New Minor In Museum And Preservation Studies

Beginning Fall Quarter, 1979, Armstrong State College will offer courses leading to a minor in Museum and Preservation Studies for the first time. The minor will consist of two

areas: Museum Studies and Historic Preservation.

Armstrong's program will be the only one of its kind in Georgia and one of only a handful in the country on the undergraduate level.

According to Madaline Boney, chairman of the committee which has developed

and designed the new curriculum, Savannah and the surrounding areas provide both the unique opportunities and the requisite expertise for such a program.

Each area (Museum Studies or Historic Preservation) will consist of three five hour courses and an internship at a local

historical institution.

Courses will be offered in sequence, and the minor may be completed in one full academic year.

Courses for Museum Studies are "Curatorship," to be taught by Anthony Dees, director of the Georgia Historical Society; Continued on page 8

Franklyn Ajaye Interviewed

On May 3, Armstrong was fortunate to have Franklyn Ajaye perform and still more fortunate to get an interview with Ajaye. Ajaye arrived about 2:30 Thursday and was interviewed by reporters from the Savannah Tribune, WSGA, WSOK, and by yours truly.

Ajaye is 29, single, and when asked about marriage, gave interesting theories on the subject. He said that marriage has to be worked at very hard, and he is ready to settle down. Ajaye was inspired by Richard Pryor because Pryor makes fun of 'real people.' Ajaye views acting, in referring to his role in 'Car Wash' as 'different and

interesting.' He says that black actors in particular have it tough because the demand for black actors is, unfortunately, low. Ajaye does not watch television anymore because there are no role models on television. (After all, who would you rather be like; Laverne or Shirley, or perhaps Mork from Ork). He said he does mind the cursing he does in his act because it's the same language one hears on the street, and his act is basically street life.

When asked about his future plans, he said he intends to stay

with comedy because he felt comedy was not as difficult to him as compared with acting. Ajaye has the highest respect for comedians, especially those who write their own material because he feels those comedians show a real talent for humor. Ajaye writes his own material. Ajaye mainly performs in night clubs but is currently on tour of colleges throughout the U.S. which includes Armstrong and the University of Georgia. Ajaye is a very interesting person and very easy to work with. Armstrong was indeed very fortunate to get him.

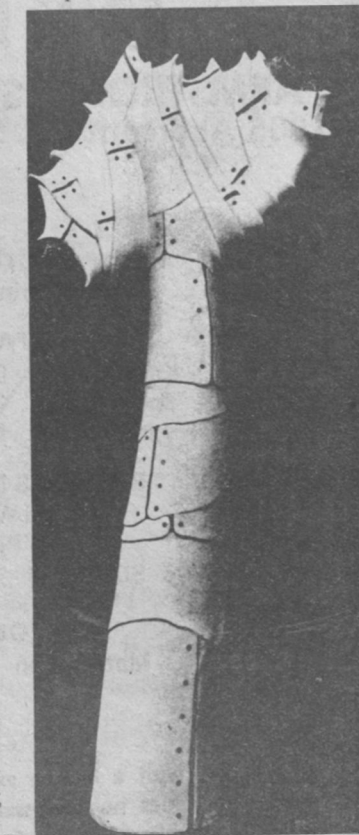
The exhibit will continue through June 6. Gallery hours are 9 a.m. until noon and 1 p.m. until 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Workshop On Heritage

A "Workshop on Heritage Preservation" will be held at Armstrong State College May 26, featuring Donald Bruce McKeon, a professional conservator in private practice in Tallahassee, Fla.

The workshop is intended to provide information and "hands on" experience for persons wishing to preserve elements of their personal heritage, such as old photographs.

It is a practical workshop, designed to acquaint individuals with the causes of deterioration of historic artifacts (particularly but not exclusively of paper) and corrective measures which one may apply locally.

Of special importance will be practice in distinguishing what may be locally cared for and what should be professionally corrected. Particular problems of participation will be analyzed. Participants are encouraged to bring specific items to the workshop about which they have questions.

McKeon has served as restorer and conservation consultant to museums, historic foundations, state agencies, art and antiquarian dealers in New York, Louisiana and Florida. He is a member of the American Institute for Conservation and the International Institute for Conservation. He holds a master's degree from Louisiana State University and the University of Minnesota. He is currently a doctoral fellow at Florida State University.

