Riot witness fears retaliation, won't go to police

ATLANTA (AP) — A young woman who refuses to go to police because she fears retaliation told an Atlanta television station Monday that she can identify those who severely beat and robbed a Stone Mountain man during downtown rioting two weeks ago.

The woman told WAGA-TV that Fred Schuttenberg was beaten by five men in downtown Atlanta during a riot April 30 in which blacks beat whites and vandalized businesses in response to the Rodney King police verdict in Los Angeles.

Schuttenberg, 45, was the most seriously injured in the confrontations and suffered severe head injuries.

She said she knows one of the attackers and could identify the others through mug shots or police lineups.

"I think they should pay for what they did," the woman said.

Surgeon General urges outcry over Crazy Horse brew

WASHINGTON (AP) — The surgeon general appealed Tuesday for a public outcry against brewers who she says target Indians, blacks and other minorities with high-alcohol products such as Crazy Horse malt liquor.

"Together we can do what none of us can do alone," Antonia Novello told a House committee. "We must tell the alcohol industry that we have had enough disease, enough disability, enough addiction, and enough death."

Indians have expressed outrage at the Hornell Brewing Co. for putting the name Crazy Horse, a revered Sioux leader, on the malt liquor being sold in several major urban areas.

Rep. Patricia Schroeder, who chaired the hearing by the Select Committee on Children, Youth and Families, said Congress needs to outlaw that kind of marketing.

The Colorado Democrat said the 40-ounce bottle of Crazy Horse malt liquor, which sells for \$2.15 in the Washington area, has more alcohol than a six-pack of beer.

"A free society requires freedom of choice in many areas, not the least of which is the consumer's right to select among products they find attractive or distasteful. They vote with their pocketbooks," said a letter from the alcohol beverage industry released by the committee.

Indian leaders told lawmakers the brew will worsen alcoholism among Indians. They added that Crazy Horse considered alcohol a scourge that would destroy Indian people.

"Imagine the outcry from the black community if a brewer were to market a liquor entitled, Martin Luther King Beer, or from the Christian community for a Jesus Christ White Wine," said Gregg Bourland, chairman of the Cheyenne River Sioux tribe in South Dakota.

Novello said Congress should give the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms the power to ban alcohol products that disparage cultural symbols and appeal to Indians and the urban poor.

Congress now forbids alcohol products from bearing the name of anyone who is alive. Rep. Frank Wolf, R-Va., suggested extending the ban to the names of dead people as well.

Sorority suspension lifted

Alpha Kappa Alpha will resume activities May 24

Alpha Kappa Alpha's temporary suspension of activities from campus due to hazing has been lifted, and the sorority will resume activities May 24, according to Alpha Kappa Alpha's Regional Director.

The chapter was under investigation for allegations of hazing. The investigation was completed about two weeks ago.

"The chapter was never suspended, only activities were suspended," said Vertille Middleton, Alpha Kappa Alpha South Atlantic Regional Director.

Middleton acknowledged that hazing did occur, but would not comment on the type of hazing or the individuals involved. "They will be dealt with," she said.

According to James Orr, associate dean of students, the

rules of the university regarding hazing were not violated, but the rules of the chapter were. "My involvement is very limited," Orr said. "It was not a major situation," he said.

Orr pointed out that the situation with Omega Psi Phi was entirely different. The university was involved; whereas the situation with Alpha Kappa Alpha is between the sorority and the national chapter.

Glenora Martin, the only advisor to Alpha Kappa Alpha, refused to comment on the matter.

Orr was not sure whether the sorority would be on probation. That decision is left up to the national chapter. "I have not been told of probation," he said.

"Alpha Kappa Alpha remains on campus, and I hope the campus will continue to

support Alpha Kappa Alpha," Middleton said.

According to Alpha Kappa Alpha President Tamiko Braswell, the sorority initiated 27 new members May 2.

The new members were recruited through rush, which consists of a series of interviews. The girls then go through a workshop which covers various areas such as the history, goals, and ideas of the sorority.

House candidate Jack Kingston visits Southern

GSU College Republicans welcomed Jack Kingston, a two term state representative from Savannah, who is running for the seat in the House of Representatives for Georgia's First Congressional District.

The seat was left vacant by U.S. Representative Lindsey Thomas' decision not to run for re-election. The First District includes Bulloch County.

