### Florida panel votes to lower drunken driving limit

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida would lower permissible blood alcohol levels for operating cars or boats under a bill approved Wednesday in a House committee.

The allowable level of 0.10 percent for adults would drop to 0.08 percent under the measure (HB 541) sponsored by Rep. Daniel Webster, R-Orlando.

The House Criminal Justice Committee also approved a bill that would set lower blood-alcohol limits for people under 21 operating cars or boats to 0.03 percent under another Webster proposal (HB 539).

A third measure would change the offense of operating a boat while intoxicated, if it causes serious injury to another, from a misdemeanor to a felony, matching the law for motor vehicles.

The House Criminal Justice Committee unanimously approved the measure and sent to the Appropriations panel.

### Mass trial planned for abortion demonstrators

GREENVILLE, S.C. (AP) — Court administrators said Monday they might have to hold a mass trial in an auditorium after more than 400 anti-abortion activists arrested during outside a Greenville woman's clinic demanded a jury trial.

The protesters were ticketed Jan. 30 for violating the city's picketing ordinance outside Palmetto State Medical Center. Those arrested maintain they were holding a prayer vigil, not picketing.

The ordinance limits the number of picketers to 10 per block and prohibits them from coming within 10 feet of either side of the business' driveway. A violation carries a fine of \$50 plus \$25 in court costs.

All 437 defendants will be tried together, court officials said.

A trial date has not been set.

### Charges are up, but sexual misconduct isn't, camp says

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The courts-martial of five enlisted men, four of them training-company commanders, doesn't mean that fraternization and sexual harassment are increasing at Orlando Naval Training Center, officials say.

In fact, they say the increased number of sailors charged with such offenses — 12 in 1992 compared with four in 1991 — is a sign that education efforts have led to more reports of misconduct, said base spokeswoman Lt. Terri Kaish.

In the past year, the base has toughened its policy banning fraternization, the personal relationships between staff and students and between officers and enlisted members.

That policy demands that all personnel undergo training on the rules at least once a year. It also bars company commanders from socializing with former recruits for at least 60 days after the recruits leave their charge.

## Local religious leaders sign declaration of diversity

Religious toleration reaffirmed in the aftermath of recent racially discriminatory incidents

GSU's Coordinated Religious Ministries (CRM) gathered Monday to sign a declaration of diversity for Georgia Southern's campus.

The declaration, signed by all members of the CRM, is a document stating that each group on campus, religious or cultural, has the right to exercise and speak their beliefs without uneasiness or intimidation.

Craig Higgins, president of

CRM, said that the group does not intend to imply that Georgia Southern is uncivil and hostile.

"One of our goals ... is to commend Georgia Southern's commitment to genuine diversity and to demonstrate to them our support," Higgins said.

The declaration was established as an attempt to ease racial tensions that have developed as a result of discriminatory incidents on campus in the past.

According to GSU Division of

Public Safety, the most recent incident involved the marking of the door to a t.v. room in Stratford Hall with the letters "KKK" and what may have been a Star of David in shaving cream. This incident intensified the need for the different religious organizations on campus to work together to promote religious and cultural tolerance.

The declaration speaks for a wide variety of religious groups including Jews, Muslims and Christians.

Several denominations of the Christian faith, Anglican, Baptist, charismatic, evangelical, independent, Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian, Reformed, Roman Catholic and Wesleyan are also included.

A primary goal of the declaration is to uphold everyone's First Amendment rights.

"We reaffirm our commitment to free speech and religious liberty," Higgins stated.

On the other hand, we wish to express our abhorrence with

those who would silence the voices of diversity with violence or abuse."

The declaration is the first step in promoting diversity throughout the campus. Coordinated Religious Ministries hopes to sponsor several educational activities that will encourage sensitivity toward others.

"Our next step is to bring in consultants, sponsor a lecture series, and informally work through the religious groups that already exist," Higgins said.

## Rash of bicycle thefts continue

Eighteen thefts reported in two-month period

An reoccurring problem for GSU students is the number of reported bicycle thefts both locally and on-campus. This can be seen in the number of thefts in the past two months.

At least 18 thefts were reported to either the GSU Division of Public Safety or the Statesboro Police Department during the months of January and February.

According to this statistic, there were over two bicycle thefts a week during the eight and half week period.