Registration will be at 9:30 a.m. the morning session, to be held in Room 204 of the Fine Arts Center, will focus on "The Physical Artifact: What It Is Made of and Why It Deteriorates." The afternoon session will focus on "The Philosophy of conservation."

Workshop fee is \$42.50 which includes a sample bit of conservation materials and supplies, printed materials and other course materials.

Workshop enrollment is

Jacques Brel Is Alive And Well And Living In Paris

The ASC Theater and the Fine Arts Department of Armstrong State College will present a cabaret theater production of "Jacques Brel is Alive and Well and Living in Paris" May 23-26 at 7:30 p.m. in Jenkins Hall.

A buffet dinner will precede each production which features Brel's most outstanding songs.

Over a period of 15 years, Brel wrote about 150 important songs, now regarded in the popular music industry as the new art songs of this century.

Eric Blau and Mort Shuman, Brel enthusiasts, screened Brel's repertory, selected 25 characteristic songs and produced "Jacques Brel..."

Brel made his first public appearance in a small cabaret in Brussels in 1952 and retired in Paris in 1967. He died in 1978 at the age of 49, a victim of cancer.

Starring in the production will be Laurentia Owens, an Armstrong student; Karen Price, an ASC alumnae; Grady Prosser, ASC student; and J. L. Smith, a professional actor in Savannah under a federal grant to hold drama workshops in the local schools.

The production will be directed by John Suchower, assistant professor at Armstrong and ASC Theater director. Vocal musical direction will be provided by Dan Radebaugh, assistant professor of music at ASC; and combo music will be directed by Randy Reese, instructor in music.

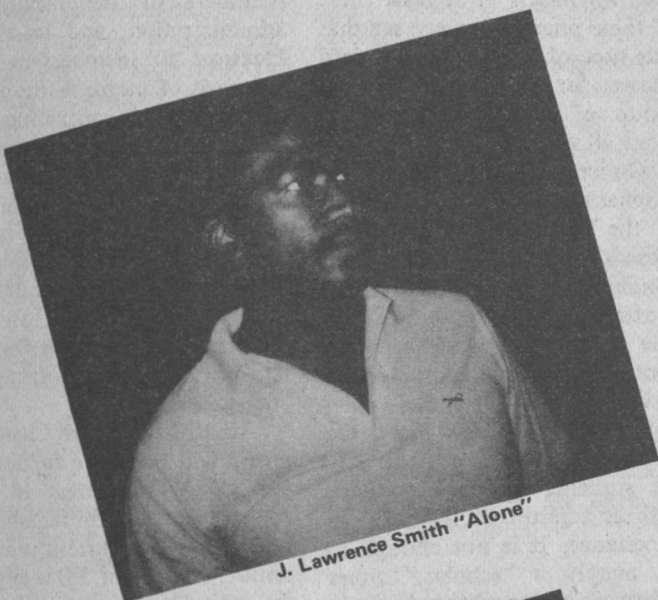
Jenkins Hall on the Armstrong campus has been transformed into a cabaret with the setting designed by Suchower and John Smith.

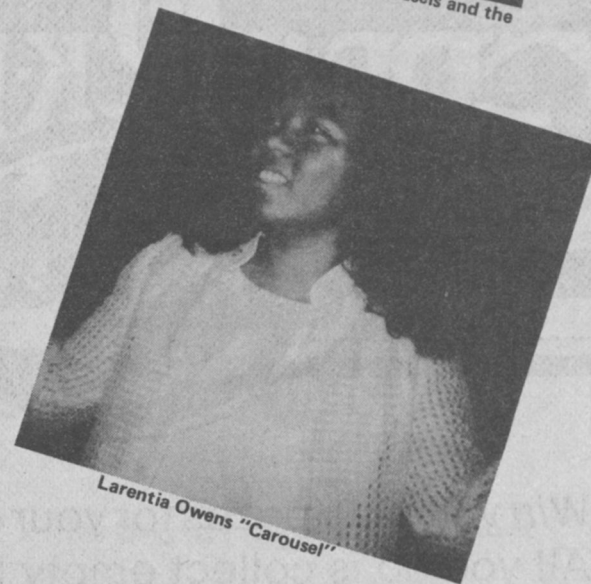

The buffet dinner will include round of roast beef, fish casserole, broccoli Normandi, red rice, tossed salad, relish dish and beverages.

