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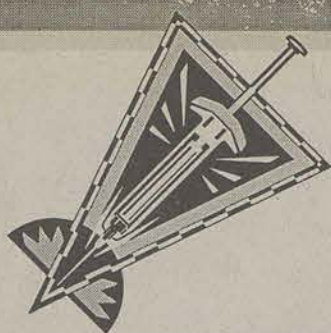

Regents OK building expansion

The Board of Regents approved the \$3 million expansion of the Math-Physics-Psychology building which is slated to begin sometime in November.

"The July session of the Board of Regents approved the addition," Vice President of Academic Affairs Harry Carter said.

"The reason we got the July Board to approve it was so we could select an architect in time to begin the work in November," Carter said.

The vote will allow for an additional 23,000 square feet to be added to the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science.

The Georgia General Assembly, which approved the \$3 million last winter, approved the appropriation for the construction to be used for this project in this vote.

"The additional building will be approximately 30 to 40 feet

apart from the existing math-physics building on the southeast side," Director of Facilities Planning and Space Utilization at GSU Philip Hodge said.

"It will be three stories tall and will connect to the existing building via walkways and bridges," Hodge said.

The plan is for the new math and computer science wing to

have its heating and ventilation system connected to the one in the existing math-physics building according to Hodge.

With the new building, numerous classrooms and teach-

ers offices will be added for the math and computer science department.

"There will be 14 classrooms, 24 offices and one computer lab in the new building," Hodge said.

The search for an architect for the project is currently under way.

"I hope in the next 30 days to get one approved because we want to have the groundbreaking in November," Hodge said.

"It will take more than one year is all I can say about the construction because I really am not sure how long it will take," he said.

With the location of the new building somewhat in the area of the parking which is located behind the math-physics building, some parking spaces will be lost.

"In the short run we will lose those parking spaces, but we will pick up an additional 200 or so spaces in all after the construction is finished."

November date targeted for referendum on legal liquor

The petition for the liquor referendum currently has between 1,700 and 1,800 signatures, according to Jarell Jones, a spokesman for the Committee for a Progressive Statesboro.

"We need several hundred more signatures, but there hasn't been any real activity since the end of Spring quarter," Jones said. "We are trying to get the votes for a vote in November."

In order to bring the issue to a vote, petitions from 35 percent of Statesboro's approximately 2,700 registered voters must be submitted to the city. A referendum would be required within 30 to 60 days after the petitions are filed.

If the referendum did pass, several businesses would consider opening restaurants in Statesboro.

"I've been contacted by several chains that have discussed the possibility of coming to Statesboro pending the pass-

ing of the referendum," Jones said. "I'm really not at liberty to give you their names, but several have contacted me."

The owner of Wet Willie's in Savannah said he really didn't know much about Statesboro as far as demographics are concerned and whether the population could support an operation here, but he said Statesboro would be a place that he would look at if expansion was in his plans.

He added that it is a "what if" question, and he really couldn't say anything right now about it.

In February the Statesboro-Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce stated their position is to fully support the calling of a public referendum for the purpose of allowing the citizens of the City of Statesboro to determine, through the democratic process, the legality of the sale of alcohol in the form of liquor within the City of Statesboro.

According to their official statement,

while not endorsing the consumption or sale of alcohol, they do maintain the position that the allowance of said sale and/or consumption should be determined by the people of Statesboro and Bulloch County.

The Statesboro community is divided on the issue.

An employee of Johnson's Beer and Wine on Fair Road said he believed passing the referendum would have many positive effects.

"As far as benefits you would have to look at the extra revenue through the taxes which would be generated from the sale of liquor, and of course it would benefit our store," Johnson's employee Chris Logan said. "You have to look at other schools in the state like UGA and Mercer because those students aren't going crazy and burning down things."

Logan expressed they (Johnson's) was

Students assist in Georgia flood relief

With the recent flooding in Georgia, relief efforts have begun. Many GSU students and area residents have joined the effort in assisting the flood victims.

