Watson, a Lecturer.

Timing of Law, He Seeks Congratulatory Work on the Lecture Platform.

THOMPSON, Oct. 26.—The announcement has been made that Hon. Thomas C. Watson had decided positively to give on the lecture platform a course of lectures on the "Life of Napoleon," and no doubt it will be a most interesting series throughout the entire south and west, especially to his former constituents.

He was visited this past week by Mr. S. R. Bridges, the manager of the Alhambra Lyceum system, of Atlanta, and definite arrangements were made upon for his lecture tour, which will begin early next year. It is understood he is to be under the exclusive management of the Alhambra Lyceum and is to deliver 150 lectures in the United States during the year. Beginning in Atlanta he will give the first week or so to Georgia, then go to Texas and the western cities.

It is possible, however, that his opening speech will be made in New York city, as a very flattering offer comes from there. Much interest is manifested in Mr. Watson's coming into public life again, after five years of the closest exile from public view. And especially is this true when his first lecture will deal with governmental and political affairs. He has persistently refrained from expressing his opinion, either with speech or pen, on matters of general interest, since the close of his campaign for vice president with Mr. Bryan in 1896.

The leading newspapers, magazines, etc., have implored him for articles containing his opinions on certain subjects, but his answer has been to all "I am out of politics forever, and have nothing to say." The flattering offers of lecture bureaus have all gone unnoticed. During this time he has been engaged in preparing himself for the lecture platform by doing literary work. He has just completed his fourth book, which is on "The Life of Napoleon," and is now ready to exercise his oratorical powers again.

This book will soon come from the press of the MacMillan, New York, and will be his most powerful work. It will contain more of his wonderful dramatic nature than any of the others, which will make it more popular. Mr. Watson's first lecture is entitled, "Imperialism or Democracy, Which?" In this he will discuss the trend of government in general today and especially that of the United States, giving his ideas of what twentieth century government ought to be.

Then he will give a series of lectures on French subjects as follows:

1. The French Revolution.
2. Napoleon.
3. Waterloo.

Several other lectures will be added to the above list as the demand comes. Mr. Watson says he is tired of his law practice and goes to the lecture platform as a field for more congenial work.

His many friends in Thompson regret that this will take him away from home, but they believe he has a great future of usefulness as a lecturer. He will put his mightiest efforts into the work and it is believed that he will soon be as great a power as Phillips and Ingersoll ever were on the lecture platform. Mr. Bridges' who will manage his dates, goes to New York next week to arrange for his trip there. —Atlanta Journal.

Unwritten Facts in Georgia History.

Unrecorded Events of Interest. No man has a right to be a historian unless he is thoroughly impartial. He should allow no animosity nor no belittling to control him, and should approach to justice to all alike. This is difficult, and none but a bold man can be free from all bias. I became satisfied very soon after I began my study of Georgia history that exact justice had not been done to the loyalists, or Tories, as they were called, and I have tried to put them in a proper light.

My ancestry were all Whigs, all Americans, springing from the first settlers of Virginia. Most of these unrecorded people were Englishmen and Scotchmen and I was sure I could not be actuated by any feeling of kindred or partially when I thought the time had come when they should have justice.

GEORGIA AND THE CROWN. It will be remembered that Georgia was the last-born of the colonies, that she was the petted child of the English crown; that some of her first settlers who came 1733 were leaving in 1774, when the troubles began; that they had been office-holders under the trustees, and had been entrusted with high places by the English colonial office. They could not see that Georgia had ever been wronged. They knew she was the weakest of all the colonies, and the most exposed to the Spanish, the French and the Indians. The colony was prospering, Savannah, the chief town and the home of many of them, was not an elegant community, with all the refinements of life and with all the luxuries and comforts which constant intercourse with England could bring to them. They could see nothing but madness in a contest with the mother country.

The few young men who led in this movement they counted as hot-heads, and so many of the trustees and the best of the people were unwilling to go into so unequal and so unwise a contest.

JAMES HABERSHAM. James Habersham, whose three sons were the leaders among the first to come to Georgia. He had served the colony and the king and had rendered the most efficient and valuable service to both. The colonial office had trusted him implicitly, and when James Wright was in England he was in the governorship. He was a man of spotless character and of the very highest order of mind, and he was bitterly opposed to the revolution. He was quite an old man when the struggle began, and died before it was fairly on. His old comrade, Noble Jones, had been, even before him, in Georgia. His oldest son, Dr. Noble Wynter Jones, was like the Habersham brothers, heart and soul with the colonies, but the son had too much regard for his old father to accept the appointment of delegate to the continental congress of 1776. The old gentleman died that year, loyal to the last.

Sir James Wright, who was the most thoroughly hated of all loyalists, was a South Carolinian. He was a man of large wealth and of the finest intelligence, and one who did more for Georgia than any other governor ever did. There was a breach between him and the assembly and it widened every day afterward, until the time when there was open war, and he was a prisoner in his own house. He was permitted to escape and he went to England.

THE FIRST GEORGIA ASSEMBLY. The assembly met to organize a state government and it was soon evident that Georgia was

not a pleasant place for the loyalists, and they went in different directions.

In Governor Wright's letters, published by the Georgia Historical Society, there is a list found which shows who and where these loyalists were. The list was made January, 1780. Before this list was made the first legislature had taken vigorous steps and passed an act ostracizing all these and a few more, and confiscating their property. Up to 1777, when this act was passed, the trouble was confined to Savannah and its surrounding country. As will be seen by looking over the list, the wealthiest, the most prominent and the most intelligent people in the section were on the king's side. There was no favor shown them by the assembly, and to escape the ills around then they fled but the disasters of 1779 came thick and fast, and the staunch old governor came once more to Savannah to take the reins. Then it was his time to act, and he did act vigorously. He called an assembly and he had an act of attainder passed, but alas he could not enforce it. There was a garrison in Savannah and a garrison in Augusta, but the pestiferous rebels were everywhere else. In the meantime the whole of the up country had become involved. The frontiersmen of Virginia and North Carolinians, almost all who had any means, were whigs, and nearly all able bodied men were in the war, but there was not a few Tories and there was a fearful internecine war. The larger part of these up country Tories were simply brigands, and the war was to the knife, but the act of 1782 shows there was not a few who were under the ban who belonged to the best class of up country people and whose only fault was that after a brave fight they had despaired of independence and were for submission.

Those who had remained true to the continental congress, had no pity on these weak kneed ones, and their property was taken, and they were exiled. The Georgia Gazette after its resumption in 1783 was full of the advertisements of confiscated property. It was sold on long time, and much of it never paid for, in state money, worth about one-fifth of its state value. The home of Josiah Tattnall was given to Major afterwards Governor Jackson. The elegant home of lieutenant Governor Graham was given to General Wattle Green, General Waine, General Clarke, General Twigs, indeed all soldiers and officers shared in the spoils. The negroes were taken and divided among the soldiers. The cattle were used for the military, and the lands were sold. Some of the family was generally on the whig side, and secured the legislative relief the loyalists, but property changed hands at a fearful rate in those days when it was the universal cry, to the victor belongs the spoils! Major Jackson burned nine barns for the old governor, and then bought the farm he had near Savannah, at the sale of confiscated lands. Many families were reduced to poverty and some of the exiles never returned to Georgia. The bitterness passed away gradually and one by one the loyalists came back and their children
