Last Sunday evening at the Methodist church in Statesboro a large crowd gathered to discuss the barroom question. The several speeches were interspersed with singing, and the crowd was almost unanimous against the barroom.

Mess. H. B. Strange Hinton Booth W. A. Nisbet A. M. Deal R. Lee Moore, L. C. Glisson, L. F. Davis, T. E. Hays, M. C. Holland, B. E. Turner, W. C. Parker, J. B. Cone, Rev. W. Langston and others indulged in speech making, and in denouncing liquor in general, and the proposed barroom specially.