Kingston called the race for the First Congressional District "a wide open race" with their being an Independent, close to ten Democrats, and two other Republicans in the race for the seat.

Furthermore with the government "four trillion dollars in debt, we need a balanced budget amendment," said Kingston. He also supports the line item veto for the President and believes taxes should stay at the current level.

Kingston told the group of the need "to get the government off the backs of small businesses."

He promised to work for more jail space.

On Wednesday, May 27, the College Republicans will welcome William Jolly, who is also running for the First Congressional seat.

Study: Cops in the South receive most complaints

WASHINGTON — Law enforcement agencies in the South were a major target of complaints to the federal government about police misconduct from 1984 to 1990, according to a Justice Department study made public Tuesday.

However, the study analyzed fragmentary data and has limited importance, department officials said.

Still, a House Judiciary Committee analyst said it does reveal "a real Southern cast. ... A lot of the police brutality problems appear to be in Southern and border states."

The study of 15,000 complaints made to the federal government over six years ranks the New Orleans Police Department first, with an average of 35 complaints a year.

The Jefferson Parish Sheriff's Office, in the New Orleans suburbs, ranked third, with

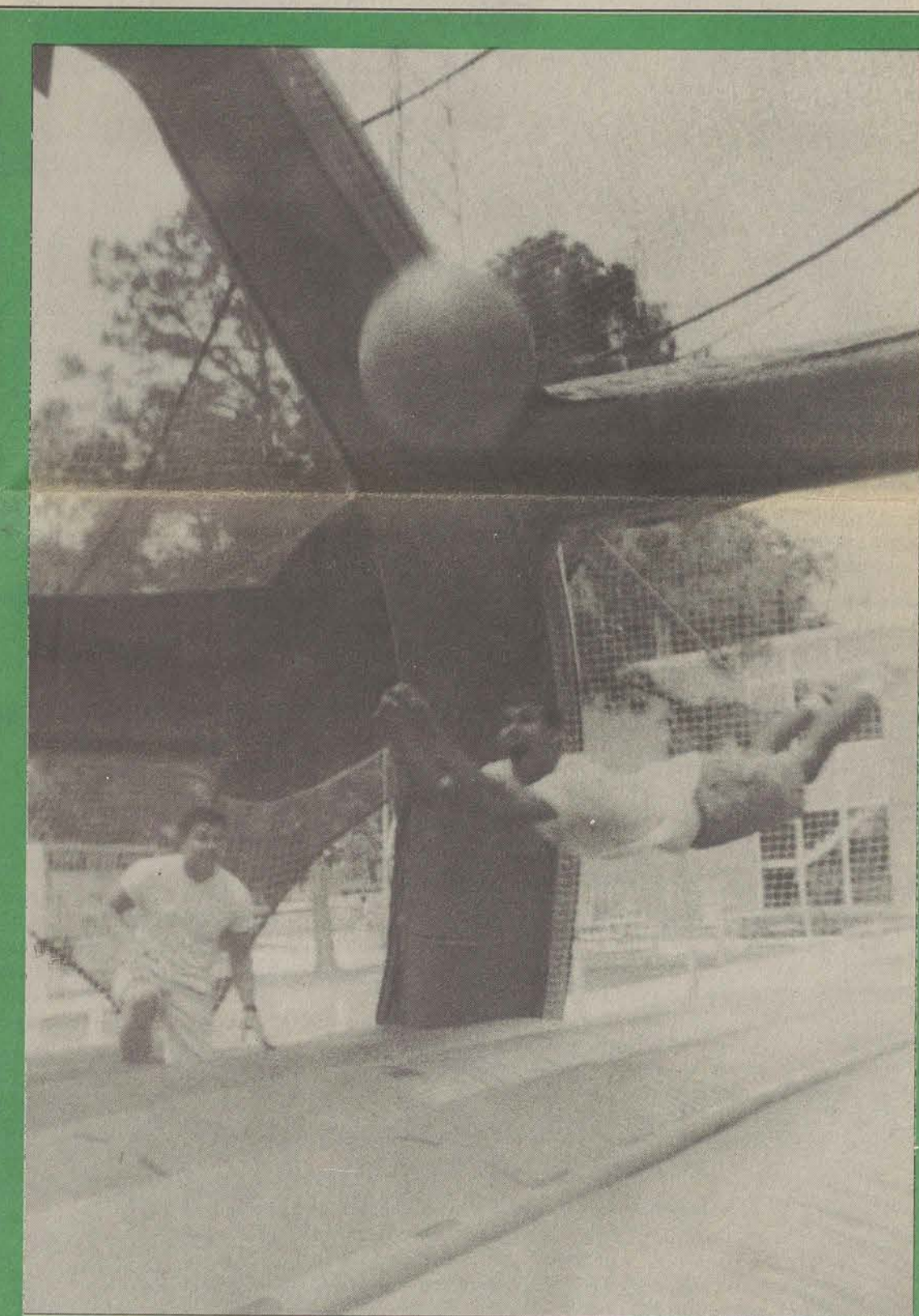
23 complaints annually. Police departments in three Texas cities — San Antonio (21), El Paso (18) and Houston (18) — were close behind. The average annual number of complaints for 187 law enforcement agencies was about five.

