Graduate student wins national award for paper

GSU graduate student Michael Hatchett, of Lithonia, had a class paper that was named one of the best submissions nationwide to the Phi Alpha Alpha national honor society for practitioners and scholars in public administration.

Hatchett won \$500, and his paper will be one of only four published in the Commemorative Volume of the Twentieth Anniversary of the society.

He is planning to pursue a Ph. D. in public administration specializing in administrative behavior and applied behavior science at the University of Southern California. He would also like to possibly become a university professor.

Hatchett will graduate in August with a master's degree in public administration. His plans are to enter USC in 1995.

Charges dropped against woman arrested for slapping child

CANTON, Ga. — Prosecutors have dropped charges against a woman accused of child abuse because she slapped her 9-year-old son in a supermarket.

Cherokee County District Attorney Garry T. Moss said Friday it would have been difficult to prove that Lynn Kivi slapped the boy hard enough to cause excessive pain.

"Courts of this state recognize the reasonable discipline of a child by his parents," Moss said in court papers dismissing cruelty to children charges that carried a 20-year prison sentence.

Moss also noted that no reports of abuse had been filed against Mrs. Kivi before the incident.

Mrs. Kivi, 35, was arrested May 23 after police were notified by two employees of a Winn-Dixie supermarket in Woodstock, an Atlanta suburb. According to the police report, she admitted slapping her son, Chuck, and said: "He was being rotten."

Student, fraternity named in suit

Former GSU student Clint Fair was named along with his father and a campus fraternity in a civil suit that was filed in the Bulloch County Court-house July 14.

The suit, filed by Sonya Tootle, was filed almost two months after her husband Ernest Edwin Tootle died due to injuries sustained in a near head-on collision with Fair on May 21 on Highway 67.

Fair was charged in the accident with driving under the influence (.17 grams/percent), first degree vehicular homicide, reckless driving and driving on the wrong side of the road.

Mrs. Tootle is asking for \$6,294 in order to take care of medical and burial expenses. She is also asking that "she is entitled to recover an amount determined by the enlightened conscious of the jury for the economic value of her husband's life and for the intangible loss resulting from his death."

According to the suit, as owner of the

1994 Chevrolet that his son was driving, Dennis Fair is liable for the negligent acts of Clint as related to the operation of the Chevrolet under the Family Purpose Doctrine.

The law firm representing Sonya Tootle is Brown and Livingston of Statesboro.

Associate Dean of Students James Orr was served a subpoena to appear before the law firm of Brown and Livingston in Statesboro on Sept. 20, pursuant to Section 30 of the Georgia Civil Practice Act (Section 9-11-30) for a deposition to be taken for the purpose of cross examination, discovery and all other purposes.

Orr was instructed to bring a copy of the charter for the Kappa Zeta Chapter of the Kappa Sigma International Fraternity, a copy of any and all documentary evidence of any and all disciplinary sanctions taken against Kappa Sigma in the last 15 years and a copy of all documents submitted by Kappa Sigma in relation to the "Luau" party on May 21.

A Bulloch County grand jury began deliberating yesterday whether there was enough evidence to indict Clint Fair on the charges. The court proceedings were expected to last through today.

