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Students Sought To Form Charter

A group of ASC students is needed to be a charter forming group of Omicron Delta Kappa National Leadership Honor Society. ASC is petitioning the Society for charter, and many students will find an opportunity to form a brand new chapter or circle.

The five major phases of campus life on which acceptance in the society stems are: 1) scholarship, 2) athletics, 3) social, service, religious

activities, and campus government, 4) journalism, speech and the mass media, 5) creative and performing arts. Each student will be chosen on his own merits in at least three of these phases. One can see that this type of acceptance standard allows for a large, diversified group of ASC student leaders from all aspects of campus life.

Omicron Delta Kappa places emphasis upon the development of the whole person, both as a

present member of his college community and as a prospective contributor to a better society. The Society believes that while good scholarship and intellectual development are the chief objectives of college years, the life of the mind is not the only life students will have to cope with as a result of their college

experience. It is not enough to be merely a "scholar," other indispensable qualities have to be cultivated also. Omicron Delta Kappa believes that the real search for truth, the promotion of good will, the development of consideration and understanding good taste, and a sense of honor, learning

how to get along and cooperation with others, and the assumption of duty and responsibility are important lessons and personal qualities which one learns and develops through an integrated program of academic and extracurricular education.

SGA Election Results

In last week's SGA elections Andrea Etersque was elected Vice-President. Out of the 259 voters cast, Miss Etersque received 166 votes, 64% of the ballots, beating out Willie Tuten for the job. Tuten received 93 votes, 36% of all votes cast.

In the race for Treasurer Fred Newlin emerged with 93 votes, 36% of all those cast. Fran George followed with 84 votes, 33% of those cast. Steve Knapp received 46 votes, 18% of those cast, while 13% of those who voted cast their ballots for Louis Reisman, who got 34 votes. There will be a run-off election in two weeks between Newlin and George for the Treasurer's position.

CHAOS Informs New Student

CHAOS - Communication, Help, Assistance, Orientation and Services is a Freshman Orientation program geared towards informing new college students about Armstrong and helping them adjust to college life. This program is organized by administrators and a selected group of students. Before the summer CHAOS sessions begin, the leaders attend about five training classes. Here the students learn information about all aspects of Armstrong to enable them to answer just about any questions the incoming freshmen could have. The actual CHAOS sessions are held during the summer on Fridays from 1:00 until 5:00. There are approximately five sessions, depending on the number of freshmen enrolling.

During the CHAOS session the freshmen are first introduced and welcomed to Armstrong by a faculty member. Knowing the apprehensions the new students have, the CHAOS leaders lead the students in a few fun, get-acquainted exercises. After everyone has loosened up, the students are divided into small groups. Each leader leads his or her group in an informal informational question and answer session. Here the leader discusses the college life of Armstrong with the students. The CHAOS leader explains such things to the freshmen as how to register for classes, the college Honor Code, drop and add procedures, the various services available to the student on the many opportunities available for student involvement in organizations (service and social) on campus. Many other areas of the college and its policies are covered in this information session. After all questions have been answered, the freshmen go to their various departments for faculty advisement. Here their fall schedules are compiled. The students return their schedule cards, have their I.D. pictures made and the CHAOS Orientation Session is over. The freshmen are encouraged to maintain contact with their leader after the CHAOS session

so that they will be able to rely on a familiar face when they have questions concerning Armstrong or any aspect of college life.

The CHAOS program gives the freshmen confidence in themselves when fall quarter begins. They already are familiar with the college's policies and procedures and with the campus and buildings. Hopefully, during CHAOS the students have made some friends and as a result the college atmosphere will not seem quite so foreign. Also, CHAOS gives the new students a chance to get involved in the various activities by providing them with information on the college newspaper, yearbook, student government, service clubs, fraternities and sororities.

If you are interested in assisting new students make the transition to college life, sign up to be a CHAOS leader for these summer sessions. Applications are being accepted by Ms. Benson in the Counseling and Placement Office in Room 5 of the Administration Building. To qualify to be a leader, you must have completed 45 quarter hours by summer quarter, have a 2.0 grade point average, enjoy working with people, and generate enthusiasm about Armstrong.