According to Lt. Guy Sharp of the GSU Division of Public Safety, out of the 14 campus thefts, only one was an unlocked bicycle.

According to the incident reports of the Statesboro Police Department, only one out of four thefts resulted from unlocked bicycles.

Even though some thefts occur at night, "most of the bicycles are stolen during the day between classes or when there are no classes (at night)," Sharp said.

He stated that with a two unlocked to 16 locked ratio, having "good" bicycle locks is a necessity.

"Crime prevention should be judged on how much the bicycle costs," Sharp said. "Purchase a lock that is comparable to the value of the bike."

By citing that some of the locks can be easily undone, Sharp said that public safety encourages students to use the "U" lock.

"Use the 'U' type to lock the bicycle tires and any other part of the frame to a rack," Sharp said.

When the lock is attached on the front tire, sometimes the only part of the bicycle left attached to the bike rack after a theft will be that tire, Sharp said.

Sharp stated that the location where the bicycle is locked affects of the number of thefts. Examples of "bad locations," included locking the bicycle to a stop sign that can be pulled out of the ground and locking the bike to a drain pipe, where the lock can be nudged loose.

According to Sharp, another problem is when a thief uses bolt cutters to remove the bicycle from its rack and then rides away.

Several students have forgotten that they can register their bicycles free of charge with public safety, Sharp stated.

"Because the bicycles were registered, [public safety] has been able to recover bikes out of the state," Sharp said. "We even located a bike in Ohio."

Sharp said that public safety believes that local youngsters are some of the culprits, but the department also believes that GSU students have taken part in some of the thefts.

"We arrested a couple of [GSU] students for a bicycle chop shop in their apartment," Sharp said about a residence housing four or five bikes.

In the past, public safety set-up traps to catch people stealing bicycles and were able to catch some thieves, Sharp said.

## SHARP teaches rape prevention

Seminar to teach self-protection

The Statesboro-Bulloch County Parks and Recreation Department (SBCPRD) is sponsoring a one day, three-part seminar on sexual assault and harassment on Saturday, March 13.

The seminar, called Sexual Harassment Assault Rape Prevention (SHARP) will provide tips for women on how to handle annoying flirtations as well as protecting themselves from actual physical assault. The program was started by the American Taekwondo Association whose instructors must pass a certification test in order to teach the seminar.

The seminar will take place in the Administration Building on Fair Road, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. The cost is \$30, which includes the cost of the course and the course booklet which goes with the program.

Jim Richards, a taek-won-do instructor, will be teaching the class. He has his own martial

arts studio in Tifton, and is a qualified SHARP instructor.

The three parts to the seminar include prevention psychology, managing social or professional physical harassment and sexual assault countermeasures.

In the first part, prevention psychology, women learn to identify their own personality traits, and how to use this toward defense. Prevention tips are given for women at home, in the car and away from home on trips.

The second part teaches women how to handle advances or flirtations in the workplace or in a school or social setting. These techniques are simple but effective and can eliminate embarrassing situations.

The last part contains ways a woman can physically defend herself. These include striking the assailant's pressure points and nerve endings, and may also include simple taek-won-do maneuvers, according to Eddie Lott, one of Richards's students.

## Petty thievery 'Cheeto bandito' knocks over snack machine

GSU Police are looking for what are probably juveniles with severe stomach aches, in connection with a Feb. 27 burglary.

According to Lt. Guy Sharp, \$72.50 worth of snacks were taken from a vending machine on the main floor of the Math/Physics/ Psychology (MPP) Building.

A professor reported that upon entering the building at 12:55 p.m. Saturday, he discovered the front glass of the vending machine had been broken and it appeared that several items had been removed.

Further investigation revealed that the front entrance to the MPP Building had also been shattered by an unknown object, according to Sharp.

There are no suspects in Saturday's incident, and GSU police were "unable to retrieve any latent prints," Sharp said. He does, however, suspect juveniles were involved due to the type of the crime.

GSU auxiliary services had to spend \$372.91 to repair the vending machine and replace the snacks that had been stolen. The entrance to the building had not been repaired as of press time.



