## Profs Dedicate New Gym With 93-75 Win

### Prexy's Discuss Problems On GTC's Campus

The presidents of various organizations on GTC campus met with Dr. Zach S. Henderson in his home last Monday night for an informal chat.

Some of the problems on our campus were discussed and solutions were offered. The group took no action on any of these problems but merely gave the President suggestions.

Some of the problems discussed were the parking situation along several streets on campus, the mob reaction when the dining hall is opened each day, line breaking, recreational facilities out of doors, action to be taken concerning the lakes, and the proposed signs to go near the front entrance.

The group anticipates several similar meetings next quarter and thanks Dr. Henderson for this opportunity to discuss these problems.

The George-Anne heartily congratulates him on this move and feels that it is a thing that has long been needed. We would like to see this develop into a regular meeting.

Dean of Women, Helen Duncan, was back in the Bulloch County Hospital earlier this week with a relapse of a virus attack which hospitalized her just before Thanksgiving holidays.

### Xmas Holidays Begin Fri. For GTC Students

Only the small matter of examination week now lies between the 755 GTC students and Christmas holidays.

The vacation officially begins at noon next Friday and extends to Sunday, January 1.

But unofficially, the holidays will begin sooner for some students—as soon as the last exam is finished—and extend to the beginning of the winter quarter classes Tuesday, January 3.

In case anyone is interested, however, the dormitories will be open Sunday, January 1, at 5 p. m. Registration of new students is slated the following day at 2 p. m. and classes begin at 8 a. m. Tuesday, January 3. The last day for registration for winter quarter is Monday, January 9.

### Easily Defeat Wofford College; Webb Hits for 33, Wallen 20

Contributing its part towards making the program complete, the baseball team of Georgia Teachers College tonight defeated Wofford College, 93 to 75. The game was the climax of the formal dedication of a recently completed \$325,000 physical education facility at which Gov. Marvin Griffin was the featured speaker.

A near capacity crowd estimated at 2,000 attended the event and inspected the handsome brick structure which is equipped with all modern facilities and paraphernalia of a complete gymnasium.

President Zach S. Henderson of GTC was master of ceremonies and introduced the chief executive.

Chester Webb paced the Georgia Teachers' scoring attack with 33 points, on 13 field goals and seven foul shots. Don Wallen had 20; Bo Warren 17 and Garland Campbell had 15.

Georgia Teachers hit 36 out of 88 field goal attempts while Wofford connected on 29 out of 73.

Georgia Teachers' scoring attack was almost halted during the early minutes of the game but the Profs, with 10 minutes left in the first half, began to hit and ran up a 48-33 halftime lead.

The lead changed hands twice and was knotted twice during the first ten minutes of play.

Early in the second half Wofford cut the GTC lead to seven points. Both schools then traded baskets until the clock showed nine minutes to go. At that point Wofford reduced the lead to 71-65. GTC then increased the advantage and continued to extend it.

With three minutes left the Teachers held a 20-point lead at 85-65. From then on the scoring pace slowed down but GTC continued to hold its large advantage.

# Sigh of Relief...

The eyes of the nation have been focused on Georgia again this week anxiously awaiting the outcome of the Governor Griffin-Ga. Tech squabble over whether the Tech eleven would be allowed to participate in the 1956 Bowl contest in Louisiana.

The metropolitan newspapers played the dispute to the hilt. Hardly a day passed without some writer predicting the death of Georgia Tech and the University of Georgia as big time football powers if the wishes of Gov. Griffin were carried out.

Meanwhile, Georgia Teachers College, nestled in the murmuring pine trees, out of the national spotlight, went calmly about its business of beginning a new basketball season. But was this calmness the true feeling of those at GTC?

In reality, had the Board of Regents seen fit to grant the Governor's request, the sports future at GTC would have been hit harder than most people seem to realize.

While the summit of Georgia and Georgia Tech has already been reached on the sports scene, the future of GTC is still to come. Although the teams now on our schedule comply with the wishes of the Governor, this will not always be the case.