The End Of The Line

Don't ever let anyone tell you that the last quarter of college before your graduation is going to be easy. I am now in the process of discovering — daily — the horrors of being a graduating senior. If I hadn't been "wise" and taken part of my exit examinations in December, I really would be in trouble now. I hope to be able to warn people to avoid the situation into which I placed myself. A Campaign Speech

Because of the fact that I was unopposed in the election for SGA President at Armstrong, I did not have to campaign. I was deprived of the chance to give rousing campaign speeches, plaster posters on the walls and shake hands with potential voters. Of course, a speech about my qualifications for President of the Student Body, or about what a fantastic person I am, or about my campaign promises is irrelevant, now. So, I would like to take this opportunity to convince the students of

Armstrong of the importance of your Student Government.

It seems to be the prevailing attitude across the nation on some college campuses that Student Government is not necessary. This attitude hit very close to home when the University of Georgia elected an abolitionist candidate for SGA President and then voted by referendum to abolish their Student Government. (It must be noted that very few students voted in the election.) The students at the University felt that the SGA was ineffective, so they got rid of it. Personally, I agree with the Georgia student who wrote a letter to the editor of the RED & BLACK campus newspaper saying that the SGA may have been merely a whisper before but its abolishment made the students completely mute! I feel that the Student Government Association definitely has a loud voice at Armstrong State College. Otherwise, I would not have signed the intent to run for President.

I can give you many examples of the input that the SGA has on campus. The entire Student Activity Fee (\$12.50 per student) is budgeted by the Student Finance Committee with the approval of the Student Senate. That will be about \$80,000 spent on this campus next year. Students, through the SGA, decide how the money will be spent. We are very lucky at Armstrong to have this power. The only other school in our system that I know of that is allowed to allocate their fees completely is Georgia Tech. An ineffective student government would not be able to handle the responsibility and it would be placed in the hands of the administration.

Another area where students have direct input into college affairs is through the Faculty / Student Committees which deal with areas such as athletics and curriculum. The students that serve on these committees are appointed by the vice president and curriculum. The students

that serve on these committees are appointed by the vice president of the student government with the approval of the Senate. Without this process the students would have to be hand-picked by the administration.

Armstrong's student power extends to the Board of Regents for the University System of Georgia. This is possible through our current SGA President, John Opper, who was elected chairman of the Student Advisory Council for the 33 institutions in Georgia. As SAC chairman John has attended every meeting of the Board of Regents this year in Atlanta. He is allowed to speak for the students of Georgia at these meetings. As SGA Vice President I also attend the SAC meetings each quarter with the other college and university SGA officers. Needless to say, schools like the University of Georgia no longer have SAC representatives.

The list of student government advantages goes on and on, but I will stop here in the interest of time. A good political candidate should never let a speech go beyond the saturation point of his listeners. But I would like to close by saying that Student Government is YOUR voice at Armstrong. Of course, there is always room for improvement. If you have suggestions or would like to see Student Government in action, the Student Senate meets on Thursdays at 12:30 on the second floor of Memorial College Center. The Student Government offices are also located there. The SGA wants the student vote of confidence. We are working for you.

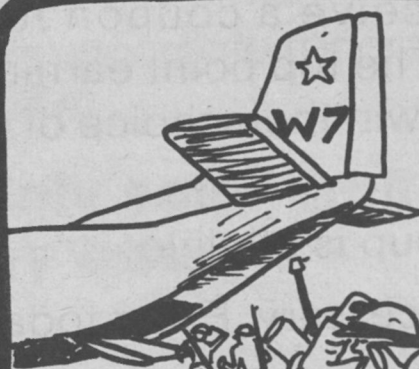

What are we here for? Over and over people have written to the "Inkwell" telling me "why

don't you shut up and mind your own business, we are here to get an Education and don't have time for the silly tripe you put out!" O.K. No more silly "tripe." Now tell me this, what kind of "Education" are you looking for?

The term education implies many things. Where do we as students stand in regards to our understanding of what education really is? Fortunately, Armstrong has a small enough student teacher ratio that many of our professors can appeal to the interests of individuals and instill in students a desire to learn rather than sit back and be taught. However, the sole responsibility is not the professors. The student too should try to aid the professor (in his task to educate), through careful self examination. After all, we are paying for what we get. Don't we owe it to ourselves to get our money's worth?