The Justice Department's civil rights division found no pattern in the statistics and warned against attaching great significance to them because the data do not indicate whether the complaints had merit or how flagrant the alleged violations were.

Moreover, department officials said they had not received a single complaint from about 75 percent of the nation's 16,000 law enforcement agencies during the six years studied.

The study covers only complaints made to the federal government and does not include

SCAD students want pledge waived

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) — Administrators at the nation's largest art school should waive a demand that a handful of student leaders sign a pledge before they'll be allowed to register for classes, the students said.

The Savannah College of Art and Design students said Friday they put their request in a letter to administrators. The letter asks administrators to waive the demand or explain why an agreement must be signed.

"Our hope is that people will be allowed to register without having to sign anything," said

graduate student Marissa Magaz, one of 10 students blocked from registering.

"It's just more or less asking for specifics," said student Charles Baughman.

The students declined to release a copy of the letter but said it was sent to school President Richard Rowan this week.

Rowan was out of town Friday and could not be reached for comment.

All of the targeted students led a campaign this spring to adopt a student constitution and form a student government at the private college.

School officials told students they would not be allowed to register until an investigation into an April 6 explosion on campus is completed.

Agents from the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms are investigating the small bomb, which injured no one and caused minor damage to a school building.

On May 4, Rowan sent the students a letter saying they could register only if they signed and notarized a statement agreeing they would be dismissed if they tried to block use of campus facilities or were

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At the movies: *Far and Away*, *Encino Man*, *Alien 3*

If you're really bored, these films will provide entertainment and a cold movie theater

Far and Away

Imagine "Ben Hur," "The Godfather" or "Lawrence of Arabia" with Tom Cruise in the lead roles instead of Charlton Heston, Marlon Brando and Peter O'Toole.

Preposterous, you say? No doubt.

The aforementioned are actors who fill a screen, who command attention and keep us riveted to an epic from beginning to end. Epics are, by definition, large in scale and demand large actors — actors of substance, of depth, technicians who can reach inside and get to the guts of a character and make it their own.

Here, then, is the problem with Ron Howard's lavish and lovingly filmed production, "Far and Away." He has cast two actors — Cruise and Nicole Kidman — who simply do not have the scope or abilities to carry an epic. And he does not have a strong enough support team to fill in the gaps.

Cruise fashions an Irish accent for his role of Joseph Donnelly, sounding like a reject from a Lucky Charms commercial. He also flexes his biceps and triceps and flashes that wonderful Cruise smile, but doesn't pump very much else into his portrayal. His cute looks aren't enough to overcome a superficial performance.

Kidman, an Australian actress who charmed American audiences in the thriller "Dead Calm," is delightful as Joseph's love, Shannon Christie, but gives a small-screen portrayal.

Strangely, this husband-wife team shows little on-screen chemistry, so we can't even look to that.

Written for the screen by Bob Dolman ("Willow"), "Far and Away" is based on a story by Dolman and Howard. It's set in the late 19th century, when the second wave of European immigrants hit the United States.

Joseph is a poor tenant farm boy, who uses his fists to settle all disputes real and imagined. Shannon is the privileged daughter of one of the most powerful landlords in the country.

Her father, Daniel Christie (Robert Prosky), has Joseph's farm burned to the ground once his father dies and Joseph loses his home. He sets out to seek his revenge against Christie, is caught and held for hanging and wind ups falling in love with the highly independent and neo-feminist Shannon.