## SGA to contribute \$300 for national ad

Full-page USA Today ad will ask Clinton to keep his campaign pledges

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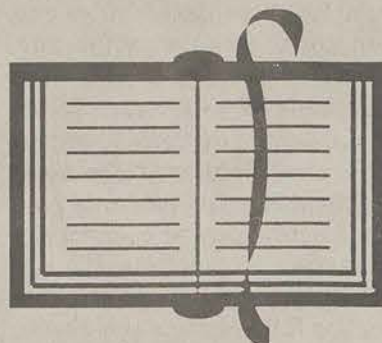
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## Ingram elected head of GA College Republicans

*Election brings political attention to Southern*

Chris Ingram, the former chairman of GSU's College Republican chapter was elected chairman of the state organization at its convention in Athens last weekend. The election marks the first time a state chairman has attended a school outside the Atlanta metropolitan or Athens areas since 1984.

Ingram won 57 percent of the vote versus 41 percent for his opponent, a student at Emory. Two percent voted for write-in candidates due to their unbiased position in the state leadership. Ingram chaired his first state board meeting Sunday.

Doug Simon, interim chairman of the GSU College Republicans, said "this makes GSU the capital of College Republicans in Georgia." Ingram said the state board meetings will be held here from now on, with occasional rotation to other schools in the

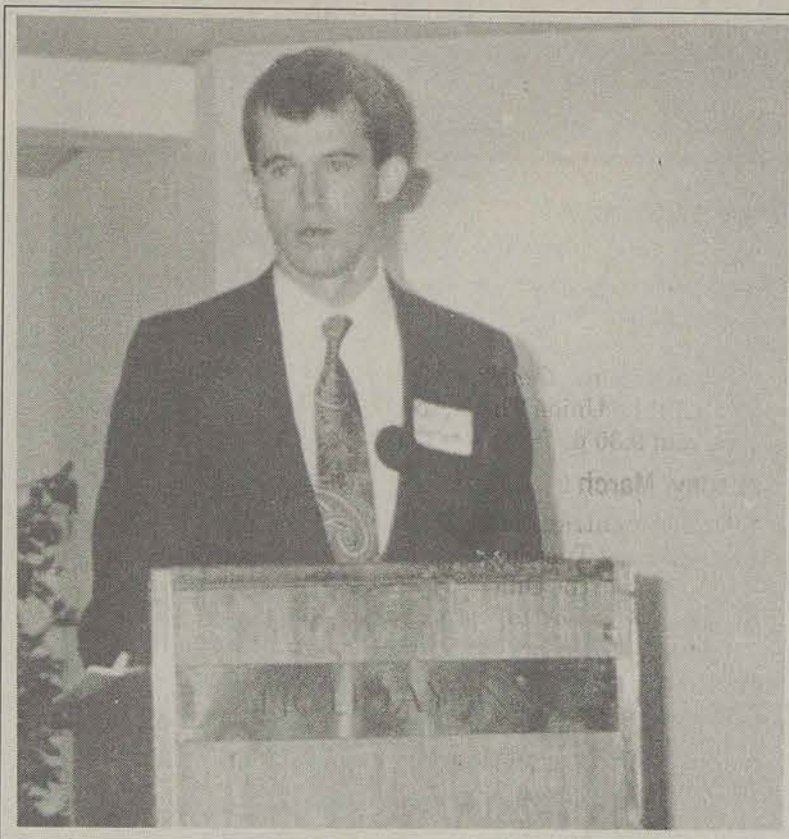
state.

Ingram said the election "shows that GSU has a strong organization. This is proof of how strong we are."

His immediate plans include the creation of a new statewide position in the club. "Congressional district liaisons" will be placed in each of Georgia's 11 districts. They will work with both Republican candidates and the schools in their districts to "meet their needs." Before the primaries, when College Republicans cannot endorse candidates, the liaisons will organize forums for the candidates to speak to club members.

Later, the liaisons will work for the Congressional campaigns. They will mobilize students to staff offices, organize events and rallies, pass out literature at football games and grocery stores, and canvas neighborhoods.

The new position will take a burden off candidates' backs, who would otherwise have to hire collegiate coordinators for their campaigns. Ingram said he spoke to recently-elected District 1 Congressman Jack Kingston about the idea, and Kingston was receptive. The four Republican

Congressmen from Georgia are coming to the next state board meeting to iron out any problems in the proposal.

