## Congress Representatives Like Four Amendments; Kill One

Five proposed amendments to the Student Congress Constitution were discussed at the Dec. 8 meeting, four being approved and one voted down.

The approved measures will be presented to the student body spring quarter and voted on simultaneously with the election of 1967-68 Student Congress officers.

The defeated amendment would have provided for election of five additional members of Congress at large, with one representing each of the five organizational groups on campus, service, interest, departmental, etc.

A proposal of additional methods of nominating class officers was the first of the approved amendments. The motion calls for nominations from class

meetings, dormitories, and by securing petitions with 50 signatures. Four top nominees would be chosen at a class meeting, with a plurality of votes deciding the actual election.

Also passed were two motions which would lower the minimum required grade point average of class officers and Student Congress members respectively to 2.0.

The last proposal approved for student consideration was a provision to have vacancies on Student Congress, when they occur, filled by divisional elections rather than by appointment of division chairman, presently the case.

## KDX Approved

The Activities and Organizations Committee of Student Personnel has officially approved the organization of Kappa Delta Chi as a service fraternity, according to Larry Davis, chairman.

Officers for the organization were installed in the first official proceedings on Tuesday night. Carolus Daniel will serve as president and Gordon Turner as vice-president. Other officers are: Bill Nasworthy, secretary; John Thornton, treasurer; Charles Brown, Sgt.-at-Arms. The fraternity sweetheart is Jean Strickland.

KDX is sponsoring the homecoming parade, and according to a fraternity spokesman, plans are underway for this activity, as well as for a float and display. There will be a pledge period this quarter for new membership.

## Air Force Team To Visit College For Recruitment

The local Air Force Officer Selection Team will visit the college Jan. 11-12, according to Technical Sergeant Jim Pearce, local representative.

Located in Room 104 of the Williams Center, the team will conduct interviews from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m., both days, with officer-qualifying mental examinations being given Jan. 12.

They will interview senior men and women who are interested in an officer's commission in the U. S. Air Force, emphasis being placed on men who are interested in the Pilot Training Program, and women to fill executive positions.

## 3641 Register; Andrews Starts New Fee System

Winter quarter enrollment reached 3641 as of Jan. 4, according to Registrar Lloyd Joyner. Breakdown by classification is: freshmen, 494 men and 700 women; sophomores, 423 men and 484 women; juniors, 442 men and 364 women; seniors, 330 men and 274 women; unclassified, three women; post baccalaureate, 13 men and seven women; graduates, 50 men and 57 women.

A total of 175 men and 1889 women comprise the total enrollment. First time registrants totaled 243.

ever, due to students being permitted to register as late as Jan. 10. First time registrants totaled 243.

A new system was inaugurated for paying fees. This process was the work of Associate Comptroller Ralph M. Andrews.

Fees were paid in the Alumni Gymnasium in ten cashier lines rather than the previous four lines available in the Administration building. Students were issued meal tickets in the line for paying fees and had their ID cards punched for winter quarter as they left the gymnasium.

There was one line for loans and a separate line for scholarships, rather than the combination loan and scholarship line formerly used in the Administration building.

Joyner said that there were no actual changes in the actual registration system other than the requirement that all students see their faculty advisers before going to register. He said that this quarter's registration "was perhaps the most efficient we have had. We had some classes closed out, but not as many as in previous quarters."

and colleges with which the "George-Anne" exchanges papers, and to alumni subscribers who purchase the "George-Anne" at the rate of \$1.00 per year.

Tentative plans for the contest include preliminary nominations by any approved campus organization. Entries are to be submitted to the "George-Anne" office no later than 4 p.m. Friday, Jan. 13.

Judging will be done by a board of faculty members and student leaders, who will select 10 finalists on Jan. 23. The same board will select one winner from the 10 finalists on Jan. 30. The winner will repre-

sent Georgia Southern College in the national contest.

"Glamour" magazine began the Best Dressed Coed Contest in 1957. Colleges across the United States annually send representatives to be judged by "Glamour" editors. The "Glamour" editors then select 10 winners from the representatives of various colleges. The 10 national winners will be flown to New York for an all-expense paid visit to cultural centers, museums, evenings at the theatre, and dinners at famous restaurants. These winners will also be featured in national magazines and advertisements.

## Annual Faculty Art Exhibition Opens Tuesday in Library

The annual Georgia Southern Faculty Art Exhibit will be held Jan. 10-17, in the Rosenwald Library. Diversity in background, training, and media will lend variety to the individual creative expression of the staff.

Dr. Frieda Gernant, head of the art department, will exhibit pieces that include batik, collage, and ceramics. Dr. Gernant has exhibited locally and in Michigan, New York, and Washington, D. C.

Miss Roxie Remley's paintings will be keynoted by subtle translucent shapes and muted color keynotes. Miss Remley has exhibited paintings in West Palm Beach, Winston Salem, the Kennedy Art School at Cape Cod, and at Pratt Institute in New York City.

Mrs. Judith Myers' paintings are dominated by the surrealistic quality of forms suspended


in enveloping darkness. Mrs. Myers is a graduate of the University of Michigan; she has exhibited at the Gallery in Statesboro.

Four fall quarter Student Congress members will be replaced for winter quarter, according to James Stapleton, president.

Francis Smith, science and math division representative, and Larry Olsen, arts division representative, were suspended from Congress for failure to attend 75 per cent of regular meetings. Olsen's replacement, Harry Amerson, junior Industrial Arts major from Macon, was named during fall quarter. Smith's replacement has not yet been named.

Ken Ivey, arts division representative, and Joe Mercer, senior class president, will also be replaced due to their not being regularly enrolled students during winter quarter. Ivey's replacement will be appointed by the arts division.