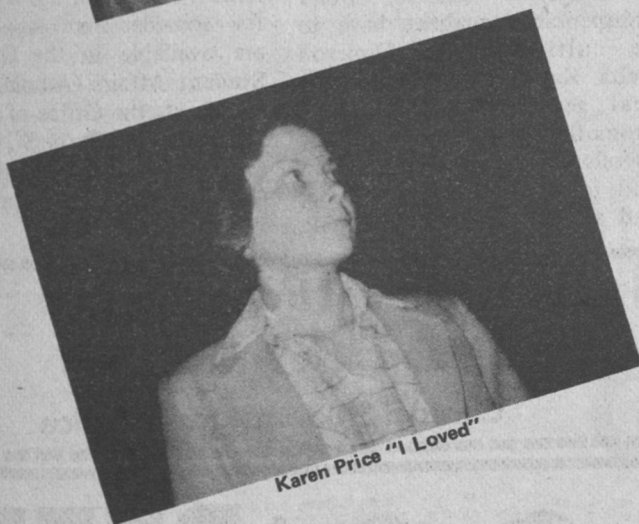
The cabaret will seat about 130 persons with tables for parties of four, six or eight.



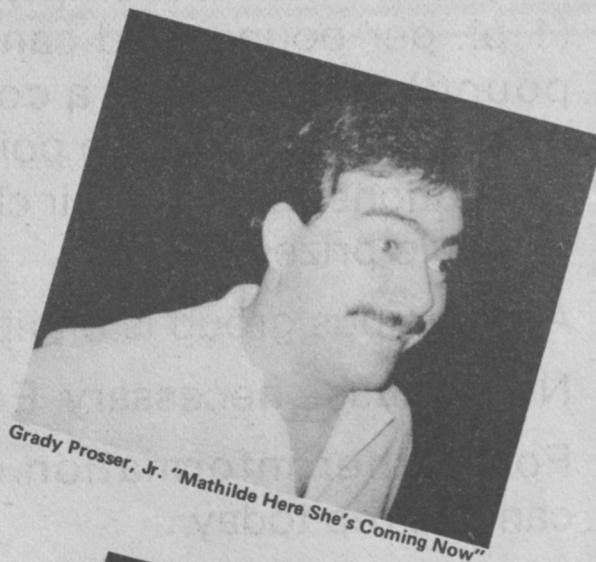

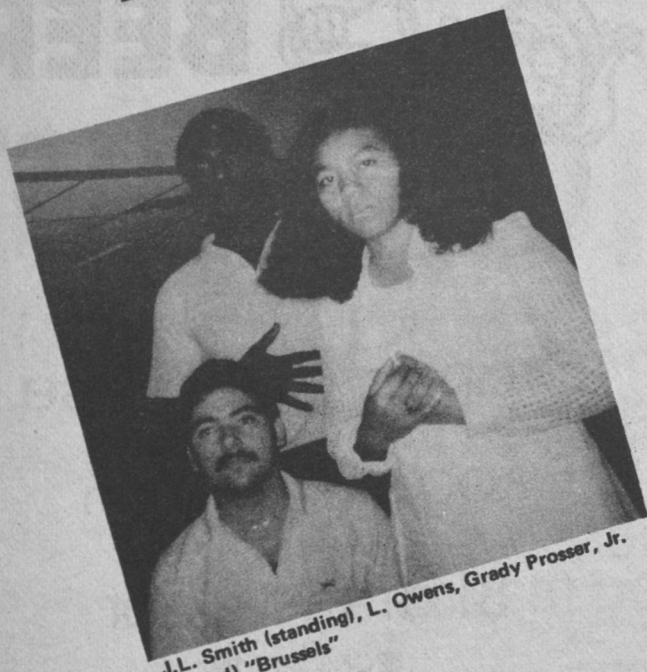

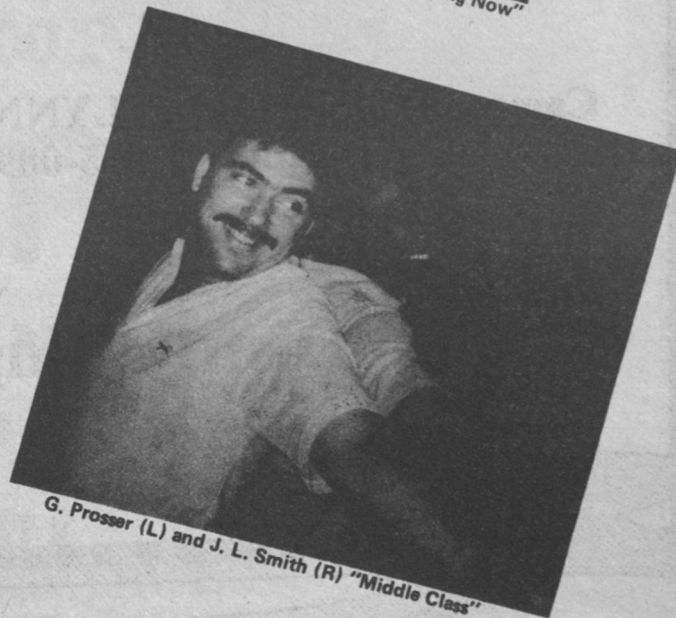

Students Sought To Form Charter

A group of ASC students is needed to be a charter forming group of Omicron Delta Kappa

National Leadership Honor Society. ASC is petitioning the Society for charter, and many students will find an opportunity to form a brand new chapter or circle.

The five major phases of campus life on which acceptance in the society stems are: 1) scholarship, 2) athletics, 3) social, service, religious activities, and campus government, 4) journalism, speech and the mass media, 5) creative and performing arts. Each student will be chosen on his own merits in at least three of these phases. One can see that this type of acceptance standard allows for a large, diversified group of ASC student leaders from all aspects of campus life.

Omicron Delta Kappa places emphasis upon the development of the whole person, both as a present member of his college community and as a prospective contributor to a better society. The Society believes that while good scholarship and intellectual development are the chief objectives of college years, the life of the mind is not the only life students will have to cope with as a result of their college experience. It is not enough to be merely a "scholar," other indispensable