"We made inroads in 1992 with 10 new House seats (Republicans in Congress)," Ingram said. "Three of those were from Georgia. That was in 1992 when everyone was caught in the glaze of Bill Clinton's headlights. Through this plan and a

strengthening Republican party, and when people begin to see Clinton's promises were a bunch of lies, I see no reason why we can't pick up three more seats in 1994."

As chairman of the state organization, Ingram will sit on the executive board of the Georgia Republican Party. The club will also be recognized as an "established political organization."

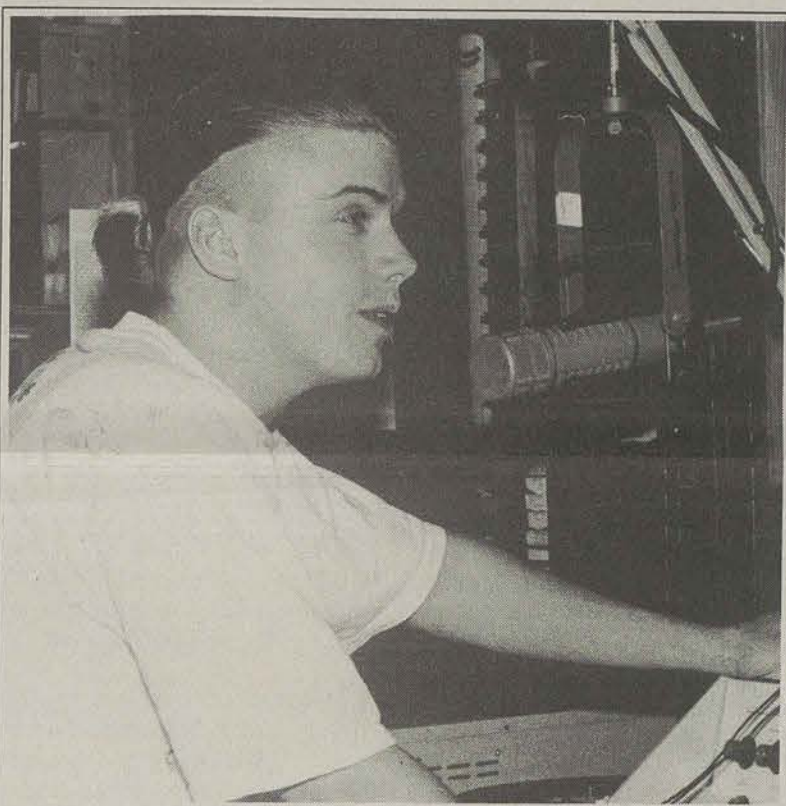

SGA President Jonathan Brown said, "We're trying to make each year's election better than the last, so for this year's election, computers will be used to help speed up the process."

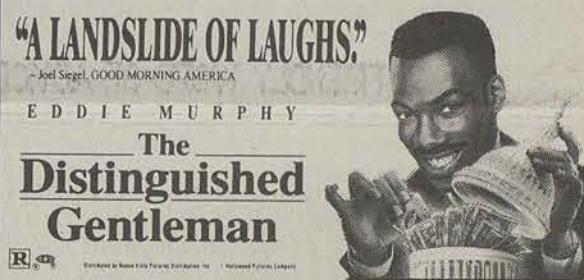

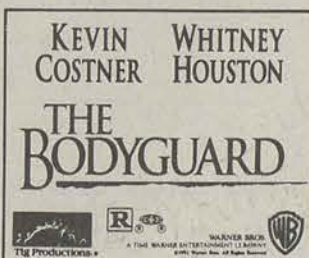

I am an Assistant Professor of Geology here at GSU as well as a faculty advisor to the Geology Club, and I feel compelled to respond to your Feb. 18 article regarding Geology Club's request for SGA funding of a planned spring break field excursion.

