Administration Responds To Proposals

The Student Association of Governing Councils on May 6th submitted four pieces of legislative to the Administration.

These proposals called for:

Dependent upon individual parental approval, the abolishing of all curfew laws, excepting all first quarter freshmen under 21.

Abolishing all dormitory regulations concerning dress and desk duty. Also included was a call for simplification and standardization of room check.

Issuing meal tickets bearing the photograph of the purchaser. Replacement cost of the meal ticket would be the cost of reproducing another such meal ticket.

Establishing a Student Counseling Center which would offer counseling and services related to drugs and sex education. The physical location of this center would be separate from the Administration Building. Also proposed was the addition of more trained personnel and the establishment of a Counseling Committee composed of students and faculty. This committee would make suggestions and keep programs updated.

In memos sent from the office of Ben Waller, Dean of Students to the SAGC on May 11, and May 27, the Administration gave either decisions or progress reports concerning these four proposals.

Stating that the curfew proposal "would be detrimental to our students" the administration rejected this proposal.

No decision has been reached concerning dress regulations. As of Fall Quarter, 1971, all girl's dormitories will have paid desk attendants. Room check's past unnecessary trivialities will try to be eliminated through the use of a standardized check list.

Waller Succeeds Tyson As Dean of Students

Ben G. Waller, Coordinator Dean of Student Function and Director of Placement and Student Aid has been named Dean of Students and Dr. James Orr, a counselor in the Student Personnel Services office has been named Associate Dean of Students according to Dr. John O. Eidson, President of Georgia Southern College.

"Actually this is nothing new," Dr. Eidson said. "Mr. Waller has been working in this capacity since February 25 when Dean Tyson went on vacation due to illness."

Mr. Dewberry, chairman of the Auxillary Auxillary Services Committee, states that with present facilities the meal ticket with photo plan is not feasible. However, it has been suggested to the SAGC that they obtain information concerning types of meal tickets used at other colleges and universities.

Possible by September 1971, the Student Counseling Center is to be physically located elsewhere than the Administration Building. However, the Administration states that any additions of counselor, psychologist, and full-time physician must be funded by the Board of Regents. No decision has been reached concerning the possibility of a Counseling Committee.

According to Dr. Eidson, Tyson is now working with Vice President Pope E. Duncan on several projects, one of which is the school's self-study project.

As to his own reactions to his appointment, Waller said that he "appreciated the confidence the president and vice president had in me in naming me dean of students. I would not have accepted this position had it not been for the cooperation I received from the staff, the faculty, and the students themselves while I was coordinator dean of student functions."

SAGC Schedules Office Hours

The office of the Student Association of Governing Councils (SAGC) room 109 in the Williams Center, will be open from 12:30 to 2 p.m. Monday through Thursday, according to Howard Thrower, vice president of the SAGC.

"This office is open to the student body in case the services of the student government are needed this summer," said Thrower. "I am interested in working with all students, particularly new students, freshmen, and transient, who may have questions regarding student rights, disciplinary procedures,

Eidson, a new director will be named.

Both Mr. Waller and Dr. Orr, who recently completed the requirements for his Ph.D., stated that they were hopeful about their relationship with the students by "dealing openly and honestly with everybody."

The concert will be held in the Foy Fine Arts Building from 8 p.m. to 11:00. The concert is open to Georgia Southern students and faculty. Admission is by I.D. only.

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Enrollment Reaches 2,845

Summer quarter activities began Thursday, June 10, when a record-breaking 2845 students enrolled. According to college officials this is a 21 per cent over last summer quarter's enrollment which was placed at 2,471.

The Registrar's Office broke down the enrollment into 59 unclassified students, 559 freshmen, 292 sophomores, 488 juniors, 515 seniors, and 932 graduate students.

"We are pleased with this impressive number of graduate students," commented Dr. Jack N. Averitt, Dean of Graduate School. "There has been a definite increase in the Graduate School enrollment during the past three quarters, averaging 794 students per quarter."

Dr. John O. Eidson, president of Georgia Southern College, noted that the 559 freshmen constituted

the largest group of freshmen ever to enroll for a summer session.

Social and cultural events scheduled for this quarter include concerts ("Warm" on June 22 and Bryon Flynn on July 21); a lecture by Sander Vanocur on July 22; and watermelon cuttings by the lake every Tuesday and Thursday from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m.

The free movie, now a tradition at Georgia Southern, has branched out into new dimensions under the direction of Student Activities Director Jack Nolan. The College Union (CUB) has instituted several new series this summer, which includes a Foreign Film Series, a Film Classics Series, and other special short films all of which have "something to say" about man and society or have made a contribution to the history of cinema.





Nolan Raps on Rec.

"Entertainment plus education" is what Jack Nolan, director of student activities, hopes to establish at Georgia Southern College beginning this summer.

