## Traditional Old South Ball Is Saturday Night

### Committee of 15 Educators Meet Here to Study Scholastic Program

A committee of 15 prominent educators met on the campus of Georgia Teachers College April 13 through April 14 to study the college teacher education programs and make recommendation.

Regulations of the State Department of Education requires all colleges having teacher education programs to be approved before their graduates may be certificated as teachers for the Georgia Public Schools.

A college must be evaluated every five years to remain on the accredited list. The last time Georgia Teachers College was evaluated was in 1952.

#### Committee Is Impressed

According to Dean Paul Carroll, the committee was favorably impressed with the teacher education program.

Dean Carroll also said, "the members of the visiting committee were very helpful in pointing out areas where the program needs strengthening."

The newly developed graduate program in teacher education was also under examination. A project program for the preparation of junior high school teachers and a major in French to be started in September was also studied by the committee.

#### Dean Carroll Says

Dean Carroll said, "on Tuesday afternoon the visiting committee reported their findings to the college faculty."

The report was summed up by Dean Carroll saying, "the committee pointed out both strong and weak points of the college and were very pleased with the progress the college had made."

### Members Vote On Amendments For Constitution

During the regular meeting of the Student Council, Monday night, April 20, the following amendments were made to the GTC Student Constitution:

#### Article III. Members

The members of the Council shall consist of a president, a first vice - president, a second vice - president, a secretary, a treasurer, and eight representatives from the student body.

#### Article IV. Officers

##### Section 1—Qualifications

The presidents, vice - presidents, secretary, and treasurer shall be elected from among those members of the student body who will be members of the sophomore, junior, or senior class at the time they assume office; they must have been enrolled in this college for a least three quarters by the time they assume office; and they must have, at the time of nomination and must maintain throughout their tenure of office, a scholastic standing of "C" or above.

##### Section 4—Vacancy of Offices

In case of vacancy of presidency, the first vice president shall become president. The president shall then appoint a new first vice - president from the social committee. In case of vacancy of second vice-president, secretary or treasurer, a new officer shall be appointed by the president from the student Council.

##### Section 5—Duties

The first vice - president shall preside at all meeting in the absence of the president and shall have the same powers of the president in the president's absence. The first vice - president shall serve as Chairman of the social committee as established in Article VIII.

Dr. Connell was widely regarded as an educator of high character.

### Regents Approve Two Degrees

Here April 22

The State Board of Regents Wednesday approved a Georgia Teachers petition for permission to offer two additional degrees. The Statesboro school was empowered to offer courses leading to the degrees of bachelor of business administration and master of education in business education.

The regents also rejected a plan to elevate Georgia Southwestern College to a full four-year school offering degrees in nursing, science, Elementary education, business and English. The school would have retained its junior college program under the proposed plan, but the board ruled that the school lacks a sufficient faculty and library facilities.

It indicated that the Southwestern plan might have won approval if sufficient state funds were available to improve facilities.

## BASEBALL REVIEW

Editor's note: This column will appear each week covering one week of GTC's baseball activity running from Tuesday to Tuesday until the end of the Profs 1959 season).

In the past week the Profs have lost four of their five games to bring their season record to 6-6-1. The only victory was a big 20-1 victory over Furman last Friday.

The action started against the Newberry Indians last Wednesday with a 5-4 defeat in 11 innings. Clyde Miller, the most used reliever of the Profs, was credited with the loss, and his record is now 0-1.

Larry Moore was nipped for his first defeat (his record 1-1) as Furman came out on top 7-14 in 10 innings. This was a pitching duel between Moore and Coco Myer of Furman until the seventh inning when GTC got their four runs.

Then the Furman Hornets came back with two in the eighth, one in the ninth, and three in the tenth. Their other run came in the first inning on a triple and an error on Bill Mallard, the Profs' third baseman.

Following this defeat came one of the better games the Profs have played this season. Big 6-2 righthander Tony Adams pitched a four-hit game against the Hornets to even his record at 1-1. He struck out seven and walked nine as the Profs collected 20 hits against the

opposing pitchers.

Still plagued with a sore arm, Ray Mims gave up seven runs to the University of South Carolina in two innings and was eventually the losing pitcher. The Gamecocks got two more runs on reliever Larry Moore which were enough as they snuffed out a ninth rally to win 9-7. For Mims this was his first defeat as compared with two victories.