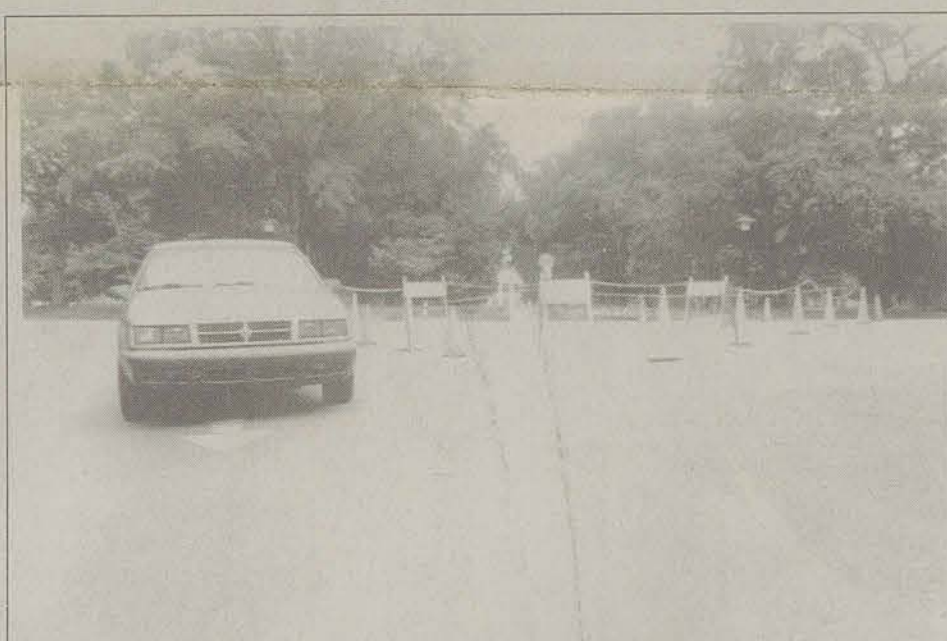
Sweetheart Circle gets a facelift

The Circle will remain one-way in front of the Administration Building, but will be narrowed to a single lane with diagonal parking.

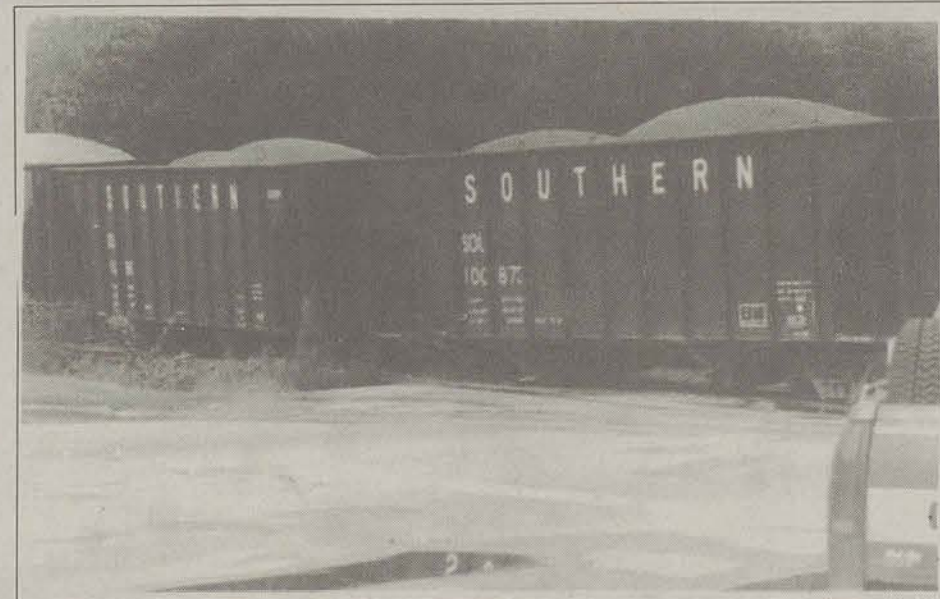

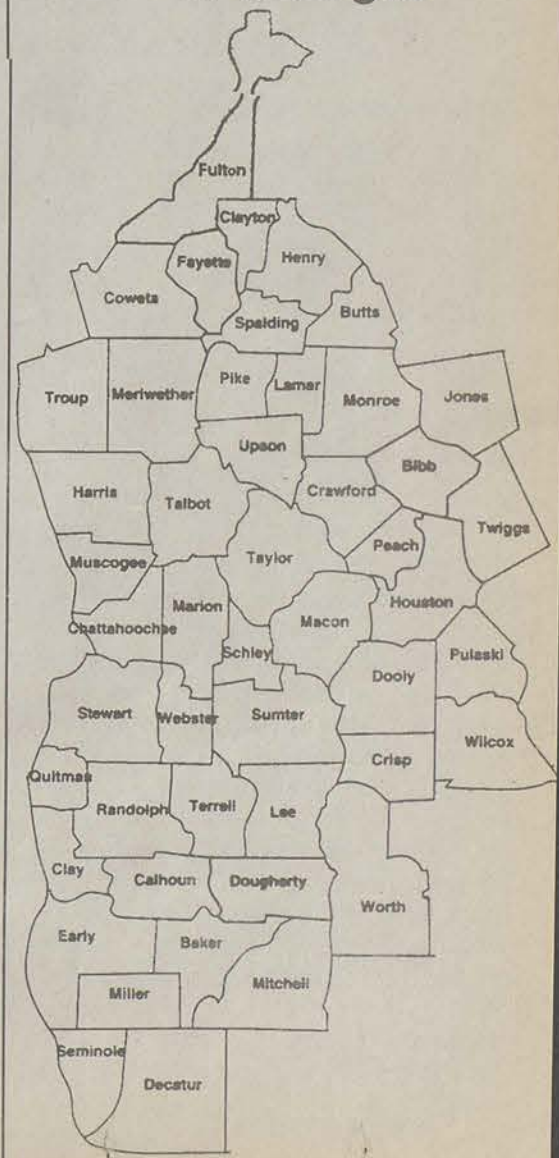

1993 plane crash results in filing of two civil suits

A second civil suit was filed last month by the parents of a former GSU student who was killed when his aircraft collided with another in 1993 at the Statesboro Municipal Airport.