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Vacationing Students Get Emergency Cash Fast

If you and your friends are heading down to Florida over spring break, here's a quiz to test your vacation disaster preparedness. What would you do if:

You check out of your motel room and learn that the bill comes to more than your combined cash reserves.

Your wallet disappears on the beach.

You get an expensive speeding ticket, and the sheriff

says it's cash or the weekend in jail.

The transmission falls out of your car.

Answer: If you suddenly need more money than you've got, there's a Western Union money transfer service called Charge Card Money Order that can help you get emergency cash in a hurry. All you need is a telephone and a relative or understanding friend who has a Master Charge or VISA card.

Here's how it works: First, you call your relative or friend and explain how much money you need. You can get up to \$300 with this service. The Master Charge or VISA cardholder calls Western Union's toll-free number and charges the cash you need to his or her account. The toll-free number is 800/325-60000.

Western Union sends the Money Order to the office or agency nearest you. Make sure your rescuer phones you back to tell you where to pick up your Money Order. If you've lost your identification, test questions may be substituted. You usually can cash it right at the Western Union Office.

Two-Hour Delivery

If your Charge Card Money Order is sent when the paying office is open, you'll get your money within two hours - and usually much sooner than that.

A Charge Card Money Order for up to \$50 costs \$6.75, plus the cash requested. The fee rises 75 cents for each additional \$50 to a maximum of \$10.50 for a \$300 Money Order, and the convenience certainly makes it worthwhile. The Money Order and service charge will be billed

on your benefactor's monthly Master Charge or VISA statement.

If you need more than \$300, or if you can't locate someone with a Master Charge or VISA card, you can still request a regular Western Union Money Order. They are available in amounts from \$50 up to any amount, but the sender must deposit the money at a Western Union office. The charge for a

\$50 Money Order is \$5.70, and it rises as the amount increases.

Whenever you're away from home, a Western Union Charge Card Money Order can be your solution to problems ranging from a lost ticket or a broken down transmission to a pickpocket or an unexpected traffic fine. Knowing about Charge Card Money Orders, you can concentrate on enjoying your holiday to the fullest.

Navy Nurse Corps

Navy nurse corps officers are registered nurses responsible for the total care of patients, management and supervision of wards, and supervision and instruction of Navy Hospital Corps personnel.

The education requirements for Nurse Corps is that one be a graduate of a nursing education program of at least 108 academic weeks duration accredited by a state or the National League of Nursing at the time the applicant completed the program. He or she must have current registration in at least one state and be a citizen of the U.S. or an alien graduate nurse of an approved school of nursing in the U.S., Canada, or Puerto Rico, who is residing in the U.S.

and has filed a declaration of intent to become a U.S. citizen.

The age limits are at least 20 but not over 29 for appointment to ensign; 33 for appointments to lieutenant (Junior grade) of 35 to lieutenant. Training starts at the Officer Indoctrination School, Newport, Rhode Island after which there is a three year active duty obligation.

Navy Nurse Corps Officers earn competitive salaries plus non-taxable allowances for subsistence and living quarters. Other special duty pay and bonuses help to increase the lucrative take home pay.

EPA Relaxes Ozone Standard

Blasted by accusation that it responded to undue industry pressure, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has eased the smog standard for U.S. cities, despite earlier remarks by a top EPA official that industry was using "gross distortion and exaggeration" to obtain changes in the Clean Air Act. EPA's administrator Douglas Costle announced in late January that the air could contain 0.12 parts per million of ozone, a major smog component, rather than 0.08 parts per million allowed since 1971. New health research data, not industry pressure, brought about the revisions, Costle insisted. He contended that the new standard still

