COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an intensive evaluation of all the issues involved in both addiction and recovery, with a special focus on community health through service-learning. Students are expected to be present at every class session.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

This course is meant to be an intensive and unique learning experience for students that are in recovery from drugs, alcohol, eating disorders, self-harm and other process addictions. Studies show that QOL (Quality of Life) factors such as social support, motivation, and higher levels of life satisfaction are predictors of sustained abstinence from substance-use and other addictive behaviors (Laudet, 2007). This course will empower students to use education as a means of improving self-confidence, decision-making skills, and interpersonal relationships. Students will be given the opportunity to build upon their physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual recovery by using the experience of those in the group as well as the resources suggested by public health and social science literature on the addiction recovery processes. As this is a service-learning course, students will work with other Georgia Southern and local community organizations to participate in at least 25 hours of service to their community and will be graded on a reflection of their experiences participating in this service work. Each facet of this course is designed to enhance each person's recovery from their addiction with the goal of giving students tools they can use throughout their life to achieve lasting sobriety. Students must have at least 6 months of continuous recovery from their addiction at the time they enroll in the course.

COURSE DATES & TIMES:

Students are assigned one of 3 possible seminar times:

Wednesdays 12:20-1:10 p.m.

Thursdays 11:00-11:50

Thursdays 5:00-5:50 p.m.

Seminars meet every week. Each seminar will meet 11 times during the course of the semester and have a final exam on the last seminar date. Two weeks during the semester that you do not have seminar you will be expected to participate in the Haunted Forest in some capacity. You are expected to attend the same seminar time every week a seminar is held. You *may* attend another seminar time on any given week if you have a documented reason why you will not be able to attend your regular scheduled seminar time. Changing seminar times requires a documented excuse and approval by instructor.

ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENTS:

Attendance and Participation at all seminars and social events *are* a large portion of the students' grade. Please see grading rubric for number of points you will earn. You will be required to sign in at each class, and you will receive up to 3 points for each week's participation

SERVICE-LEARNING REQUIREMENTS:

You will be required to complete a number of service hours as a part of your PUBH4890 curriculum this semester. You can receive credit for a maximum of 25 hours, and each service or volunteer hour needs to be approved by course instructor. There are several opportunities already available through the Center for you to receive your service hours. They are as follows:

- Participation in Run for Recovery: 25-100 hours
- Participation in Center for Addiction Recovery fundraising and/or speaking engagements: hours vary
- Participation in Spring Leadership Retreat)
- Participation in Students of Service student organization revitalization
- Participation in Ghana Study Abroad Fundraising
- You may see instructor about other potential service opportunities on campus or in the community. A great resource for locating other service opportunities is the GSU Office of Leadership and Civic Engagement located in the Russell Union. <http://students.georgiasouthern.edu/leadership/>. This office provides opportunities on a weekly basis to get involved in service work. Each service hour must be approved by instructor in order to receive service credit for the course.

SOCIAL GATHERINGS:

There will be several social gathering opportunities this semester. You will have the chance to earn 5 points per gathering.

RETREAT

The retreat will be held this semester in April in Asheville, N.C. The Center student population voted on this location and details will be discussed during first seminar.

DOSSIER:

Students will each have a portfolio (which can be kept in the Center) that keep track of: seminars attended, seminar assignments & service hours. The last page in the dossier will contain a short essay describing the student’s experiences through service learning over the course of the semester. On the last day of seminar (see calendar), students will lead discussion about their experiences through service-learning and share their 5-year plan with the rest of the seminar participants. This is your final exam.

HONOR STATEMENT:

Students will be required to complete an honor statement with the Director of the Center for Addiction Recovery at the beginning of the semester which outlines stipulations for continued participation in the class. If students cannot meet the minimum conduct requirements and exhibit behavior which does not adhere to the goals and missions of the Center for Addiction Recovery, he/she will be asked to leave the Center and will receive the grade of “F” for the semester.

STUDENT DISABILITIES:

Any student who, because of a disability, may require some special arrangement in order to meet course requirements should contact the instructor immediately to make necessary accommodations.

GRADE:

Your final grade will be determined by your compliance with all expectations of the class: attendance at seminars & social events, quality of participation in seminars & social events, volunteer hours, and personal evaluation by your instructor. Your grade will be based upon a points system that is composed as follows:
