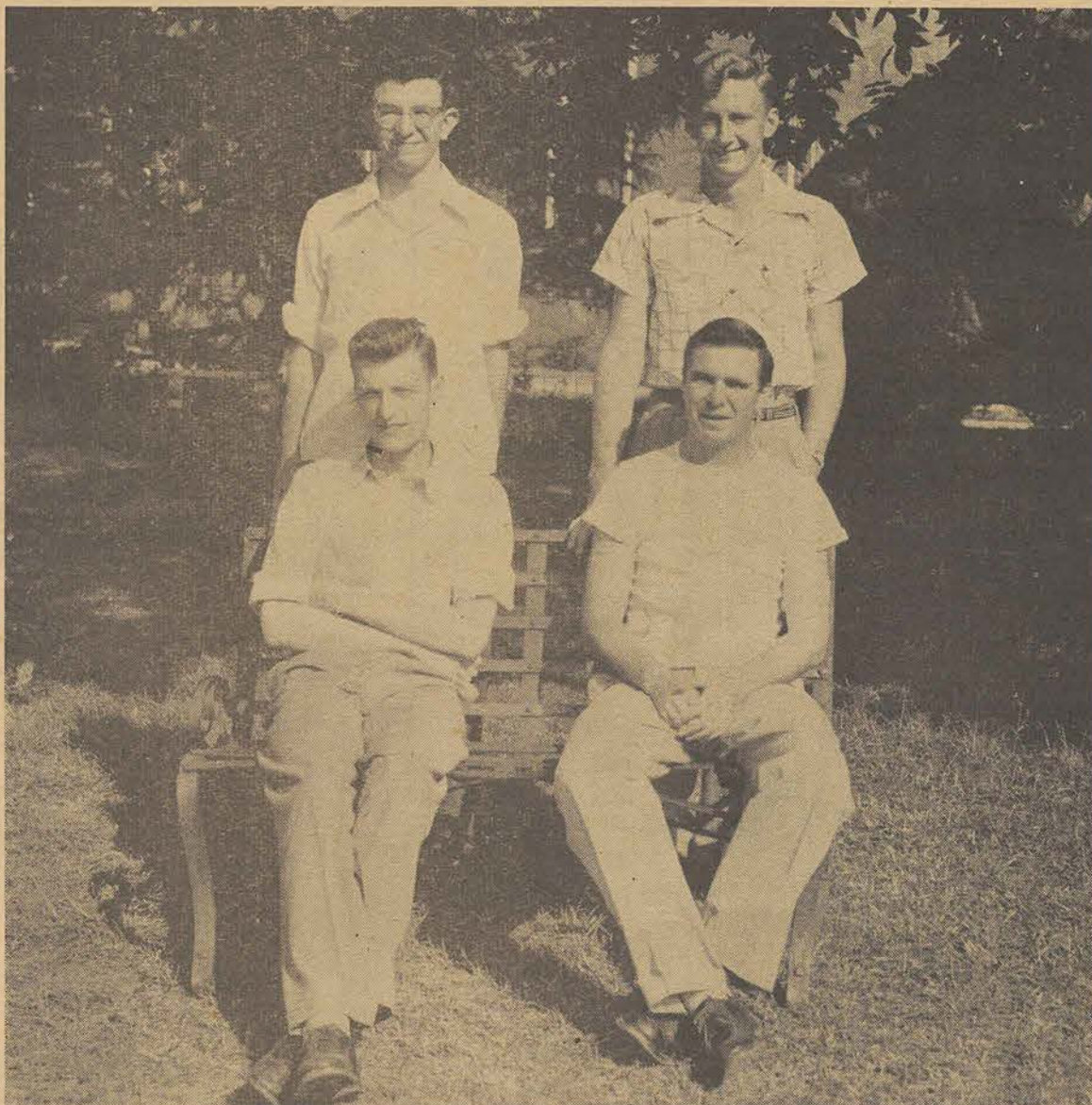

115 Seniors To Receive Diplomas Monday Night

Georgia Teachers College will confer the bachelor of science degree on 115 seniors, the largest June or August graduating group since degrees first were awarded to a class of four in 1929, at closing exercises at 10:30 a.m., June 5. Fifty-eight are war veterans.

William Henry Shaw, superintendent of schools at Columbus, will deliver the baccalaureate address, and President Zach S. Henderson will award degrees. The commencement sermon will be given at 11:30 a.m., Sunday, June 4, by Bishop Arthur J. Moore, of the Atlanta area of the Methodist Church, who recently returned from a six-months tour of the Far East.

Both services will be held in the college auditorium.

Other seasonal events include Alumni Day on Saturday, June 3; a Step-Singing Festival, and a Lantern Walk in which seniors parade the campus, darkened except for their lanterns, and reflect on college experiences. The Festival and Lantern Walk took place on Friday night.

Alumni will highlight their day by dedicating a new college entrance, to be known as Alumni Gate, and an adjacent Alumni Park at 1:30 p.m. Sidney Boswell, class of 1931, principal at Glynn Academy, Brunswick, will make the acceptance speech and dedicatory address.

Activities will open at 11 a.m. with reunions for classes of 1930, 1935, 1940, and 1945, and will close with a banquet at 7:30 p.m., in which James Chorry, class of 1936, superintendent of DeKalb county schools, will be presented as the "Alumnus of the Year."

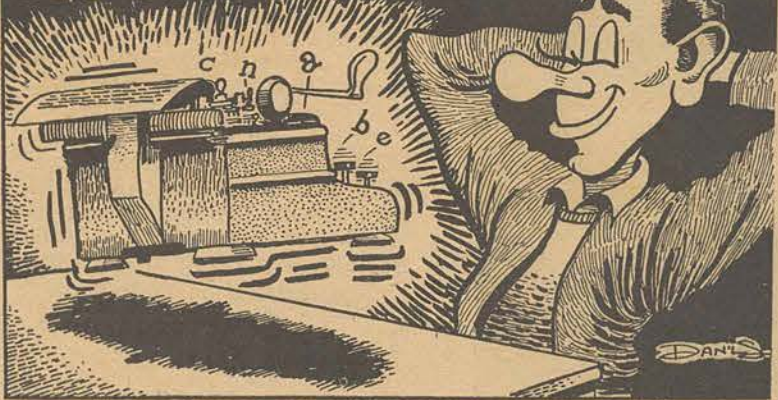

Of the 761 fall quarter enrollment, T.C. welcomed 278 freshmen to join the ranks of knowledge.

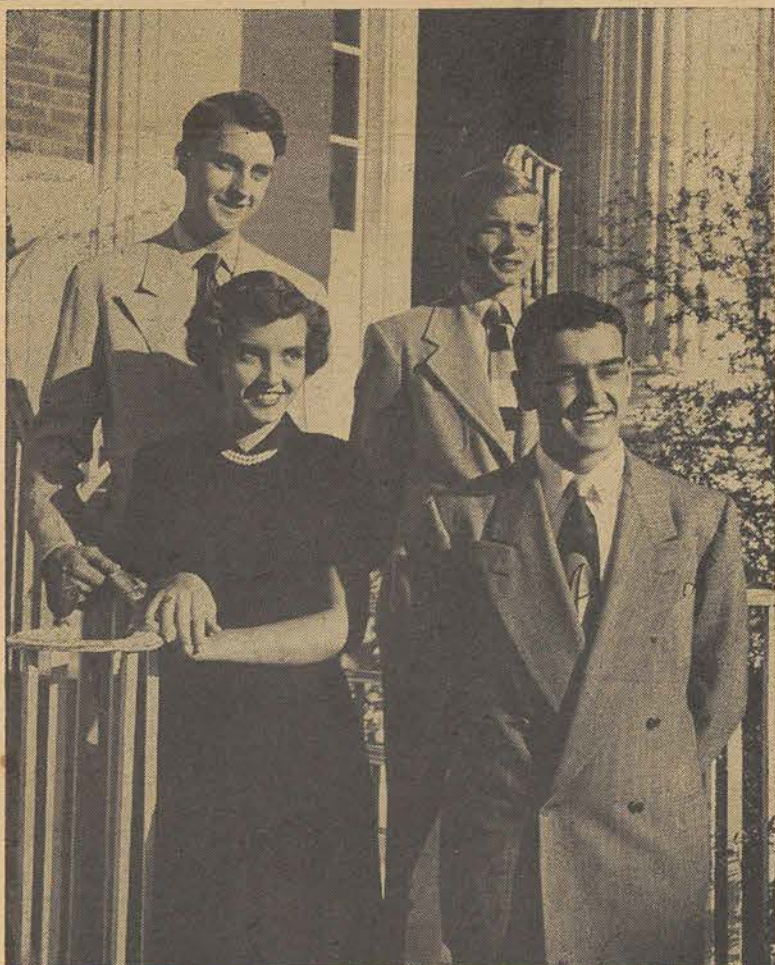
To welcome the freshmen girls was a new ruling which allowed them to have one date per week, and two if they maintained a "B" average.

