GSC Celebrates Black History Month

Congressman Walter Fauntroy, of the District of Columbia, was the keynote speaker at a presentation kicking off GSC Black History month last-Tuesday night in the Conference Center.

In his speech to students, faculty, and guests, Fauntroy discussed the exploitation of cheap labor on foreign goods and its effects on black history and apartheid.

"The basic problem is the flight of American capital to cheaper labor markets abroad," said Fauntroy.

He defined apartheid in South Africa as a labor control system that feeds on cheap labor and foreign investments.

Fauntroy also proclaimed the lesson of Black History Month

lesson of Black History Month.
"Either we learn to live together as brothers in this world, or we shall perish as fools," said Fauntroy.

The event was sponsored by Kappa Alpha Psi and the Black History Month Committee.

Activities of Black History Month, focusing on the theme Black History—Contemporary and

Historical Perspective, will be held through the month of February.

"Out of Africa"- an exhibit featuring the story of early West African civilizations, the transatlantic slave trade, and the black struggle for emancipation opened February 6 at 4:30 pm in the GSC museum

The opening featured guest speaker Dr. Leopold P. Benye from Savannah State College.

The exhibit will be open for viewing through February 28.

Round one of the Black History Jeopardy was held February 10 at 7 p.m. in the Williams Center Coffeehouse. Round two will be held February 16 at 3 p.m. The final round will be held February 24 at 7 p.m.

On February 13, at 7:30 p.m., a panel discussion on apartheid in South Africa will be held in the Conference Center.

The disussion panelists include college professors from GSC and Savannah State College and two black South Africans.

The Miss Afro-American Club (AAC) pageant will be February 20 at 7:30 p.m. in the Marvin Pittman School.

The girls will be judged on beauty, poise and talent.

On February 27, SABOO, a talent review by GSC students, will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the Marvin Pittman Auditorium.

The Foy Art Gallery will open an exhibit by contemporary Georgia artists Michael Harris and Wadsworth Jarrell on March 3.

GSC Lady Netters Open Season



Lady Eagles Go Winless in Marshall Tourney

Heading into the Marshall Tournament in Huntington, West Virginia last weekend, assistant coach Gina DiCicco felt the GSC Lady Eagles would have a good shot at the championship if they could play "good fundamental basketball," which usually is defined as good defense, good passing on offense, and good rebounding on both offense and defense

However, GSC seemed to forget the most important fundamental of all, putting the ball in the basket. Frustrated by sagging defenses applied by both Marshall and University of North Carolina Charlotte that contained GSC's inside tandem of Regina Days and Phylette Blake, the Lady Eagles were forced to put up shots from the outside. And, as has been the case most of the season, the perimeter shots didn't fall as GSC shot a combined 37.5% from the field in losing 78-67 and 66-48 to Marshall and UNCC respectively.

"We've got to be able to put the ball up from the perimeter if they slouch off on Days and Blake," head coach Jeannie Milling stated, "and right now we're not able to do that."

In the opening game of the tournament, GSC fell behind quickly and was never able to catch up.

"We got down by 16 in the first half because we had no execution," Milling said. "In the second half we played a super game, but we were down too far to come back." All-American candidate Days led the Eagles with 18 points (five below her average) and 13 rebounds, while Blake added 17 points and 12 rebounds.

In the following game against UNCC the Ladies made an excellent comeback as they cut a 42-29 deficit at the 13:34 mark to only one point, 46-45, with 9 minutes left. But from there it was all UNCC as the 49'ers outscored the Eagles 20-3 for the remainder of the game.

"We played much better defensively until the last 8 minutes," Milling said, "but we shot poorly the entire game."

Despite playing in foul trouble the entire game, Days led GSC with 13 points, and Sharon Thomas added 12.

The two losses dropped the Eagles' record to 7-10 on the season, and 1-8 outside of Hanner Fieldhouse. GSC played GA State last night and takes on GA Tech tonight, before returning home to battle Central FLA Saturday at 5:15 p.m.



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Young Eagles Lose Another Close Game

A balanced Eagle attack led by Fred "J.J." Jone's 16 points helped the Eagles out to a 40-29 first half lead but a strong second half helped Samford tighten the game up and eventually win.

The Southern attack featured 4 players in double figures. In addition to Jone's 16, Michael Stokes and Brian Newton had 12 apiece, while Ben Bailey had 10. Newton's figures marked the 16th consecutive game in which he has scored in double figures.

