12 Fulbright-Hays Grants Available To Educators

The Council for International Exchange of Scholars has announced the availability of twelve Fulbright-Hays grants for specialists in educational administration, planning and policy under a short-term exchange program between the United States and the Federal Republic of Germany. A group of twelve American educators will spend two months in Germany beginning in mid-May for the purpose of studying the educational systems in the Federal Republic as well as the social and political mechanisms involved in educational planning and reform.

Similar awards are made

annually to educators and government officials of the Federal Republic of Germany for observation of various aspects of the American educational system. Programs for German educators are arranged individually by the Council based on the grantee's particular interest.

Grants to American educators will provide round-trip travel, travel within Germany, and a cost of living allowance of approximately DM 6,000. No provisions are made for dependents. The application deadline is January 31, 1977. For all practical purposes, the micrographics industry was born in the 1920's when George L. McCarthy invented a camera to microfilm bank transactions. From this beginning, micrographics has enjoyed tremendous growth in applications and technology.

John P. Eager was a leader in the industry. During his career, he helped guide and shape the future of the micrographics sciences and was instrumental in broadening the applications of

microfilm in information management.

John P. Eager retired from Eastman Kodak Co. in 1967 as

Special Interest Graduating Seniors

Immunology, folk studies and regional development are just three of 66 graduate programs in out-of-state universities available to Georgia students at in-state tuition rates through the Academic Common Market, organized by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB).

The Academic Common Market, an interstate academic sharing program, makes specialized graduate programs available to students in 12 Southern states and discourages needless, and often expensive, duplication of programs and facilities among states.

Qualifying for the Academic Common Market is a simple procedure. The student must be accepted into a program offered through the Common Market and then must be certified as a resident of a state which has made an agreement to send its students to that program.

The Questionable OM

On the college campus today there is an upsurge in spirituality. Courses on Oriental religions, T.M. and zen are thriving. Morning finds countless students wrapped in yoga positions and chanting mantras. The question that arises is whether or not this new development will lead to an enhancement of our true religious drive.

In Christianity there has always been a tension between the active and passive principles in life. Jesus frequently retired to a deserted spot to pray. Then He returned to an active life. We can make a case that this same dynamic is presently being re-enacted on a communal level. There was the social activeness

of the civil rights movement and the anti-Vietnam protests of the 60's. Now there is the retreat for reflection into Oriental religions.

If this is the case, then we are all in support of this reevaluative phase. But there is also a danger here. To the degree that meditation helps one to recognize one's motivations, and know oneself, to put oneself in the presence of God, it can be an excellent tool in preparing for commitment. But commitment is essential. To contemplate oneself, so to speak, is to be involved in a cyclical process which leads nowhere. Meditation ideally leads one to be more, TO BE MORE for other people and to be more authentic in our relations with others.

It is interesting to note that the meditation phenomenon is especially prevalent among middle-and upper-class students. They are seriously re-examining their values. They are questioning such traditional American values as the work ethic and competition motivation. This is good. But one must admit that these middle and upper-class youths have a certain luxury to do such re-evaluation. What about the members of our society and of countries in the Third World who can't afford such luxury? They are working at merely surviving. As we chant our "OMS," what explanation will we give them for our inactivity? I'm Ron Saucchi.

Fashion 101: 3 New Endings For Old Pants

If by chance you have found that your favorite pair of jeans drowned in a tub of hot water, and that when you wear them you look like you are expecting a flood; or "Guess who's leg got caught in the bicycle chain? Never fear, for here are three new endings for old pants.

1. If winter means 75° F in the sun, but you love the layered, sock-over-boot look, fake it with a pair of sockless cuffs that tuck in and fold twice over the outside of your boots. **DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING:** use a 4 oz. skein of 4-ply knitting worsted wool and a number 10 circular needle. Gauge: 5 stitches to the inch; 7 rows to the inch. Begin at top of cuff, cast on 60 stitches. 1st RND: *K1, P1. Repeat from * across. Repeat first round until length is 9 inches. 2nd RND: *K2 together, K13. Repeat from * three more times, 56 stitches. 3rd RND: * K2 together, K12.

Repeat from * three more times, 52 stitches. 4th RND: *K2 together, K11. Repeat from * three more times, 48 stitches. Continue knitting until total length is 11 inches. Bind off.