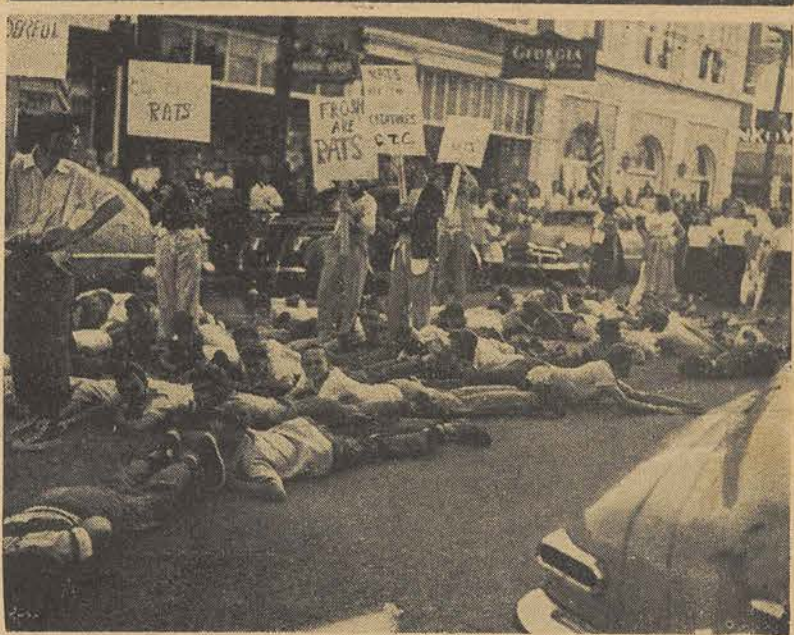
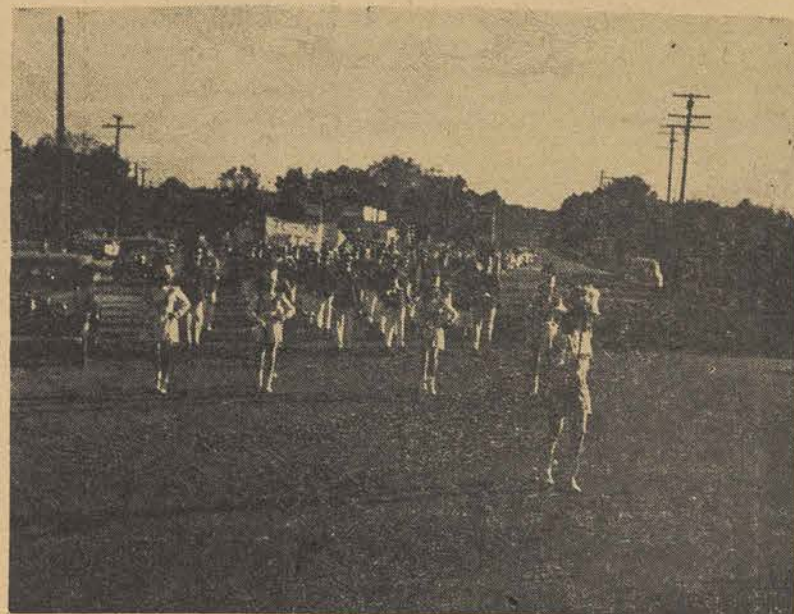

Ann Nevil and Ed Mitchell represented the class as members of the student council.