Shannon yearns to leave the restrictive society of Protestant Ireland for the glorious adventures of the American West. She dreams of owning her own farm near a gurgling river in Oklahoma where, she's been told, the government is just giving away the land.

On a misty morn, as Joseph faces Shannon's spurned love, Stephen (Thomas Gibson), with dueling pistols, she emerges from the fog in a buggy and hustles him off to a steamer about to leave for the United States.

They arrive in Boston only to have Shannon's pilfered savings stolen. To support them, Joseph becomes a bar-room boxer. The Christies, meanwhile, are burned out of their home by Catholic rebels and journey to Boston with Stephen to save Shannon.

Joseph's pride and his insane jealousy of Shannon cause him to lose his fight money and his boxing gig. The two are thrown out of the brothel where they rent a room and cast out to the snowy Boston streets.

Shannon is shot one night after she and Joseph seek refuge in what they believe to be an empty mansion. But Joseph sees to it that her life is saved by taking her to her parents.

Slowly, they make their ways across America — Joseph building the rails for the trains that carry the affluent Christies.

They all turn up for the Oklahoma land rush and race to their destinies.

Howard is wonderful with romance and relationships, as he's demonstrated in such movies as "Cocoon" and "Parenthood." He also artfully films the beautiful vistas of the Irish coast and the expansive American Plains.

But as pretty as "Far and Away" is (filmed in the new Panavision 70 camera equipment), it does little to move us — emotionally or intellectually, and winds up being little more than a watered-down brew of "Wuthering Heights" and "Cimarron."

And that's too bad, because Howard's was a noble effort. His prime failure, though, was in weak casting.

"Far and Away" is an Imagine Films Entertainment and Universal Pictures production and is rated PG-13 for some violence, blood and adult situations.

Encino Man

Are kids in Southern California really a bunch of twits who think school is a place to chill until the afternoon comes, who have no ambitions in life except to excel in stupidity? Or is Hollywood doing a disservice to American youth with its unfortunate chain of moronic teen flicks?

Whatever the answer, check out Hollywood Pictures' "Encino Man" only if you're 12 years old or your IQ runs in double digits.

Here's the skinny: After a minor earthquake, a geek named Dave Morgan (Sean Astin) finds a slab of ice in the pit he's digging in his parents' backyard for a swimming pool. Frozen inside is a prehistoric man.

So Dave and his friend, Stoney Brown (a throwback to Haight-Ashbury), set up electric heaters in the garage and defrost the turkey ... er, the caveman ... who blinks awake as the last piece of ice cracks.

While Dave and Stoney are in school learning about the Ice Age (in an elementary lesson usually reserved for grade schoolers), the caveman heads straight for the Morgan house and engages in some high-level trashing. \$Adv00<

Dave and Stoney (Pauly Shore) return just in time to hear the smoke alarm go off — our cave bud has attempted to make a fire by rubbing two sticks together, as in the legs of a chair.

But after a serious bath and makeover, Link (Brendan Fraser), as they dub him, emerges as a righteous dude and becomes a hit at the local high school.

There's not much of a plot, just a series of happenings involving friendship, the idea of family and fun — oh, and females. Pretty females. And, of course, there's the usual bully irritant who gets his in the end.

Fortunately, there are one or two genuine laughs and one or two cute gags, especially Link's leap from the balcony and a scene in an East L.A. bar.

Director Les Mayfield and producer George Zaloom make their feature-film debut with "Encino Man." And it is surprising that these two filmmakers, who won Cable TV's Ace Award for the estimable "Hearts of Darkness: A Filmmaker's Apocalypse," could stoop to lazy filmmaking with "Encino Man."

They use every cinematic cliché, including the all-purpose Hollywood SCREAM. This little device is used to express fear, shock, surprise or pain, and usually is employed by filmmakers too lazy or unventive to find some good dialogue or interesting action. Just count the screams in John Hughes' "Home Alone."

Come on, fellas, give it a rest!

But take heart, Disney stockholders, this little flick is going to make a fortune and keep legions of teen-agers in air-conditioned splendor this summer. And parents, even if it is a dumb movie, it has a PG rating so your kids won't hear any of those nasty words they already know.