Not only have the students traveled to the affected areas, but they have also been collecting cash and goods which they can take to the victims. The collection will continue through July 23.

The 648 Engineering Battalion National Guard Unit, under the direction of Capt. Bill Geddy, has offered to transport the donations. Many of the members of the National Guard unit are GSU students.

"Many of his people (648th members) have called in and expressed how good they feel about what they are doing in helping these people," Futch said.

The student support will be directed by David Lariscy who is a pre-engineering major from Sylvania.

"He has done volunteer work for us (GSU) before, and he came in my office wanting to know what he could do to help," Futch said.

She added that many faculty at GSU have volunteered their offices as collection points where students could bring in the relief donations.

"I have had many faculty calling in to say they would like to volunteer their offices for collection points," Futch said. "I've had Dr. Woodrum (department head of the physics department), Sharon Pratt (program specialist at the Southern Center for Continuing Education) and many others who have volunteered for this."

Futch said a number of churches in the area have inquired into how they could help.

"We've adopted a family through Residence Life and they've collected five boxes of donations to send to the family," Futch said. "Many student groups have also given their time in this effort like SOAR and Habitat for Humanity."

GSU makes effort to save dying eagle

Editor's Note: There is currently a debate over the possible down listing of the Bald Eagle from the endangered list to the threatened list. We will talk to Mr. Hein in our next issue about why our "national symbol" is not even close to being taken off the endangered list which is contrary to what certain groups would like the general public to think.

Steven Hein, Director of the Eagle Sanctuary and Raptor Center at GSU, was called to the aid of an injured Bald Eagle last Friday evening.

This eagle had been hit on the side of a road near the town of Stillmore.

"At first when I received the call from the DNR officer in Metter, we both believed it was simply a red tail hawk and I went out for the evening because I knew I could deal with it later. Around 10 o'clock I got the call back that it was indeed a Bald Eagle, and I got my things together and left for Stillmore, which is located 40 miles west of Statesboro" Hein said. "It is unusual for it to be an actual Bald Eagle because people get worried that they must have hit an actual Bald Eagle and it turns out to be a red tail hawk instead."

Besides the red tail signifying the red tail hawk and not an eagle, the difference in wingspan is an instant giveaway.

The eagle has a wingspan of nearly seven feet as opposed to the four foot wingspan of the red tail hawk according to Hein.

The injured eagle had apparently been feeding on carrion, and had somehow flown up into the path of the

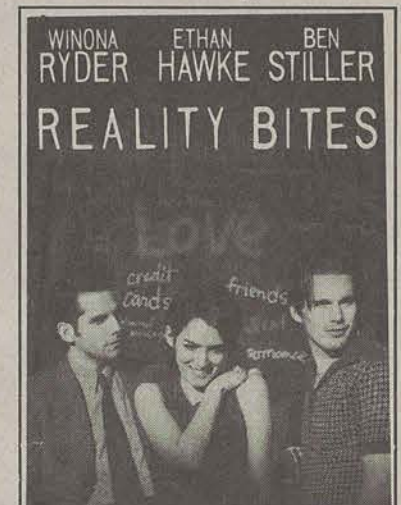
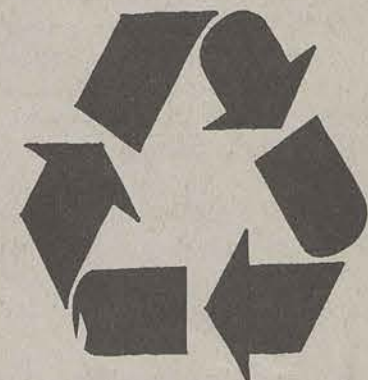

Reforms in store

There will be a new method to disperse money for financial aid at GSU for the 1995-96 school year.

With the plan, no longer will banks be responsible for sending checks to students for their financial aid.

GSU, along with 982 other schools, will participate in the Federal Direct Student Loan Program.

