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Coach Alexander Resigns

Armstrong State College athletic director and head basketball coach Bill Alexander resigned his position at ASC to accept an assistant coaching position at Stetson University.

Alexander, who in this decade at Armstrong built the Pirates into a nationally known entity in NCAA Division basketball, resigned effective August 17.

Alexander moved to Stetson as assistant under head basket-

ball coach Glenn Wilkes. He will handle recruiting and coordinate booster activities as well as his on-the-job coaching duties.

As athletic director, coach Alexander has developed an outstanding plan of inter-collegiate sports that are competitive with programs of schools in the NCAA Division II category. As head basketball coach, he has brought Armstrong to national prominence with na-

tional rankings for his teams.

Three SAC championships and participation in two NCAA and two NAIA post season tournaments, as well as the naming of two players to All-America teams with several others receiving honorable mention, have been highlights of coach Alexander's career at Armstrong.

Alexander thus ends a highly successful career at Armstrong

which culminated this past season with ASC winning the South Atlantic Conference championship, "Big Al" claiming "Coach of the Year" honors, and the Pirates advancing to the NCAA Division II South Regionals in Chattanooga, Tenn.

Alexander explained his reasons for leaving the ASC post: "I felt that the program here had about reached its pinnacle."

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Sims Named Athletic Director

Armstrong State College filled half the vacancies left by the departure of Bill Alexander as Dr. Roy Sims was named athletic director at the institution Monday.

In a move that will bring the Health and Physical Education Department and the Athletic Department under the control of a single director, ASC President Dr. Henry Ashmore has added the athletic directorship to Dr. Sims' current position as head of the Department of Health and Physical Education.

Dr. Ashmore cited limited facilities and funds and conflicts that arose between the two departments as reasons for the combining of the two, and said the change should make for efficient use of the limited resources available. "Dr. Sims is not only the long time head of the physical education department, but he has also been athletic director and has served

at times as head coach. He is well versed in all areas," said Dr. Ashmore.

Dr. Sims has served as athletic director, basketball, baseball and golf coach in his 22-year career at Armstrong, and was just recently named head golf coach, a duty he will be surrendering in the reorganization. In effect, he will have control of all athletics as well as instruction in the physical education department.

"This is not going to change the direction Armstrong is going as far as athletics is concerned," said Dr. Sims, 46.

"Our main emphasis is trying to better both programs (physical education and athletics). I don't see any real change of direction. I do see this creating one cohesive program at Armstrong. Before, an individual, either teaching or coaching, was responsible to two masters, and that is not the wisest situation to have."

Seante Meeting Held

The SGA Senate held its last regularly scheduled meeting of the summer August 10 during which the senate voted on the recommendations of the finance committee.

The finance committee, a senate committee charged with the responsibility of determining the legitimacy of request for Senate funds, recommended that \$536 be allocated to the Inkwell for new camera equipment and that \$281 be earmarked for Campaign '77.

Furthermore the finance committee recommended that a request from the chess club for \$1025 and a request from Vice President Ken Chapman for

carpet and apneling for the Vice President and Treasurer's office both be tabled pending further information.

A request from the Fine Arts department for steel caging to lock up musical instruments was also tabled.

The Senate unanimously confirmed the recommendations of the finance committee.

In other business the Senate approved the appointment of Mike Cassidy as senator from the P.E. department and the appointment of Pam Bridges as senator from the Biology department.

Regents Set Deadline

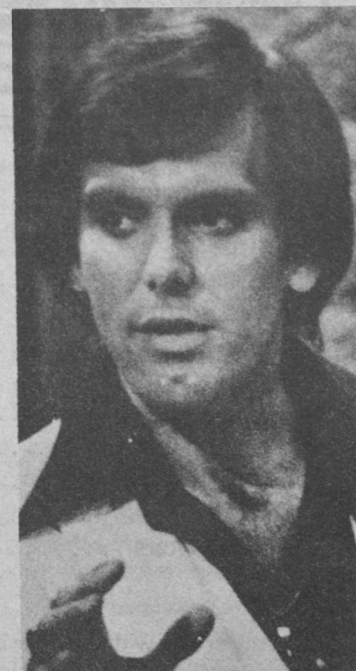
The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare (HEW) has issued a directive to the colleges and universities in five states including Georgia, Florida, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and North Carolina concerning plans to speed up efforts to desegregate their systems. The order gives each institution in those states 60 days to come up with a new efficient plan. Of course these efforts are aimed at the system's predominately black and white colleges.

