GSC hosts annual GAN convention

GSC hosted the annual convention of the Georgia Association of Newscasters (GAN) in the Southern Center for Continuing Education last weekend. The three day event was attended by about 50 professional broadcasters from throughout the state, and perhaps an equal number of GSC faculty and students.

Kyle Brinkman and Amy Dorfman, both senior Broadcasting majors at GSC, won \$1000 scholarships in the student writing competition on Saturday.

The association also recognized James Todd, a Broadcasting major serving as student liaison on the GAN board of directors, and Kent Murray for their efforts in arrang-

ing for the event to be in Statesboro this year. Murray, who is in his fifth year of teaching broadcasting at GSC, is a faculty representative on the GAN board.

GAN member William Kitchin of radio station WLKC in St. Marys said participation by faculty and students here was greater than last year when the event was held on the campus of the University of Georgia in Athens. "Georgia Southern is the place we should have the convention every year," he said.

The guests were welcomed to campus Saturday morning by President Nick Henry and Dr. Carl Gooding, dean of the School of Business.

Dr. Michael McDonald, associate professor of management, addressed the convention Saturday, urging his audience to maintain

"psychological hardness" in handling adversity. He praised the value of humor, which he called a "pressure-release valve," and the importance of hard work.

Using as an example golfer Gary Player, who once rallied from eight strokes behind to win the Masters in Augusta, Dr. McDonald said the famous golfer told reporters after his victory, "The harder I work and practice, the luckier I seem to get."

McDonald joined the GSC faculty in 1987 after 11 years at Clemson University. He holds degrees from Georgia Tech and the University of Georgia.

Workshops throughout Saturday included "Sound Ideas for Radio," led by GAN President Pete Koenkamp with the Georgia Network, and Doug Walker of WRGA/WQTU in Rome.

The workshop emphasized the value of sound effects in radio features, using a buzz saw in the background on a feature about hearing loss, for example.

Cameraman Tony D'Astoli of WAGA-TV in Atlanta shared pointers on filming video for broadcast, including sample features on illegal cock fighting in Georgia, and the aftermath of the Panama invasion.

Dale Russell, also of CBS-affiliate WAGA-TV, shared insights in a workshop on "Investigative Reporting Techniques." Examples included an expose on the Atlanta Zoo, which resulted in an improved zoo.

"Ethics in and Out of the Newsroom" was a workshop that raised rhetorical questions about "tough calls" in journalism. When do you identify a homosexual in a

newscast? Do you report suicides? Do you label a victim of AIDS?

The workshops concluded with an electronic graphics exhibit in which convention guests were shown the extent and variety of computer-generated video special effects.

The keynote speaker at the convention was Bill Dahlberg, Georgia Power Company chief executive officer.

Among those in attendance were Dr. David Addington, head of the Department of Communication Arts; Tim Stowers, head football coach; and Tal Wright, a Georgia Power public relations executive and GSC alumnus.

Gubernatorial candidates who were expected to attend were unable to make the trip because of high winds prohibiting air travel.

Ga. Power CEO speaks on energy demands of future

Power plants are not in construction today to meet the energy demands of the near future, Bill Dahlberg, chief executive officer of Georgia Power Company, told the Georgia Association of Newscasters (GAN) Saturday.

The keynote speaker at the GAN convention at GSC warned that some areas of the country may experience brownouts (power failures) if new plants are not constructed to meet the needs of a rising population.

He predicted that the Northeast will be the first region with critical energy shortages, but pointed out that Florida, our next door neighbor, experienced a brownout last Christmas.

Dahlberg praised the "world-class performance of (Georgia Power's) nuclear units" but pointed out that the public is still suspicious of nuclear energy.

The Georgia Power CEO admitted that nuclear energy is "a dangerous technology" but assured his audience that so many checks and back-up systems have been installed in nuclear facilities that they are safe.

"A site emergency was declared at Plant Vogtle last year," Dahlberg said, "but it was just a glitch and there was no real danger." Vogtle is

a nuclear facility operated by Georgia Power.

He said the company called a press conference, invited Nuclear Regulatory Commission officers and state representatives, as well as the media and offered answers to all questions.

