## Modern Racism

"I have a dream," Martin Luther King Jr. declared to a large Washington crowd on August 28, 1963 in his most renowned and repeated speech. King went on to say that he hoped for all races to be able to live together in harmony, in other words for racism to cease.

But, even though we are now in the year 1986, racism is still alive and it is not all on the part of Whites either. Not when people like Jessie Jackson and Joseph Lowery stand up in front of a mass of people and a national television audience and call Whites, "racists." Not when education leaders in our land propose that academic standards be raised and are bitterly opposed by Black leaders who stand up and call them, "racists." And most of all, not when Jackson, Lowery and company encourage Black people to teach their children that White people are evil—which evokes hatred on the children's part—instead of teaching them to love their fellow man just as Jesus Christ did.

I'm not saying there is no more racism among Whites—that's not the case (although there is significantly less now)—but it has become very evident that certain Black leaders such as Jackson are trying (sometimes through the memory of King) to arouse feelings of hatred and supremacy among Black people.

I personally don't agree with the way King has been immortalized by a Christian nation. No one who has ever walked on this earth should be worshiped (honored has given way to worshiped) as King is, except for the king of all kings — Jesus Christ. To worship one who lived a perfect life — Jesus — is our Christian privilege. To worship any other person is secular.

However, King preached love — not hatred — to his followers. Now those same followers are teaching Blacks to consider all Whites as the enemy. Is that not racism?

According to The American Heritage Dictionary, racism is "The belief that some races are inherently better than others." That my friends is just what Jessie Jackson and his contemporaries have been preaching.

Jackson (we will now focus on him) claims he is trying to carry on the works of King. If that's true, then King definitely had a different "dream" in mind than most people have been led to believe.

I don't think King's dream included this new racism — a racism that could cause more hatred and violence in the United States of America than seen during the 1960's — that Jackson is trying to breed.

Then again Jackson's motivation could come from hatred, a hatred of Whites because of what happened to his ancestors, which in turn brings in the revenge factor. But is revenge what King preached, or was it love?

Anyone who has genuine Christian love in their heart can look at and listen to Jackson, and realize (not judge) love isn't the instigating factor in his campaign. Of the times I've heard Jackson speak, I've never known him to have anything good to

say about Whites. His very speech emits hatred and contempt for them, which in turn has a negative effect on those Blacks who are striving to live by the Bible's teachings of "Love thy neighbor as thyself."

Love...that's the key word. We must all love each other as brothers and sisters in Christ. We must be steadfast in that love so that people such as Jackson, or any other person that is racially motivated, can't cause us to waver.

