Ry. depot, but was not at home at the time. About 7:30 o'clock as he was coming down town he noticed a light in the house and running over found the house on fire. Fortunately it was discovered in time to extinguish it before much damage was done. Mr. Olmstead only losing a mattress and a rocking chair.

Monday was an unlucky day for Statesboro. A car load of sea island cotton which Messrs. J. G. Blitch & Co. had enroute to Savannah via the S. & S. Ry. caught on fire and the car with its contents were destroyed. There were 27 bales of cotton on the car valued at \$2,500.

**STATESBORO.**  
Is The Leading Inland Town For Sea Island Cotton.

Up to last Saturday night Statesboro had received and bought 1,200 bales of cotton. This exceeds Valdosta's receipts which were only 900 for the same time. In addition to the 1,200 bales of Sea Island, 750 bales of upland cotton were received, making a total of 2,000 bales. Last year Statesboro received about 5,000 bales of sea island and this year, even with a short crop, our receipts will be about 5000. This is about \$400,000, 00 paid out for the staple yearly.

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**MID-DAY BLAZE.**  
THE DYE HOUSE BURNED

Last Monday morning about 11 o'clock the town was startled by the cry of "Fire!" It was soon discovered that the Dye house on Walnut Street occupied by Messrs J. J. E. Anderson and E. A. Corry, was on fire. The fire was caused by a defective flue and had gained such headway before the people of the town got there that but very little of the household goods were saved.

The roof was falling in before Mess. Corry & Anderson who were in their offices, found out that the fire had been devouring their home and its contents.

The citizens of the town turned out on mass but too late to save much of the effects of the occupants of the house.

There is a house belonging to Mr. J. G. Brannen, just across Walnut street, which was occupied by a family of negroes, not more than forty yards from the burning house, towards which the light east wind blew the flames, but which, by hard work was saved, although it caught two or three times.

Statesboro's experience, in that part of town, but emphasizes more strongly our need of some equipment for fighting fire. Even if we had a fire engine none of the wells would furnish sufficient water and the present water mains, laid along the principal streets, as they are, would be entirely too small to give a sufficient supply of water for ordinary fire-fighting purposes.

We see no chance but for our town to, issue bonds, if necessary, for the establishing of water works and some means by which to preserve the property that our people, with self-denial and hard work have improved, adding to the beauty and substantiality of our town.

A strong south, south-east or southwest wind last Monday would have swept a number of residences on North main street in spite of our crack fire fighters Charley Cumming, John Jones and their host of willing and not less plucky helpers in our town.

Mr. Dye carried some insurance on his house and so the loss is not as heavy as it might have been.

### How He Succeeded.

#### NOT AFRAID TO WORK.

He came to Bulloch about ten years ago from the washed gulches of Wilkinson county. He had been a tenant for years, and never would have owned any land there. So he came here, rented lands for a few years, and saved up some money, and bought a place on part cash and part credit. He moved on the place and went to work. His wife and children helped and the result is to day, that he owns several hundred acres of good lands, well improved, and will clear a thousand dollars on his crop this year. He is contented and prosperous and has made a success on the hills of Bulloch. Many have done the same.

#### The Cotton Crop.

Commissioner Stevens says in a late bulletin that the cotton crop of Georgia will not exceed 1,250,000 bales—a falling off of 45,000 bales from last years crop in this state. The same conditions which have caused this large shortage in the Georgia crop, pervades all the cotton states east of the Mississippi. In the trans-Mississippi department the shortage is much greater, being estimated at one-third, or a million bales alone in the state of Texas. With these facts staring us in the face we find midling cotton quoted in the seaboard markets at 8 cents, and about 7½ in the interior. If the laws of supply and demand were allowed to obtain, this years crop ought to be worth 10 cents in the interior markets. The farmers have it in their power to control the prices of this years crop.

The negro then left. A warrant was taken out for his arrest, but he has not yet been found.