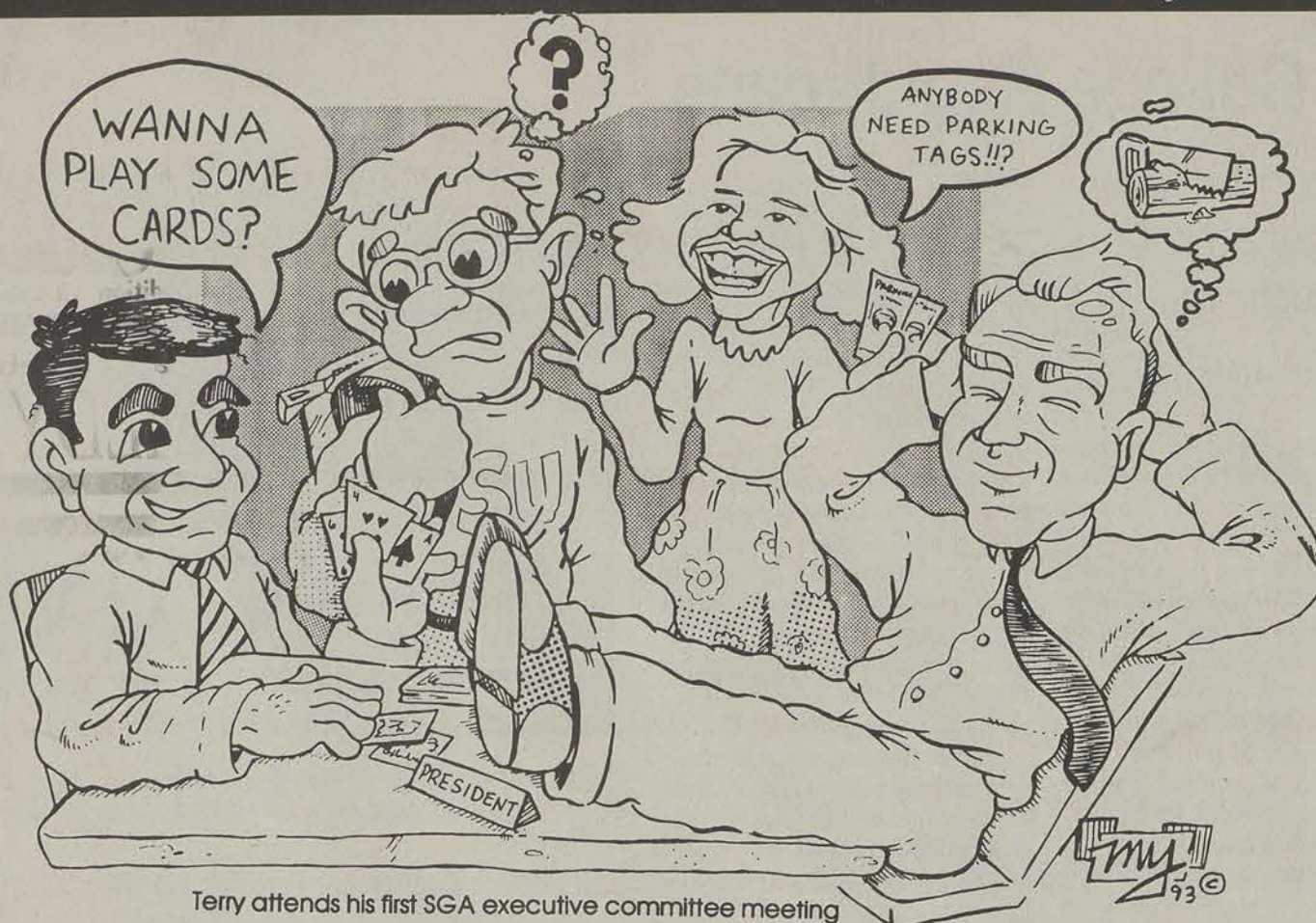
I know that Geology Club members are very grateful that SGA voted to provide some funding (\$50 out of a

requested \$400) for the field strip. However, based on several of the senators' comments regarding the proposal, I think that the low level of funding and the controversy concerning the Geology Club request stem from a fundamental ignorance of geology.

Geology is defined as the study of the earth. As an instructor, I can tell you that it is difficult to study the earth if the student is confined to the classroom.

Many schools have extensive, six to nine week, formal field courses that are required for geology majors. We do not have such a program here; therefore, it is not simply desirable for geology students to participate in numerous field

## 'Politically correct' Diato rocks the 'Boro

Diato is a local band with something to say, and they're going to say it loud and clear.

The band says that its name translates to tribe of justice, which is also a main theme that runs throughout their music.