Alien 3

When Ridley Scott came out with his cleverly crafted

"Alien" in 1979, the movie proved to be one of the scariest and most intelligent sci-fi flicks around. It breathed an industrial darkness and blended human and mechanical elements, and John Hurt's on-screen birth got the attention of men everywhere.

Its sequel in 1986, "Aliens," was almost as frightening as the original, and won an Academy Award for special visual effects.

Now comes "Alien3," and the magic definitely is gone. The scare factor is down to zero and the predictability level has risen to 10.

David Fincher, whose film credits have been limited to TV commercials and music videos, uses the same camera tricks over and over — most notably when he tracks with the beast through labyrinthine passageways. And he directs with such slowness that you almost wish the alien would gobble up everybody and get it over with so you can go home.

The story picks up where "Aliens" left off: Ripley (Sigourney Weaver) is on her way back to Earth after battling the mother Alien. She's locked in her sleep chamber on board a spacecraft that also carries a young survivor from the planet ravaged by the alien and two of Ripley's crew, including the android Bishop.

But the sleep pod is ejected from the mothership and crash lands on Fiorina 161, a lice-infested gloomy planet that houses a refinery and a maximum-security prison. Ripley, the only woman on board, also is the only survivor of the crash.

A bleak outlook – for now

Two universities have released studies on the job market prospects of college graduates, and the future looks bleak. Studies by Northwestern and Michigan State universities show a 30 percent decrease in available jobs since 1989 – meaning nearly one out of three jobs have disappeared. And almost 1 million experienced professionals and managers now looking for jobs were laid off during the recession.

With all the gloom-and-doom talk from economists, a student would rightfully feel a job search is futile – but that's just not the case. A University study on the state's job markets gives heartening news:

- Atlanta is recovering faster economically than the rest of the state and the nation.
- During the next year, non-farm jobs are expected to increase by 15,000. Those openings are mostly in food and paper-products production.

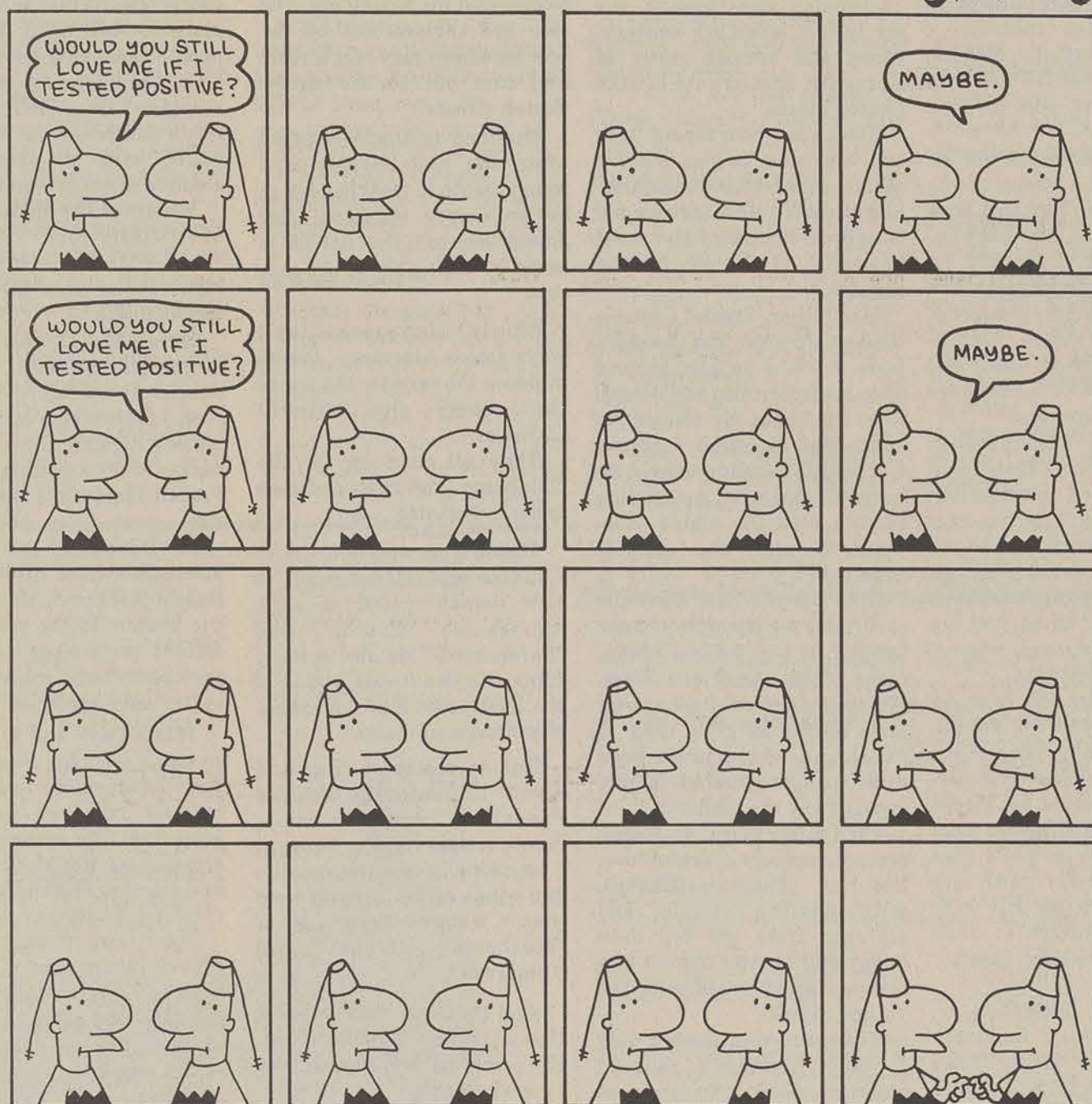
The Michigan State report, which compares the number of available jobs to the number of available graduates applying, says technical areas have more jobs than applicants. Nearly 45 percent of this year's 1.1 million graduates are in technical fields. Unfortunately, 42 percent of graduates are in social sciences and communications – two areas with more graduates than jobs.