There are many varying opinions on the subject. Some anonymous school officials at Armstrong have said that they feel that the directive is unfair to all parties involved considering the fact that the two local colleges, Armstrong and Savannah State, simply "do not have enough time" to develop the plans and assess them properly. Others seem to feel that the

institutions have known for some time that the directive was soon coming. An official at Savannah State, a predominately black college, states that he feels that "the identity of that college will go down the drain. He also said that he thinks the move will speed up plans for the merger of the two local colleges. Regardless, each college has its duty to accomplish some time in September after which time the pressure will be on the Regents.

Some of the general guidelines which the plans should contain are:

1. Increase the number of black students going to predominately white colleges and universities.
2. Increase the number of white students attending predominately black colleges.
3. Providing for a more realistic formula allowing for the admission of white and black high school graduates in equal proportions in respect to their numbers.

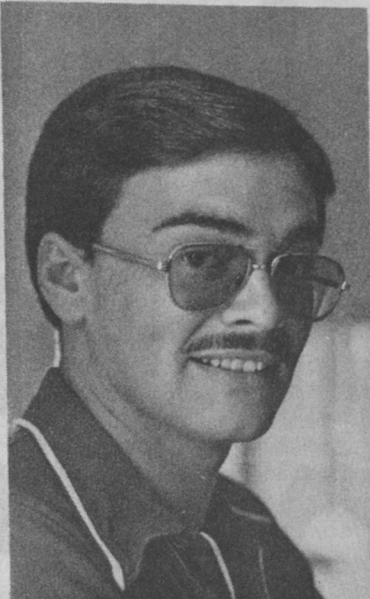
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Off The Wall: Picking Up Girls

Making Policy Decisions

The SGA Union Board has some policy decisions to make that all students should be a part of at the onset of this fall quarter. These matters concern the ideas of bringing of "Big Name" expensive groups to ASC, extending certain privileges to SGA officers and understanding the governing control of the Board.

SGA President Craig Harper vowed to bring better quality of entertainment to ASC by bringing big-name groups to ASC as part of his campaign statement. He sees the move as one of enhancing ASC's appeal to stu-

dents, prospective students and the community at large. Most factions at Armstrong seem to agree with the idea in its idealistic state. However, many doubt the feasibility of the same due to a mere budget of \$46,700 granted to the Union Board for entertainment. Some speculate that the venture would require too great an initial expenditure to warrant taking the risk. Others claim that we should take the risk and say that our programming surely can not worsen. Which view is right and which is wrong? No one knows for sure. One thing is clear and

that is that this issue will remain viable and provocative and deserves the attention of all students and faculty members.

Campaign '77 will present a proposal to the Union Board to allow SGA officers, Union Board members and Honor Court members to attend Union Board sponsored activities for which students are charged at a price which is 50% of that which students are charged. That is to say if students are charged \$1.00, student officers are admitted for 50 cents. Campaign '77 intends to mediate to 30% or drop the idea entirely if enough

students appear to be against the idea. The rationale behind the proposal is that senators and honor councilmen have no privileges other than representing their constituencies. Executive officers have offices, parking places and scholarships for their tuition while Union Board officers get into activities free. So the question is, why can not a senator and an honor council member have some benefits for doing a job well?

The final policy matter before the board concerns governing jurisdictions of the board. This writer, also a member of the board, has explored the matter.

According to the SGA Constitution the Union Board consists of two distinct bodies. There is the Administrative Council which is ultimately responsible for the operation

and decisions of the union with each of its members having a vote with the exception of the SGA Secretary and Treasurer, and the SGA President who votes in case of a tie. The other body consists of five divisions which review and research material and recommend ideas to the Administrative Council for their consideration. These five committees have a definite power in more or less determining what the council will see or not see. The board has not functioned as it should since its inception. Hopefully, we will get

the necessary number of people to staff these responsible positions. Since this setup is constitutionally provided for, this will certainly mark an undefeatable issue involving campus politics.