Nolan, indicated "there is going to be a lot of the same but more" regarding his hopes initiate a broader program of movies, concerts, dances and facilities on campus for the students.

According to Nolan, each program plan depends upon passage by the College Union Board (CUB). In addition to the usual purely "entertainment flicks," Nolan is hopeful for a broader-type movie program featuring a film discussion series in relation and cooperation with the different academic departments.

'Bigger' name bands may be on the ticket for the 1971-72 year. Nolan quoted prices for people such as Santana, James Taylor, and Chicago. Taylor and Santana sell for \$12,000 to \$15,000 concert and Chicago goes for \$15 to \$20,000.

"In the past our budget of \$40,000 which has to cover everything has not been enough to support the 'bigger name bands,'" said Nolan. It is hoped promoters will take the risk and put up some of the money to bring these bands to Southern, the director added.

"If the bigger names do come to Southern it will mean the students will have to pay an admission price to concerts. It has gotten to the point that the student activities fees can only act as a subsidy," Nolan said.

An expansion in facilities for student use is already in effect. The school has purchased pool tables which are located in the Williams Center.

5¢ Coke Killed

The beginning of summer quarter saw the end of the 5¢ Coke. One of the oldest institutions in the nation came to an end on Thursday, June 10.

C.R. Pound, director of student centers said that this raise in prices was instituted in an effort to offset the cost of operating the snack bar.

"This was not done to exploit students. We decided that a five-cent raise across the board would hurt the students less than any other plan."

Study. Other colleges and universities involved in the program are the University of Georgia, Georgia College, and Valdosta State College.

The Independent Study system, all courses of which are on the undergraduate level, has its headquarters at the University of Georgia Center for Continuing Education. Purpose of the plan is to "provide a variety of educational experiences through which students learn, and at the same time learn 'how' to learn independently for themselves."

This service of the University System has previously referred to as "home study" or "correspondence courses." In changing the title of the courses to "independent study" the Center for Continuing Education attempts to place greater emphasis on the actual

learning process rather than the medium of learning.

Courses from the University System Independent Study program taught by Georgia Southern Personnel include: English 455, English 457, English 552, History 250, Home Economics 324, Home Economics 381, Management 355, Management 363, Mathematics 099, Mathematics 162, and Mathematics 171.

Students in the Independent Study program may apply credit to a degree program being pursued at one of the four participating colleges.

New Athletes Enrolled

And then there is that group who announce that the best basketball players are from the Northern sections of our country. Regardless with whom you agree, there is evidence at Georgia Southern that they do raise good players in the North.

Four members of the Freshmen basketball team are from Illinois and from all indications will supply the team with plenty of talent.

Tim Bell, '6'3" player from Joliet, averaged 20 points a game last year, despite sitting out eight games with an injury. Steve Heinzelman, a '6'6" boy from Western Springs, pulled down an average of 14 rebounds this year. Another Illinois recruit is Mike Mandele, a '6'5" player from Arlington Heights. Mike averaged 12 rebounds and 12 points in his final year of high school. Johnny Saracco is from Benld. A '6'3" player, he averaged 19 points a game last year.

However those of you who still are positive that Dixie raises the best cotton, the prettiest girls, and the best basketball players-relax! Two of the new GSC recruits are

southern boys. Freshman Clyde Agnew, a '6'6" player from Greenville, South Carolina, will add his Honorable Mention All-American talent to the Freshman team, along with his 22 point average. From Tampa, Florida-by way of Middle Georgia College-comes Richard Johnson, a '6'8" basketball player. In two years of junior college competition he averaged 21 points and 15 rebounds per game.

Rowe's Camp Going Strong

Four years ago, Head Basketball Coach J.E. Rowe began a program at Georgia Southern College called "the Southern Basketball Camp." It has become one of the finest in the country. Each summer, boys from eleven to eighteen come to the GSC campus to attend Coach Rowe's camp, with some coming from such distant places as Pennsylvania.

Two sessions are held each summer, beginning in early June. Open to anyone, attendance is always good. This year, the first session had 121 players registered while 116 young athletes were present for the final session.

Along with Coach Rowe and Coach Fields are seven other coaches who teach these boys the basic fundamentals of basketball help them to improve their playing ability, and expose them to different philosophies of basketball.

Besides learning skills, the boys also engage in basketball games with other teams in the camp-such as the UCLA Bruins, the Boston Celtics, and of course, the Georgia Southern Eagles.

Callaway 'Prof' Appointed

In making the announcement of Dellenbarger's appointment to the Callaway chair, Dr. John O. Eidson, College president, said that he was pleased to have Dellenbarger joining the GSC School of Business in September.

"Dr. Dellenbarger will bring the national reputation, the teaching experience, and the personal and professional accomplishments which the chair deserves," Eidson commented.

Dellenbarger is married and has a son and two daughters.