Alan Newman and his wife Kathryn first filed a suit against the pilot of the other plane, John H. Thompson on July 19, 1993. The accident, which took Henry Newman's life, occurred on April 27, 1993.

On July 7, 1994, the Newmans filed a suit against the company which owned the plane that Th-

ompson was piloting, Arkansas Aircraft Incorporated.

According to reports from the accident, both planes were trying to land on intersecting runways when they collided only a few feet off the ground.

The suits state that Thompson had reported making transmissions on frequency 123.0 prior to his approach. The radio frequency for the Statesboro Municipal Airport is 122.8.

The suit alleges Thompson failed to determine the proper radio frequency for the airport, determine the runway in use at the Statesboro airport, monitor

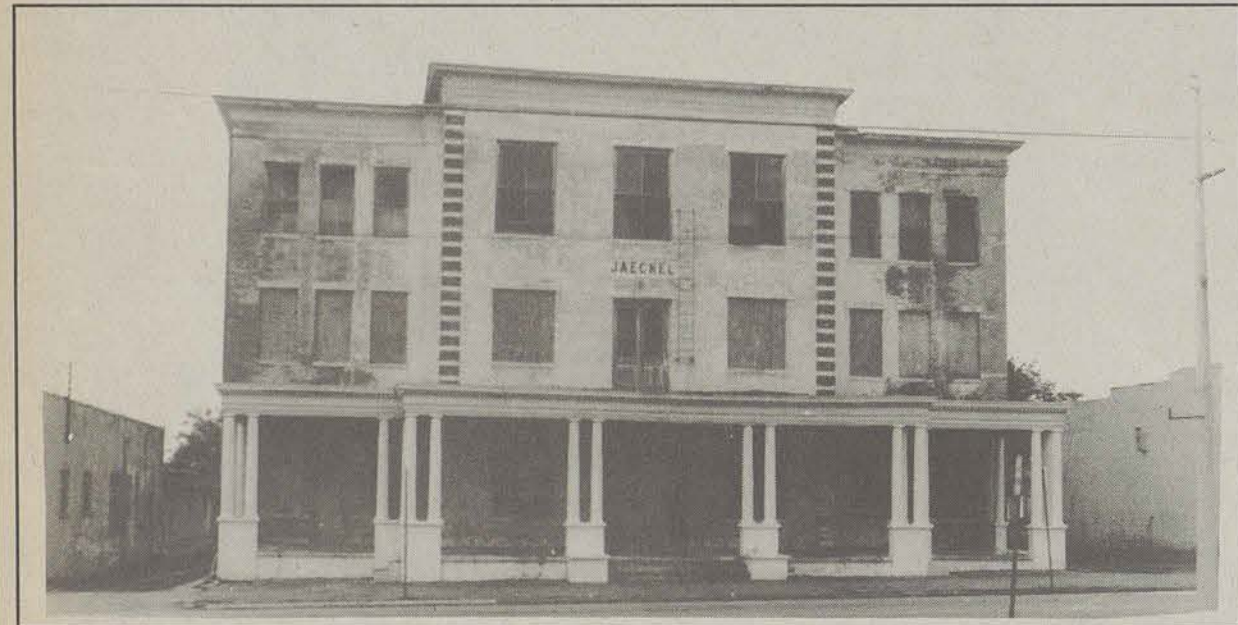
the airport advisory frequency for aircraft operating in the vicinity of the Statesboro airport and announce his position on the airport advisory frequency.

The suit against Arkansas Aircraft includes many of the same allegations, but also "Arkansas Aircraft Inc. negligence was the proximate cause of the collision."

It also states Arkansas Aircraft Inc. is responsible because it "owed a duty to other people to ensure that its pilots operated Arkansas Aircraft Inc. aircraft in a reasonably safe and prudent manner."

The city had preliminary drawings of the future site done a few years ago, so they will go by these as a guide, according to Averitt.

"We will have a bid process on it in around six months, and if the bid fits into the budget then the project should take between 18 and 20 months," he said.

"And if it doesn't, we will have to go back and work on it and fix it in the budget," Averitt said.