The 1995-96 school year will be the first year of the program.

"Now with the Stafford loan program, money comes from participating banks, under this program the money will come directly to GSU to disperse to the students," a GSU financial aid representative said. "This plan will allow us to operate much more efficiently."

With the current situation, sometimes financial aid checks are late in arriving which causes problems and this will hopefully be taken care of with the new system.

Students will still file for the financial aid in the same manner as before.

"Students can still help us by filing for their financial aid early during January," he said. "The federal program should reduce the delay time in checks through the mail."

This is a new concept with less than 1,000 schools scheduled for participating in the first year.

The Department of Education has planned for all post-secondary institutions to eventually participate in the direct lending program.

"We were pleased with the turnout," Futch said. "We will have our next blood drive sometime in September."

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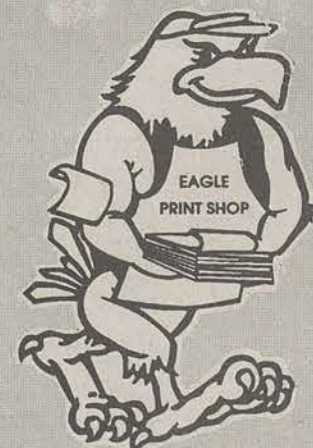
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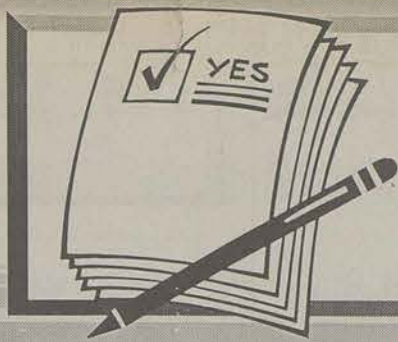

Farmer to replace Stan Willamson

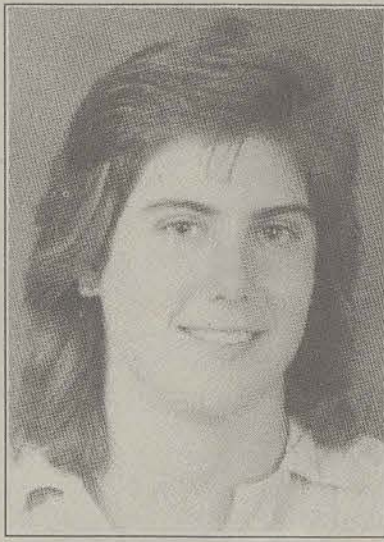

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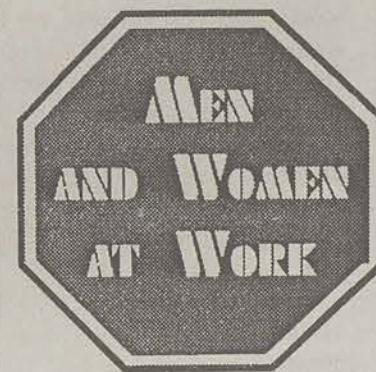
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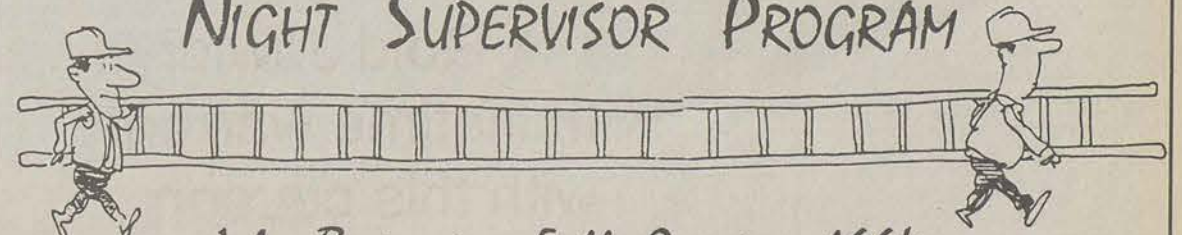

No one would steal from another person if they knew how much pain they caused.