During the Christmas holidays, the Professors will journey to Quantico, Va. to compete against some of the better northern cage teams. Here is an opportunity for the Professors to stand up against teams they would otherwise fail to meet. If the Regents had passed a bill forbidding Georgia teams to compete against teams with Negro players, our participation in this tournament would have been rendered impossible.

This year's group of Professors is, in the opinion of many, the best hope of national tournament play in Kansas City that has been produced at GTC.

The Professors have never captured the district tourney. And now, at just the time when this goal is more than just a dream, our chances were almost rendered nil by Gov. Griffin's concern with segregation.

Georgia Teachers College had much more at stake in this dispute than is realized at first thought. The George-Anne is pleased and breathes a sigh of relief at learning that the Board of Regents kept their heads and made a decision that showed sense and forethought, a rare combination in Georgia this day and time.

This is the last edition of the George-Anne for the fall quarter. We, of the staff, feel it has been a very successful quarter. The willingness and cooperation of each member of the staff has been responsible for the success of this quarter's paper.

I was doing a review on the Supreme Court's school segregation ruling and came upon those old words again and again appalled at the complete irrationality of them.

I quote: "We have come to the question presented: Does segregation of children in public schools solely on the basis of race, even though the physical facilities and other 'tangible' factors may be equal, deprive the children of the minority group of equal educational opportunities? We believe that it does."

Let us look calmly and rationally for a moment at what these people have said. They contend that equal plants, equal facilities, equal equipment, equal curriculum, equal terms, equal teacher qualifications, and equal salaries do not make equal educational opportunities. What do they propose in order to remedy this desegregation. In other words, all these things will not make opportunities for education equal, but mixing the kids together will. If all these things would not make for equality for the Negro, would the sitting of a white student in the next row over do the job? I think not.

The court says that segregation gives the Negro a feeling of inferiority thereby destroying his motivation. Segregation separates both one from the other—why then does not the white student feel inferior?

The "nine little men in Washington" have pulled some terrific boners in their time, but for sheer stupidity, this particular group in this particular incident has surpassed them all.