Woodstock isn't free

In the '60s, Woodstock was a hippie celebration of peace, love and rock 'n' roll. Today, Woodstock is a fighting word.

Promoters of dueling shows marking the 25th anniversary of the nation's most famous concert are fighting in federal court over the rights to the name.

Woodstock Ventures LC, the successor to producers of the 1969 concert, sued rival promoter Sid Bernstein and Shea Entertainment Inc., saying they misrepresented their show as an official anniversary concert.

Woodstock Ventures is selling tickets at \$135 apiece to "Woodstock '94," slated for Aug.

13-14 at an 840-acre farm in Saugerties, about 20 miles from the site of the original Woodstock.

The rival show, called "Bethel '94" takes place the same weekend at Max Yasgur's 600-acre farm — the site of the original show. Tickets for the Bethel show went on sale Monday for \$94.69.

The digits of the price are a play on the anniversary dates.

In its lawsuit, Woodstock Ventures claimed it has all rights to use of the Woodstock name because of its "extensive use, advertising and promotion of its Woodstock trademarks."

It asked for damages of at least \$80 million and a ruling that the show at Yasgur's farm cannot use the word "Woodstock."

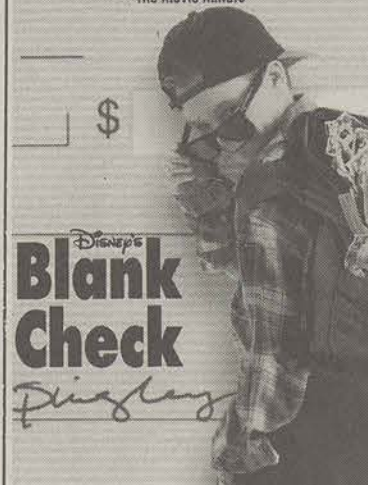

GACA games possibly coming in 96

The board will vote on this issue in October and announce its decision at that time.

New commissioner in sight

Stan Kasten, president of the Atlanta Braves, says he believes baseball will have a new commissioner very soon after a new collective bargaining agreement is reached with the players.

He also said owners could have had a commissioner in place a long time ago, but that they "made a conscious decision" not to do so until a new bargaining agreement is reached.

"The commissioner can't force the players to accept anything,"

Kasten said at a news conference Friday. "All he can do is impose things on the owners."

"We've never collectively bargained a solution," he said. "We've always had one shoved down our own throats. This time we won't."

Kasten's remarks before the Braves game with the Philadelphia Phillies came on the heels of Thursday's decision by the player's to set Aug. 12 as a strike date if a new collective bargaining agreement is not reached.

Kasten said he isn't convinced

there's going to be a strike.

"If we can develop a momentum (in negotiations), maybe we can put it off," he said. "I don't know if there's anything magic about the 12th."

He said he doesn't see the need for a strike, claiming that players will be guaranteed no less money than they're getting now.

Kasten also said owners haven't picked a commissioner because they didn't want him to be sullied by the process of reaching a new agreement with the players.