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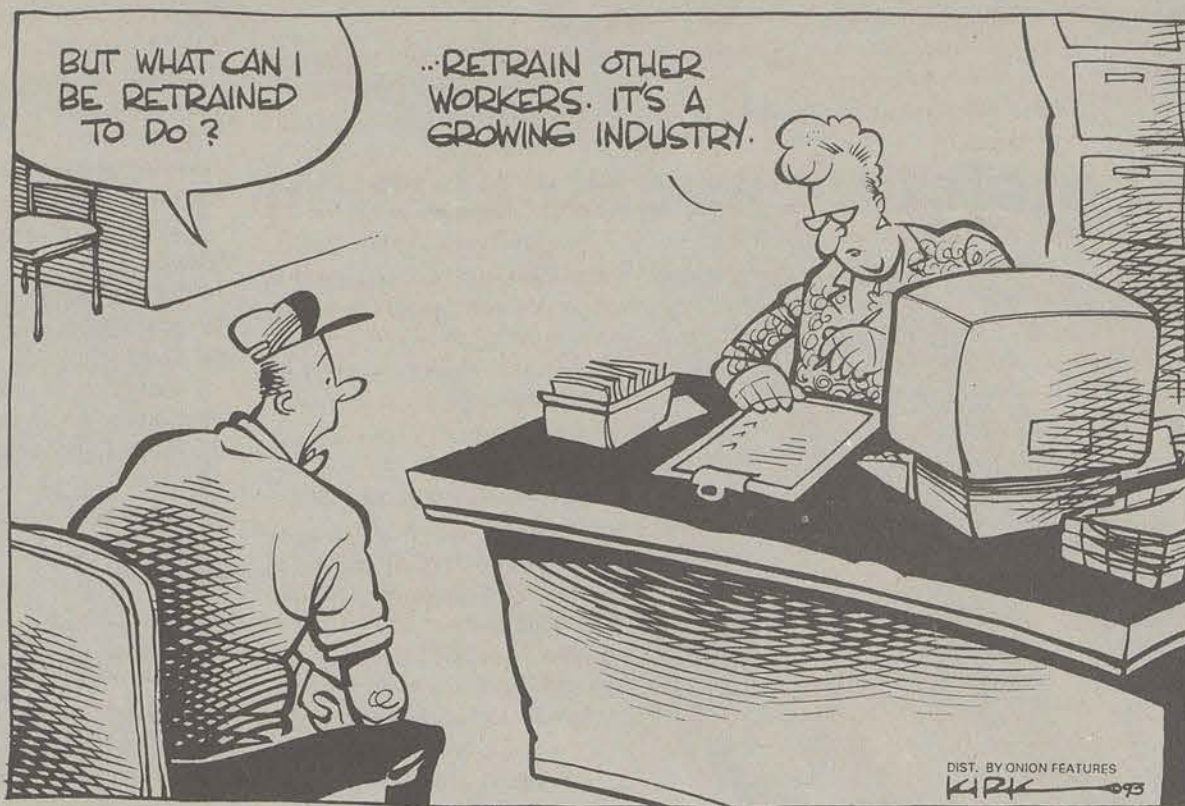

"Flash," that's what she calls me, "Flash, what're you doin' messin' yer' head 'bout that stuff for? Why you wanna go contemplatin' changin' yer' whole life 'cause of some vision you had of some virgin while you were

floatin' from those bad chitlins? You worried 'bout how it's gonna be when you die, 'bout yer soul 'n stuff?

"Yeah," I said.

"Look here. You're in the South and Statesboro is Bible Belt central. You're surrounded by Godliness of all calibers."

"I forgot about that," I said.

