Large Graduating Class Get Diplomas Monday

The Alumni Association will dedicate an east campus entrance as a memorial to Dr. Charles H. Herty, and the first president of the college will give the baccalaureate address in the commencement at Teachers College.

Exercises in tribute to Dr. Herty will take place at 11:30 a. m. Saturday, May 31, near the college site where the famous Milledgeville chemist perfected the first cup and gutter for the collection of gum turpentine.

A new brick gate, costing \$1,800 and paid for by the alumni, will bear a plaque to be unveiled in testimony to Dr. Herty's work. The trunk of the first tree on which a Herty Cup was placed, the "Herty Pine," will be sunk in the ground below the tablet.

The dedication will be the big event of a schedule ending with graduation exercises at 10:30 a. m. Monday, June 2, in which Dr. Ernest V. Hollis will be the speaker.

Dr. Hollis, chief of College Administration in the Office of Education Zach S. Henderson will accept. The plaque was given to the college in 1935 by the late Mrs. M. E. Judd of Dalton. It bears the inscription:

"On this tree on July 20, 1901, the first cup and gutter for collecting gum turpentine was placed by Dr. Chas. H. Herty and his assistant Frank Klarpp. Here began a revolution in the naval stores industry."

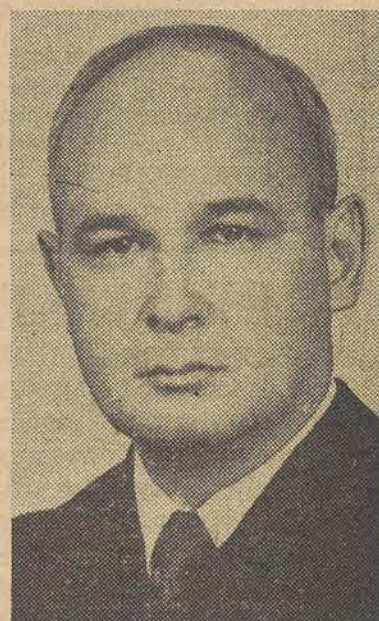
