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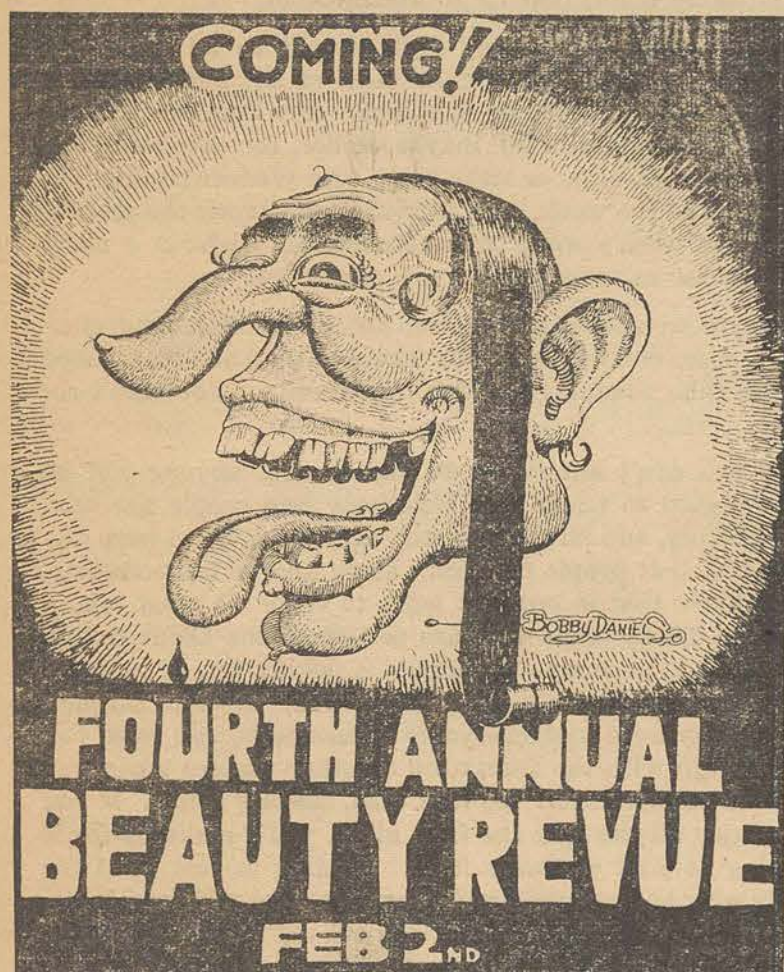

Cousins Finally Meet at College

A likeness in appearance noted by their psychology classmates at T.C. caused William J. Peacock, of Baxley, and Cecil M. Peacock, of Milan, to get acquainted. They learned they are sixth cousins.

Enrollment Same As Last Quarter

Winter quarter enrollment is exactly the same as for the fall quarter, 762, President Henderson announced in chapel Monday. There are 436 men, 199 of whom are veterans, and 326 women.

The veteran enrollment decreased 45 over last winter quarter, whereas the total enrollment increased 41.

According to Professor Jack Averett, faculty sponsor, they are only preparing for the Fourth Annual Beauty Revue, an elaborate contest to name "Miss Teachers College," which will be presented at Georgia Teachers College on Thursday night, February 2.

Students are already selling tickets in Statesboro in anticipation of the five-act pageant. They plan to make an intensive campaign during the week before the revue. The price of all tickets is 50 cents.

Contestants and judges will be announced next week, Mr. Averett said. The program will include continuous organ music by Prof. Jack W. Broucek of the Teachers College and novelty skits to be presented between acts.

Miss Betty Fuller, of McRae, a sophomore, was crowned "Miss Teachers College" last year, although she was only a freshman at the time. Winners may not compete again, but Miss Fuller will present the bouquet designed for the 1950 queen.

Chapel Movie

"Fight for Freedom" was sponsored by the IRC in chapel Friday. This was a documentary film based on world events, 1914-1938. Such prominent persons as Lenin, Trotsky, Hitler and Mussolini appear in the film. Conditions in Japan and her invasion of China were also points of interest. I.R.C. Social Held Thursday Night

Good, wholesome entertainment is also furnished in pool and shuffleboard. Mr. Foss stated that although one table has already been set up he plans to install two more. No gambling will be tolerated by pool shooters.

There is a nice dance floor and four bowling alleys. If students cooperate and try to make Student Night a success, bowling teams may also be organized.

Mr. Foss also pointed out that no drinking, or any person who is drunk, is permitted in the Skate-R-Bowl. The establishment, as it is set up, is utilized for the purpose of sponsoring wholesome recreation and entertainment for all.

PUBLIC OPINION

MAYBE I'M JUST BIG-HEARTED, but I like to see people get a square deal. Somehow, I find it hard to really like a person who shoves ahead of others in any place, or assumes a "holier-than-thou" attitude over the miserable masses.

I don't like to think that any of us really appreciate a person like that. But did you ever stop to think that perhaps you are the cause of a person being that way? If you'll listen for a moment I can explain what I mean by that.

Did you ever laugh when the boy in the line ahead of you sneaked an extra piece of meat from under the glass and hid it in his napkin? Suppose it had been the last piece, and that left you without any? It wouldn't have been funny then! The same thing applies to line-breaking. Maybe you couldn't find that "special friend" when you started to supper. Well, when he comes in, why should he come up and break into line with you—instead of you going back to wait for him?

Did your roommate ever leave her clothes strewn across your bed? Did you toss them on the floor, or meekly pick them up and put them away? If you did the latter, why grumble the next time she does the same thing? If you had a free maid, wouldn't you utilize her, too? On this subject of roommates, too much cannot be said. Why should you do all the sweeping and dusting, and perhaps bed-making, until resentment gets the better of you and there is a grand "blow-up"? Why not let her know where you stand on the first day? Present a plan of work and say definitely, "I'll do this and you do that." Then stand pat, and under no circumstances ever do her work! Of course, if you are one of those people who glories in his martyrdom and finds his greatest pleasure in being submissive to those egocentric personalities, this does not apply to you. But, most of us aren't built that way. We become annoyed and aggravated when people don't meet us half way—and rightly so. When you meekly give in, you are doing your roommate and injustice and yourself also. She will find it twice as hard to get along with you because she will expect more meek servitude and, the chances are, she will not find it. And all this time you are steadily building up pressure that must sooner or later find an outlet.

Did you ever back a paper with a fair number of correct answers only to find that your rank in class was at or near the bottom? Not many of us wonder why. We know of the cheating that goes on in the classroom; perhaps we even see it. Some of us may have been guilty of helping someone else. Most of you are saying, "What can we do about that? If other people cheat we can't stop that!" Did you know you can? It's the thing I've been trying to bring out all the time—public opinion;

Do you think cheating would go on here as much as it does if the cheaters found out that the majority of the students didn't even think it was "smart" to play around until the last minute, and then get their grade dishonestly? As one of our professors has said: "It is nothing more or less than stealing." They are stealing the grade you should rightfully have had. Is it funny to watch someone steal your personal property? Then, why do we laugh?

We have to learn to get over our primitive instincts. The boy or girl who "takes" what he or she wants, be it only a place in line, credit for knowledge he does not possess without paying for it with patience and work, or whatever the price may be, is made that way by our own efforts. I believe the majority of us feel the same way as I do. Let's let them know where we stand. If they still persist in doing the way they do, maybe what they do need is a good psychiatrist, not an education.—EDITH CARPENTER.