"Don't worry 'bout nothin'. Just say a prayer or two about whatever seems important, put some change in the pot for the guy with the bell at Chris'mass, an' try to keep sayin' GD much. Everybody else'll take up the slack. If you die, yer soul'll just slip on up to heaven with the crowd."

"That does make sense," I said. "Maybe you're right."

"Course I'm right. Now come on over her an' wash my legs. You know I can't bend over that far."

I'm following Myra's words of wisdom; they seem to be working so far.

Anyway, the last time I spilled clam juice all over my desk I saw Kurt Cobain. And that was with both eyes.

The Fourth Amendment is meant to protect all

The Fourth Amendment. Well, it seems to me that members of law enforcement throughout this country must have been asleep when they covered that Amendment in evidence class.

I know many people will argue that if someone is guilty then they should serve the time, well if a person's rights have been violated (specifically their Fourth Amendment rights) then the evidence in their case which was collected in the illegal search should not be allowed in court.

Face it, if the police just followed the U.S. Constitution then there wouldn't be a problem here.

How tough is it to get a magistrate to sign a warrant, not very. As long as the police follow the correct procedure then some of these guilty people won't get to walk due to a screw up in the way the police searched their house or person.

For a refresher on the Fourth Amendment, let's look in this book I have here:

"The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized."

How many police officers follow this, not enough. Take for instance the O.J. Simpson case.

The judge in the preliminary hearing in the Simpson case allowed a number of evidence to be admitted. This evidence was recovered from O.J.'s house in the following hours after the murder of his ex-wife Nicole and Ronald Goldman. When this case goes to trial, the admission of this evidence can once again be challenged.

The police arrived at the scene to see if Mr. Simpson was OK, and to make sure no other murders had been committed.

Once the police entered the house and determined that no one was in danger and nothing had occurred at the residence, they began to search the lower portions of the house and the outside area.

Well, once they did find out everything was OK, they should have left the residence. Mr. Simpson was not necessarily a suspect at the time. There was definitely no urgent need to search the area, and why were they looking around for "evidence" if Mr. Simpson was not a suspect?

These police officers had no need to search for anything. They could have come back later after they did secure a warrant and search.

There was no reasonable belief that any "evidence" could be destroyed.

There are exceptions to searching without the presence of a warrant, which allow evidence to be admitted even if it was gathered without a warrant.

During the case of Boyd v. United States, in 1888, the Supreme Court established the use of the exclusionary rule. Basically the defendant had to either admit to the truth of fraud charges or turnover personal papers.

It turned out the Supreme Court found that search violated the Fourth Amendment, and just as the Fifth Amendment protects against self-incrimination, the

seizure of his private books and papers to be used in evidence against him is substantially different from compelling him to be a witness against himself.

As stated in Weeks v. United States, 1914, the Supreme Court found that once again for the defendant because the search in question violated his Fourth Amendment rights and the evidence which was seized should not have been admitted by the lower court which had convicted him.

The Supreme Court reached the conclusion that the letters in question were taken from the house of the accused by an official of the United States, acting under color of his office, in direct violation of the constitutional rights of the defendant which was a denial of the constitutional rights of the accused, and the court should have restored these letters to the accused. In holding them and permitting their use upon the trial, we think prejudicial error was committed.

Because the letters were confiscated without a warrant, the Supreme Court found this evidence could not be used in the decision.

As of today, 30 states reject the Weeks doctrine, and 17 are in agreement with it. The jurisdictions which have rejected the doctrine have not left the right to privacy without other means of protection.

Another case, Mapp v. Ohio, involved a search by police officers with a "warrant" for policy material (gambling material) and for a person who was being

searched for in connection to a recent bombing.

The police tried to enter the house, but Mapp wouldn't let them in without a warrant. Three hours later they forcibly entered the house and conducted an all inclusive search which turned up pornographic materials, which she was later convicted for.

There was never a warrant presented at the trial, and she was convicted for knowingly having in her possession and under her control certain lewd and lascivious books, pictures and photographs in violation of an Ohio code.

