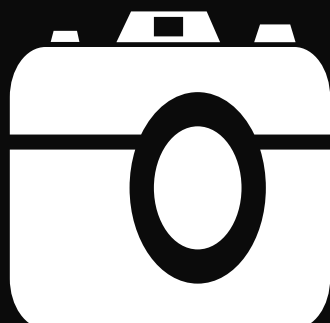

University looks to Tackle Diversity

On Nov 6, Dr. Damon Williams, a leader and champion of strategic diversity, led a talk on the necessity for multilevel initiatives to engage diversity.

Williams covered a multitude of topics ranging from the correlation between innovation and diversity to the impact of

engage that dynamic within one's own community because, as Williams stated, "context matters" and the issue of topic of diversity is multifaceted.

Williams goes on to suggest that the topic of diversity exists at multiple levels and at many scales, and because the context of diversity is so large, in order for diversity to be effectively engaged, it needs to be addressed from across those multiple levels and many scales; the individual has to become just as involved as the institution, if true diversity is to be realized within an institution or association.

Williams presented a three-phase plan that both included initiatives at the institutional-level and at the student/faculty-level for engaging diversity. The plan is scheduled to proceed throughout the new, school year, ending in May, and aims to promote activity and an understanding of this important topic and the implications

pertaining specifically to our community. The phases include:

Phase 1, which is thought leadership and relationship building, entails connecting with and understanding Georgia Southern's minority population.

Phase 2, which is data collection analyses and reporting, entails planning and measuring up the Georgia Southern's response to the requisite of diversity—is it adequate, is the school doing enough, and who are the school's efforts aiding?

Phase 3, which is capacity building and technical assistance, involves the actual action on the initiatives; this phase is to include more campus presentations, coaching executive teams, CDO searches and work sessions.

Williams also drew a connection between innovation and diversity. He explained that the crux of diversity is innovation—that diversity comes from not only institutional initiatives but from

individual involvement from the faculty, staff, and the student body. Diversity is experimenting with new ideas, trying something new in the classroom, or inviting someone new into your study group—someone different.

He goes on to state, "What we need today is for the younger generation, faculty, and staff to be innovators in diversity issues, and [we need to ask the question] 'how does that work start today?'" Ultimately, as Williams explains, the topic of diversity all comes down to who we are as people. It's not entirely about the big plan or institutional incentive, even though that is also an essential part. To tackle diversity—to make a change in our community for the better involves every individual in the community and involves what we decide. "Do we see diversity or a benefit? It all comes down to our mental model."

Masquers presents Shakespearean comedy "Twelfth Night"

Under the direction of Associate Professor Dr. Peter Mellen, Ph.D., the play entails the story of two twins, Sebastian and Viola, who become separated after being shipwrecked.

Along the way, Viola disguises herself as a man only to fall in love with the guy of her dreams. However, she encounters some dilemmas while trying to figure a way out of the situation.

The play is a rendition of poet and playwright Shakespeare's romance comedy which mixes love, discovery, mistakes, and passion all in one storyline.

It is comprised of 12 characters who are all played by current students.

For Dr. Mellen, the play was dedicated in memory of his wife, M.H. Clark who played the role of Olivia in 1995.

Dr. Mellen also mentioned in an interview with Georgia Southern University that his favorite part of the play was when the cast realized the play "really is funny."

Not only did this production feature interesting dialogue from the cast, it also featured some creative uses of lighting, sound effects, and musical interludes.

Paloma Whatley, who plays Viola, said in an interview with Georgia Southern University that

"working on a Shakespearean play has been pretty challenging to say the least."

"From memorizing lines that feel like a tongue twister every time you speak to understanding the material and trying to interpret it to the best of my ability, it definitely takes time to get it down and practice. Once you understand what you're saying and can comfortably react, it gets more fun each time we do it."

For many audience members, the play was well directed, and many parts resonated with them.

Shella Davis, freshman Nursing major, said, "It's just something about William Shakespeare that just connects with my childlike self."

Davis has also seen other plays put on by the Masquers such as "The 39 Steps."

Joshua Smith, junior Biology major, said, "I like seeing students be funny in plays."

The title "Twelfth Night" is a reference to the twelfth night after Christmas Day, which is called the Eve of the Feast of Epiphany.

With the holidays just around the corner, "Twelfth Night" ushers in the season and embarks on the spirit of love and hope.

With the semester coming to a close, there will be more shows presented on campus next semester. Two of which will be "The Great American Trailer Park Musical" and "Bright Ideas."

Remembering The Life of Comic Book Legend Stan Lee

This week, the world lost a legend, Stan Lee, Marvel CEO and Co-Creator died at age 95. The news broke early on Monday afternoon on numerous major news outlets that stated his daughter and manager made the news official.

Lee is regarded as the Godfather of Marvel Comics, and rightfully deserves that title. He was with the company for over 70 years and created fan favorites such as Spider-Man, The Fantastic Four and Black Panther. Before he was with Marvel, he began his comic book career with Timely Comics in 1939, at the young age of 17.

By the early 1960s, Lee had been involved with Timely Comics for some time and continued to climb up the ranks of the company. The company went with a brand change at this time to rival DC Comics, changing its name to Marvel Comics. Around this time, Lee and his good friend Jack Kirby would create The Fantastic Four.

In 1972, Lee was named the Editorial Director and Publisher of Marvel Comics. He remained in the position for some time before deciding to create his own company in 1998, which was known as Stan Lee Media. His own company filed bankruptcy

a few years later, which led Lee to go back home to Marvel and Pow! Entertainment in 2004.

More recently, Lee has been responsible for Marvel Comics' major success on the big screen, scoring numerous #1 box office hits such as The Avengers, Guardians of the Galaxy, Doctor Strange and Thor. Marvel Comics has been successful for most of the 21st century, and Lee has had multiple cameos in all of his movies that fans enjoy with delight.

Lee's wife, Joan, died of a stroke over a year ago in July of 2017. He recently connected with New York memorabilia

collector Keya Morgan, but their relationship had its issues.

With Marvel Comics at an all-time high, this news comes with great sadness to comic book fans and everyone involved with his life. Hits such as Avengers: Infinity War and Venom broke enormous numbers money wise and also smashed numerous records for box office openings and gross money earned. In the coming months, Marvel is releasing Spiderman: Into the Spider-Verse, Captain Marvel and Avengers 4, all of which are likely to be major box office hits.

Lee is leaving behind a legacy that most cannot match.

He has touched comic book lovers from generation to generation, and his early and recent work have pleased everyone impacted by them. Anything that Marvel has released has been impacted or innovated by Stan Lee at some point. We would not have nearly any of our beloved fictional heroes from Marvel without the work of Stan Lee. Dying at age 95 meant he lived a full life and a life that some would give anything to have. Rest easy, you are your own hero now. "With great power comes great responsibility."