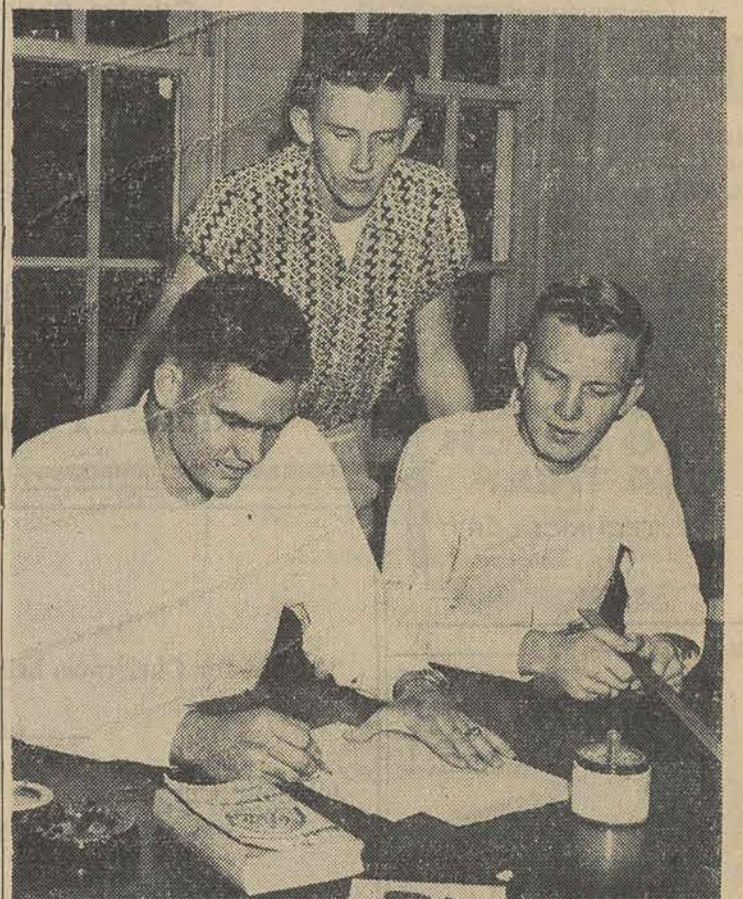
## Sports Writers Keep Fast Pace

Sports coverage next quarter will be even more important with the basketball team expected to have one of its greatest years and with the baseball season opening up in March.

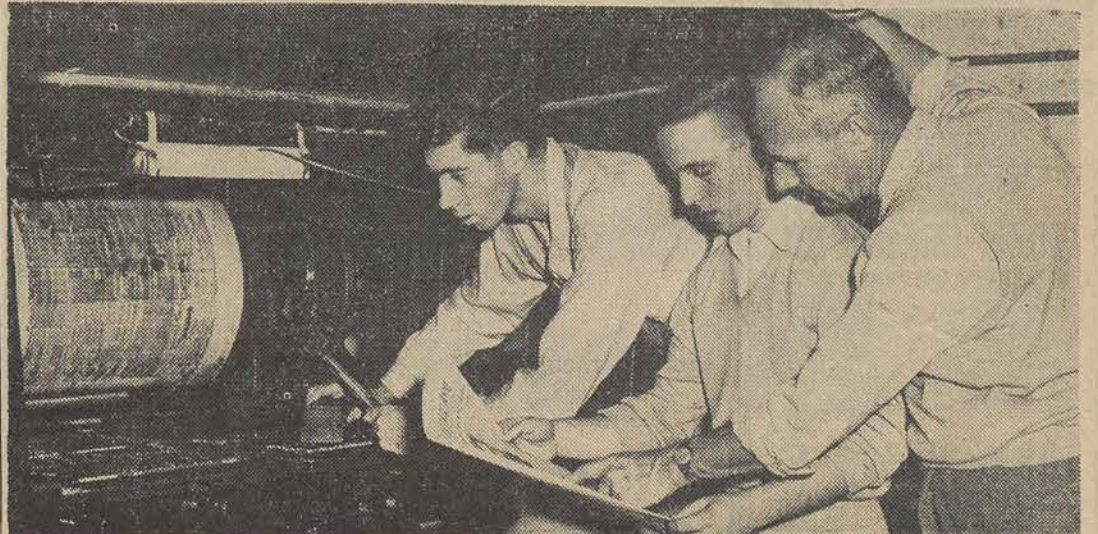
More sports reporters will be needed to cover the big sports quarter.

## IA Department To Add Graphic Arts Laboratory

It is the hope of the industrial arts department that work on the new graphic arts laboratory will be completed by Christmastime and that the room will be ready for use by the winter term.

Members of the Industrial Arts Club and other hired student labor have been working for several weeks on the 30' by 35' room which adjoins the drafting area of the present building. When completed, it will be used primarily for teaching graphic arts courses but will also offer new office and classroom space. One feature will be a large photography dark room, eight times the size of the one now in use.

The new lab will make it possible to zone the different working areas of the department by putting all graphic arts such as work in letter press, printing, etching, linoleum block, and photography in one end of the building.

## GTC'S New Well Now Testing; To Cost 20,000 Bux

GTC's new well is presently in a test stage and is expected to be completed and ready for actual use about one or two months from now.

The well is presently being tested to see if it can supply the water capacity expected. It is pumping 550 gallons per minute, all of which is going down the ditch nearby.

After the test run, they will have to await the delivery of the pump and electrical components, build a brick pump house and landscape the area.

The well will be operated by a 60 horsepower motor and have an expected output in excess of 500 gallons per minute from a depth of 620 feet.

The contract price, which provides for drilling, the pump, electrical control, and guaranteed output of 500 gallons, is \$14,971, but upon completion the total project will amount to an estimated \$20,000.