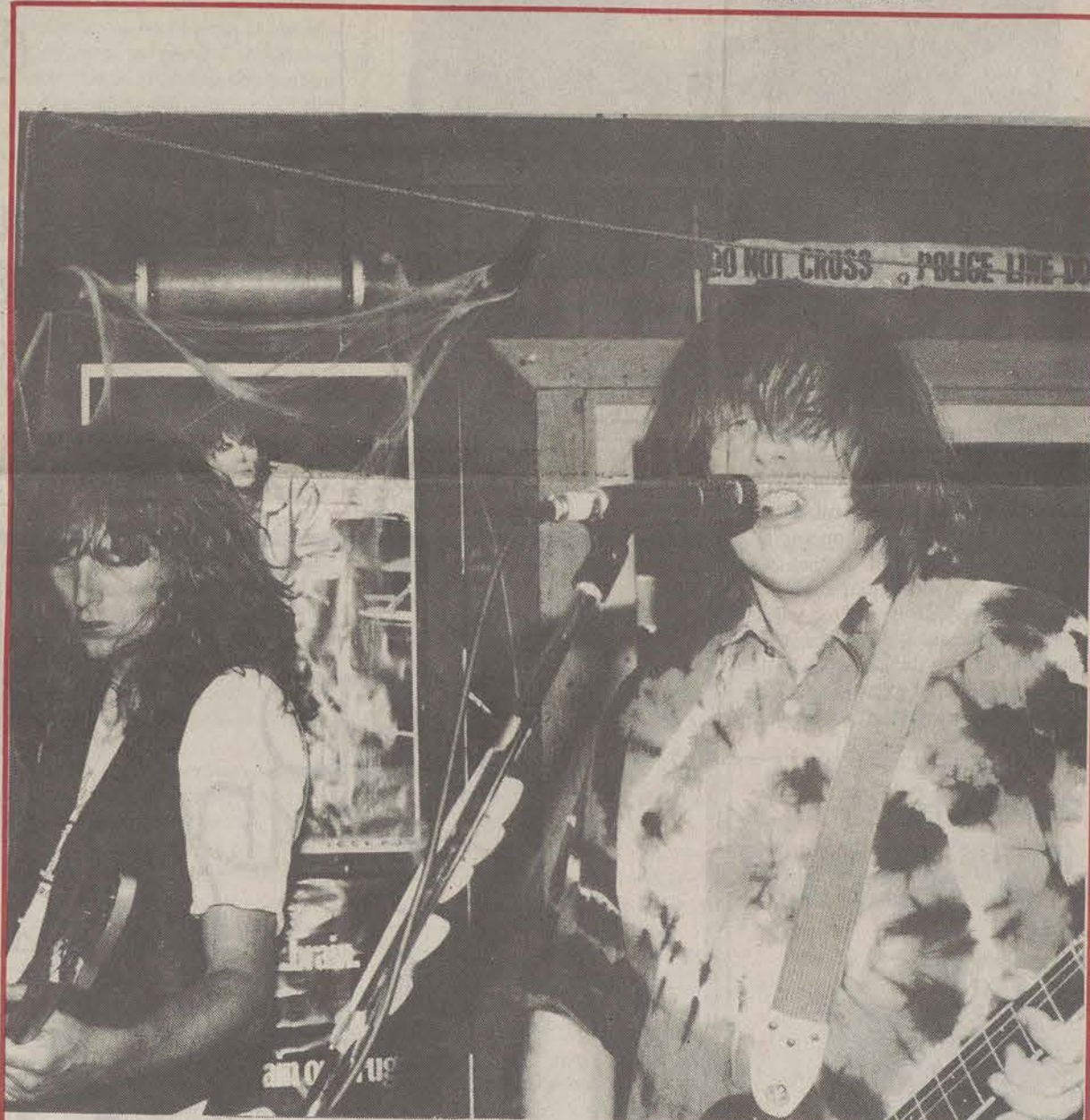
"Still," he said, "the tone of the media was that the plant was about to blow up."

Dahlberg told the GAN members and guests that both the power industry and the media have a "sacred responsibility to the public to be factual and open," but not alarmist, in matters concerning nuclear energy industry. "There is a regulatory slow-down," he said, referring to the difficulty the power industry faces in gaining governmental approval or plant construction.

"We've used up all the good water-power sites," the CEO said, explaining why hydroelectric dams cannot answer future energy needs, and "the clean-air debate" limits coal-burning plants.

As for solar energy, Dahlberg said "there's no organized group opposed to it but it's not the solution" because the technology is inadequate.

The CEO said that Georgia Power is heavily investing in research and development in an effort "to discover ways to provide clean energy."