qualities have to be cultivated also. Omicron Delta Kappa believes that the real search for truth, the promotion of good will, the development of consideration and understanding good taste, and a sense of honor, learning

how to get along and cooperation with others, and the assumption of duty and responsibility are important lessons and personal qualities which one learns and develops through an integrated program of academic and extracurricular education.

Membership in Omicron Delta Kappa is awarded to undergraduate juniors and seniors, to students of graduate and professional schools and colleges of the institution, to members of the faculty and administration, and to alumni. Election to membership is on the basis of merit, is irrespective of a person's affiliation with other organizations, and is without solicitation or propaganda, such as rushing or social pressure, to insure acceptance of the invitation to membership. Membership is as much an obligation and responsibility in citizenship as it is a mark of highest distinction and honor.

At ASC the initial Chartering group will complete applications to show their interest. In order to be considered for membership one must be a current junior or senior. A GPA of 3.0 is required for consideration. Applications are available in the Office of Student Affairs (Administration Building), the Office of Student Activities (MCC) the SGA Office (MCC), or the Inkwell Office (MCC). 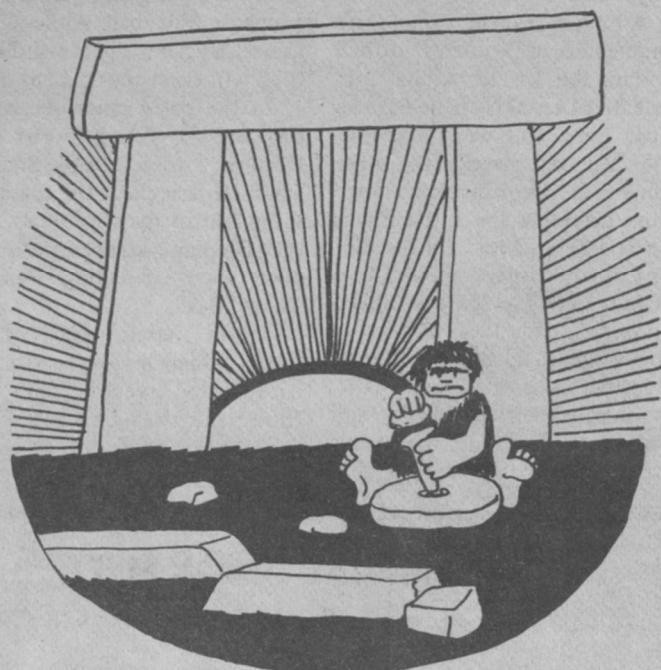
