Along with these great Halloween classics will be two more excellent movies: "Spook Party Festival" and "Moan and Groan."

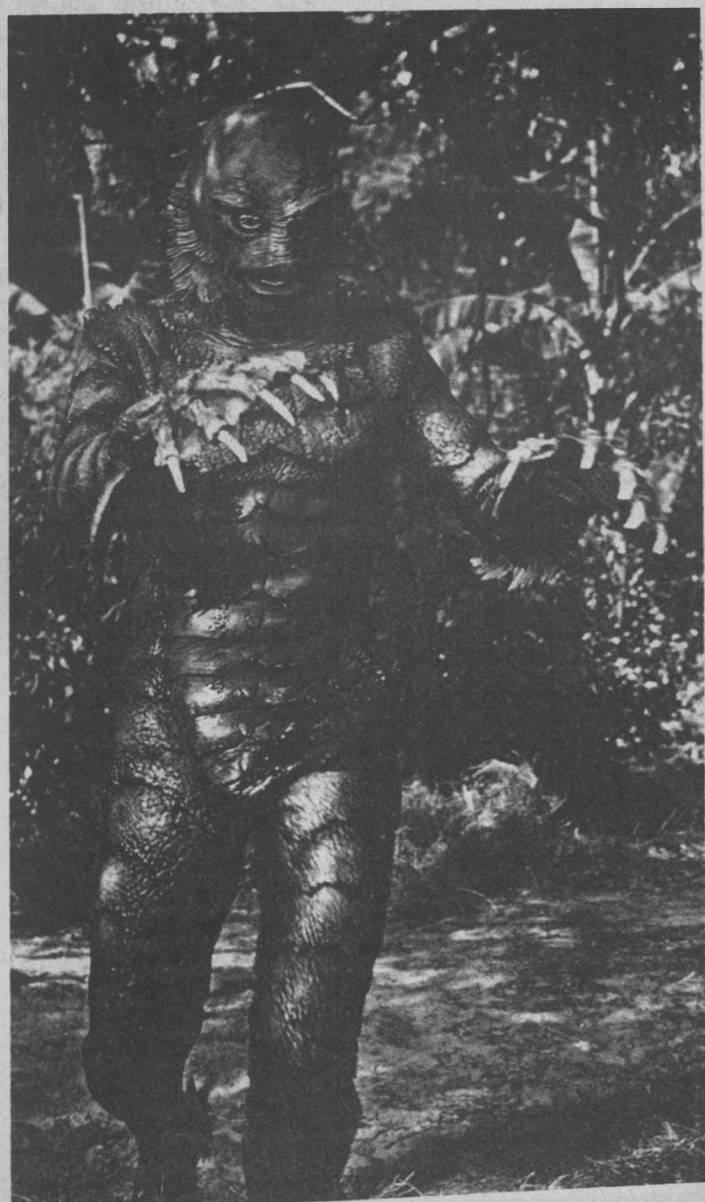
The "Spook Party Festival" is a series of cuts from several old horror movies and promises to be either a real thrill or a laugh riot.

Never have rehearsals seemed less like work than those for this week's Armstrong Masquers-Coastal Heritage Society dinner-theater performances of "From California to the New York Island", said Masquers Director John Suchower.

Even though he and cast members are in the midst of last-minute preparations for Wednesday's opening of this Woody Guthrie musical jamboree, Suchower added, "The cast hasn't even felt as if they have been rehearsing. It has just been a pleasure to get together to sing Guthrie's music and we hope the audience feels our enthusiasm."

The Armstrong State College Masquers and Coastal Heritage Society have linked efforts this year to offer playgoers a unique theater experience.

"California to the New York Island" will be presented Wednesday through Saturday nights at historic Fort Jackson, which is operated by the Society and located 2 1/2 miles east of downtown Savannah off the Islands Expressway.

The evenings' entertainment will begin with a 7:30 p.m. dinner at the fort. The menu includes seafood casserole or baked chicken, fruit salad, vegetables, bread and beverages.