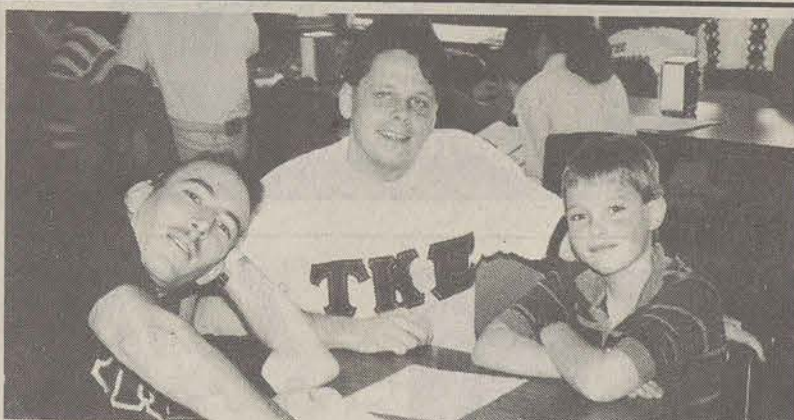

Former Georgia Southern president Dr. Pope A. Duncan will deliver the keynote address at dual Spring 1990 Commencement Exercises June 9.

Duncan, now chancellor at Stetson University, will speak twice in a new graduation format that will see ceremonies at 11 am and at 6:30pm, due to the large number of graduates and what would be an overflow crowd of family and friends for a single ceremony.

Degrees will be conferred for the School of Arts and Sciences and the School of Education in the morning. The evening ceremony will be for graduates from the School of Technology.

Between the ceremonies, there will be a reception for graduates, families, and guests from 1:30-3:30pm in the Williams Center.

Duncan was president of Georgia Southern from 1971-77, and served as vice-president from 1968-71. He came to Georgia Southern after four years as president of

South Georgia College in Douglas. The president of Stetson for ten years, he was named chancellor in 1987.

He received his B.S. and M.S. in physics from the University of Georgia, and his Th.M. and Ph.D. in church history from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Duncan has also conducted post-doctoral studies at Union Theological Seminary, Oxford University, and the University of Zurich.

Duncan has served as president of the Association of Southern Bap-

tist Colleges and Schools, a board member of the National Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools, a board member of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Schools, and president of the Association of Church-related Colleges and Universities of the South.

The commencement will be the last for Georgia Southern College, as the August graduation will be conducted as Georgia Southern University.

drivin' n' cryin' tries new songs on 'Boro progressive crowd

The progressive rock band Drivin' n' Cryin' is preparing to produce their fourth major album in five years. Last week they came to Statesboro to see how the new songs would be received by their fans, and when they left they seemed happy with the response.

The four-day stand at the Rockin' Eagle drew an estimated 700-900 fans to the club, including some who drove down from such cities as Atlanta, Milledgeville, Athens, and Charleston.

Kevn Kinney, the lead singer and guitarist for the group, said the new recording will be more of a rock album than their previous albums, such as the highly successful *Mys-*

tery Road (Island Records). Drivin' n' cryin' is best known for their mix of new-wave folk and rock, and even a little southern style country-rock. They have included music by every instrument from the cello to the banjo on their earlier albums. The new album is expected to be released sometime in September of this year.

The band's drummer, Jeff Sullivan, said the switch to a pure rock sound for this album won't be permanent. "Were just not in the mood for the other styles right now," Sullivan, who joined the band three years ago, is a former member of an Atlanta area band called The Disciples.

At least one record producer showed up to see the band perform their new songs. Andy Johns, who

has produced and/or engineered albums for such bands as The Rolling Stones, The Who, Bob Dylan, Led Zeppelin and more recently Cinderella and Tangier, flew to Statesboro from England to see the band's performance Friday night.

Johns seemed impressed with Drivin' n' Cryin's style as well as the excitement of the crowd which pushed to get closer to the stage. While discussing his Statesboro visit, He commented in his undeniably British accent that he liked the "Quaint little pub" the band had performed in.

Among the opening bands this week were Will Rogers of Will Rogers and the Coyote Rangers, Stonemaker, and The Go-Devs. Michelle Malone and Drag the River took the early stage call Tuesday and Wednesday. They received

almost as much attention as the headline band was expected to. Malone took the opportunity to announce that their first album, *Relentless*, (Arista Records), will be released on June 1.

Drivin' n' cryin' was formed about five years ago with Kevn Kinney, Tim Nielsen (bass and vocals) and Paul Lenz (drums). After Sullivan took Lenz's place at the Drums, Buren Fowler joined the band as a lead guitarist. Fowler, a former guitar technician with R.E.M. brought his rich rock-based style of music to the band.

No one knows when Drivin' n' Cryin' will return to the 'Boro, but those who missed last week's shows or just didn't get enough will have a chance to see them again this summer at Six Flags over Georgia on June 1.