Normally Mercer's replacement would be Mack Poss, senior vice-president, but will be Secretary-Treasurer Carol Skinner since Poss is student teaching during winter quarter. Miss Skinner is a sociology major from Columbus, Ga.

## Two APO's Attend Meet

Eddie Bateman and Richard Steele, Alpha Phi Omega fraternity brothers, attended the National APO Convention in Minneapolis, Minn. Dec. 27-31.

They left Atlanta Dec. 26, and arrived in Minnesota the following day amid snow and freezing temperatures.

Bateman, sergeant-at-arms for the college chapter of APO, was named national sergeant-at-arms. The appointment was made by the national president of the convention and the Chief Executive Director. He will also serve as national sergeant-at-arms for next year's convention, in Washington D.C.

Steele was appointed to the national convention's Constitution and By-laws Committee, which held meetings concerned with additions to the constitution and issues to be amended. He will represent the college at the Constitutional Convention to be held in Oklahoma next December.

At the convention both representatives attended business meetings and participated in a legislation period, during which laws for all fraternity chapters were enacted and revisions in the national constitution were made.

## PROBATION??

Sigma Epsilon Chi, service fraternity for men, sponsored a Christmas party, complete with presents and Santa Claus, Dec. 10, for underprivileged children in Bulloch County. The same organization was placed on social probation earlier in the quarter by the director of student activities and the Organizations and Activities Committee.

Originally probation status was described by a committee spokesman as forbidding all organizational activities with the exception of regular meetings.

The Christmas party therefore was an illegal activity, according to the original probationary terms. A committee spokesman, confronted with this position, said that the party was "a service project" had been "previously planned," and was therefore given administrative sanction.

We commend Sigma Epsilon Chi for their project with the underprivileged children. No other organization individually undertook a similar endeavor. Clarification, however, is needed on the definition of probation status.

Since "service" project are the only truly legal activities of GSC fraternities this definition of the party should not differentiate between it and a dance or concert. Secondly, a dance, previously planned by Delta Pi Alpha (also placed on probation during fall quarter), had to be cancelled after probation was announced. Thus the fact that the party was previously planned should not merit it any special status.

Certainly some administrative clarification is needed. If indeed such parties and activities are to be accorded a special status (as perhaps they should), then such terms should be spelled out explicitly, not expressed in ambiguous terms which vary with individual situations.

## 75 PER CENT

Two Student Congress members have been removed from their positions for failure to attend regular congress meetings. The announcement was made by President James Stapleton at the last fall quarter meeting.

To remain eligible for congress membership, representatives must maintain 75 per cent attendance at regularly scheduled meetings.

This marks the first time in several years that the attendance rule has been enforced. We commend the Student Congress Executive Committee for their implementation of this action with the suggestion that similar procedures be taken in the Committee of Campus Organizations. Enforcement of basic attendance requirements is a prime requisite for effective student government. Surely it is not asking too much of Congress and committee members to attend 75 per cent of regular meetings.

Seeley (25), Wise Run Into Positions; Gregory (4) Waits; Stetson's Buchanan Guards Rose.


## Eagles Dump Lenior Rhyne

Southern qualified for the championship game by defeating Campbell College, 68-63, in overtime the night before, while ACC crushed Old Dominion, 111-86. In the consolation game Old Dominion beat Campbell, 94-78.

The Eagles led the ACC Bulldogs by five points early in the first half, but the Bulldogs switched from man-to-man defense to a zone and took the lead, 35-34, at halftime of the Championship battle.

Although Southern tied the game at 42-42, the game was lost. The Eagles could not get off enough shots and scored no more than 18 points after the rest.

Robert Jordan was hottest of the Southern cagers making nine baskets and 11 rebounds. Seeley was the top rebounder with 15 for the losing Statesboro team.

Southern shot for 35 per cent while ACC posted a 60 per cent field goal mark.

Guard Jimmy Rose put on a show when the Eagles nipped the Camels of Campbell College. He scored 16 baskets during the regulation time, which ended tied, 57-57.

The Eagles won the overtime with Rose scoring six of these 11 points.

Guard Ken Szotkiewicz assisted well, and scored a total of 17 points. Seeley once more was the leading rebounder snapping 15. Jordan did not get more than 5 points, but his 12 rebounds certainly helped.

Southern sank 34 per cent of the attempted field goals and the Camels made 36 per cent of theirs.

The Bulldogs came back though and were only three points, 43-46, behind in the half. After a dramatic second half with the visitors ahead most of the time Rose tied the ball game, 70-70, 14 seconds before the end of regulation time.

The five-minute overtime was a crescendo. With 19 seconds to go the Citadel led, 78-76 and T. C. Hooper was fouled. He missed the 1 of 1 and six seconds later Greg Conner missed another one. And then came Seeley.

Seeley was fouled before he made the jump shot, which should have rendered Southern only one foul shot instead of the two-pointer and the winning foul shot, many criticized.

Coach J. B. Searce made a discovery. Eagle Center Barry Miller, a 27-year-old newcomer from Galva, Ill., proved to be a high caliber player. Although Miller played his first game ever in front of spectators he was high rebounder with 13 and scored seven points. "I think Barry will help us a heck of a lot," grinned a pleased Searce.

Southern this time posted a .486 shooting percentage compared to .449 for the Citadel. In the first half though the Eagles shot for .568.

Jimmy Rose was the leading Southern scorer with 29 points. For the Citadel Tennis Star T. C. Hooper and 6-7 Dan Mohr were hottest with 15 points each.

The Eagles' season record now is 7-5.