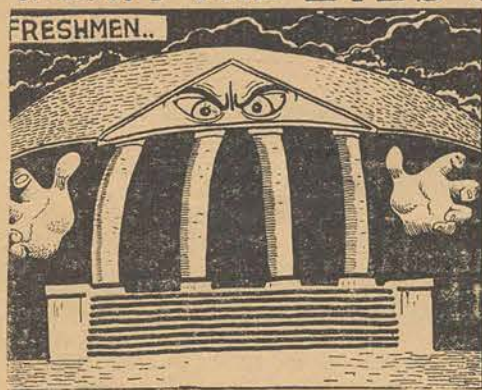

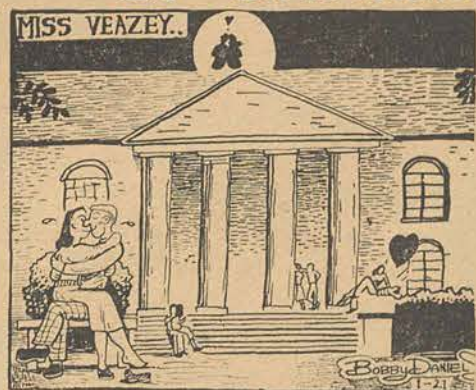

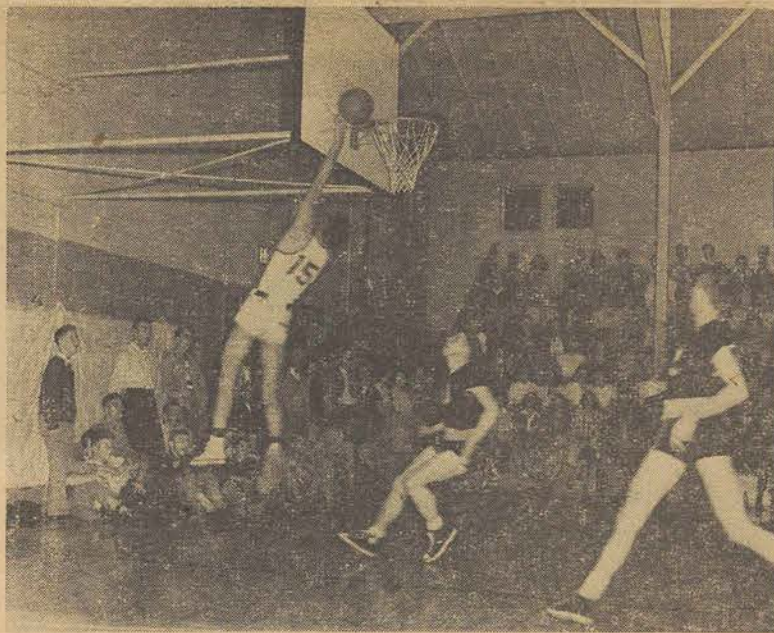
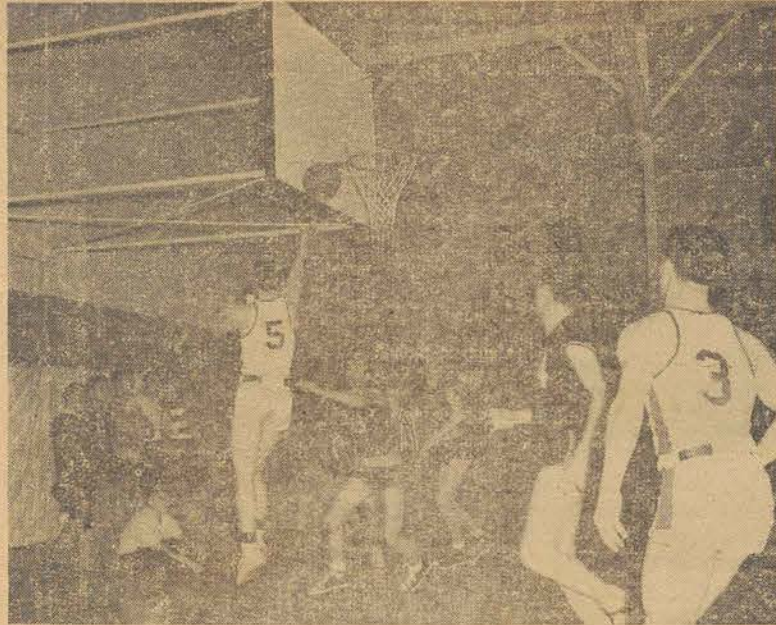
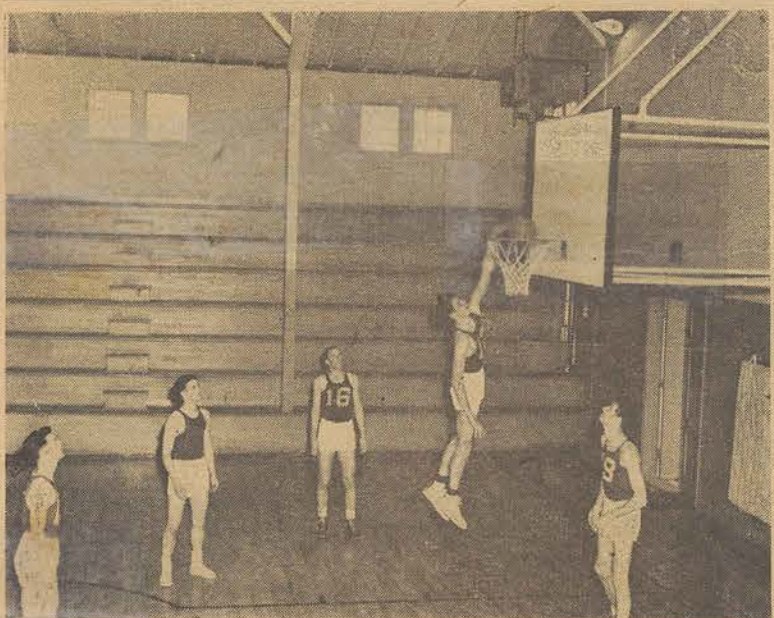