There's a plethora of liberal arts majors. many graduates are choosing graduate school to delay entering the job market. Graduate applications have risen as much as 75 percent in the last year at some schools. The result: tougher standards, fewer admissions.

For those about to graduate, job prospects in the South, Southwest and Northwest are expected to be better than in any other area in the nation. So the old "no geographical preference" line will take on new significance for those unable to get jobs in the South. But the good news is the recession may finally be over.

When the administration was deciding who to invite to speak at June's graduation ceremonies, there were probably a couple of criteria they were looking at.

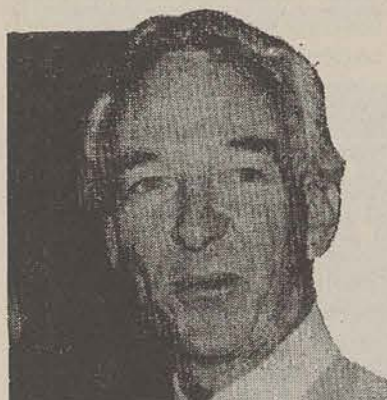

I think the reasoning behind Fowler's yearning to speak at GSU this year is simple: it's an election year.

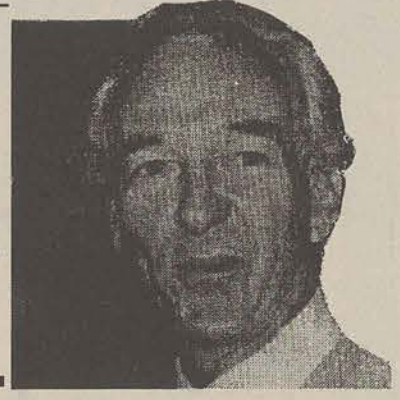
For more than 20 years, Fowler has lived the life of a professional politician on the extreme liberal left of the Democratic Party, expanding

Restroom encounters shouldn't happen, but are symptoms of larger problem

Dear Editor,

I am writing in response to Kennedy Ward's "Counterpoint" in your May 19 issue.

Triangle, GSU's lesbian, gay and bisexual student organization, officially states its distress with the situation and reminds the straight community of Mr. Ward's own statement: "No person should have to meet individuals in a public restroom for sex."

It is important to note, however, that though I am co-chair of Triangle, I am writing this letter as an individual, not as a representative of that group. Incidentally, I hold the same opinion.

So, Mr. Ward, welcome to the Real World. "Public bathroom sex," as you call it, exists in every reasonably sized city in this country, and around the world.