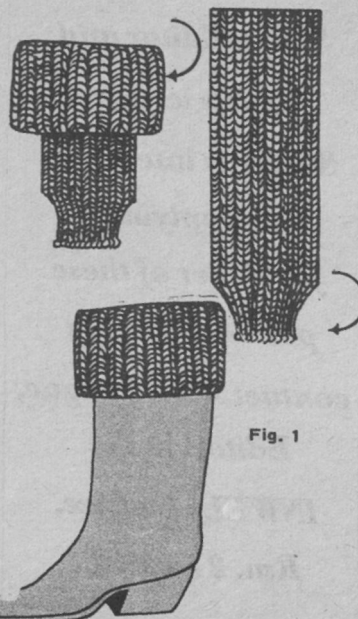

2. Jazz up a pair of pants with drawstrings at the ankles. Make an opening in each hem through the outside seam and run the shoestring through the hem. Tie at your ankles or over the boots. You can also substitute elastic for the shoestrings. This version will hold anywhere up or down your leg.

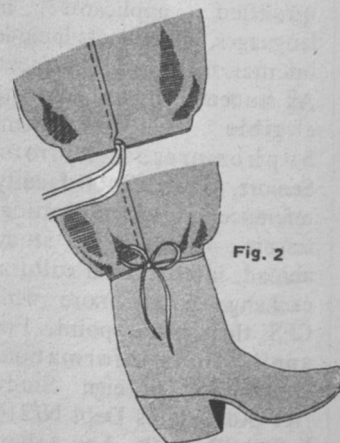

Student Suicides

"Jump!" some students shouted playfully to the young man on the roof of the 28-story Univ. of Massachusetts Library. He returned the shouts and dropped some model rocket engines that sounded like firecrackers on them. He then took a running leap and plunged 286 feet to his death, the fourth suicide there in two years.

Four suicides in two years is about average for a campus the size of the Univ. of Massachusetts according to a 1968 study by Dana L. Farnsworth, "Psychiatry, Education and the Young Adult." The study estimates that on a 10,000 student campus:

**1,000 students will have emotional conflicts severe enough to warrant professional help;

**100 to 200 will become apathetic and unable to organize their efforts;

**15 to 25 will become ill enough to require treatment in a mental hospital;

**5 to 20 will attempt suicide, and 1 to 3 will succeed.

Other studies show that the rate of suicides among young people is less than among older people, but it is second only to accidental death as a cause of death in the college age group. Each year 10,000 college students in the U.S. try suicide; 1,000 succeed.

3. You can change your straight-leg jeans into wrapped ankle pants with denim tabs made from cutting off jean scraps. Top-stitch one end of a 22"x1" tab to the outside seam of pant leg, about 3 inches above

the hem, wrapping it twice around leg so it crisscrosses at the side. Hold a button where you have attached the tab to the jeans. Make a buttonhole at the other end of the tab.

New Vocational Institute Developed

Guitar Institute of Technology, the first vocational institution devoted exclusively to the training of professional guitarists, will open for classes, March 7, 1977, at 1420 N. Beachwood Dr., Hollywood, Ca., 90028.

Curriculum for the new school has been developed by master guitarist and music educator Howard Roberts, who will head the faculty, according to Pat Hicks, G.I.T. director and founder. Guitarists Joe Diorio, Ron Eschete and Don Mock also will be instructors at the Institute, located in the heart of the music industry at the former Columbia Pictures studios.

Roberts, a 35 year veteran of film, television, recording, concerts and teaching, is the author of several books on guitar methods. He is a permanent member of the visiting faculties at Westminster College, Salt Lake City, and the University of Colorado at Denver. The course of study he has originated for G.I.T. is a culmination of his experience conducting Howard Roberts Guitar Seminars in major cities of the U.S. for the past ten years.

"G.I.T. will offer an intensive, five-hours-per-day, five-days per week, 48-week program designed to produce professional working guitarists," reveals Hicks, who previously was national administrator for Yamaha Music Schools. "Our graduates will be trained to work in every area of the business," he continues. "They will play here under the identical conditions they may expect in studios, clubs and concert halls, and they will know rock, classical, jazz, country and bluegrass guitar as well as teaching techniques."