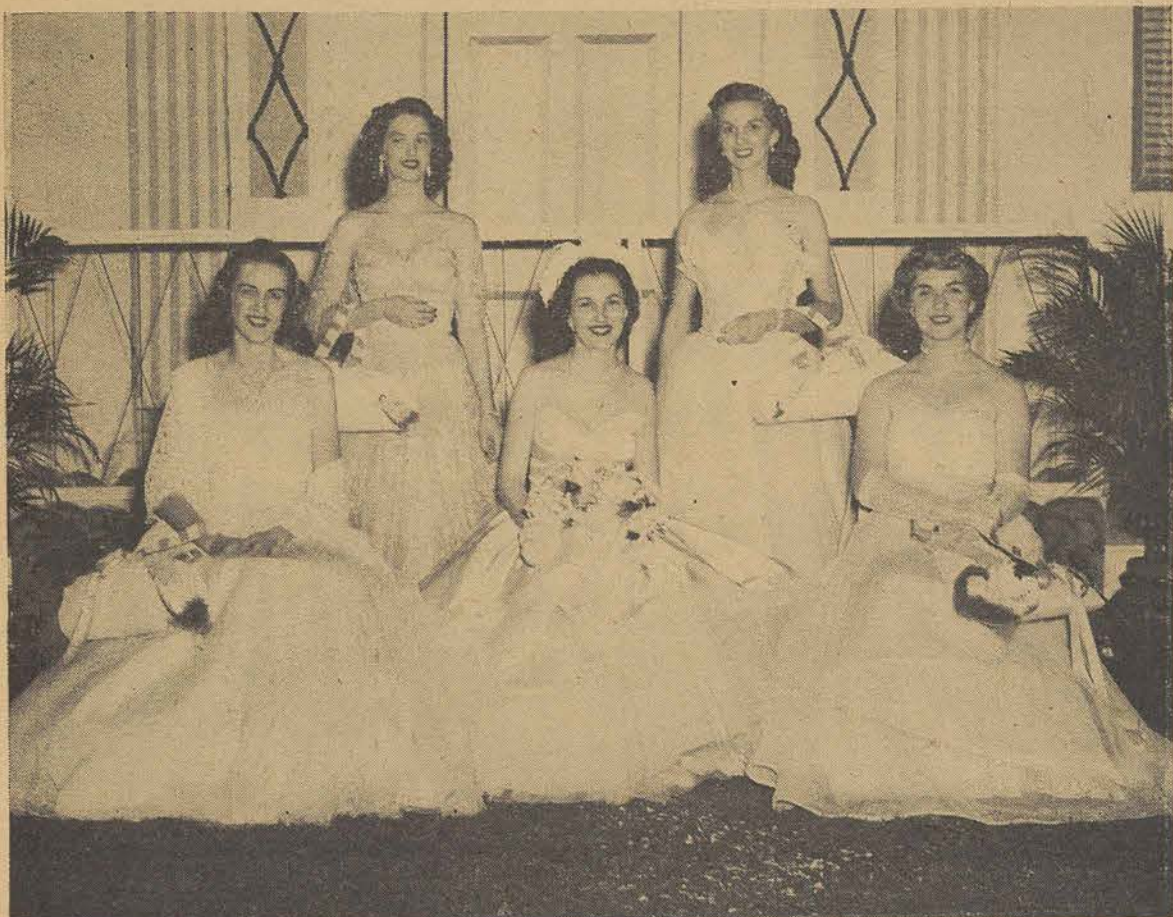

