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National News Briefs

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REAGAN ISSUE FACES HEARING:

A federal court hearing Monday will determine the scope of President Reagan's videotape testimony in former national security adviser John Poindexter's Iran-Contra trial. Reagan surprised court observers, saying he would comply with Judge Harold Greene's order compelling the former president to sit for a closed-door videotape deposition.

MILITARY SCHOOL FACES SUIT:

The Justice Department told Virginia Military Institute to admit women or face a lawsuit. An unidentified woman filed a complaint about the state-supported college in Lexington, Va., prompting the department action. The state and the VMI Foundation filed suits asking a federal judge to hold the single-sex policy constitutional.

PILOTS, L.A. GO BACK TO TABLE:

Los Angeles city officials hope for an end to a strike that ship pilots in the Port of Los Angeles harbor blame on the Huntington Beach oil spill. Pilots, who have been without a contract since June, walked out Saturday - 10 days before a scheduled mediation session. They began talks with city officials Sunday.

AQUINO REJECTS MEETING CHENEY:

Philippines President Corazon Aquino said she will decline meeting with U.S. Defense Secretary Dick Cheney when he visits the Philippines next week. Reason: U.S. criticism about her nation. She also will demand an explanation of proposed cuts in economic aid when the two countries resume talks on renewing leases for U.S. bases there.

LEGAL CONVENTION IS HOTBED:

Activists on both sides of the abortion issue are lobbying at the national convention of the American Bar Association in Los Angeles. Reason: a resolution that would place the 365,000-member group on record opposing government interference with a woman's decision to terminate her pregnancy.

RACIAL TENSION BOILS IN ALA.:

Racial tensions in Selma, Ala., will keep public schools closed Monday - 25 years after a bloody confrontation made the city a focus of civil rights history. Sunday more than 300 people marched through the city in support of dozens of black students occupying Selma High School. They want a three-year contract renewal for the city's first black schools superintendent, Norward Roussell.

EXPERTS EXPLORE ACID RAIN:

Around 600 scientists from 35 countries gather Monday in Charleston, S.C., for the most comprehensive study yet of acid rain. The weeklong conference includes 1,000 researchers from 11 federal agencies. They spent \$500 million compiling 28 reports on the causes, effects and possible ways to curb acid rain pollution.

LINCOLN HOME GETS FACELIFT:

Abraham Lincoln's home in Springfield, Ill., has had \$2.2 million in renovations as it gears up for the 16th president's 181st birthday Monday. National Park Service officials say the home, where Lincoln lived from 1844 to 1865, is among the most popular U.S. stops for foreign visitors.

BUSH MAY LIFT SANCTIONS:

President Bush, in the wake of Nelson Mandela's release, said U.S. sanctions against South Africa may have helped swing open the prison gate. Bush, who invited Mandela and South African President F.W. de Klerk on separate visits to Washington, meets with top aides this week to decide whether to lift some sanctions.

GOTTI BECOMES A HERO:

John Gotti's admirers are many in New York City. Barely was he acquitted of assault and conspiracy charges before fans declared a holiday this weekend. Gotti's neighbors

Brother Jim "blessed" GSC students with his presence once again last week, as crowds gathered daily in front of the bookstore to hear him preach and to jeer at his preachings.

At the end of his talk, Brother Jim handed out pamphlets to the students. Just moments after condemning the entire student body at GSC for putting other things before God, he signed autographs for some of those same students.

"He was very condemning, and he presented salvation in an outlandish way," said Melanie Stephen, a freshman and a member of the Wesley Foundation. "He gave Christianity a bad name."

Brother Jim, it would seem, was just out to get a rise out of the student body, with such comments as:

* "Rock and roll is cultural brain rot!"

* "Women need to be put in their places!" (After which, he went on to talk about women being too submissive).

* "Most men here at GSC have become sissies and wimps!"

Upon examining the pamphlets that were handed out, the audience found in them the same words Brother Jim had given in his lec-

ture. There were stories of his rebellion as a teenager, his problems with drugs, alcohol, and "illicit sex."