Composition, orchestration, music electronics including guitar, synthesizer, film scoring,

music copying, accompaniment, record production, mathematical music, solos and ensemble performance, ear training, single string melodic techniques, applied harmony and theory, sightreading, fingerboard harmony, improvisation, transcription, works of major composers, history of contemporary guitar techniques and 16th Century counterpoint are among the 43 subjects to be offered.

The spacious facilities include study and recording labs and classrooms equipped with the latest professional and educational equipment such as the tachistoscope, which will be utilized to teach speed reading. Frequent seminars and workshops by leading guitarists and educators will augment the classroom schedule throughout the year.

Applicants must be high school graduates or the equivalent. An audition - in person or on tape - is a prerequisite for admission. No part time or extension students will be accepted. Additional information is available from the Admissions Office, Guitar Institute of Technology.

To become an authentic physician, a student served as an apprentice to a practicing doctor. In some states, a legal contract between the two required the doctor to provide food and lodging for the student

Musical Metamorphosis

Crystal Ball is a new album by the band Styx. Styx has been around for a few years but is still a relatively new band as far as being in the public eye is

concerned. Styx has had a few top forty hits; perhaps the most notable among these hits is the song titled *Lady*. *Lady* features excellent keyboards and perhaps shows best where the band's talents lie.

Styx is composed of five members consisting of Dennis DeYoung on keyboards, Chuck Panozzo on the bass, John Panozzo on drums, James Young on guitar and the newest member of the band Tommy Shaw who also plays the guitar. *Crystal Ball* is the first album that Shaw is featured on and he is one of the album's main contributors.

The instrumentation of the band Styx is their best asset. Their music is filled with excellent keyboard work including classical piano and synthesizers. Another noteworthy point of Styx instrumentation is the versatility provided by the two guitarists, Tommy Shaw and James Young. The combination of the guitars and the keyboards results in very interesting music. Unfortunately the instrumentation is the only noteworthy facet of Styx's music; the band's lyrics tend to be childish and remind the listener of forced poetry. They tend to rely on couplet rhymes such as fine and time and the lyrics detract greatly from the instrumentation.

Savannah listeners had a chance to sample Styx's music in a concert Monday night December 27th at the Savannah Civic Center.

Styx provided the audience with a dynamic performance. The band played selections off their new album *Crystal Ball* and also songs off their previous albums including the hit *Lady*. Black Oak Arkansas was the headline band at the concert providing entertainment for those who prefer a southern rock type music. Black Oak is best characterized by the title of one of their albums, *Raunch and Roll*; their music is raunchy rock and roll. Jim Dandy, the leader of the band personifies this type of music by his obnoxious suggestive on stage behavior. Clearly Styx should have been the headline band for Black Oak is losing their grip on their once loyal fans as was demonstrated by the poor turn out at the Civic Center.

Activity Fee Lawsuit

Students cannot be compelled to belong to an organization such as student government. They can, however, be required to pay activity and service fees to support such organizations provided the university oversees expenditures of such fee funds to insure that a balanced, educational program results. So ruled the Washington Supreme Court last month in a five-year-old case brought against the Univ. of Washington by three conservative students. The students, members of the Young Americans for Freedom, had argued that they should not be forced to financially support the student government since they disagreed philosophically with the organization.

In ruling that mandatory activity fees are legal, the court said, "...we must balance the plaintiffs' rights against the traditional need and desirability of the University to provide an atmosphere of learning, debate, dissent, and controversy."

"Dissenting students should not have the right to veto every event, speech or program with which they disagree," said the court. "On the other hand, the ASUW (student government) is not totally unchecked in its use of these fees mandatorily extracted from the students."

The case differs from similar fee cases previously decided in Nebraska and Vermont in that the Washington case established the right of non-association. Currently, the ASUW constitution says that "all enrolled students shall be" members.

Also significant is the fact that the Supreme Court returned the case to the originating court for rulings on the legality of several specific expenditures — an instance where fee funds were allegedly used to bail a non-student protestor out of jail, for example.

Jerry Coe, a Univ. of Washington attorney familiar with the case says that since the turbulent late 60's, when the questionable expenditures took place, guidelines and review procedures have been implemented which would prevent improper expenditures.