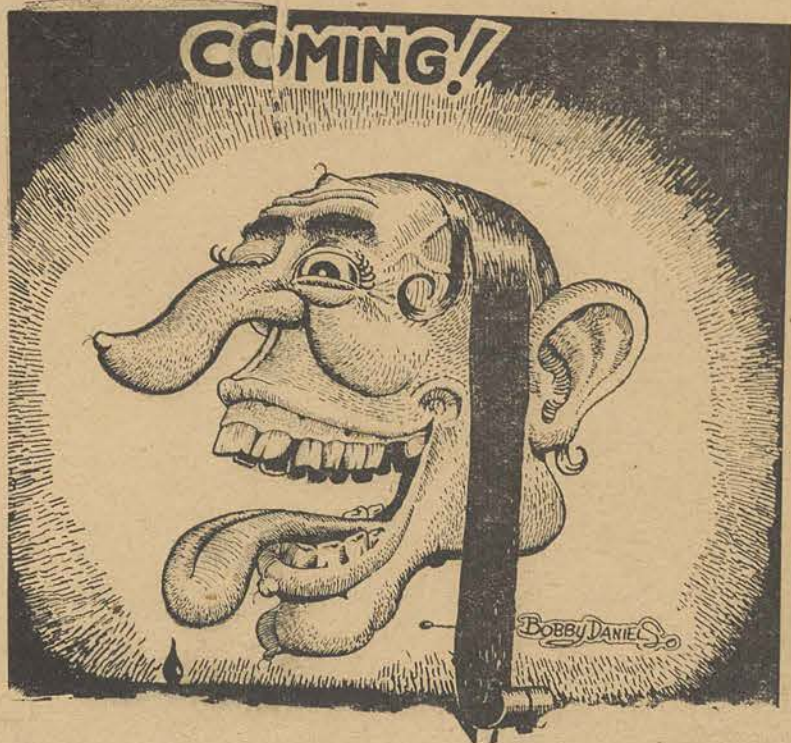

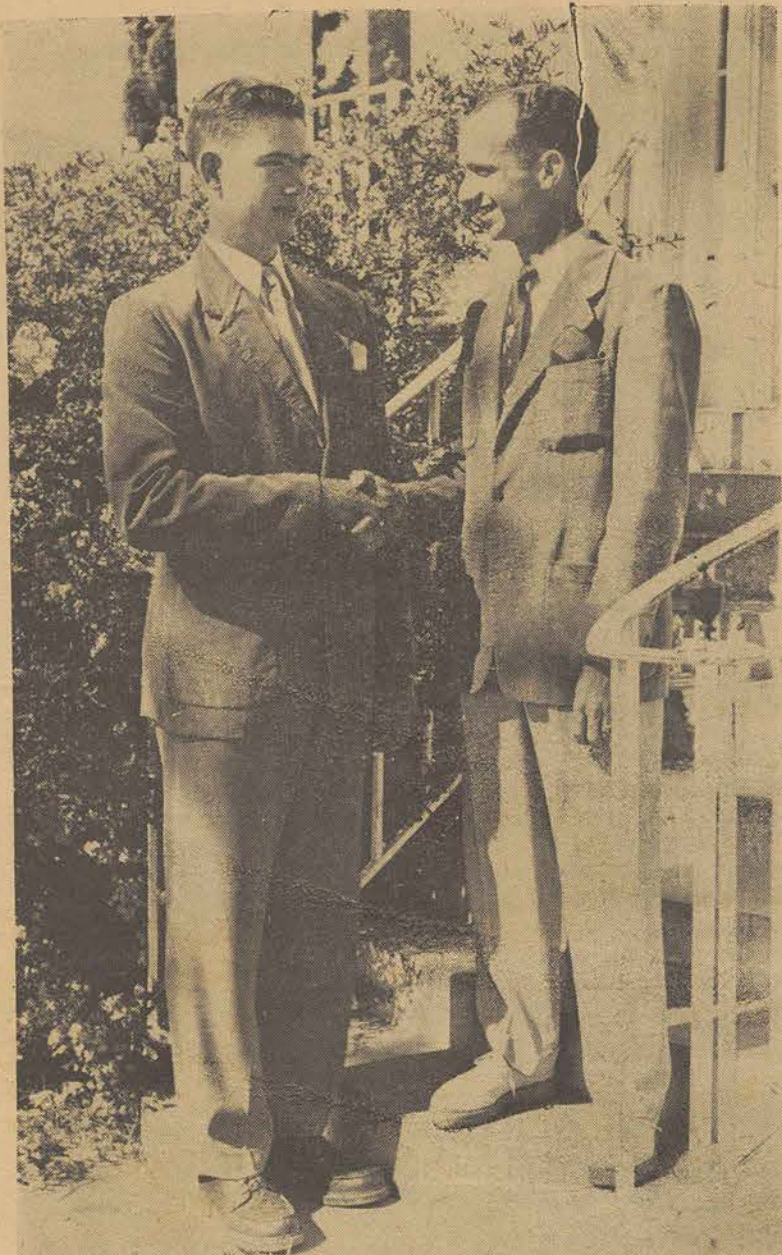