Then the Armstrong Masquers will launch into their nostalgic and autobiographical portrayal of Guthrie's life and talent. The performance will intersperse narration with more than 30 of Guthrie's best-known ballads, including "This Land Is Your Land", "Roll On Columbia", "This Train Is Bound For Glory", and "Jackhammer John."

Armstrong graduate Dan Browning will play the role of Guthrie, with other cast members joining in for duets,

group sharing of verses, and chorus renditions of this folk singer's music.

Lyrics for several of Guthrie's best-known tunes will be included on the program, Suchower said, so that the audience can join in the singing and share in the sometimes moving, sometimes just plain fun of Guthrie's songs.

It is especially fitting that the Masquers chose to perform "From California to the New York Island" now, Suchower added, because this month marks the 10th anniversary of Guthrie's death.

And last week the Nashville Songwriters Assn. International Inducted Guthrie into its Hall of Fame.

"California to the New York Island" was first performed as a benefit for Guthrie's children while the folk singer was hospitalized with Huntington's disease. After his death in 1967, the show was performed three more times as a tribute to Guthrie before overflowing

audiences in Carnegie Hall and the Hollywood Bowl.

A drifter, political columnist and spokesman for countless thousands of hard pressed "Okies" moving westward during the Depression, Guthrie wrote more than 1,000 songs between 1932 and 1952. His music has influenced such artists as Bob Dylan, Joan Baez, Judy Collins, Jack Collins, Jack Elliott and Pete Seeger.

Dinner-theater tickets, at \$10 for the public and \$8 for Armstrong students, are available at the Armstrong Student Activities Office, 356-5300; The Armstrong Masquers Office, 356-5354; Fort Jackson, 232-3945, and all Savannah Bank and Trust Co. locations.

Due to dinner preparations, reservations can not be accepted and tickets will not be sold at the door on performance nights, but persons can purchase tickets by mail through Armstrong State College or Fort Jackson.

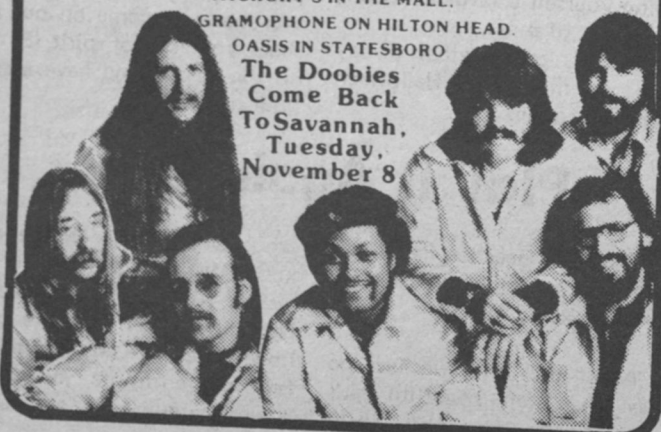

From Savannah Christian comes a guard, Margaret Zeigler. Susan Johnson from Bible Baptist adds another guard to the team. St. Vincent's Academy has contributed two new Lady Pirates, Linda Wolfe and Bernadette Hamilton.

Height is definitely a rare commodity on the Lady Pirates' squad, so the emphasis will be on a running, fast-break type offense.

Theresa McGrath, a 5'11" returning sophomore, who was being counted on heavily this season is ineligible Fall Quarter

but will add some much needed height following the Christmas Holidays.

Defense, the Lady Pirates' strong point in 1976-77, can again be expected to determine to a great degree on the success of the 1977-78 season.

The competition in the GAIW Small College Southern Division will be stiff with only four of the five teams qualifying for the State Tournament. The increase of eight new teams on the schedule and from four to ten home games in a schedule of twenty-one games coupled with the caliber of intercollegiate ball being played in Georgia add up to what is anticipated to be a very exciting season.
