supposed to be in is next door (English 111) and this is English 400? Do you remember how long it took you to find the restrooms? Do you remember how embarrassing it was to ask anyone for directions? ("Wow -- you must be a freshman!")

If you are able to dredge up from your memory any of the above painful situations, please remember to be nice to first quarter freshmen. If they ask you where Solms Hall is, don't give them withering looks or guffaw in their faces -- tell them where Solms Hall is. Don't tell them that the new student center is for seniors only or that they have to show their I.D.s to get into their classes.

Fall Registration Drops

Fall quarter, 1977 the number of students registered at ASC totaled 3159. Fall quarter, 1978 saw a drop of 1 or 2%. The number of undergraduate students registered at ASC this fall totals approximately 3075-80.

Mr. George Hunnicut, Registrar, lays some of the blame on the fact that about 200 students who had applied did not receive their BEOG money because of a cutback in funds. The graduate enrollment however, remains about the same as last year with about 325 to 330 students registering.

When asked about the parking problem Mr. Hunnicut stated that he believes that within a few weeks the parking should not be so bad. Mr. Hunnicut also expresses his appreciation to the students for their cooperation during registration including the sometimes long wait in lines.

Minors In History and Political Science

As in the case of many other colleges around the country it is now possible for a student at Armstrong to take a minor in either History or Political Science. In History the requirement is twenty-hours (20) of upper division History courses (300 level) with grades of "C" or better. In Political Science a minor requires twenty hours of upper division Political Science courses (with grades of "C" or better) with one course in each of the four special areas noted in the catalog description of the major. A student who has minored in History or Political Science will have a notation certifying the minor on his/her college transcript.

In today's competitive job market the notation of a History

or Political Science minor should give an added dimension to a student's job application by showing to an employer that the applicant has received extra training in research and writing skills. The research skills which the two minors will help to develop would be especially useful to a student interested in attending graduate school or intent on pursuing a research oriented career in private business or in government service. If you do not wish to have your information in the Directory, notify Student Affairs by Oct. 30, 1978.

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specific fields may take the National Teacher Examinations on any of three different test dates in 1978-79. Educational Testing Service, the nonprofit, educational organization that administers this testing program, said today that the tests will be given November 11, 1978, February 17, 1979 and July 21, 1979, at test centers throughout the United States.

Results of the National Teacher Examinations are considered by many large school districts as one of several factors in the selection of new teachers and used by several states for the credentialing of teachers or licensing of advanced candidates. Some colleges require all seniors preparing to teach to take the examinations.

On each full day of testing, registrants may take the Common Examinations, which measure their professional preparation and general educational background, and/or an Area Examination that measures their mastery of the subject they expect to teach.

TEST DATES CONTINUED

Prospective registrants should contact the school systems in which they seek employment, their colleges, or appropriate educational association for advice about which examinations to take and when to take them.

The Bulletin of Information contains a list of test centers and general information about the examinations, as well as a registration form. Copies may be obtained from college placement officers, school personnel departments, or directly from National Teacher Examinations, Box 911, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey 08541.

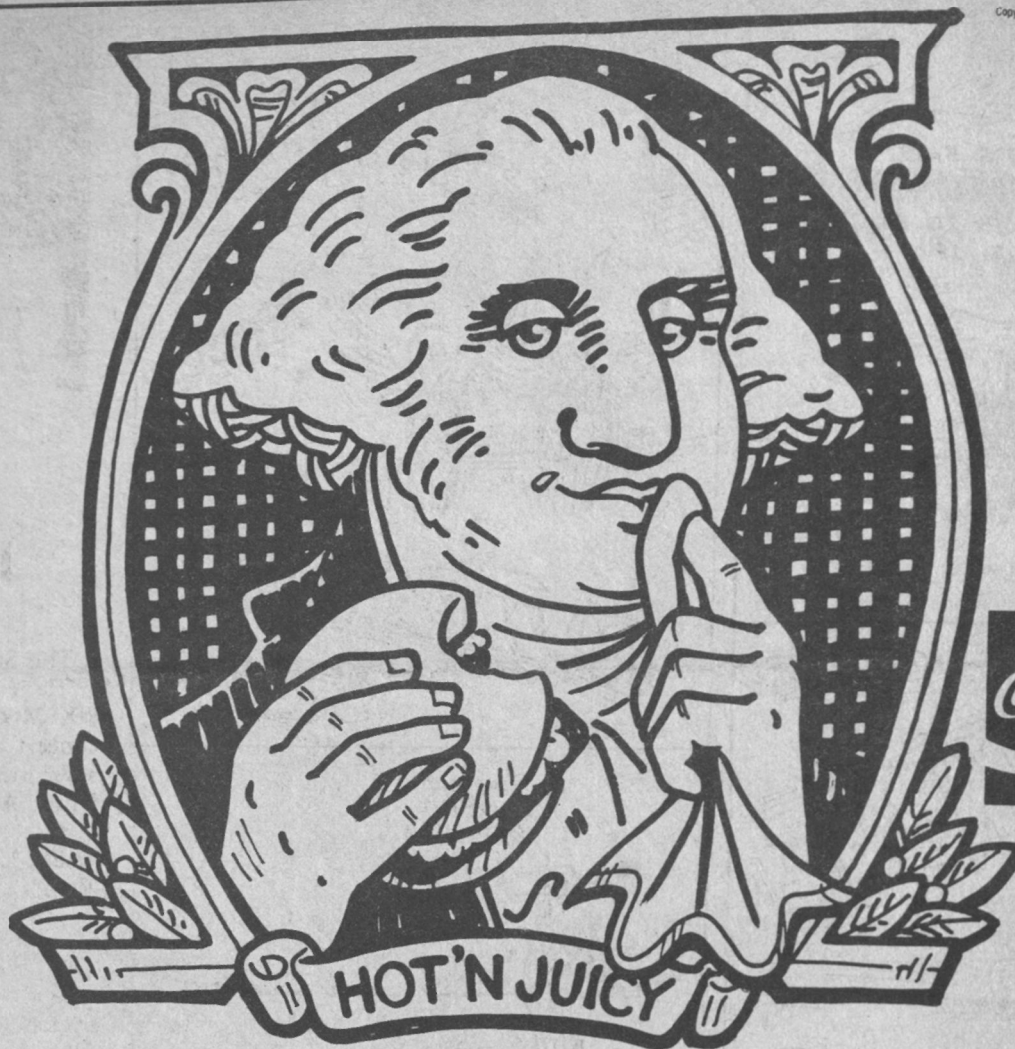
