The Pivotal Farm.

"The Pivotal Farm" is the title used by a writer in the November World's Work to describe a farm midway between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. This farm represents a successful experiment to overcome the drought of Nebraska. The object was to discover some crop that would persist.

Alfalfa was discovered to endure. It is a perennial and furnishes three or four crops every year. It subsists on the hydrogen of the air and therefore does not impoverish the ground. It makes good fodder for stock and furnishes manure for fruit trees. Many practical farmers have made it their fundamental crop. The hay is worth \$10 a ton. It was thought that fruit growing was not adapted to the regions of Nebraska; but by planting trees along the sides of hills, and ploughing furrows to utilize all the rain that falls, and by enriching the ground with alfalfa, the "Pivotal Farm" is proving that the Prairie States will soon supply their own fruit market.

QUERIES POSITION.
The Ishmaelite feels authorized to say that it has misinterpreted the position of DuPont Guerney on the liquor question. It was led to believe from notices published in the papers, and from the interview of Seb Wright, that he favored the dispensary legislation as a primary question and as a substitute for state prohibition. In this it was mistaken. He is still an uncompromising advocate of state prohibition, and he favored the dispensary bill (in which he made a mistake in judgment, the Ishmaelite thinks) as a choice of evils between that and the enactment of local dispensary laws by the Legislature.

That is a matter of opinion. It is due to him, however, to say that, while he favored the Wright bill as a choice of evils, he is as much opposed to dispensary barrooms as he is to the other sort, and so he still maintains his prohibition integrity.

This statement is due him from the Ishmaelite, because it had eluded him, at least in its mind, with Seb Wright and Sam Jones, and the other so-called prohibition allies of the Georgia Liquor Dealers Association.—ISHTMAELITE.

Where Is The Money To Come From?

Now that the Atlanta depot bill has passed the house, people are wondering where the money is to come from. The suggestion is timely. Where is the money to come from? It would have been better to have asked it before the bill was introduced, but it is just as well to ask it before it is too late. The project requires \$500,000. The amounts are to be donated from one-half of the yearly rental of the state road. For the first year \$100,000 is to be apportioned from that fund and for each of the two succeeding years \$200,000. This, of course, will reduce the state's revenues to that extent, and people may well ask where will the money come from? The state owes lots of money. The public school teachers are not paid; the interest on the public debt has not been met, and yet here is a measure which proposes to divert \$500,000 between now and 1905. Where is the money to come from?

People who have been active in passing the depot measure now say, we are forced to adopt the Blalock resolution appropriating a part of the public property fund to pay the interest on the public debt; in other words, having gone into the extremity of diverting money from lawful purposes. Unless this is done the question recurs, "Where is the money to come from?"

Wouldn't it be better for the legislature to get back to a business-like basis? First, cut down the appropriation to the bare necessities of government; second, postpone depot building until we get out of the present hole; third, if the tax rate is not high enough it should be raised. This is the manliest way of looking at a crisis. It may not be popular at first, but it is the most direct, and in the end, will be the best. It is never well to dodge an issue, to use trust funds, or to kite from one appropriation to another. Let the legislature come right down to brass tacks and business, and in a practical way ask, "where is the money to come from?"