The Profs dropped their first two-game series this season when South Carolina won the second game 7-5.

Thomas Avret, who relieved Bo Altman in the second inning with no outs, was charged with the loss.

Clyde Miller replaced Avret in the third inning with one out and finished the game without giving up a run. Over this 6 2/3 innings of pitching, only three batters were able to collect a hit; all were singles.

Leaders in the various departments changed a little during these five games.

In batting Miller Finley with a .328 batting average still is on top, but he is getting a battle from Donald Lord at .306 for the lead. Dan Stipe has overtaken Ralph Berryhill for the RBI leadership with 12. Berryhill has 11 to his credit.

Donald Lord, who has the most walks with nine, hit his first homer to share that honor with Stipe and Berryhill. Speedy centerfielder Ben Benton leads the teams in base thefts with

1. Take shower before entering pool.

5. One person on diving board at a time.
6. Dive only when area below is safe.
7. No objects of any kind are to be thrown into pool.
8. All activities must stop when whistle blows.
9. Do not enter water if you have a sore or open cuts.
10. Turn off shower when you are through.
11. Do not bring any bottles into pool area.

In the second game the Gamecocks defeated the Profs for the second time 7-5 to take the series. Leading hitters in the game were Finley and short-stop Donald Lord with two hits apiece. Pitching for the Profs were freshman Bo Altman, Tom Avret, and Clyde Miller. Avret was charged with the loss.

The bleachers were built on the side of a natural embankment, which enables a perfect view of the playing field from all positions. The construction of the stadium cost \$3,500.

Athletic Director J. B. Searce says that the field has to be in perfect condition before each

game. This calls for such things as keeping the grass cut and watering everyday, dragging the infield, making sure rough areas are level and that the pitching mound is in good shape.

The infield requires a different type grass than does the outfield. Coach Searce said that the grass used should be very thin-bladed enabling a ball to bounce smoothly. He says the finest type athletic grass is the Tift-lawn 127 which is in the infield and was obtained from the Forest Heights Country Club.

GTC's field at the present is faced with a lighting situation. "The expense," states Coach Searce, "of getting lights and wiring the field would cost around \$20,000 and may be in obtain them."

Another funny incident that has happened recently concerns

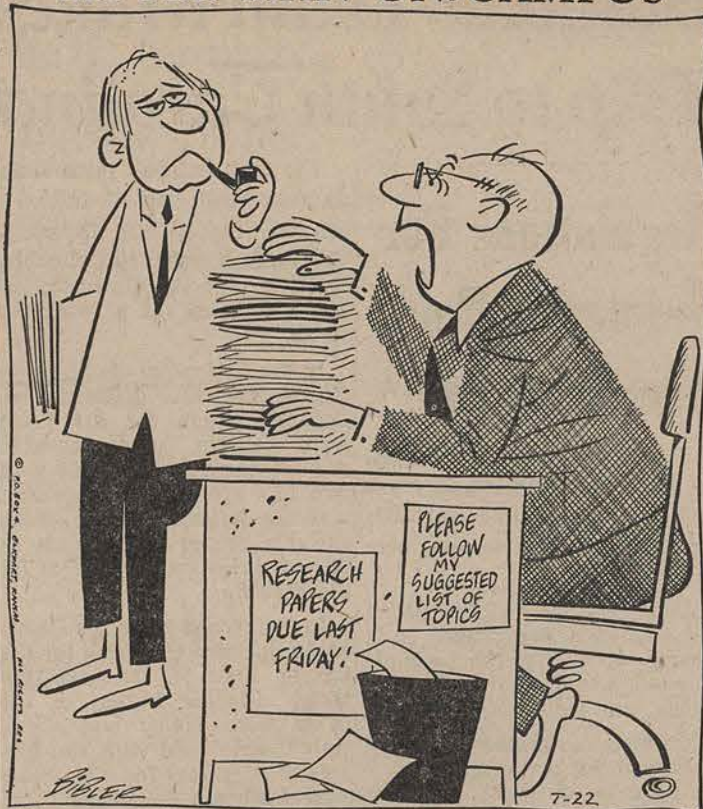

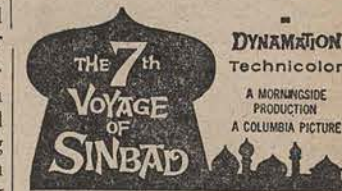
## Sanford, West To Be Closed