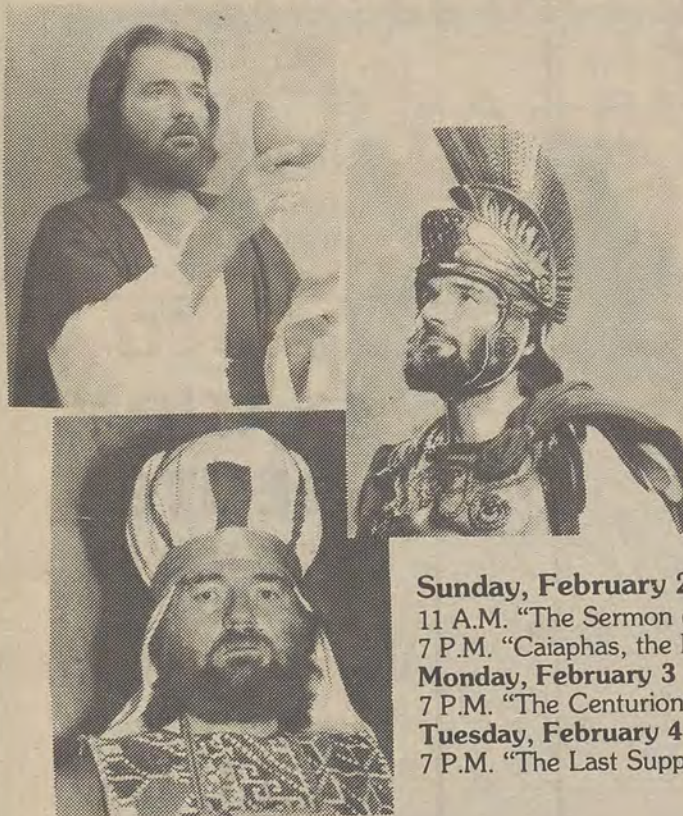

Dinner? Open to all. For no more than \$8 you can have Beef Wellington, Chicken Cordon Bleu—or perhaps a Caesar's salad for two, prepared at your table. Hours are 4-9 p.m., Monday through Friday.

"We're aiming for a relaxed atmosphere, where a person can take a date or parents for a real dining experience," said Palfy. "We will be encouraging men to wear coats and prefer no jeans or tennis shoes." All in keeping with the aesthetic mood of this charming place.

The dinner menu will be in photograph-album style, picturing

INXS Listen Like

What happens when you take a fairly good Australian band with one strong album under its belt and try to mass market them? You get INXS' latest release *Listen Like Thieves*.

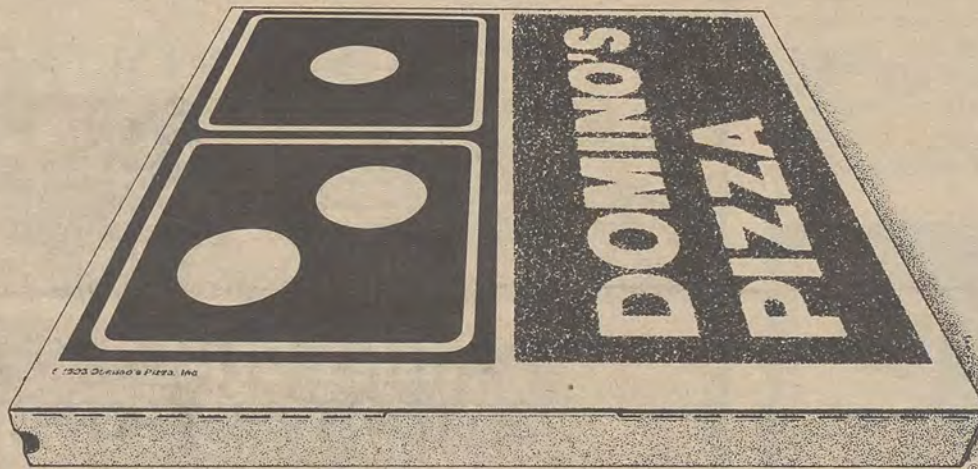
The MTV-fed American audience will, of course, gobble it up with the promotion money Atlantic is putting out for the guys, but the public is not getting their money's worth.

Back in 1982 INXS' *Shabooh Shoobah* album came out. It was a great record with such tracks as "The One Thing," "Don't Change," and "Black and White." February 3 - One-on-one

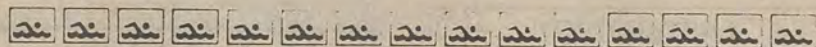
February 4 - Freethrow

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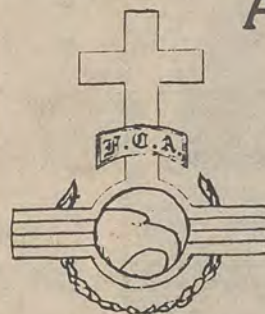
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# Lady Eagles Drop Two Games

A strong GSC rally in the second half fell short as the Lady Eagles were defeated by the Valdosta State Lady Blazers, 91-80, on January 21st in Valdosta.

After trailing 42-30 at halftime, the 6 and 6 Eagles pulled within three points on two separate occasions in

the closing minutes of the game, but a couple of missed layups and timely free throw shooting on the Blazers part quelled GSC's hopes for victory. VSC, nationally ranked in Division II, raised their record to 13-1.