The well is being constructed not only to provide GTC with adequate water supply for its ever-increasing needs but also to provide an adequate water supply for fire prevention and control.

The pump will be electronically controlled so that it will operate only when the present pump cannot maintain a constant supply of 25,000 gallons above ground.

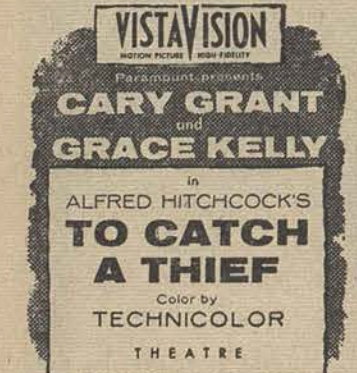

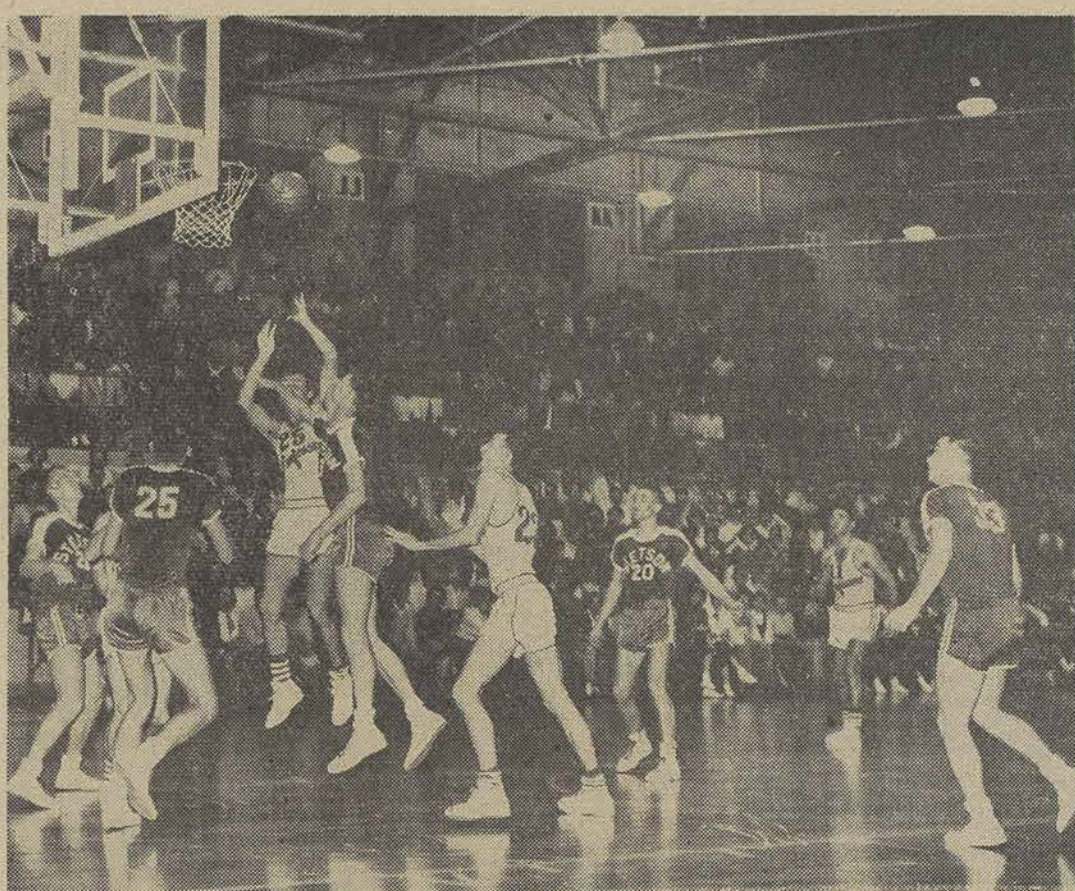