As "repulsive," "perverse," or "bothersome" as you or I or

anyone else may find this behavior, it is reality.

I would venture to say it exists more as a symptom of a larger problem than as the problem itself.

Ask yourself: Do we really live in a society so repressive that young homosexuals are actually frightened to let anyone, often even their own families, know who they are?

Do we really live in a society that would rather have its people "cruising" college restrooms than make it a little easier for them to come out, be proud, and make themselves happy without the anonymous sexual encounters in bathrooms, parks or wherever?

GSU's administration has done its part by adding "sexual orientation" to the university's anti-discrimination clause and continuing to support Triangle. Triangle is doing its part by offering support to gay students,

educating straight ones, and continuing to support community and university programs.

For the most part, GSU's heterosexual student population seems receptive. In fact, a new campus organization is forming for heterosexuals who are supportive of the lesbian and gay community.

Unfortunately, however, homophobia (irrational, unfounded fear of gay people) is still widespread, even on this campus.

Mr. Ward is a good example of this.

Another purpose of this letter is to object to his word choice at several points in the column. Despite his early disclaimer that he was not writing to "condemn homosexuality," he uses several words and phrases in which he does just that, promoting that unfortunate social disease, homophobia.

Assuming that Mr. Ward is heterosexual (not always a safe assumption, but I'll go with it), I daresay he knows little or nothing about gay sex.

Therefore his hypothetical image of it as "barbaric" seems ridiculous. If he meant that the time or place would be barbaric (and I doubt that this was his reference), he should have qualified the statement.

Also, Mr. Ward, be very cautious when referring to an individual as "deviant." If gay people are deviant because we are outside the mainstream, then I for one will happily embrace the term.

However, if you add to the definition a negative connotation, then you are likely to piss off many other groups of "deviants" - anyone from a "Jew for Jesus," to a neo-Nazi, to a college professor with innovative teaching techniques.

One last note, Mr. Ward: according to Ruth Ann Rogers, assistant to Dr. Henry, the problem is principally from off-campus people.

So, I am certainly not writing this letter to condone sexual activity in the Administration building; nev-

ertheless, I am writing to denounce the opinion of so many people that gay men have anonymous sex in bathrooms because they enjoy the ambience.

Gun control complicated

In regards to Jason Lewis' "Points to Ponder" article on April 17, it is too bad he did not do more homework on the subject of gun control.

If he would have, he would have known that the Supreme Court ruled (in June 1990) that the National Guard is formed under the clause of the Constitution that allows the Congress to raise and support armies, not under the clause that allows the Congress to organize, arm and discipline the militia (Article I, Section 8, Paragraph 16).

This case was an attempt by certain state governors to block the Defense Department from using the National Guard for overseas training in Honduras.

Also, in Feb. 1990, the Supreme Court held that the words "the people" used in the Second Amendment meant exactly the same as the words

"the people" in the First, Fourth, Ninth, and Tenth Amendments. This means that the Second Amendment is not a collective right but an individual right of each and every person.

The problem with waiting periods is that (1) the police do not have the manpower to do the job they have to do now, (2) records dealing with a person's mental state are privileged and would not be revealed on a background check, and (3) this puts the law abiding citizen at the mercy of a bureaucrat who has his own agenda concerning gun control.

The way the present background check proposals are now written, even if you pass the background check you can be denied the right to purchase the firearm. In what way is that fair?