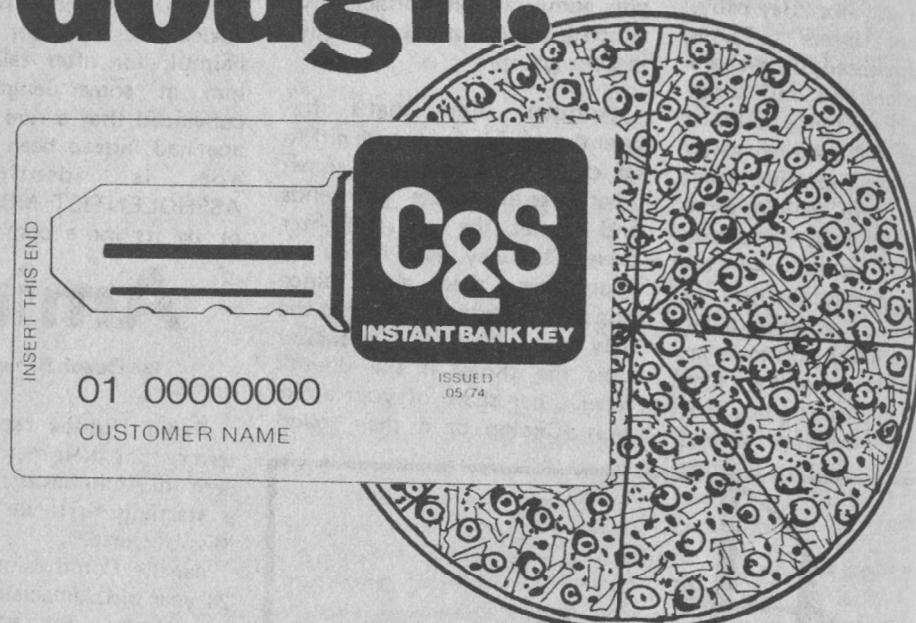

RECREATION OPPORTUNITIES

Swimming Pool

The indoor, heated pool is available for recreational swimming at various times throughout each quarter. Times may vary each quarter depending on class registration, etc. I.D. cards should be available and all swimming regulations posted in the pool should be observed. No one under 9 years old may swim unless accompanied by another person 13 years old or older. Dates and times will be posted on gym bulletin board each quarter.

Tennis Courts

Tennis courts are available to students and the public alike on a first come, first serve basis when classes, intramural tournaments or the varsity tennis team are not using them. Times are posted at the courts and a supervisor will be on duty. Please show I.D. cards and there is no charge for students, faculty or staff.

Gymnasium

Gymnasium is available on dates in the calendar and which are posted on the gym bulletin board. These are subject to change depending on class use, etc. I.D. cards should be available. Basketball is a very popular sport during recreation time along with badminton and volleyball.

Weight Room

Weight room is available whenever the gym is open unless a class is using it. It is located in the gym.

Tennis Practice Wall

Tennis Practice Wall is available to anyone on a first come, first serve basis unless a class is using it, and is located behind the pool in the rear of the gym.

Flag Football

Separate leagues for men and women. Most games are scheduled for Sunday afternoons in order to accommodate more students/faculty.

Bowling League

Separate no-handicap leagues are men and women. Four member teams bowl each Thursday at 4 P.M., Major League Lanes.

Swim Meet

Time trials are held in each event except relays and the top 6 times in each event qualify for the finals. Consult the intramural handbook or intramural department for details.

Women's Basketball Program Begins

The 1977-78 Women's Basketball Program will begin Monday, Sept. 19 with a meeting in the Gymnasium at 3:00 p.m. Any female student who would be interested is asked to attend this meeting or get in touch with Mrs. Ford in the Athletic Office as soon as possible.

The outlook is very promising for the 77-78 season with the leading scorer from last season and the leading rebounder returning and a host of very talented newcomers expected.
