## Students not pleased with housing fee increase

A recent survey revealed GSC students have negative opinions of the 1989 dorm fee increases.

The consensus of the students was that dorm prices are already high and students still aren't even provided with adequate living facilities.

Residents from Warwick Hall, who wish to remain anonymous, complained primarily about the high liv-

ing expenses for facilities with termites, worms and a lack of hot water.

"Whenever dorm facilities break down due to its aging, we (the residents) have to pay for the repairs instead of the housing department. As a justification, it is said that the residents vandalized the facility when in turn it broke because of normal wear and tear," one resident said.

An angry resident in Deal Hall argues, "There's no air conditioning and the rooms are tiny, which are

shared with cockroaches and mice."

A Lewis Hall resident said, "An increase is going to solve these problems? It's not that I mind paying more money if I were getting what I paid for."

The same responses were received by most dorm residents who said

they were skeptical that the increase would lead to better dorm improvements.

"If the increase is to help eliminate these problems, then it would be great," one resident says, "but we pay an exorbitant amount of money currently, and the living conditions are still poor."

As a result, more students are investing in their own apartments. "I feel it is cheaper, and I have no problem getting things repaired when

need be," an off campus student said.

"Maybe one day GSC will provide students with nicer dorms. But I doubt any time soon. So until then, I will be one of the many moaning over this unfunctional increase," said one Deal Hall resident.

WVGS, the radio station owned and operated by GSC, has been the target of another theft.

According to station manager Buddy Hall, two more turntables were stolen early Saturday morning, April 29, possibly between the hours of 3:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m.

Hall said that upon arrival, the disc jockey who was scheduled to open Saturday morning discovered the turntables were missing.

According to Hall there were no signs of forced entry to the front door of the station, and the turntables were properly disconnected, once

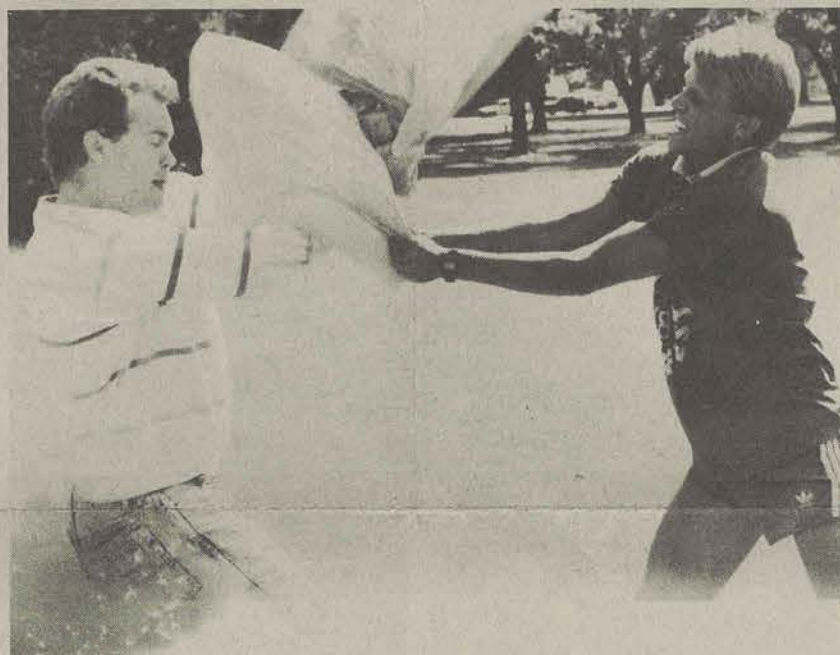
again leading to the suspicion that whoever the culprit is has a key to the radio station and is familiar with the equipment set-up within the station.

"It could be someone who worked at the station a long time ago who still has a key to the front door," Hall said.

Hall said that after the last theft at the station, he put in a work order for bars to be put on the front door of the station and that the work had not yet begun.

## GSC students served warrants for vandalism

Eight GSC students have recently been served warrants taken out on them by local businesswoman Mary Nell Cartee, owner and operator of Meadow Lakes Golf Course.

According to Mrs. Cartee, two of the students were served warrants for extensive damage to two golf carts owned by the club.