Also included among Brother Jim's words of condemnation were shouts of "Lust!", "Whoremongers!" and "Hell fire and damnation!"

Said Darin Drury, a senior premed major who is a member of Wesley and A New Mind, "The entire gospel of Jesus Christ is based on love and compassion. There is a lot of sin in the world, and there is a certain way to salvation, but he never told them how to be saved."

In the pamphlet entitled "From Running with the Devil to Walking with Jesus," Brother Jim goes into detail about his past. "If I can be saved at a Van Halen concert, you can be saved at Georgia Southern," he said.

Jim holds a low opinion of college students and their organizations, especially fraternities and sororities.

"Fraternities are hideouts for drunken masturbators! Sororities are hotbeds of fornication."

He went on to say that GSC was a "wicked college" where the students behave like lusty animals while following the motto, "If it feels good, do it."

Despite all this, though, there were some students who seemed to approve of Jim. "He's awesome, man."

Petition started for Union computer center

A petition drive has been started to see about putting a computing center in the new Student Union building.

The present Learning Resources Center in the library is often filled beyond capacity with students, usually looking for an available Word Perfect word processor. According to Sue Winfrey, a staff assistant at the LRC, if the new computer room is approved, it could include "whatever the school decides is appropriate."

Since the construction company expects to turn the building over to the college for inspection in early March, the staff involved has little time to decide how it will be furnished. Due to this deadline, the signed petitions will be submitted on February 24.

Students Charged

As a result of a 2 week investigation into narcotics activity, the Statesboro-Bulloch county multi-agency narcotics task force arrested 4 members of a narcotics distribution network. The network is believed by authorities to be responsible for the majority of lysergic acid diethylamide (LSD) being sold in Bulloch county.

As a result of search warrants executed at 2 apartments in the University Village apartment complex, 4 people were arrested, and 73 doses, or hits, were seized. Various drug paraphernalia were also confiscated.

Further investigation by Statesboro Police officers, Bulloch County Police, as well as GSC police

resulted in the seizure of an additional 95 hits of LSD, as well as two GSC residents. The residents, Peter Anziano of Veazy Hall, and Kerrie Ryan of Hendrix Hall.

The seizure of 168 hits of LSD with a street value of \$1,000.00 is the largest LSD seizure in Bulloch county's history.

So far, the following have been arrested: Peter Anziano, Veazy Hall; Kristen Dutter, University Village; Rob Fowler, University Village; Daniel Jenkins, University Village; Kerrie Ryan, Hendrix Hall; Cynthia Thomas, University Village.

All of those arrested have been charged with possession with the intent to distribute LSD, and are currently being held in the Statesboro City Jail pending further court disposition in the case.

COST OF ABORTION INCREASES ONLY SLIGHTLY

While other medical charges have increased dramatically, the price of abortions has not even kept up with cost-of-living increases, according to a report in the Journal of the American Medical Association. Citing an unpublished survey by the non-profit Alan Guttmacher Institute of New York, the journal noted that the average charge for a first-trimester abortion in 1986 was \$209 at an abortion clinic, \$235 at other clinics and \$272 in a physician's office. Today, the averages are barely higher. Researchers cite competition and "more efficient performance" of the procedure.

MORE LIKELY TO DEVELOP HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE AS AN ADULT

An only child, as an adult, is more likely to get high blood pressure than a child who grew up with sisters and brothers, according to a new study by researchers at the State University of New York at Buffalo. The number of siblings one has doesn't seem to matter, however. The researchers speculate the extra risk, which increases the risk of heart disease, may be a consequence of stress caused by higher expectations placed on an only child. The absence of sibling relationships also may leave an only child less skillful in social interaction later in life, said Dr. Maurizio Trevisan.

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STUDENTS SOLVE PROBLEMS GOLDBERG-STYLE

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. — Screwing the lid on a pint-sized jar generally isn't difficult, but anything can happen when the task is approached in true Rube Goldberg style.

That's what a group of Purdue University students aim to prove when they sponsor the eighth annual Rube Goldberg Machine Contest Feb. 17. In keeping with the true spirit of Goldberg, who specialized in drawing complicated machines to perform simple tasks, student teams will demonstrate their mechanized methods for sealing a Ball canning jar.