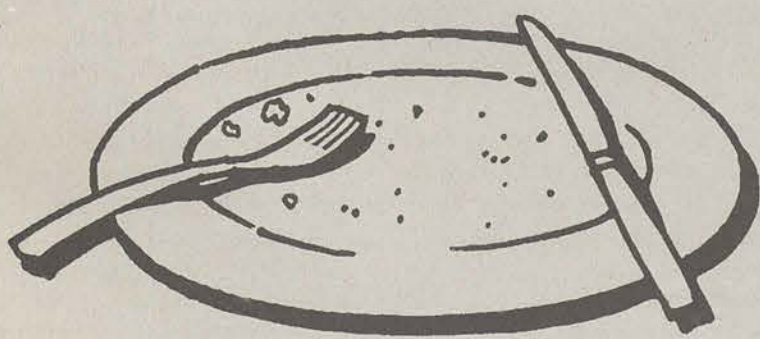

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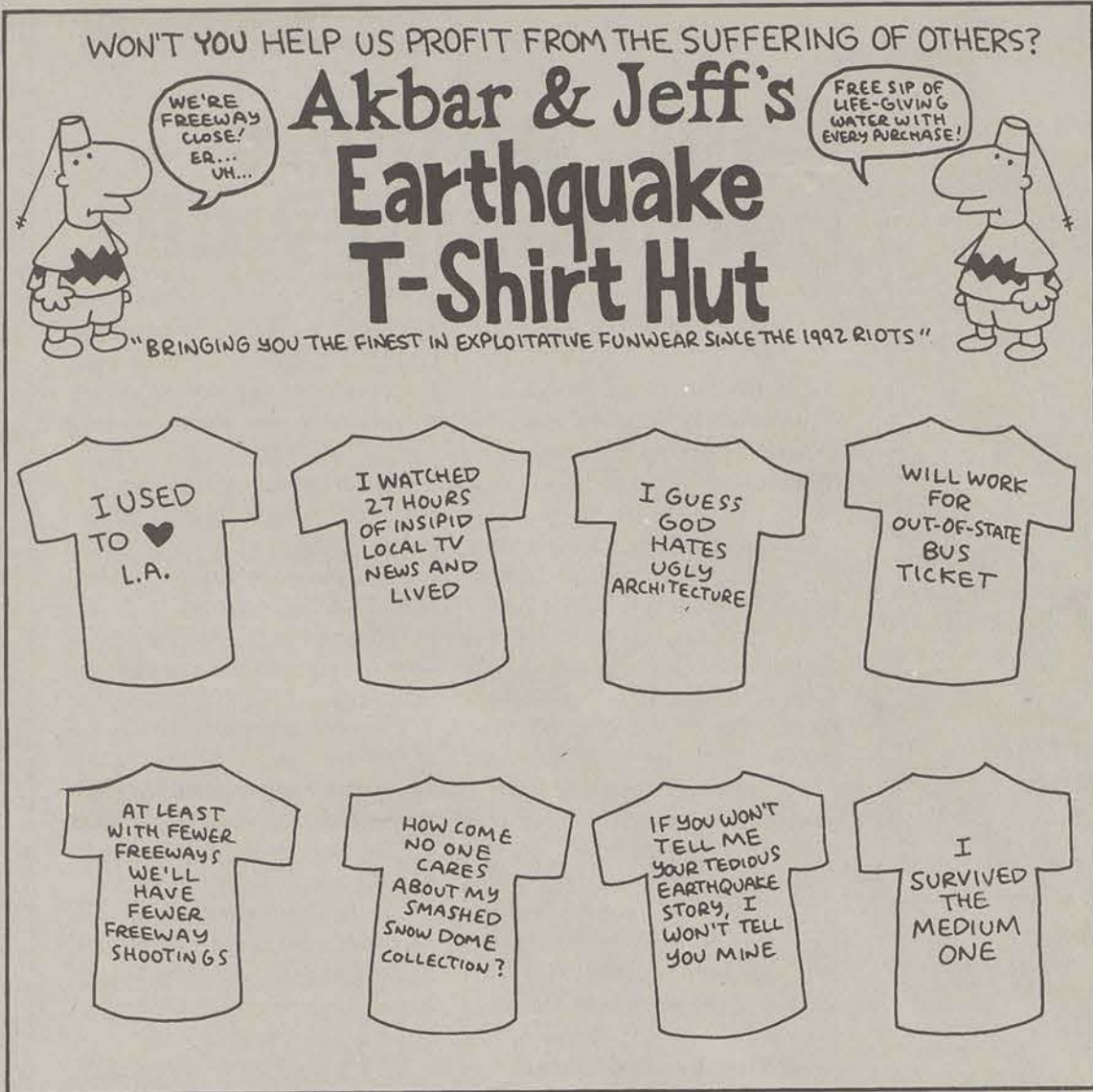

Take a shower fully dressed and go straight to class. This has the most profound effect on a bright sunny day.