The band, consisting of Chris Chesser, guitarist; Bo Davidson, bass guitarists; Ben Andrews, primary vocalist, guitarist, and mixer; and Brian Gooding, drummer, formed about eight months ago, but all of the members have had previous experience with the Statesboro music scene.

Gooding, Andrews, and Chesser played together in Gunpowder Plot, a Statesboro-based band who frequented the Rockin' Eagle, several years ago. Gooding also played with Love, Agnes, and Davidson played with Buzz Toy, two other local bands who have parted ways.

Diato communicates their feelings about political and social issues through their music. The band members collaborate on the writing of the lyrics and music, and Andrews edits the songs.

"When I write, I take what I see today and try to go back to the past and see why everything has happened the way it has," Andrews observed.

Band members all agree that they try to examine political controversies and injustices and take a stance not usually presented. "As much as I did not want us to become a politically correct band, we have," Chesser says.

As injustice is one of Diato's biggest motivating factors, the band cites Native Americans as a prime example of it. "I am very spiritually involved with Native Americans; they had it all before it was taken from them," Gooding explains.

One of their songs, "Education," explains the band's stance on the teaching of history. Gooding stresses the importance of a multi-cultural education, because knowing one's own identity, as well as the identities of other cultures, helps people to better understand each other, and therefore come to be at peace with one another. Chesser adds

that "History that is taught today is very one-sided, very Anglo-Saxon."

Diato's music is rooted basically from a hard core genre. Chesser says "We plan to expand on other musical genres such as reggae, and slow acoustic, but come full circle back to hard core."

"Yeah, we're hardcore, but usually pretty fast," adds Davidson.

"Hardcore, I like anything hardcore," says Andrews. "But, we're hardcore with a message."

Think this band likes hardcore? Well, yeah, but that's not all that they're about. Band manager Tonya adds that the band is also funky, "because we have a funky drummer."

Gooding, the "funky drummer," cites jazz and hip hop as among his influences.

The band members take turns hosting a radio show on WVGS on Thursdays from 7 to 9 p.m. "We want other people to be exposed to our brand of music," Chesser says.

The band has played all originals thus far, but Chesser observes that "When you play original music you need to throw some covers in, some stuff that people can understand, so they say that you know how to play real music."

The band has played at Chena's and Blind Willie's, as well as several local parties. Diato made their debut at a drag ball held at the beginning of winter quarter.

"Chenas is a good place to prove yourself because they are very open to hearing new sounds. You don't have to have a demo tape to play there," Gooding says.

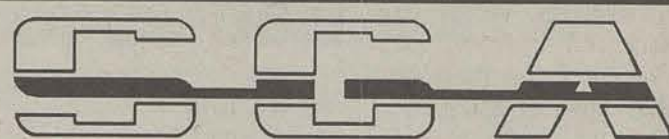

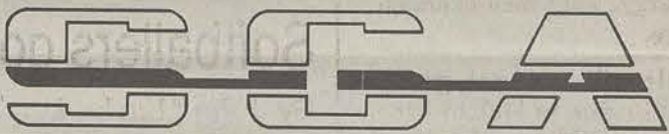

## Steve Hein:

## Not an 'earth muffin' kinda guy

Many people find it almost impossible to actually achieve a dream, but Steve Hein, a former GSU student, has.

Hein received his degree in finance from GSU in the late 80s. All of his life he has loved wildlife and enjoyed painting it.

After graduation Hein went on to marry his high school sweetheart, Kathy, and they now live with their five-year-old son Adam, who Hein says "is following in my footsteps." The couple also has a three-year-old daughter, Meredith.

Hein made his break through in art when he was asked to do a painting for Governor Joe Frank Harris, which was presented at GSU. Through this event Hein received recognition from a conservationist organization, Quails Unlimited, at age 23. Due to this exposure, he sold his first wildlife painting for \$2800.

Since the first sale, Hein has won Artist of the Year in 1987, '88 and '90 with Georgia Ducks Unlimited.

One of his other big achievements was in 1987 when he won the Wildlife Management area stamp, which is related to falconry.

"The artwork got me back into wildlife animals as a profession which came to falconry," says Hein.

A falconer is one among the many titles which Hein has earned. He has Maggie, a red tail hawk, and Louie, who is a harrisod (male).

Hein has trained both birds for the hunting season, which is more of an observation for the falconer, but it lets the birds act like they would in their normal habitat.