The two boys were purposely driving the carts into each other which caused parts of the carts to become bent out of shape, said Cartee. Once discovered, the two boys fled the golf course in a car.

The license plate number of the car in which they fled was reported to Bulloch County Sheriff Arnold Ray Akins. The two students were identified as Jason Adkins and Will Glisson of Dorman Hall.

In another incident, six GSC students were served warrants for criminal trespassing on private property.

Mrs. Cartee said that Friday night, April 28, "the students came on the golf course, went to every green, and took all the flags and put them on the putting green. They kept two of the flags. I'm sure it was a prank," she said.

"This golf course is a family operated golf course. We don't have any stockholders; when something happens it is all us. We have to pay for it, and I work here seven days a week. My husband works here seven days a week, and I don't feel like we can work seven days a week and stay up seven nights a week trying to keep someone off the golf course," continued Mrs. Cartee.

Those students involved in the incident Friday were identified as Bryan B. Douglas, Mark K. Parsons, Charles H. Chaffin, Jr., Richard L. Sussman, William M. Gleaton, and Ronald Wade Hartshorn.

Mrs. Cartee said that she is disturbed at these incidents but emphasized that it is only a few of GSC's students who are vandalizing her property.

"The only thing we are trying to do

is to have a decent place for college kids to play golf and enjoy themselves, and I just don't think it's fair for the 99 percent of the others to have to pay for it," she said.

Meadow Lakes Golf Club is a contributing sponsor to GSC.

Another incident occurred on Feb. 6 involving four other GSC students: Edward Garland Griswold, Steven Bradley Eggert, James Patrick McCarthy, and Rodney John Boucher.

These students were involved in acts which cost Meadow Lakes Golf Club \$2,000 in damage repairs, according to Mrs. Cartee. These four students were scheduled to appear in Bulloch County Court on Tuesday, May 2. They are being represented by Francis Allen, a local attorney.

Mrs. Cartee stated that approximately 75 percent of her business comes from GSC students, and she does not feel any animosity towards any student who was not involved with the recent vandalism of her property.

GSC held part of its annual Greek Week activities and its intramural tournament at Meadow Lakes.

Small problems with parking space, intramurals and other aspects of campus life, although regretful, are insignificant compared to this accomplishment.