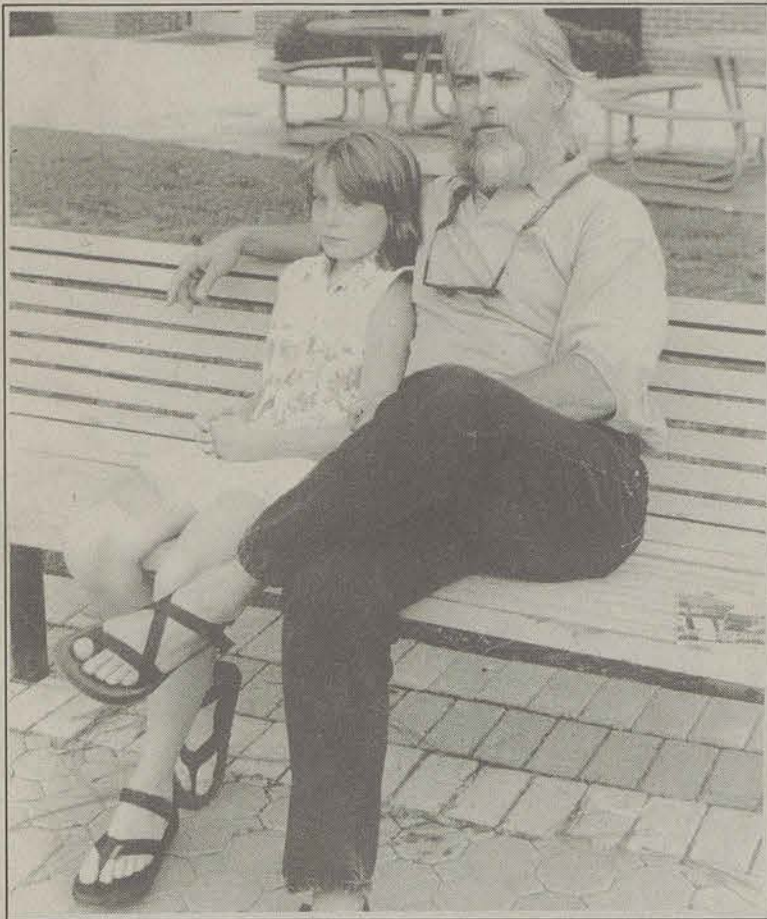
Drink 10 cups of thick coffee and go to the library.

about, so I had to go around and gather some information on them," he said. "I added my own knowledge about the rafting and some of the other sports."

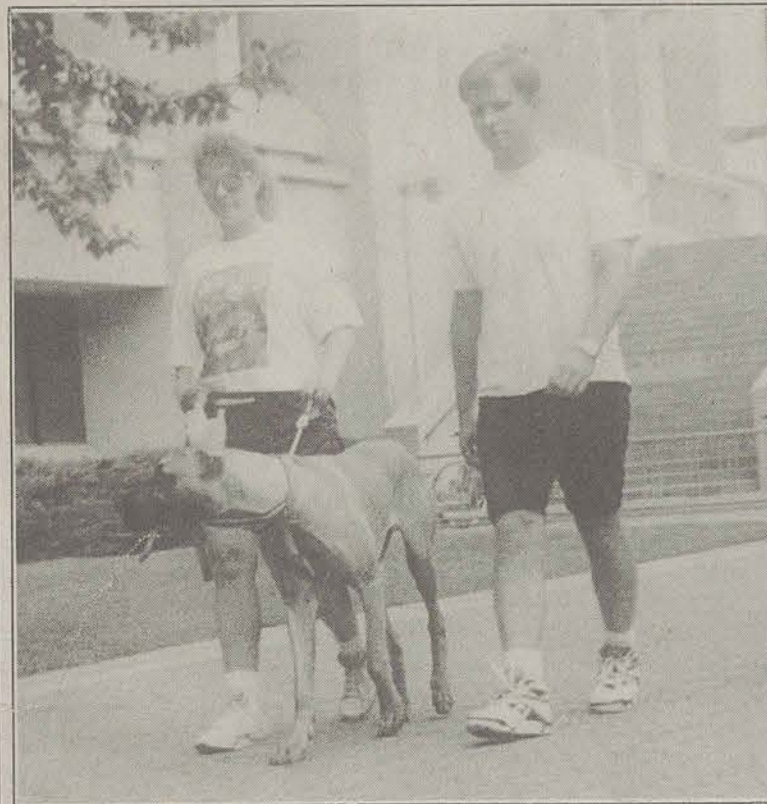

The longer term-relief efforts at GSU are being developed through Victoria Futch who is the assistant to the director of community volunteer services.

"This was a short-term project to help out," Ginn said. "Through community volunteer services at GSU, Victoria Futch is heading up some long-term projects which will be directed at helping the flood areas."

Futch explained several projects which will be planned during the next year.

"We had a lot of success in this first effort," Futch said. "In October, we will have a Red Cross Disaster Certification course which will certify volunteers so they can then be able to travel to

the flood hit areas and give their support."

Futch also said the Volunteer Services Office at GSU has been working with the Georgia Commission for National/Community Service and the Red Cross to develop more volunteer projects for the near future.

"What we must also understand is that even though a student isn't necessarily from a flooded area, someone in their family may be and thus they will feel the effects," Futch said. "This will be a long term recovery for the people of these counties, and we will have many projects throughout this coming school year which will involve helping these people."

