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NYAR conference hosts over 1,200 attendees in March

The 28th annual National Youth-At-Risk Conference (NYAR), hosted by Georgia Southern University's College of Education (COE) and the Division of Continuing Education, was held March 5-8 in Savannah, GA. The largest conference hosted by the University, NYAR attracted over 1,200 attendees this year. The conference was co-chaired by Dan Rea, Ed.D., professor of educational psychology, and Cordelia Zinskie, Ed.D., professor of educational research, both faculty members in the COE's Department of Curriculum, Foundations, and Reading.