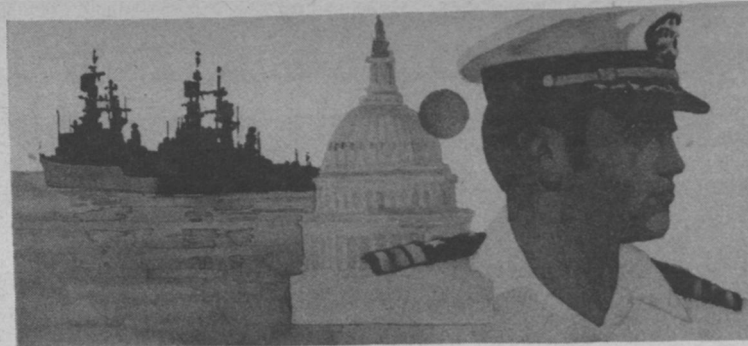
permits a safe health margin. The new allowance means that 20 of the nation's 105 urban areas would have "acceptable" smog levels. Before the relaxation, only two, Honolulu, HI and Spokane, WA, passed the cleanliness test. The compromise standard does not please the petroleum industry, which wants a greater relaxation. nor environmentalists, who say it will hurt those most sensitive to smog, the young and the old, as well as those who suffer from respiratory illnesses. The American Petroleum Institute has filed suit against EPA to try to overturn the new standard.

Steel Shot Regulations Issued

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is proposing regulations for the use of nontoxic steel shot in parts of 32 states for the 1979 fall waterfowl season. The zones where steel rather than lead shot will be required are nearly the same as those designated in 1978, except for changes in Florida, Michigan, Connecticut, New York and New Jersey. According to the Service, the shift to steel shot is necessary because each year an estimated two million waterfowl die of lead poisoning in the United States after eating spent lead shot mistaken for seed or grit. Last year the U.S. Congress gave states the prerogative of enforcing steel shot regulations, but that provision expires September 30 of this year. The latest proposals will go into effect this fall unless Congress extends the restrictions. During the 1979 season, steel shot will be required only in 12-gauge shotguns. However, beginning with the 1980 season, it must be used in all gauges and in all zones. Detailed descriptions of the steel shot zones for 1979 are available from Fish and Wildlife Service regional offices.