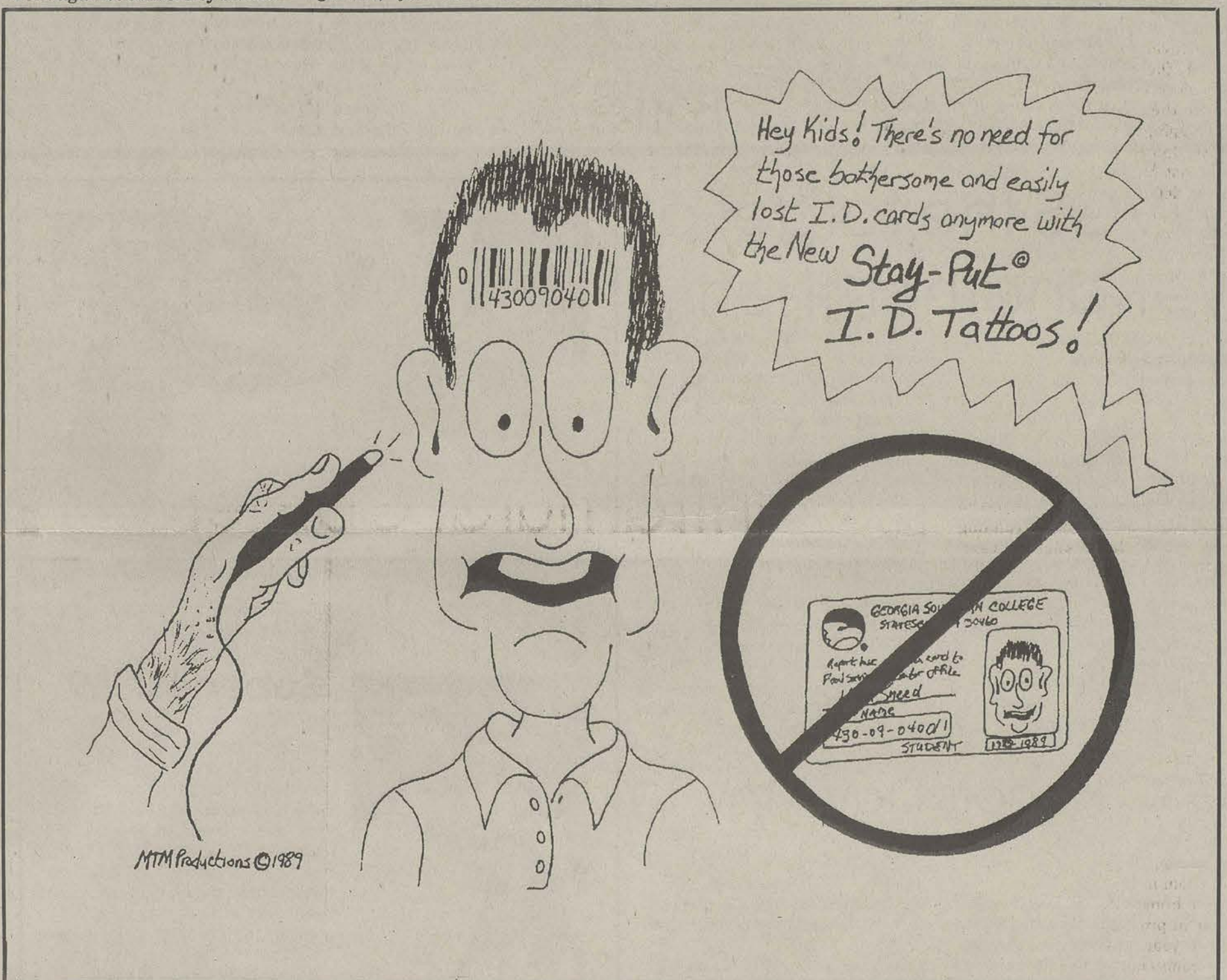
These problems should be dealt with but should not prevent the support of university status.

The Los Angeles Lakers, one of the powerhouse basketball teams in the National Basketball Association for the past decade, are about to undergo an eerie playoff season, one which, in any case, win or lose, will be sad and unprecedented. 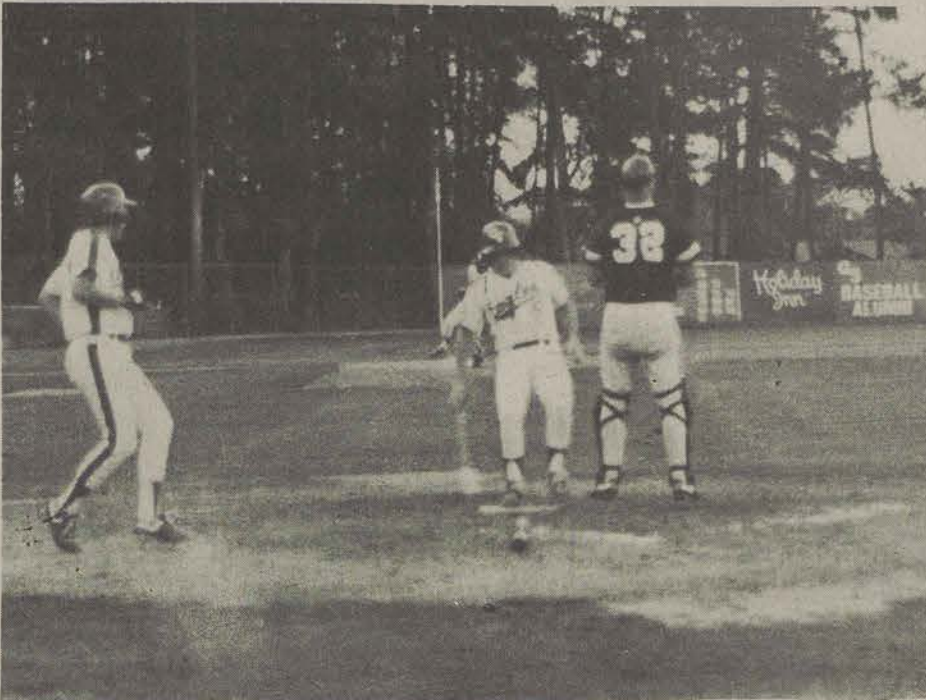

Coming into Tuesday night's game with Armstrong State, GSC pitcher Russell Hendricks was looking to extend his win streak to 10 games and move into second place on GSC's all-time consecutive win list ahead of Chuck Luster, who also won nine in a row during the 1979 season.