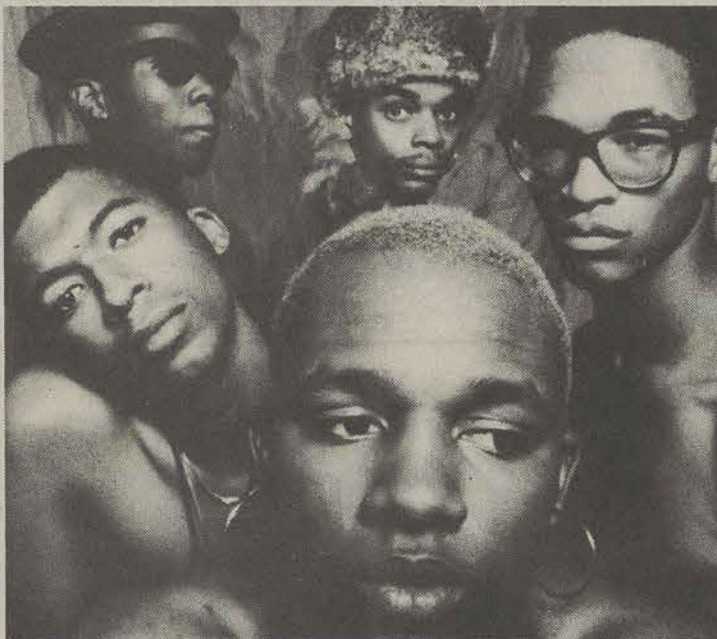

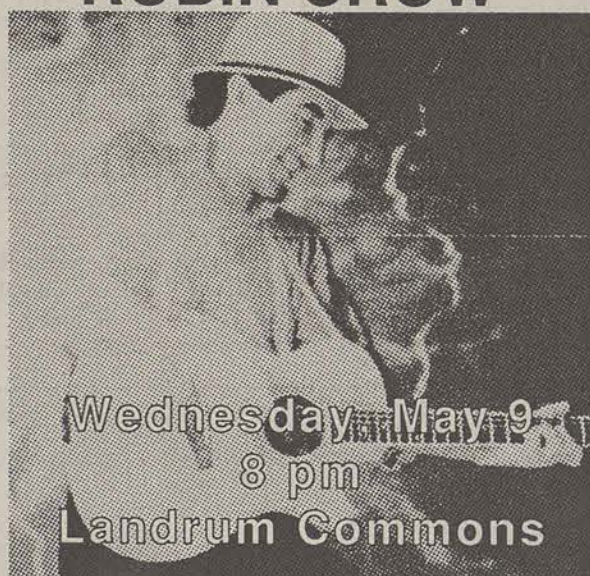
Wipf, Vice President of Tau Kappa Epsilon. "We try to find out about his or her interests, favorite things or people, or plans for the future."

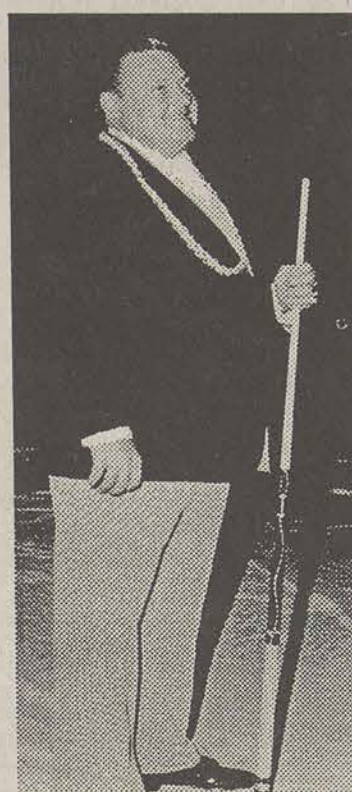

considered that; so surely those who voted for the candidates who proposed this preposterous idea were voting for them as a favor, and not as sensible candidates.

