### A Brief Note about the CSSC

Welcome to Curriculum Studies Summer Collaborative! The collaborative started nine years ago by Dr. Julie Garlen and Dr. Daniel Chapman of Georgia Southern University. The vision was to have a conference that was a safe and generative space for scholars and students of Curriculum Studies nationwide. The question was, how do you create a conference that focuses on the collaborative aspects of scholarship as opposed to the competitive? Over the years, we have tried to include informal moments where people could socialize, discuss and generate ideas. We always begin with an opening reception and we have always had lunch sessions that anchor the program.