"The guidelines are just window dressing," says the plaintiffs' attorney, Richard Saunders. "They (the UW administration) don't do anything to oversee that the student program is balanced. They leave it entirely up to the student government."

"If we can establish that the University wasn't really providing an arena for competing ideas, and I think that will be easy to do, then we're entitled to our money back."

Sanders says the amount of money involved in a potential class-action settlement is about \$500,000. "I want to go in there and get money damages. When they have to start coming up with some money, that's going to be the sanction that is going to put these people back on their heels," says Saunders. "College administrators, I think, get there because they flow with the tide and never take a stand on anything. It takes a real sanction to make them do their job and that's what we're trying to do with this suit."

*Recent census figures show that one third of all college students are over 25 years of age. There are one million college students over age 35.

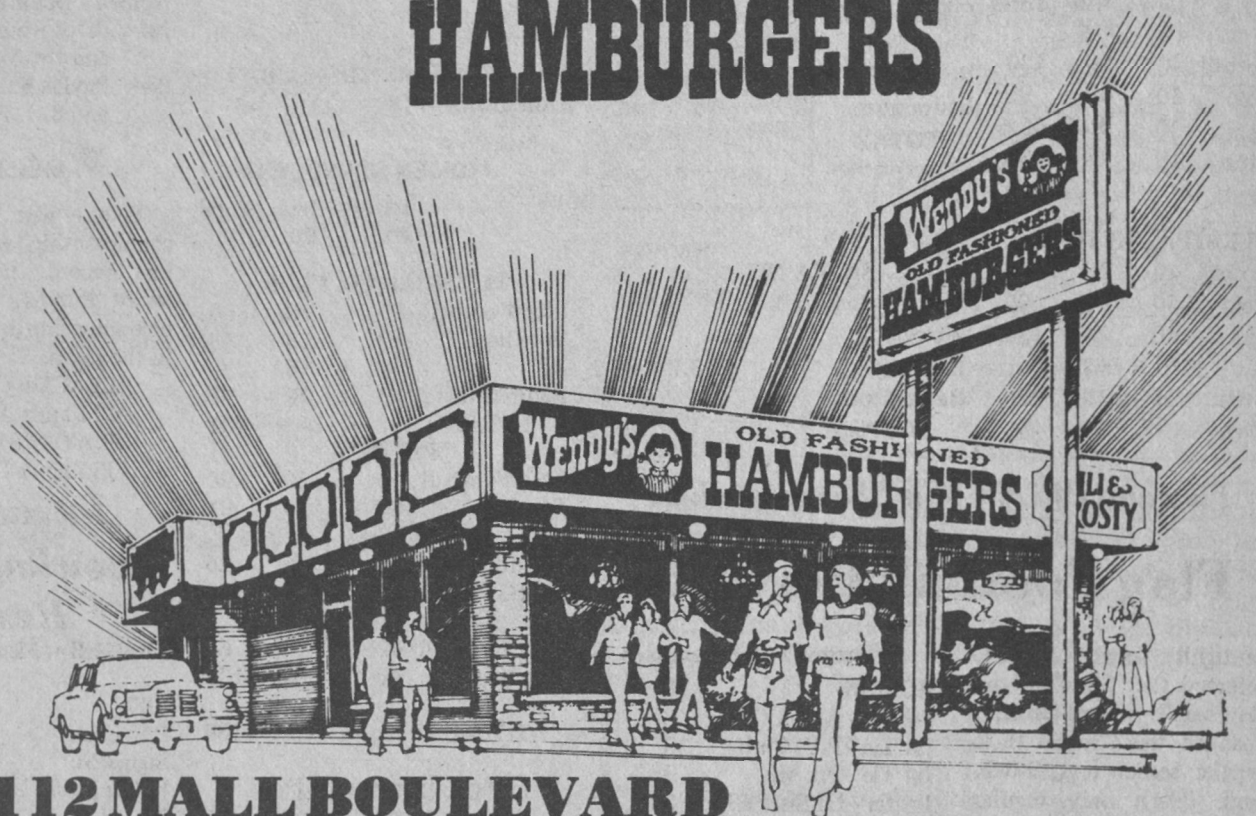