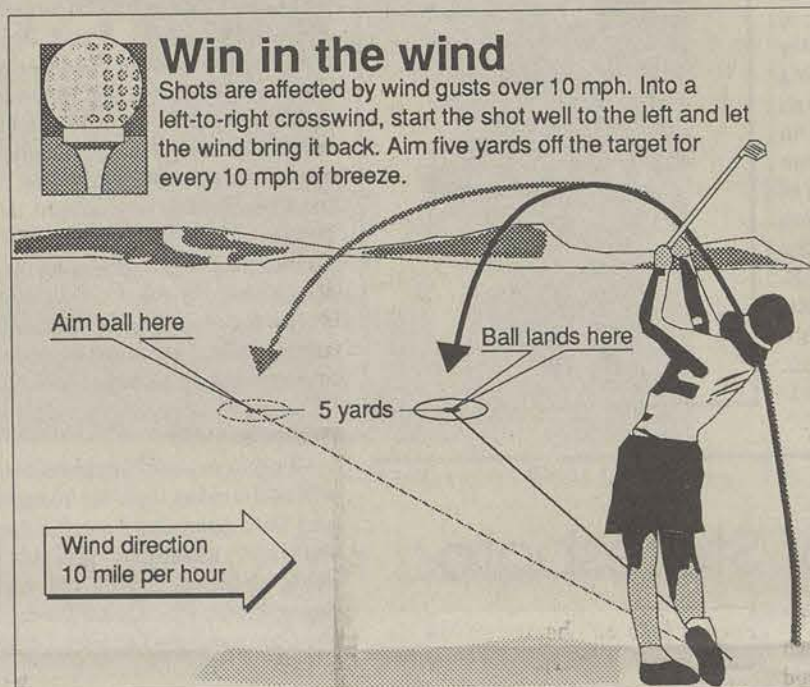

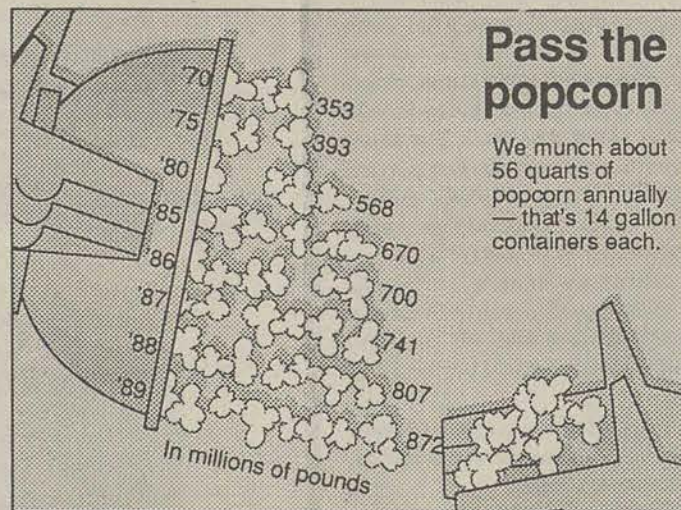
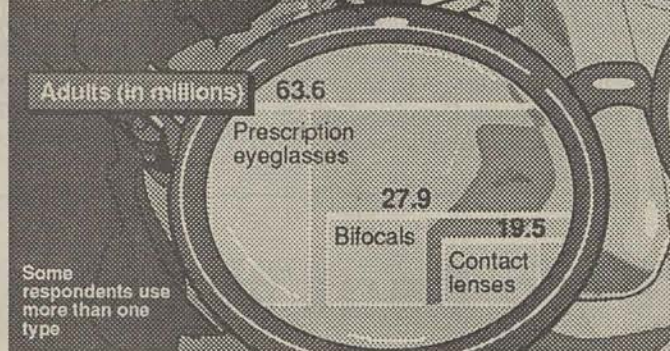

Eagles get clobbered by Stetson in championship 15-4

After losing just one conference game during the regular season, the GSC Eagles lost two in one weekend and finished second in the Trans America Athletic Conference tournament at Centenary Park in Shreveport, La.

The Eagles won three games in the four-day tourney, but fell 15-4 to the Stetson Hatters in Sunday's championship game.

Stetson improved to 31-27 on the way to their third straight TAAC crown. GSC, which had won all seven previous meetings with the Hatters this season, fell to 40-12.

With the wind blowing out, the Hatters pounded loser Scott Ryder (9-5) and three other Eagle pitchers for 21 hits, including a tournament single-game record 10 home runs.

Ryder put away the first two batters in the top of the first, but then hung a 1-2 curveball that Mike Sempeles deposited over the left field wall. Mike Pinckes followed with a homer to left-center.

The Hatters continued their home run derby in the third with five homers, all with the bases empty. After Sempeles, Pinckes and Rick Murray homered to chase Ryder, Wes Weger and Aaron Iatarola went deep against reliever Dave Masi.

In Stetson's six-run fourth, Sempeles hit a two-run dinger to tie Todd Greene's tournament record of three home runs in a game.

Greene put GSC on the scoreboard in the fourth with his 22nd

homer of the season. Following a Rob Fitzpatrick single in the same inning, Chad Sumner cut the Hatter lead to 13-3 with a two-run shot.