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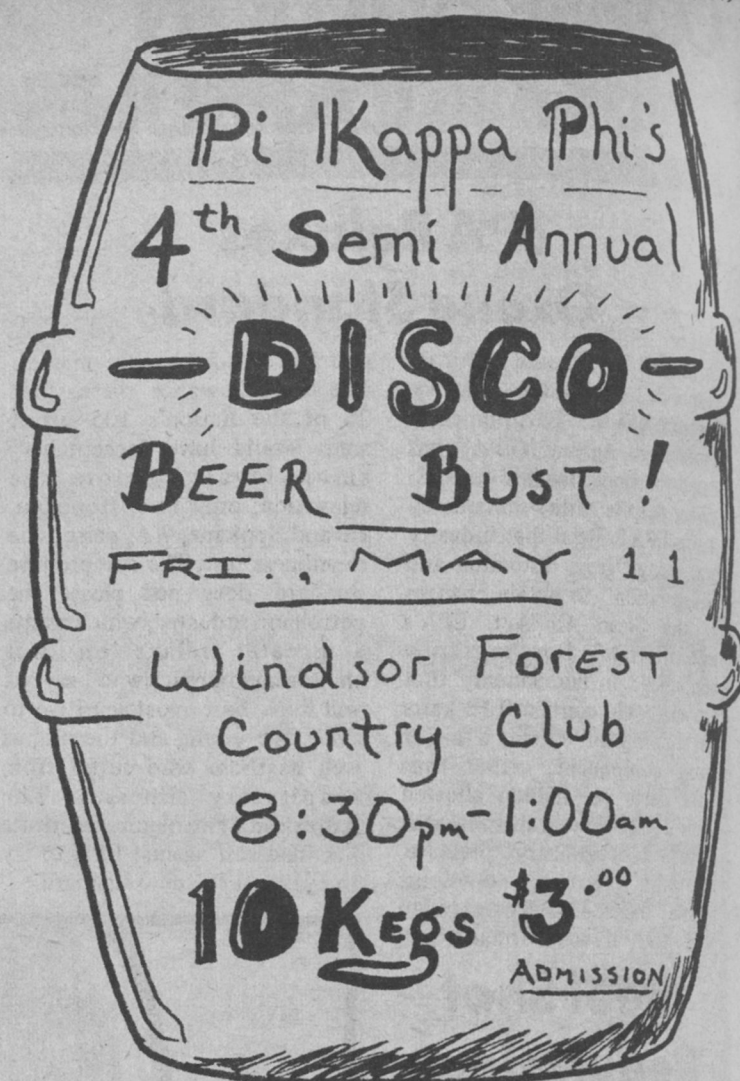
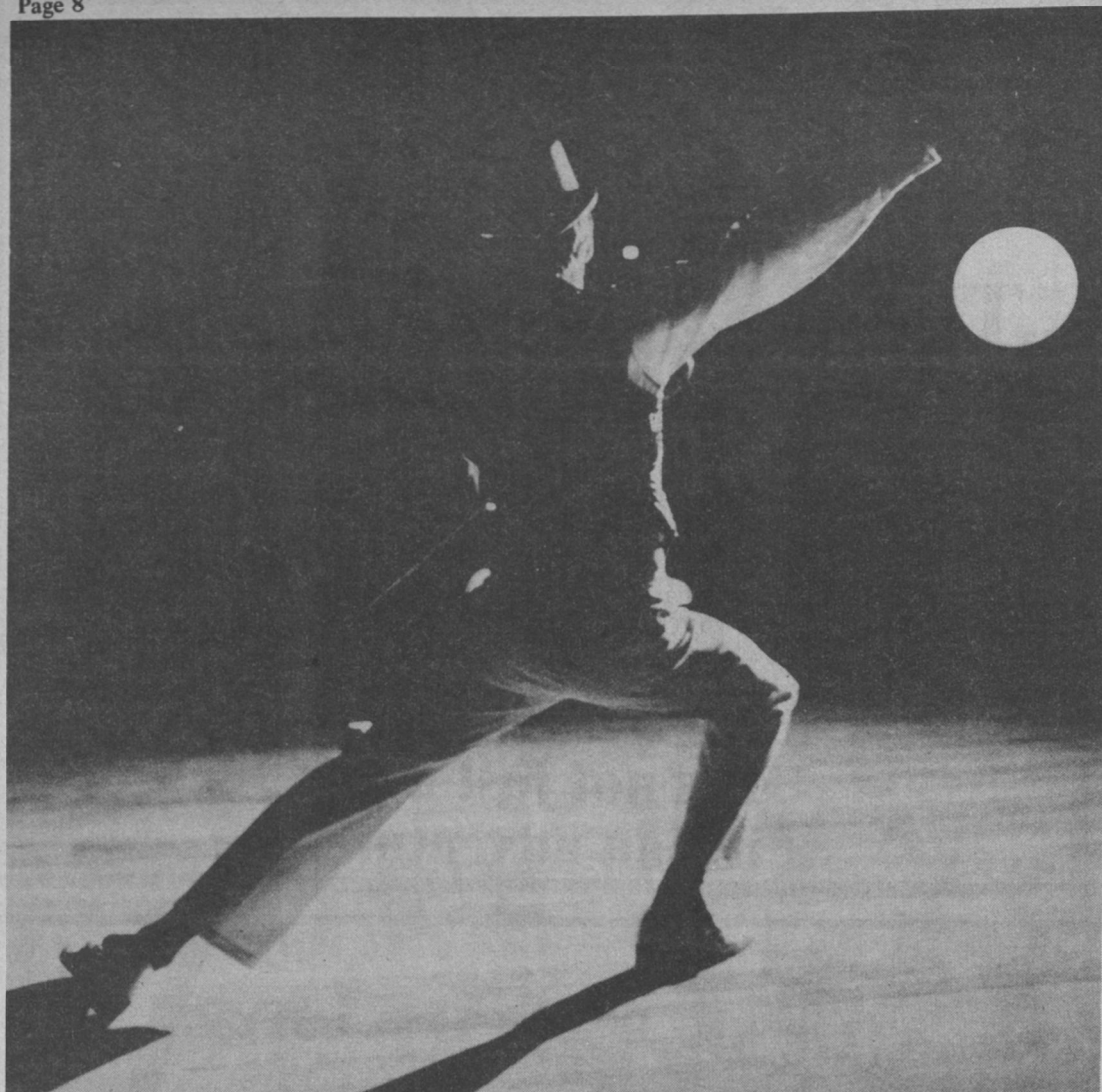