In less than five minutes and with a minimum of 25 steps, the machine must fix the lid on the jar so that it can be turned upside down without spilling the water inside. The winner of the local contest will compete against other universities at a national competition March 17.

This year's task may prove more difficult than previous Rube Goldberg challenges, which have included such jobs as sharpening a pencil and preparing an egg for frying, Oliver said.

"This provides a particular challenge because the lid of the Ball canning jar is a two-piece cap," he said. "Not only do you have to have it in place, but it has to be screwed on so that it will stay. So the machine must be able to orient the cap and then turn it."

RESEARCHER IMPROVES DNA STUDY DEVICE

BOSTON, Mass. — An assistant professor of chemistry at Harvard University has come up with a new way to engineer the molecules of life. His approach promises both better answers to basic questions about the biological processes and new tools to prevent those processes from going wrong.

Assistant Professor of Chemistry Gregory Verdine's technique enables researchers to attach molecular devices that serve as detectors, reporters, springs, and switches to small pieces of DNA, or deoxyribonucleic acid.

"This technology offers a completely new approach toward determining the structure and function of DNA," Verdine said. "We expect it to shed light on such things as how the expression of genes is controlled and how antitumor drugs work."

Although Verdine is not the first

researcher to make such devices, his method is much more general than any other method to date, giving scientists the capacity to attach a broad variety in molecules to DNA, which opens up such possibilities as detecting viruses by their genetic material, Verdine said.

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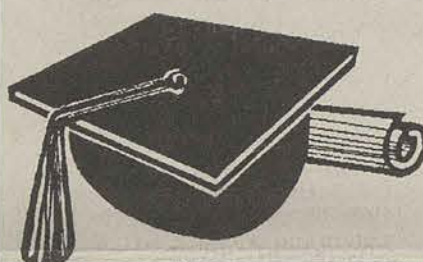

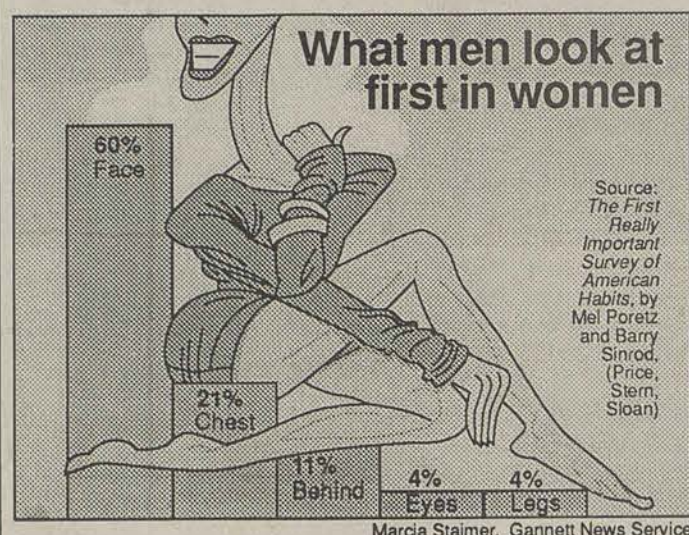

Because I like it, that's why.