Southern's next game is tonight against conference leading Arkansas - Little Rock at 7:30 p.m. in the Hanner Fieldhouse.

NOTE: ANY CHANCE THE Eagles have of hosting a first round playoff game will probable be determined this week as Kerns' squad will entertain Centenary on Saturday night in the final home game of the regular season. GSC's final two conference games will be on the road against Houston Baptist and Hardin-Simmons, and only the top four teams get to play at home in the first round of the TAAC Championships.

Baseball Eagles to Open 1986 Season Today

College baseball cranks up today at 3 p.m. at J.I. Clements Field as the GSC Eagles, seeking to match or perhaps improve on an excellent 41-23 1985 record, host Western Carolina University in the first of a four-game series. And Coach Jack Stallings, 22 wins shy of his 800th career victory and already the 6th winningest coach in the history of college baseball, begins his 11th season at GSC.

If his pitching staff comes around, Stallings could get No. 800 in a hurry. The Eagles return most of the batting order that burned opposing pitchers for a .313 team batting average last season.

GSC will stock its lineup with good line-drive hitters who are effective run producers. Right fielder Mike Shepherd, who hit .363 with 9 home runs and 63 runs batted in last year, returns -- as does catcher Greg "Pops" McMullen (.338, 5 HR's, 47 RBI's). First baseman Craig Cooper (.297, 14 HR, 53 RBI), whom Stallings said "has really come on strong," is the Eagles' best long-ball threat. Rob

Haranda will handle the DH chores and back up McMullen at catcher.

Stallings feels the infield defense will be tough with Jeff Shireman taking over at shortstop for the departed Luis Ramos (drafted by Pittsburg in last year's draft), Dan Gealy at second, and Cooper and Jim Cunningham manning the corners. Cunningham, a defensive specialist, also had a great year offensively in '85.

The outfield defense will suffer with the departure of center fielder Gary Supinski (academic problems). "He was an excellent defensive player and we'll have to find someone to replace him," Stallings commented.

However, Stallings feels an outfield of Shepherd, Scott Hardy (converted catcher) and freshman Greg Goodermote will get the job

Any questions about outfield defense pale in comparison to those surrounding the pitching staff where mainstays Phil Dale (11-4, 3.40 ERA) and Kenny Roberts (11-3,3.20) are graduated. Stallings hopes that Billy

Brooks, a senior "who has had his ups and downs for us" will finally live up to high early expectations.

Other returnees who Stallings will rely heavily on include Scott Luman, Frank Merkel and Marty Murphy.

Three new recruits, all righthanders, have shown promise this winter, and any or all of them could wind up in the Eagles' starting rotation during the season. They are: Chip Hoffman (6-2, 180 lbs.) from Clearwater Fla,; Kevin Meier, a transfer from the University of Connecticut (6-5, 205); and Keith Richardson (6-4, 195) from Atlanta.

GSC Wins TAAC Game

Georgia Southern's mens' basketball team accomplished a major moral victory last Thursday night, as they captured their first conference road win of the season. The Eagles 66-62 victory over GA State in Atlanta improved the teams record in the TAAC to 4-5 on the season; but, as Coach Kerns and his staff have become accustomed to victory was not in their grasp until the final :05 seconds of the game.

The Eagles seemed to have everything under control with just over five minutes left to play, as Brian Newton connected on a short jumper to give Southern a 55-47 advantage. However, the Panthers reeled off nine consecutive points to take? one point lead, which prompted coach Robbie Lanig to remark, "as we've had a habit of doing all season long, we sort of self destructed and let them back into the game and they actually had a chance to win it in the end."

However, in the final 2:00 of the game, it was Georgia Southern who exhibited poise under pressure.

Anthony Forrests' jumper from inside the key allowed Southern to regain the lead at 57-56 and the Eagles continued to hold a lead as Jeff Sanders and Michael Stokes converted consecutive one and one situations.

After GSU converted four freethrows of their own, the Panthers gained possession of the ball with a chance to tie the score. Georgia State guard Dewey Haley's jumper in the lane was followed by the referees whistle, and it appeared that the Eagles would lose a heartbreaker. Instead, Haley was called for the offensive foul and Georgia Southern was assured of the victory.

Brian Newton once again led the team in scoring with a career high of 28 points, as he hit 10 of 15 from the field while connecting on 8 of 9 from the charity stripe.

Coach Lanig commented, "We knew coming into the game we would have to make them play defense, and we figured that we could get the ball into Brian."
