefficient agencies and in-  
crease expense without a correspond-  
ing increase of efficiency; and,

Whereas, a large per cent of the  
mission funds raised by the churches is  
continually applied to other purposes  
than preaching, and,

Whereas, we believe there is a rem-  
edy against these evils and abuses:

Therefore be it resolved, by this  
church in conference assembled:

1. That we recognize our obligation  
to God and the world to obey His com-  
mand in spreading the Gospel.

2. That we protest against the evils  
above set forth in the Convention  
Board System.

3. That this church declares its in-  
alienable independence of outside or-  
ganization in all things.

4. That we will co-operate directly  
with our sister churches, as churches,  
in mission work, for the sake of effi-  
ciency and economy.

5. That we invite our sister churches  
to unite with us on this plan of work,  
by instructing the members of these  
associations as to their wishes in this  
matter.

6. That we write our sister churches  
in the adjacent territory to send frat-  
ernal messengers to a mass meeting  
with this church to begin on Thurs-  
day before the 4th Sabbath in Septem-  
ber, next, for the purpose of counsel  
and advice touching these matters.

7. That our county paper be respect-  
fully requested to publish these pre-  
amble and resolutions, and the  
churches be requested to recognize  
their publication as an invitation  
from this church to attend such meet-  
ing.