The Supreme Court found the ignoble shortcut to conviction left open to the state tends to destroy the entire system of constitutional restraints on which the liberties of the people rest. Having once recognized that the right to privacy embodied in the Fourth Amendment is enforceable against the States, and that the right to be secure against rude invasions of privacy by state officers is, therefore, constitutional in origin, we can no longer permit that right to remain an empty promise.

The U.S. Supreme Court reversed and remanded for further proceedings not inconsistent with this opinion.

Obviously there are many other cases which have involved illegal search and seizure, but these point to the realization that police officers do have a responsibility to follow correct procedures.

In closing, if the justice system punished individuals simply on the substance of what they may have in their possession, then that would allow the law enforcement agents to search and seize whomever they choose.

oncoming vehicle. Bald Eagles are scavengers by nature, and this explains why this one was on the side of the road feeding on carrion.

The Bald Eagle is currently on the endangered list in Georgia and many other states.

In Georgia, one of the criteria for a possible down listing to threatened would include at least 20 nesting pairs of the bald eagle would have to be present in Georgia. This past year, which was one of the best yet, saw only 19 pair in the state.

"It will take a period of three years in a row of maintaining at least 20 nesting pair in order for any possibility of a down listing for the Bald Eagle in Georgia, and we only had 19 this past year," Hein said.

An endangered species includes any species which is in danger of extinction throughout all or a significant portion of its range.

Hein has earned the title of master falconer through seven years of work and passing fed-

eral and state tests for the rehabilitation work on birds of prey. During the seven years, he was an apprentice for two, and worked as a general falconer for five years.

One of the interesting characteristics and telling facts about the Bald Eagle is in its mating.

"The bald eagle will mate only once during its life," Hein said.

"In my preliminary examination of this one, I determined the bird was a mature male Bald Eagle weighing roughly six pounds and at least five years old due to the yellowing of the beak," Hein said. "The yellow beak appears after the fifth year."

Hein met with Dr. Comer Douggan who is a veterinarian, for assistance in the care of this Bald Eagle. He has worked in the past with Douggan also.

As it turned out, the Bald Eagle had suffered a broken humerus bone, but it also turned out that intensive internal injuries occurred when it was struck by the truck.

"The eagle died due to the in-

ternal injuries earlier today," Hein said.

Due to the fact there are only 19 nesting pair of Bald Eagles in the state, this one's death could have an even bigger implication if it was one of those nesting pair located in Georgia.

"The significance of this Bald Eagle is that if it was nesting in Georgia, somewhere out there is a female who will not mate again," Hein said. "When we talk about the 19 nesting pairs in Georgia, you see how significant one eagle really is."

Currently, there has been discussions of whether or not a nationwide down listing might occur in the near future, and with the discussions have come confusion and disagreement.

"Most of the states in the south aren't close to having enough nesting pair to have the Bald Eagle be taken off the endangered list," Hein said. "Like I said, last year was a good year for Georgia and we didn't even meet the minimum number of nesting pair."

excited about the possibility of the issue coming to a vote, and that he wanted it pass.

"These students are adults and really if they want to get it (liquor) they can, if this passes they just won't have to drive as far to purchase it."

Landrum Hodges, owner of The County Line Package Store, had mixed emotions about the possibility of the referendum passing.

"I can't say that I'm 100 percent opposed to it, it might help me out," Hodges said. "I just really don't know what kind of impact it would have."

He also said that if the referendum did pass, he might have

to relocate closer to Statesboro for his business.

"It's hard to say really, if it did pass then I might have to move closer to town," Hodges said. "If it did pass, and I decided to move my store closer then I would of course have to apply for a license in Bulloch County, but who knows what will happen."

As far as support for the passage, Landrum said that most of the students would be behind it, but that there were many citizens of Statesboro who would probably oppose it in his opinion.

There are 17,661 total registered voters in Bulloch County, and registered voters in the city of Statesboro. The enrollment at GSU this past year was 14, 191.