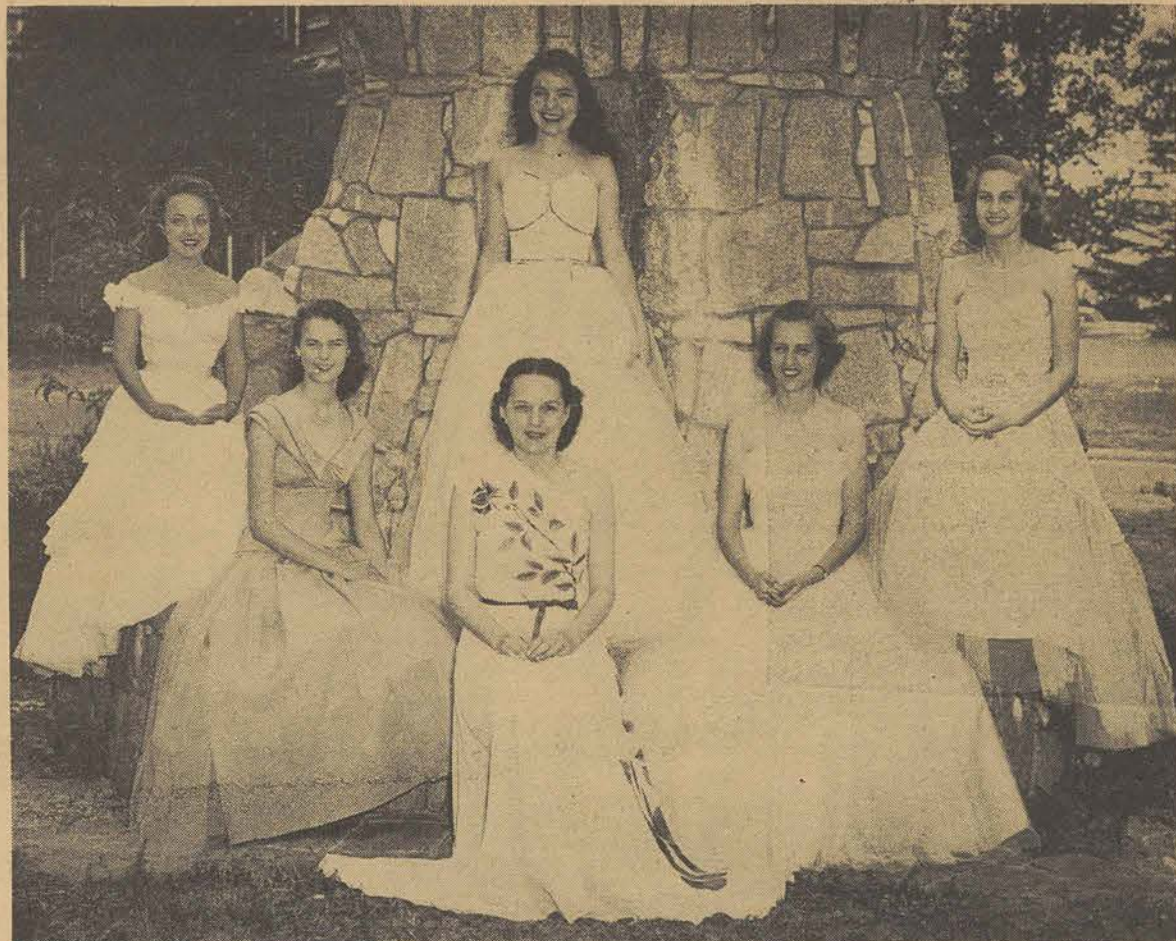