The birds are kept in mews, which are large glass cases connected to a weathering yard, which is also enclosed.

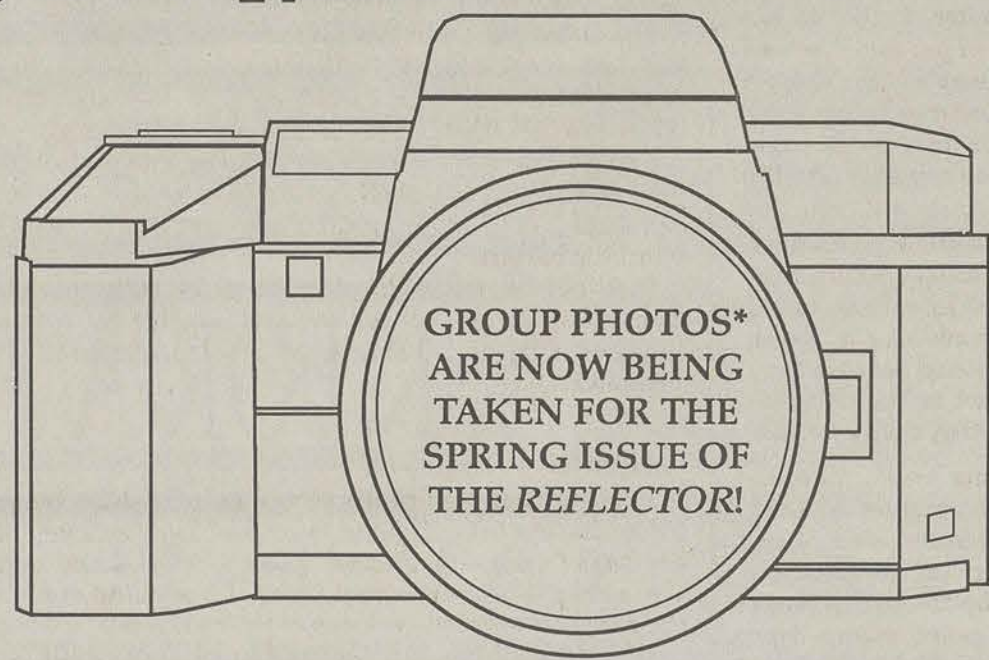
Hein's most recent project has been requesting grants and donations for the construction of the GSU Bird Sanctuary. Hein

says, "I raised \$170,000 in just a couple of months via corporate contracts from the art."

Hein stressed that the sanctuary will be built strictly on donations and not from student money.

If sufficient funds are generated, a portion of the facility will open this year. Hein assures himself that this can be done: "I am not an earth muffin kind of guy, I can talk business with the best of them."

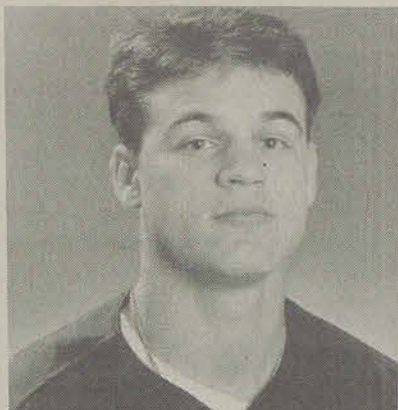
## Eagles down diamond Dawgs 5-3

"We've beaten each team in the conference at least once with the exception of UTC, so we're just hoping that we can put the regular season behind us and possibly play for the tournament championship," mentioned Young.

Southern is hoping that they can make it to the final and play against UTC. "If we do make it to the final, we want a crack at UTC for the championship because we think we can beat them and it

is hard for a team to beat you three times in a season," commented Young.

The Eagles feel confident going into the tournament. "We feel confident going into it, we know we can play with anybody and we will be ready," commented Young.

All of GSU's games will be televised live. The match-up versus The Citadel can be seen on SportsSouth Network. This game will be shown at 9:30 P.M. If the Eagles win, their next game will be shown also at 9:30 P.M. on Saturday.

ESPN will show the championship game live on Sunday at 7:30 P.M. The Eagles could face tournament favorite UTC on Sunday for the Conference title and an automatic-bid for the round of 64 in the NCAA Tournament.