According to assistant coach Gina Dickey, who took over the reins after coach Jeannie Milling was ejected (3 technicals), the Eagles played well despite the loss.

"Turnovers were a factor in the first half," Dickey commented, "but we played an excellent second half." Dickey added that the team "had a bad time with the officials."

The Eagles, who had lost by 29 to VSC earlier in the season, were once again led by sophomore forward Regina Days with 34 points and 16 rebounds. Days, who came into the game as the nation's field goal percentage leader at .72 percent, raised her scoring average to 22.9 points per game. Sharon Thomas and Phyllette Blake added 19 and 15 points respectively.

The Lady Eagles had yet another victory slip from their grasp last Saturday night, as the Central Florida Lady Knights edged Coach Jeannie Milling's squad 78-74.

Both teams shot very well in the first half, GSC 65% and Central Florida 60%. However, the Lady Knights were able to grab a 41-35 lead at intermission due in part to their conversion of 7 out of 9 free throws.

The game was close the entire second half, but Central Florida got hot in the final stages of the contest, and managed to nip the Lady Eagles in the closing moments.

Once again, Regina Days led GSC's charge as she threw in 23 points. Phyllette Blake was right behind Days as she scored 20 points of her own.

GSC was scheduled to play Stetson last Monday night, however results of the game were not available at press time.

The Lady Eagles return to the Hanner Fieldhouse Saturday to square off against the Teddy Bears of Mercer. Game time is 5:15.

## Swimmers Win Meet

Perhaps in the future, opponents will think twice before attempting to challenge Jeff Sanders.

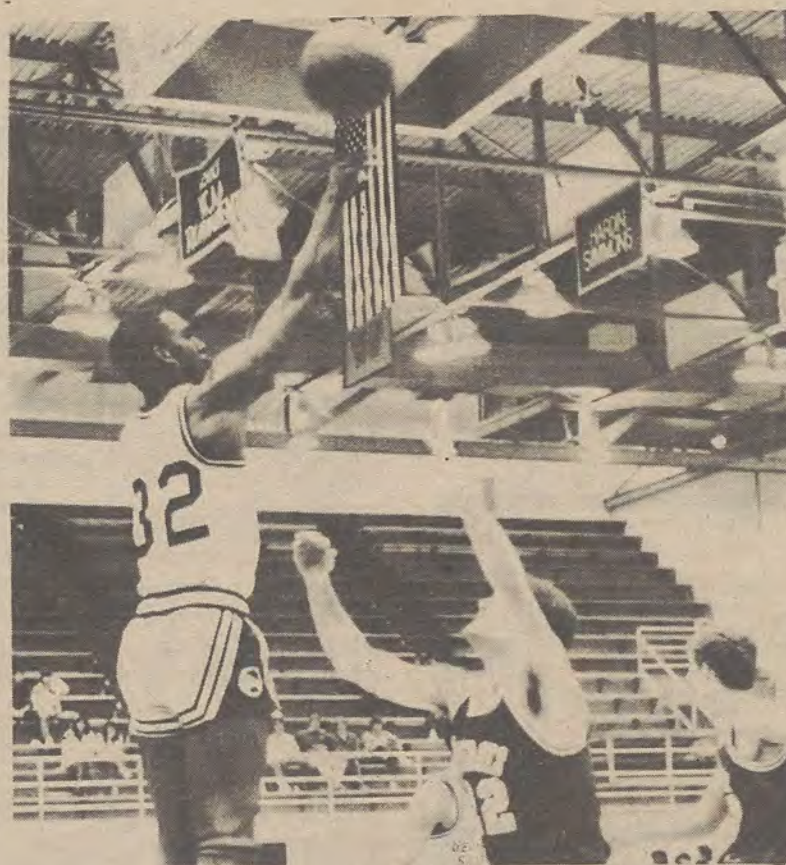

The Georgia Southern Eagles continued success at home last Thursday night with a 71-55 TAAC victory over the Houston Baptist Huskies. The win raised their Hanner Fieldhouse record to an impressive 8-2, and was the Eagles second victory in conference play against four losses.