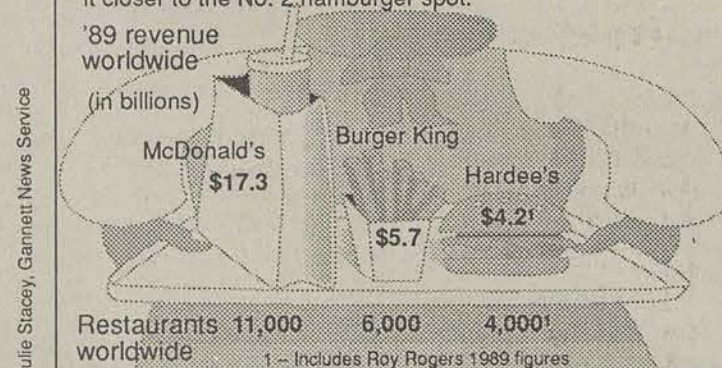

Graphically speaking



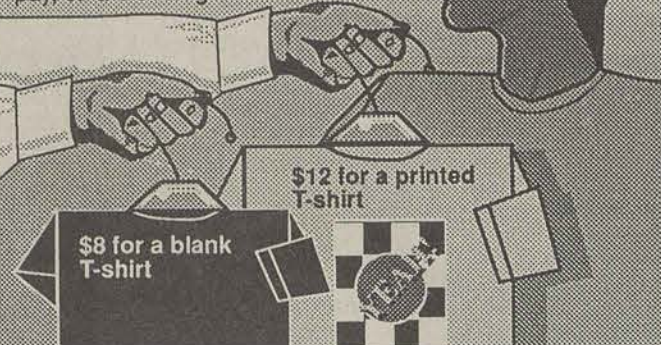

Eagles take Hats off Stetson at home 75-66

Apparently recovered from their 20-point loss to UNC-Charlotte, the GSC Eagles never trailed on their way to a 75-66 Trans America Athletic Conference victory over the Stetson Hatters Saturday in Hanner.

The win came much easier than GSC's January 13, 71-70 victory in DeLand, FL, in the previous meeting between the two schools. In that game, Mike Curry nailed two free throws with no time remaining to win the game for the Eagles.

In Saturday's win, GSC's seventh straight over the Hatters, Curry and Emmett Smith led a balanced Eagle attack with 14 points each. Smith also grabbed a team-high 11 rebounds before fouling out with 1:32 to play.

The only highlight of the night for Stetson was Maurice Cowan's 17-foot jumper that tied the score at 2-2 at the 17:42 mark of the first half. The Hatters would not force another tie the rest of the night, much less take the lead.

The Hatters needed eight minutes and 10 seconds to score their second field goal. A jumper by Jim Horn trimmed the GSC lead to 12-4 with 11:50 left, but Stetson didn't

get any closer the rest of the first half.

GSC took their biggest lead at 26-11 on a one-handed jam by Smith. Three minutes later a Tommy Williams free throw matched the 15-point margin at 29-14.

Stetson cut the lead to ten, 37-27, on a basket by Cowan, but Jeff Hagans responded with a dunk that brought the 2,286 fans to their feet. Hagans rebounded a GSC miss, then slammed with one second left to give the Eagles a 39-27 halftime lead.

Hagans came off the bench to score six first half points on perfect 3-3 shooting. He added four first half rebounds and a total of five for the game.

The second half began much like the first, with GSC holding a 48-37 lead with 12:46 to play. Sherrod hit three free throws and a reverse lay up for five of GSC's first nine second half points.

In less than one minute, though, the Hatters scored eight straight points to pull within three, 48-45. Fourteen seconds after a Rob Wilkes three-pointer made the score 48-42, Donnell Sampson con-

verted a three-point play to bring Stetson within three.

The Eagles gave the Hatters a taste of their own medicine, running off a 6-0 spurt on a 17-footer by Ben Pierce and lay ups by Curry and Horace Burton. GSC had a chance for two more points, but Pierce and Burton each missed a free throw after being fouled while shooting.

Lay ups by Charlton Young and Burton iced the game at 75-62 with just 2:11 left.

The Hatters shot a respectable 46% (27-59) from the field, but killed themselves at the free throw line. Stetson made only 10 of 26 attempts from the charity stripe. At least they were consistent: 5-12 in the first half and 5-14 in the second.

Young joined Curry and Smith in double figures with 11 points, including GSC's only three-pointer. Pierce added eight and Sherrod chipped in seven.

The Eagles, now 9-2 in the TAAC, return to conference action Thursday against the Centenary Gents in Shreveport, La. The Gents are coming off conference wins over Samford and Arkansas-Little Rock and will be out to avenge their 109-86 loss to GSC January 20.

He defeated Todd Witsken 6-1, 6-3 in the final Sunday in one hour, four minutes. Agassi, who received around \$100,000 for showing up, also won the \$32,400 first prize.