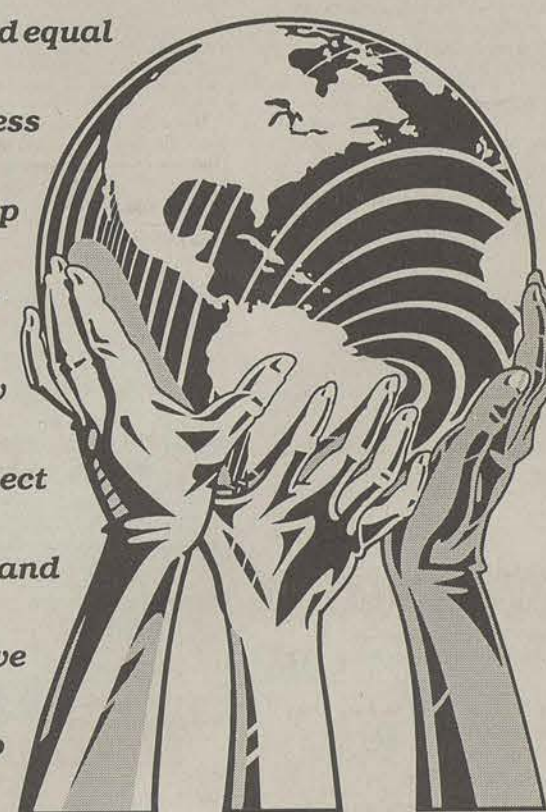

**Deadline: Tuesday, May 4th**

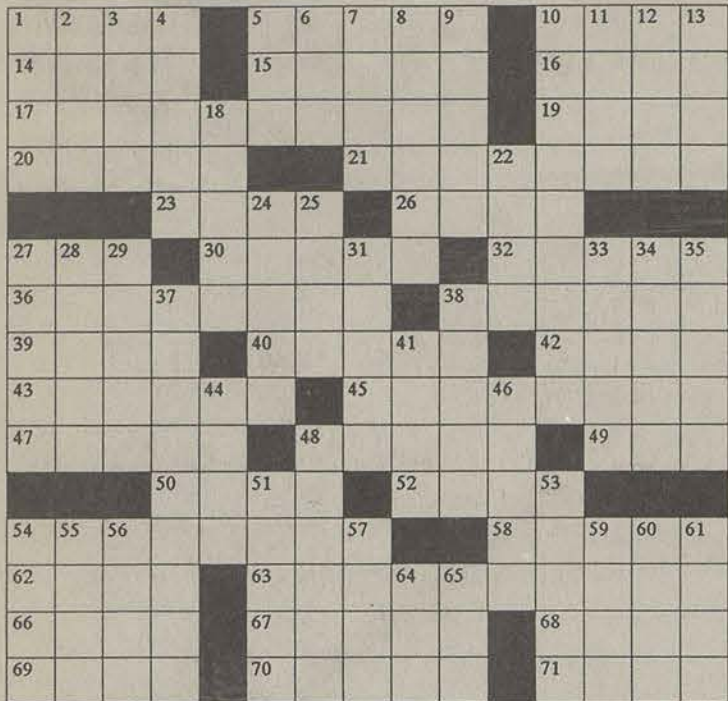

excursions, but it is essential to the learning experience.

Unfortunately, GSU's location in the coastal plain does not lend itself to field study of many important aspects of geology. In order to see exposed rocks one must travel some distance, and this requires time.

In the academic quarter, we are limited to two-day (i.e. weekend) field trips. Since most field trips require a long drive, a weekend provides insufficient time to do much geology. An academic break, (such as spring break) provides an excellent opportunity for longer, more intensive field excursions.

It is offensive that Geology Club's planned excursion was described as "frolicking" in the mountains. I can assure SGA that any field trip arranged through the Geology /

Geography Department is both intellectually and physically challenging.

I spend much of each summer in the field, and geologic field work is one of the more demanding tasks a person can choose to do.

During the course of my field work I have been shot at (twice), had my vehicle's brakes fail while traveling down a mountain, and had my truck break down in the desert in August, requiring me to walk 11 miles in 110 degree heat to get help.

If the senator who made the "frolicking" comment would care to "frolic" this summer in the remote, rattlesnake-populated Nevada desert, I invite him/her to apply as my field assistant.