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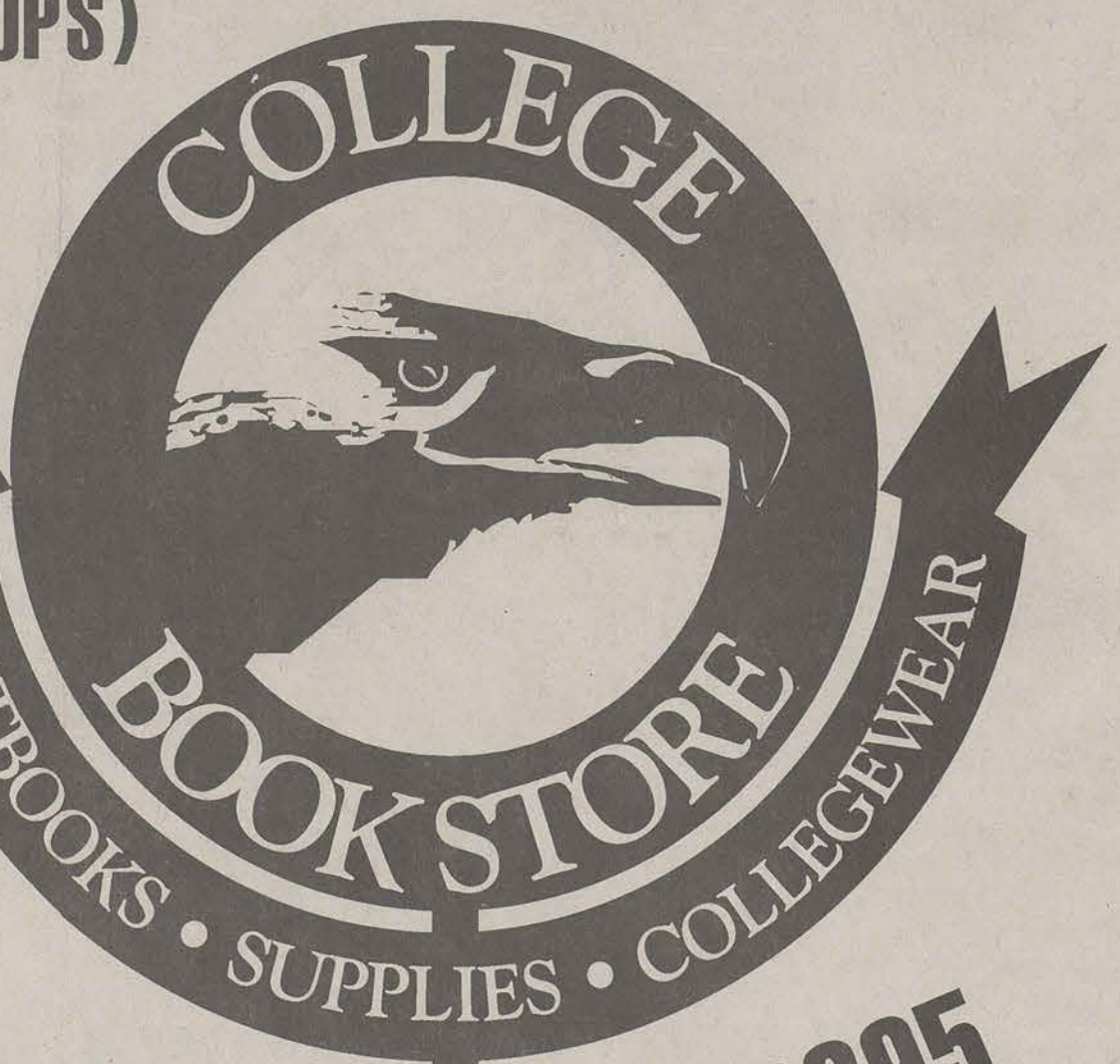