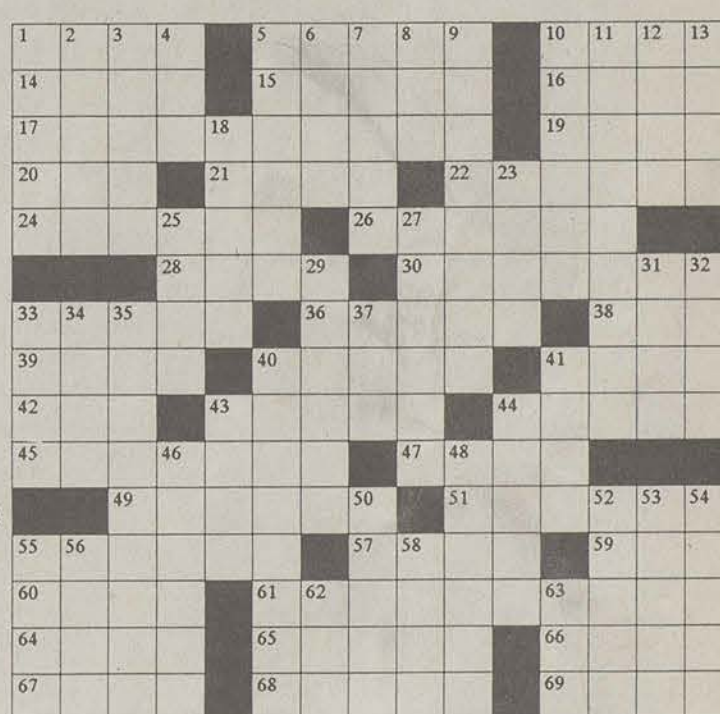

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