Not only did Hendricks, now 10-1, get the win, he completely shut down the sixth-ranked NCAA Division II Pirates as GSC bombed them 9-1 and improved their record to 29-24. Hendricks now trails the all-time leader, Ernie Venet, by two games.

"I think my experience has helped me accomplish the feat," Hendricks said. "Right now I'm pitching with great confidence, and I thank God for letting me compete on the Division I level."

The Eagles opened their scoring by putting up three runs in the bottom of the first. With one out, Doug Eder, Darin Van Tassel and Rob Fitzpatrick singled consecutively. The next hitter, Brett Hendley, promptly ripped a single to right to score Eder.

With the bases still full of Eagles, Pirate starter Rich Sawyer uncorked a wild pitch that allowed Van Tassel to trot home. Sawyer's would continue one out later. With the bases once again loaded, Sawyer threw

another wild pitch which allowed Fitzpatrick to score and account for the final run of the inning.

GSC scored two more in the third. Van Tassel lead off the inning with a single. One out later, Hendley

pounded a single to right, putting runners on first and second. With two outs, Jerry Shepard walked, and Chuck Mueller delivered the big hit of the inning with a bases-loaded two-run double.

In the fourth, the Eagles scored a single run without the benefit of a hit. Leadoff man Chris Abner walked and stole his team-leading 34th base of the season. A Van Tassel sacrifice fly moved him to third, and he scored on another wild pitch by Sawyer.

The onslaught continued in the seventh. With one out, Van Tassel hit a routine grounder to second, but Alan Bonds threw the ball into the Pirate dugout allowing Van Tassel to advance to second. Van Tassel then stole third and came home on an RBI groundout by Fitzpatrick.

Hendley, who went 3-for-4, then stepped to the plate and rocketed a fastball from new ASC pitcher Jeff Pasquale against the wall in left. Hendley came around to score on a Mike Yuro single.

GSC got their final run of the evening in the eighth when Jeff Coughlin walked, took second on another Pirate wild pitch, and scored on a frozen rope single to left by Eder.

Hendricks bid for a shutout fell short in the seventh as ASC scored an unearned run, but he still sported some impressive stats. He pitched nine innings, allowed only five hits, struck out 11 and walked four.

GSC will be back in action tomorrow at 7:00 p. m. in J.I. Clements Stadium when they conclude the season series with Armstrong State.

## GSC golfers win Hitchcock

When a golfer or a golf team is playing well, the success often can continue for weeks at a time. The GSC golfers, who have been on such a hot streak in recent weeks, won the Billy Hitchcock Invitational at the Saugahatchee Country Club in Auburn, Ala., last weekend with a 16-under-par 848.

Eagle co-captain Richie Bryant, coming off a victory at the Chris Schenkel Invitational, again took

individual honors with an 8-under 208, two strokes ahead of Central Florida's Andrew Rice.

"Winning two in one year is great, but what really makes it sweet is that the wins came in the last two regular season tournaments," Bryant said. "The main thing is my putting. I really putted well the last two tournaments, and that has turned out to be the difference."

David Noto had his best finish of the season with five-under 211 to place him third behind Bryant and

Rice. On Saturday, Co-captain Chris Berens posted a 67 on his way to a three-under 213. Mitchell Partridge posted a 218 and Drew Pittman rounded out the GSC scoring with a 226.