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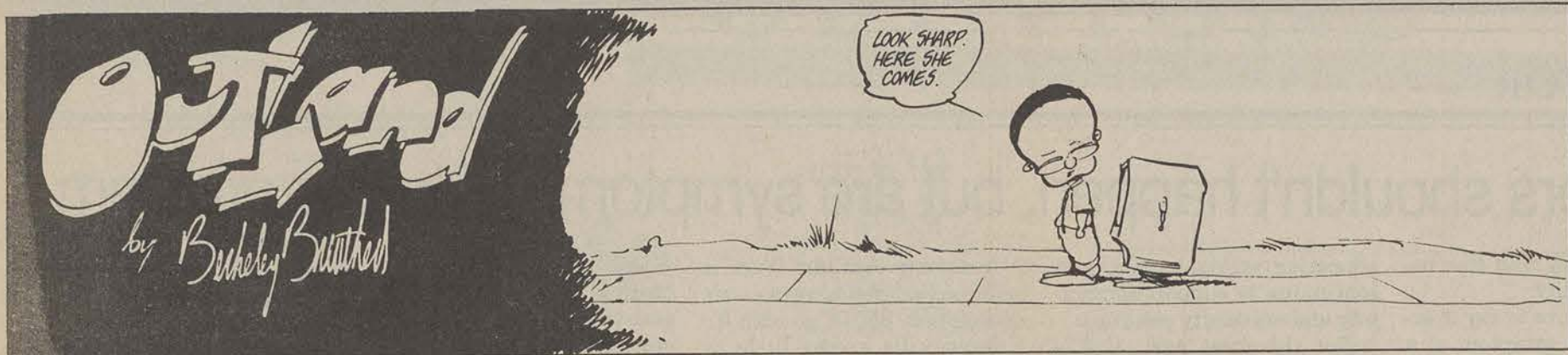
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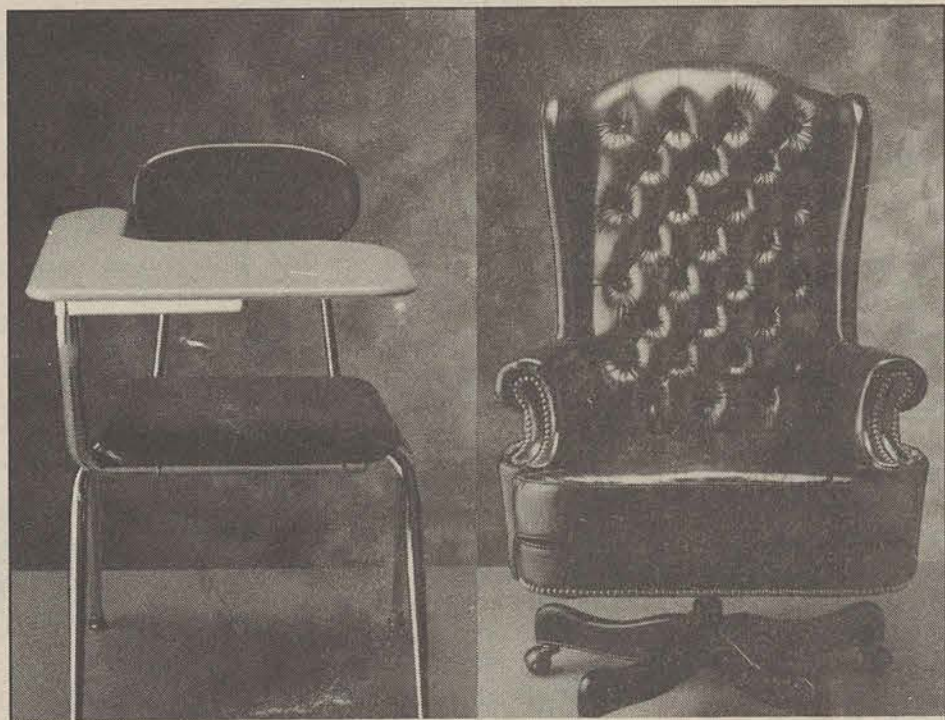

Angeles Police Department 11th, with an average of 14 complaints a year, although law professor James Fyfe, an expert in police use of force, has identified Los Angeles as "the outlaw among big American police departments" for several years.

However, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Office ranked second, with an average of 34 complaints a year. Newspaper surveys have documented a serious excessive-force problem in the county. Over a three-year period that ended in September 1989, Los Angeles County settled 61 such cases for payments ranging from \$20,000 to \$1.75 million.

Among other big-city police departments, Chicago's (17 complaints a year) ranked seventh, St. Louis' (15) was eighth, New York's (14) was 10th and Dallas' (12) was 13th. Philadelphia and

Miami averaged eight complaints a year.

But when complaints were measured against population and numbers of arrests and employees, many large cities ranked far lower, while some smaller ones produced "a disproportionately high number of complaints for the size of their police departments."

For example, New York was 10th in average number of complaints but 142nd in a complaints-to-arrests ratio.

At the same time, the police department in Darby, Pa., ranked 82nd in the raw number of complaints but placed first in numbers of complaints per employee, fourth in the ratio of complaints to population and eighth in the proportion of complaints to arrests.
