Keynote: Vernon MasonDon't Waste a Crisis! A Story of Perseverance During Tough Times!

When bad things happen, we have a choice to either give up and go home or stand up and fight! Remember that saying, "fight or flight?" In this keynote presentation, Mason tells his story of being knocked down and how he decided to take control and do it on his terms. It wasn't always easy or pretty, but he fought his way back.

This is an inspiring story of a director who brought his early childhood program through a natural disaster and came out on top! According to Mason, "I didn't make it on my looks, brain, or my family's money because all 3 are mediocre!" Mason will also share stories of some of the most seemingly talented people, like Julia Child and Lucille Ball, and how they were discouraged and told they would never make it. Participants will leave uplifted with a sense that anything is possible as long as you have humor and perseverance!



Biography

With a \$5,000 credit card in 1991, Vernon Mason and his mother opened a small child care center with a capacity of 30 that grew to 125 children. In 1999, it was destroyed by a natural disaster. After rebuilding and starting over, Mason grew WEE SCHOOL Child Development Center to 248 children in just two years. When he turned 40, he purchased three troubled childcare centers in just 12 months. What a midlife crisis! He still wonders why he didn't have an affair or buy a sports car like everybody else. He is currently the owner of five centers with 100 staff caring for 600 children.

Three Strikes, You're Out: Now What? Rethinking the Effectiveness of Consequences

Experiencing consequences is a key part of the learning process when children make mistakes or exhibit inappropriate behavior. Used ineffectively, consequences rarely foster permanent behavior change or teach children what to do differently. The result is a recycling of challenging behavior and frustration for everyone involved. This session will focus on using principles of positive discipline and emotional intelligence to better understand the complexity of behavior and social learning. We will build a better understanding of consequences and how to use them as teaching tools to effectively and appropriately help children learn new skills.

Helping Children Cope With Grief

Children grieve in childlike form. Their understanding of grief is shaped by multiple variables including age, family tradition and history. Children grieve within a family unit; therefore, as professionals working with children and families, we must help equip children with age-appropriate, healthy methods for processing grief while educating and involving the family as necessary. This informative and interactive workshop will focus on helping children (ages 3-12) cope with grief and loss. It is designed to be informative by providing technique and creative ideas while fostering an ongoing awareness of how, when and where children and families receive grief resources within the community.

"Not Me, I Love All Children!": Reflective Experiences to Identify and Overcome Implicit Bias in Classrooms and Therapeutic Spaces

The face of the United States is changing. Black, brown and tan faces are becoming more plentiful, especially in the southern regions of the country. How do the changing demographics affect our work with children? Are we providing high-quality education and access to resources appropriate for all children? How do the implicit biases we all have affect the teacher/counselor-child relationship? The big IDEA is a model that attempts to address the issue of implicit biases in our professional work with children. In this session, participants will engage in reflective exercises and experiences designed to help them begin the work of recognizing and uprooting their implicit biases. Participants will leave with a new understanding and a plan of action for moving forward in a way that is supportive of all children.

Ready, S-E-T, Go: Building a Culture of SEL



Learn how to develop your own social emotional skills and how to build a culture of SEL in your programs by being S-E-T: supportive, engaging and thoughtful. During this session, you will discuss specific ways to be S-E-T with the children you work with, including how to be supportive, engage kids during downtime, be thoughtful and observant role models, begin meaningful conversations, acknowledge behavior, and assign tasks to help kids build social-emotional skills. By developing your social-emotional skills around the S-E-T framework, you'll gain a strong understanding of what SEL looks like in action and leave the session with actionable skills and tactics to implement immediately in your programs and classrooms.


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MAP OF CONFERENCE CENTER