In the two tournaments preceding the Hitchcock, the TAAC Championships and the Schenkel, GSC placed second and third, respectively. The win in the Hitchcock was the Eagle's first of the season, and the 848 total

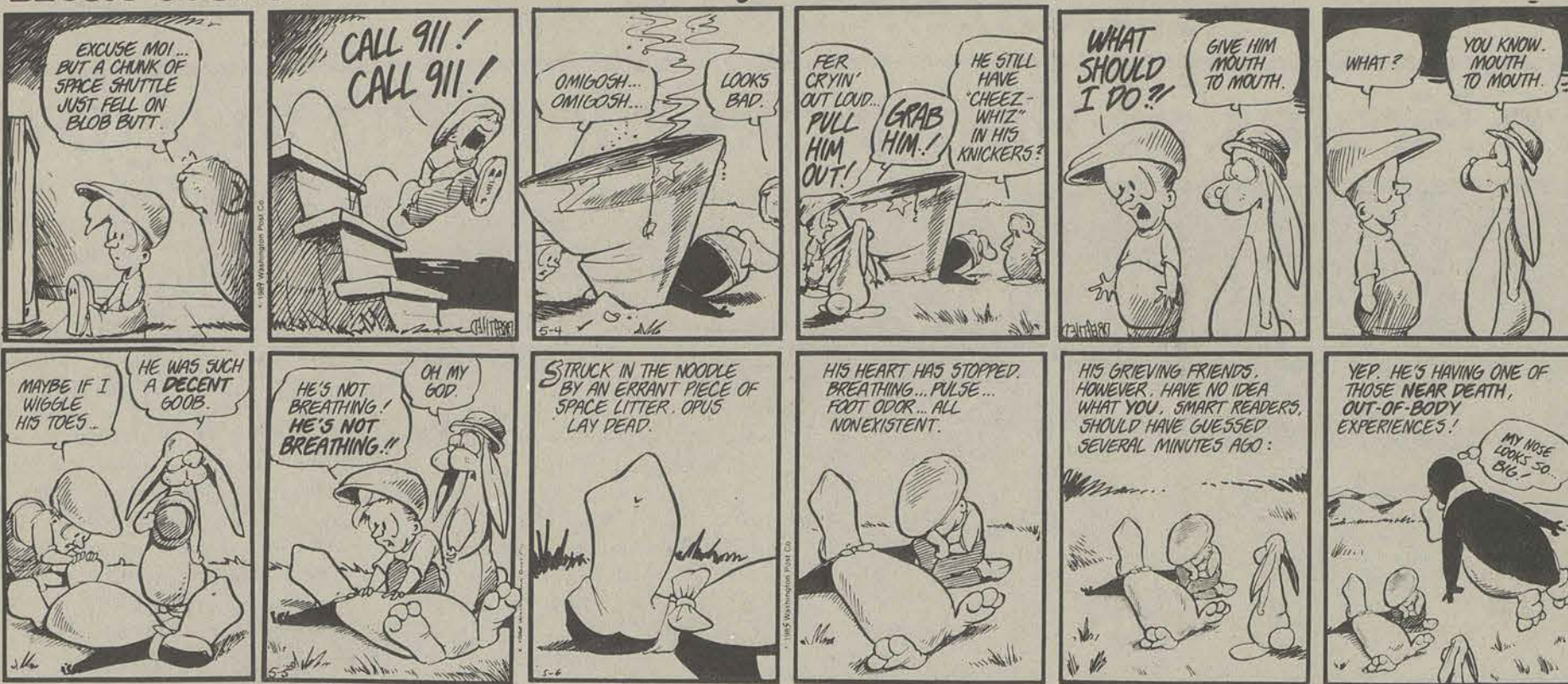

In the last two tournaments, GSC has averaged a 10-under-par 854. For the spring season, Berens leads the team with stroke average of 72.67. Bryant follows closely with a 73.24 average, and Noto is averaging 74.19.

The Eagles must now spend the next three weeks preparing for the NCAA Division I East Regionals,

which will be held at Long Bay Country Club in Myrtle Beach, S.C., May 26-28. GSC hopes to qualify for the NCAA championships, to be held June 7-10 at Oak Tree Country Club in Edmond, Okla.

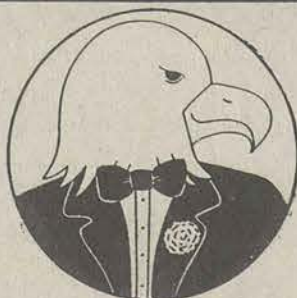