Sumner scored GSC's final run in the ninth. He reached on an infield single, advanced to third on Mike Miller's single and crossed home on Paul Frias' ground out.

Rebounding from an 8-6 Thursday loss to Arkansas-Little Rock, the Eagles downed the Centenary Gents 14-5 in Friday's elimination game.

Todd Greene led a 20-hit attack with three home runs and Joey Hamilton pitched eight innings on the way to his school-record 13th win.

Hamilton (13-3) allowed four earned runs and 10 hits while strik-

ing out three and walking three. Matt Harris pitched the ninth and picked up a strikeout.

The Gents grabbed a 3-0 lead in the top of the first, but the Eagles answered with back-to-back homers in the bottom of the inning. After Doug Eder singled with one out, Greene homered to left. Rob Fitzpatrick followed with his 15th homer of the season.

Eagle left fielder Mike Miller hit a solo homer in the second and a two-run blast in the third to put GSC up 6-3.

In the fourth, Chris Petersen singled to left and, two outs later, came home on Greene's double to left. Greene went to third on a wild pitch and Fitzpatrick walked, but the the Gents caught Fitzpatrick trying to steal to end the threat.

The Gents showed signs of life with a run in the top of the fifth, but GSC responded in the bottom of the inning. Mike Yuro, who entered the tournament with two homers and

left with five, drove a pitch over the green wall in left-center.

GSC scored three runs in the sixth inning to open an 11-4 lead. With two outs, Greene launched his 19th homer to center. A Mike Yuro single scored Fitzpatrick and a Paul Frias base hit drove in Chad Sumner.

In the seventh, Greene homered with Chris Abner on base and, in the eighth, Chris Petersen hit GSC's eighth home run of the day. Petersen's blast was his first of the year and gave the Eagles at least one run in every inning.

The Eagles got revenge in Saturday's opening game, eliminating UALR 14-4.

GSC scored single runs in both the first and second innings. Chris Abner opened the game with a single, stole second and scored on a base hit. One inning later, Chad Sumner homered, tying Todd Greene for the team lead in hits.

The Trojans scored twice in the bottom of the second, but GSC took the lead for good in the third. Abner reached on an error by third base-

man Vint Anderson, stole second and scored on Greene's double down the third base line.

Abner scored his third run of the game in the fifth. After he led off with an infield hit, Doug Eder drilled a Bob Summers pitch over the left field wall.

Senior Peter Bouma (7-1) picked up the win over Summers.

The Eagles forced the Sunday championship game with a 5-2 win over Stetson Saturday night.

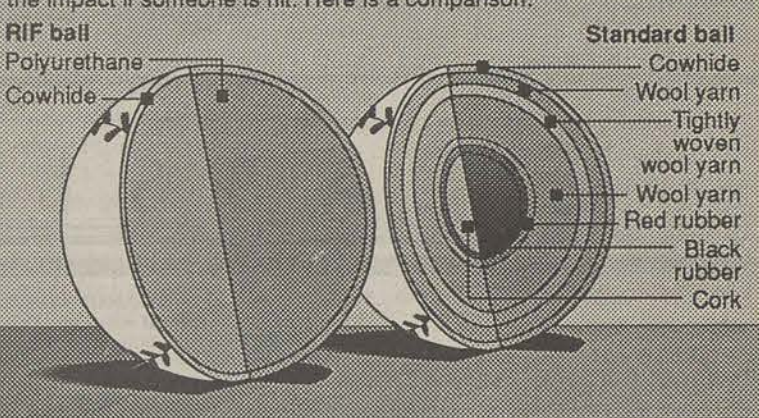
With two outs in the top of the first, GSC scored four unearned runs. After Todd Greene's hit, Rob Fitzpatrick reached on a two-base error that brought home Greene. Chad Sumner singled home Fitzpatrick and Mike Yuro knocked a two-run homer to left-center.

Doug Eder's fifth-inning solo homer put GSC on top 5-0 and gave Eagle starter Jay Berkner (5-0) all the runs he needed.

In Thursday's loss, the Eagles led 6-3 after six innings, but the Trojans scored five runs in their last three at-bats to pull out the win.

The USA, which plays Finland Tuesday, clinched a place in the 1991 championships Friday by defeating West Germany 5-3.