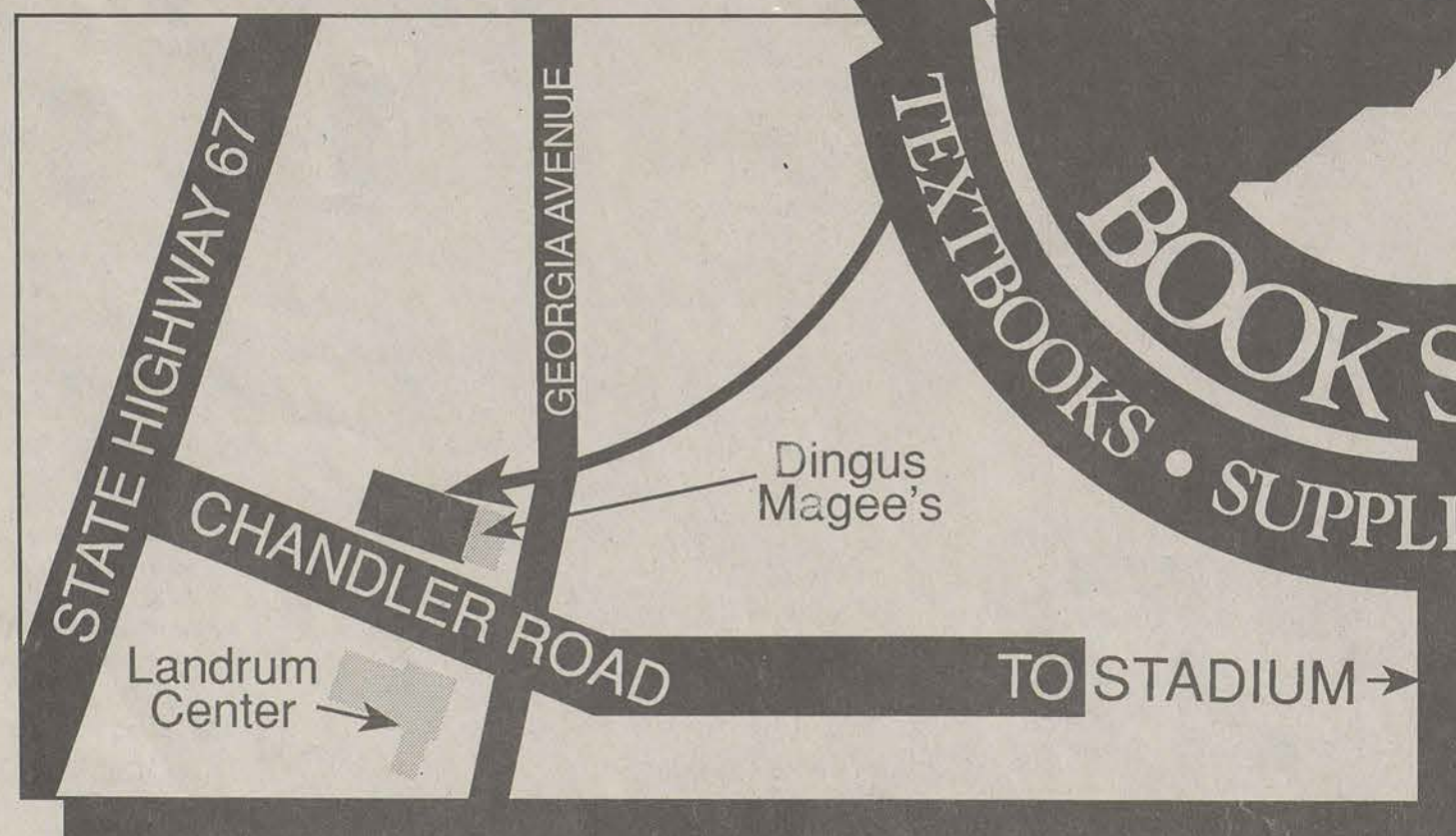
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