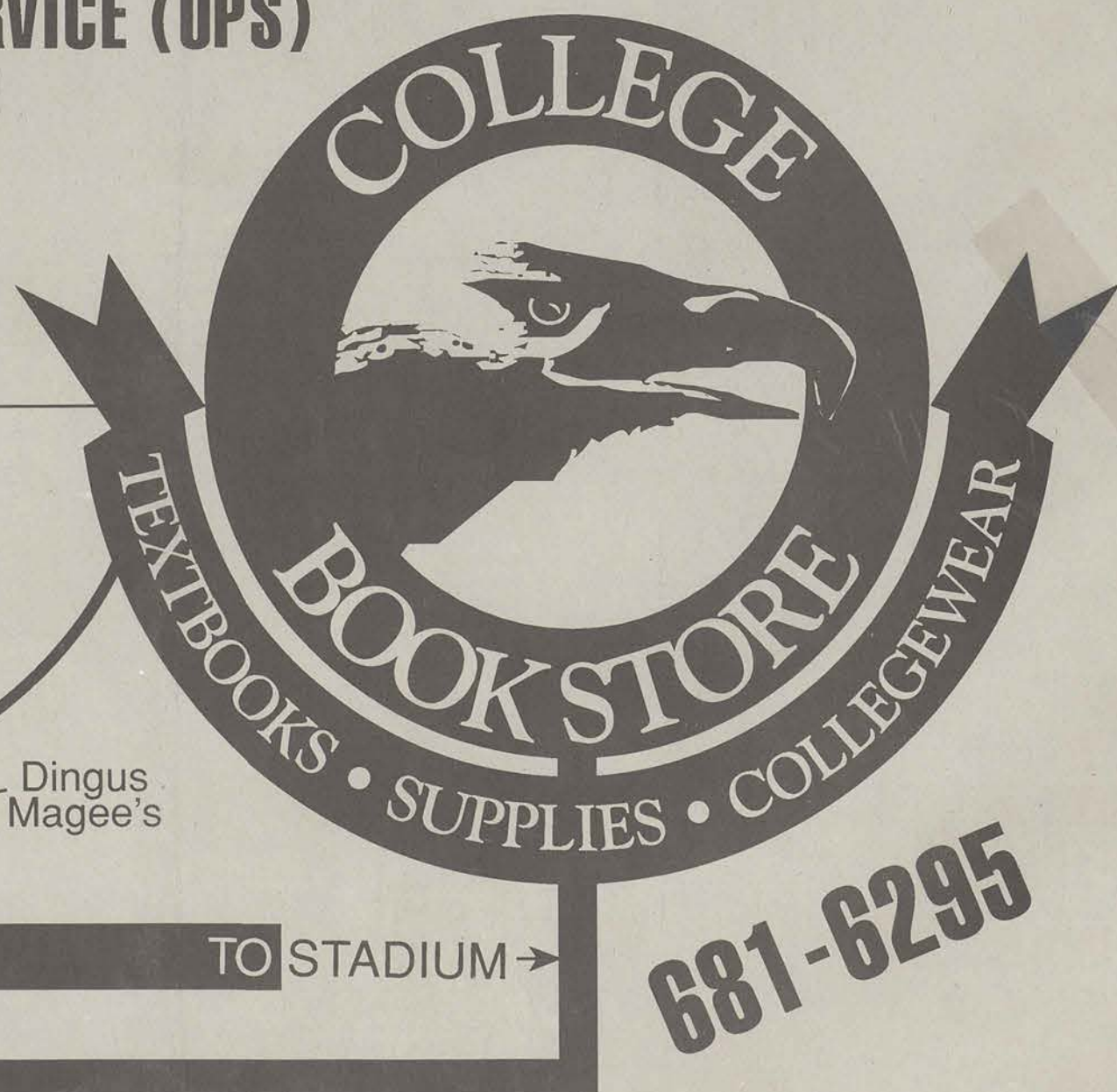
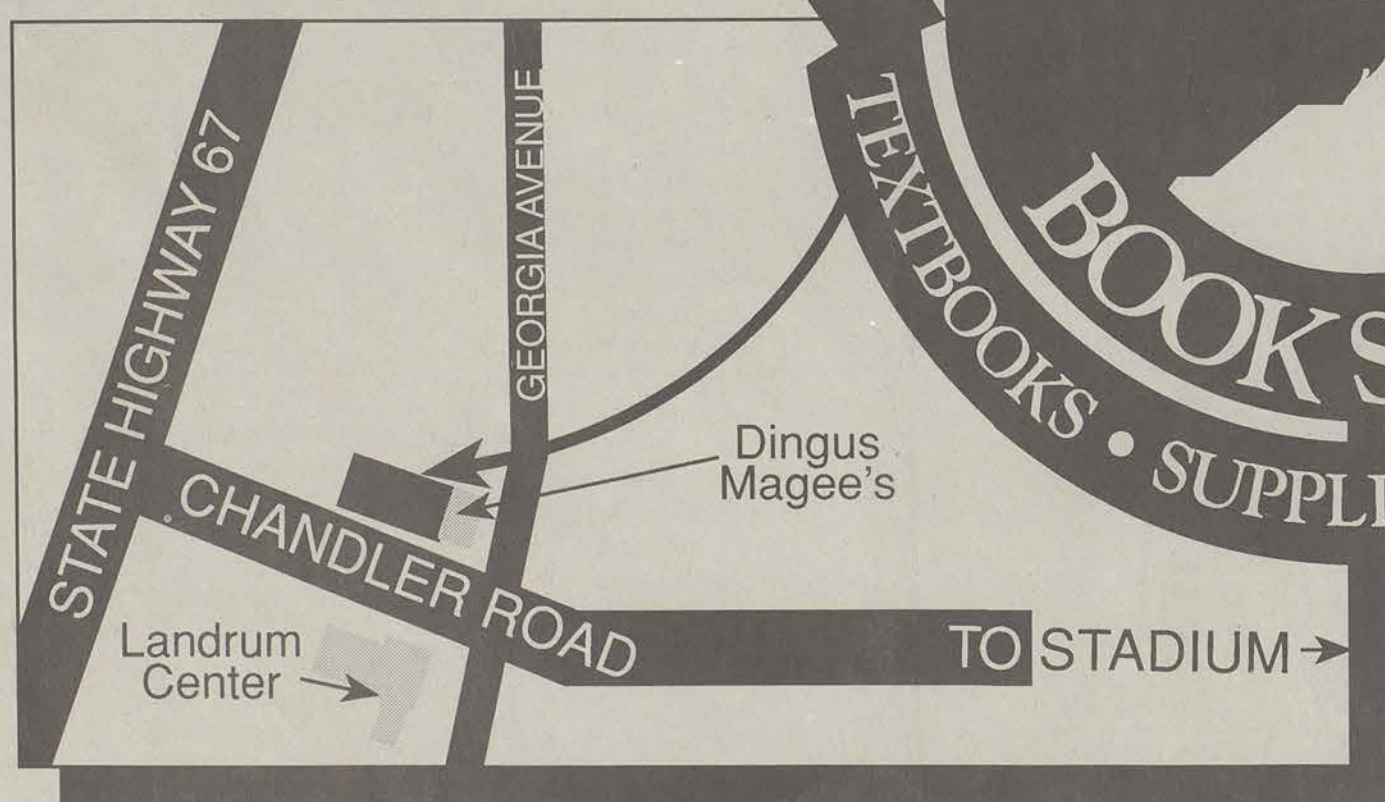