Rookie David Farmer won the first leg of the Du Pont Pro Cycling Championship Sunday at Washington, D.C. despite a broken rear wheel the final nine miles. 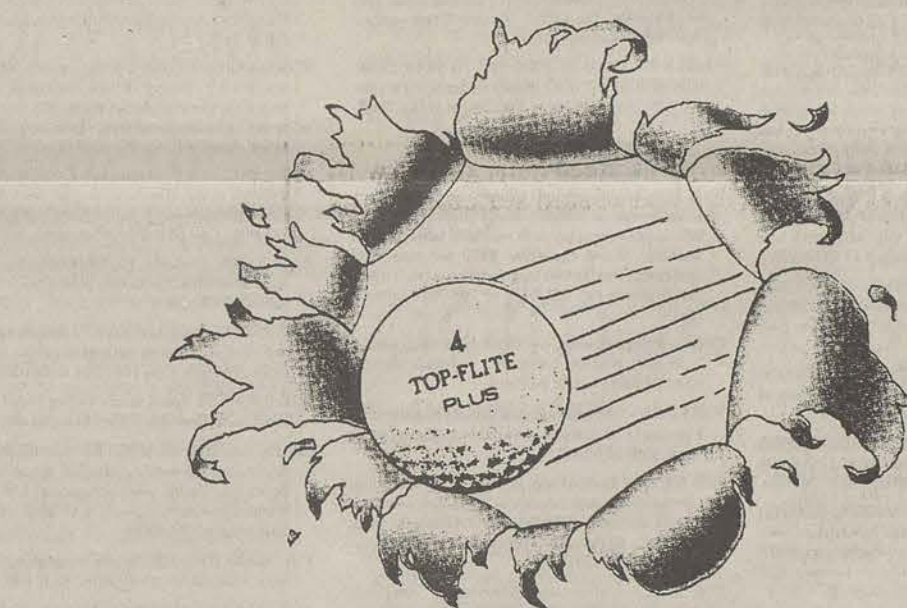
CUBS DEFEAT DODGERS:

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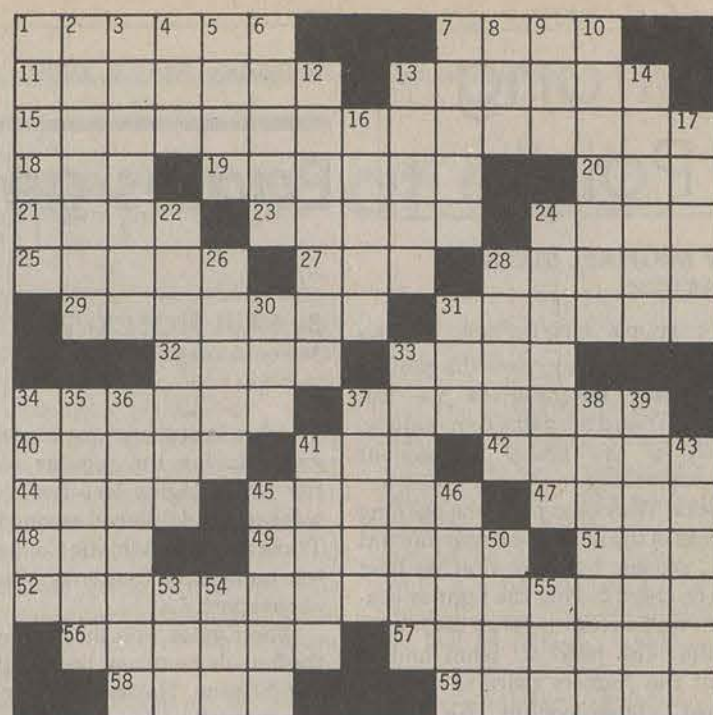
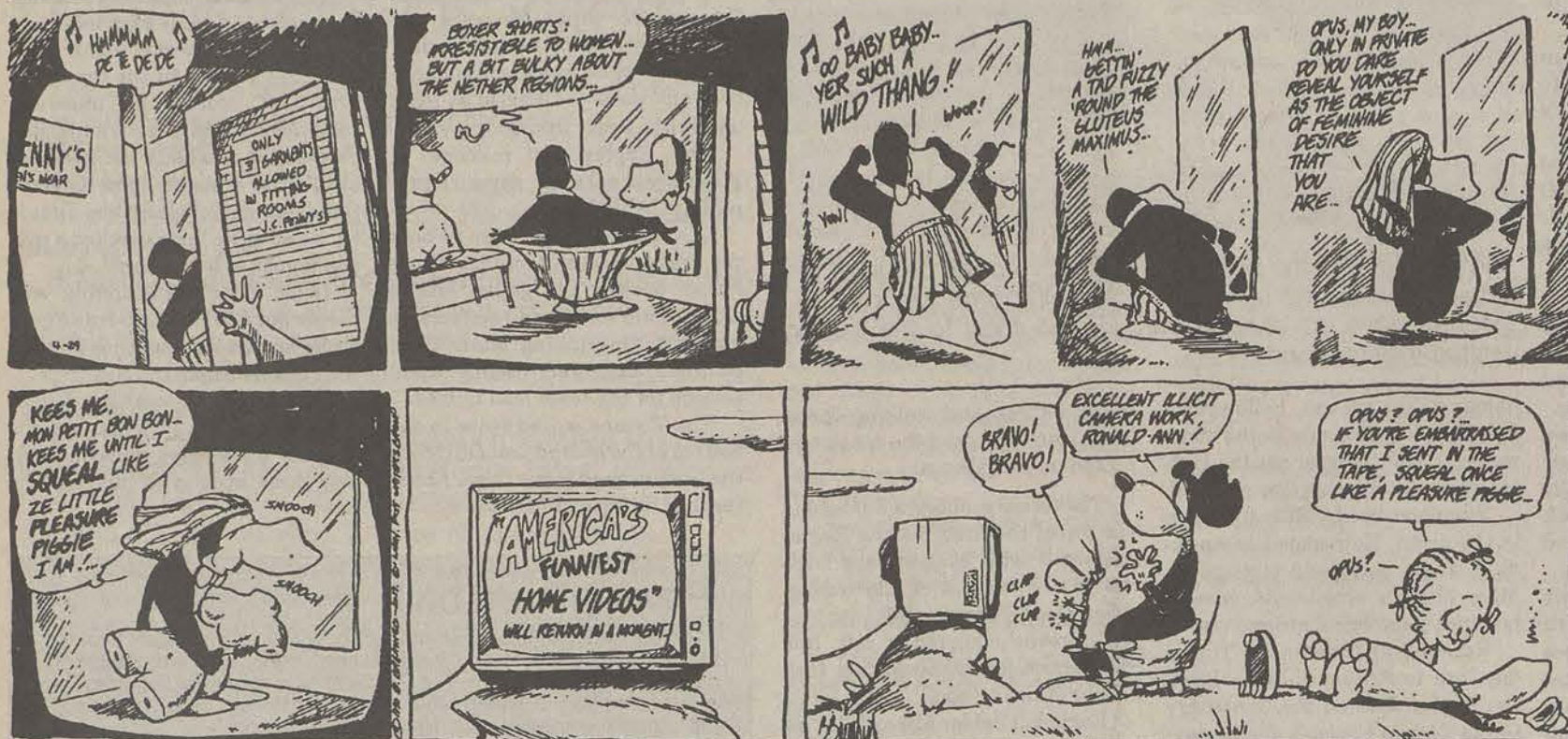
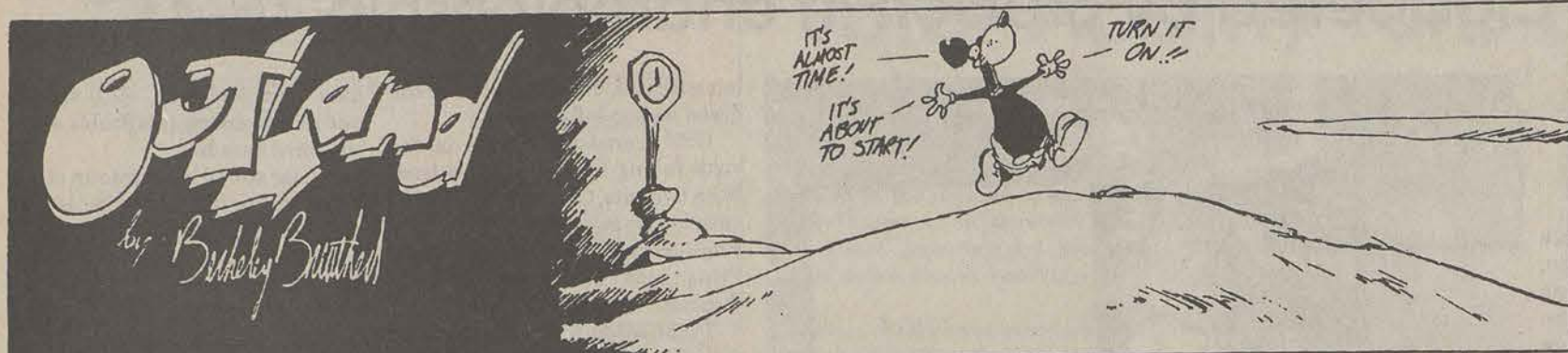
