## Farrakhan may speak at Atlanta's annual Freaknik

ATLANTA — Louis Farrakhan, the Nation of Islam leader, may extend a scheduled April 16 appearance in Atlanta to address black college students attending Freaknik later in that week.

Abdul Akbar Muhammad, an aide to the minister, said Farrakhan would soon decide whether to reshuffle some dates on an 11-city tour to extend his stay in order to address the thousands of black students expected for the annual spring gathering.

Muhammad announced Farrakhan's planned visit at First Iconium Baptist Church. He also criticized Atlanta business owners who say they're going to close early during Freaknik, which spawned scattered looting in the city last year.

"They want to try and give this the kind of image that black people are just savage, it's terrible," he said. "These are our students. We have to encourage them to do well in school just as white people strengthen their students and give them opportunities to blow off steam and enjoy themselves during their spring break."

An aide to Atlanta Mayor Bill Campbell said the mayor was traveling and could not be reached for comment.

Some have said the mayor hurt himself politically among blacks last year by taking a hard-line stance on Freaknik.

The Rev. Gerald Durley, who heads a committee appointed by Campbell to help structure this year's Freaknik, said students may not make time to listen to Farrakhan's message during the sprawling party.

"They come for their purpose, not for the purpose of an individual," he said. "These students have decided what they're going to do before they get here."

Steven Muhammad, a concert promoter and Nation of Islam leader, is trying to gain approval from the city for the use of Grant Park during Freaknik.

He said an appearance by Farrakhan could draw 200,000 students to Grant Park. "Freaknik would change as we know it," he said.

## Oh brother! Preacher causes uproar

Jim Giles, known as Brother Jim to his followers, brought his brand of evangelism and shock preaching back to GSU last Wednesday and Thursday.

"He has never called and scheduled when he is coming to campus," said Ken Brown, director of Public Safety. "First time we hear about it, usually, is when students call in."

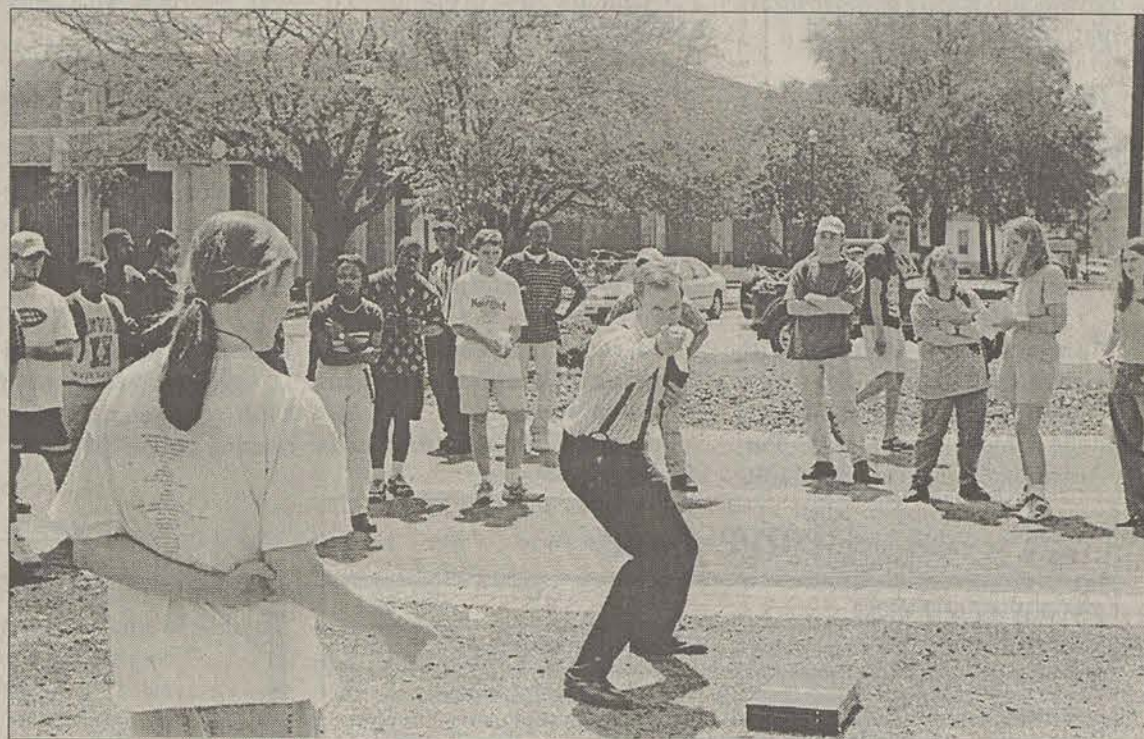
Giles, standing next to the University Store, began his preaching by condemning almost everyone in the crowd, from people with long hair to those of the Jewish faith, and also calling sorority members whores.

During his preaching, the crowd rhythmically began to chant, "Go home, Jim," while saluting Giles with the middle finger.

These are the ones Giles plays to.

"I play off the hecklers, use them to keep things going," said Giles in a previous interview with *The George-Anne*. "I guess you could say I play the crowd."

But as Giles brought his preaching down to a personal

level, two officers of Public Safety removed him from campus.

"We had a couple of officers go up there when we heard he was on campus," Brown said. "We want to protect his right to free speech, but we also don't want any problems. As I used

to tell Jim, as long as he is speaking in general terms and not getting specific with what he is talking about with a specific individual, and there is not a threat to the public safety, then we won't remove him from campus."

Giles said GSU audiences

were some of the worst he has encountered in his 15 years of traveling. He also said the taunts and threats don't worry him.

"These people are bluffing, trying to intimidate me," Giles said.

He said he attributed the

## South Building closes

GSU has closed the modular South Building and has almost completed the move of classes into other buildings, including the Forest Drive Building. Officials have not made a decision on what will be done with the empty space.

GSU has been leasing the South Building from Spacemaster International Incorporated since 1988.

"One thing you have to understand about the South Building is that Georgia Southern doesn't own it, we lease it," said Lee Davis, assistant to the vice president for legal business and finance. "It was pretty costly to lease."

Spacemaster International Incorporated will remove the South Building at a future date.

With the construction of the new College of Business and the College of Technology buildings, the uses for the South Building became

obsolete.

"When other buildings became available that we could put the former occupants of that building into, we were able to trim our costs considerably by just not leasing it anymore," Davis said.

The history classes have been moved into the Forest Drive building and the sociology, international studies, and foreign languages have also been moved to the Forest Drive building. ROTC and military sciences have been moved into the old Technology Annex building. The Campus Life Enrichment Committee has been moved to the Anderson Building.

No definite plans have been made for the land that the South Building currently occupies.

"That is a big building and it sits on a lot of space, but it is not an easily accessible space," Davis said. "In the short run, I don't know what they are going to do with it. In the long run, there is going

## More parking changes expected

Campus officials are in the process of constructing a new parking lot by Forest Drive to be ready for use next fall.

GSU students returning in the fall will be welcomed back to find an additional 1,500 to 1,800 new parking spaces on campus.

The changes are already underway and could take some time to be complete, but the main construction and paving should be done by the beginning of next fall, Parking and Transportation Director Bob Chambers said.

"This construction is being done with the students' interests in mind," Chambers said.

The first phase, which is already underway, is the paving of the gravel lot on the corner of Forest Drive and Plant Drive, across the street from the new engineering building. As soon as the parking and road construction is completed, construction on the new education building will begin sometime in October.

Also underway is the construction of a road connecting

the 301 bypass to Forest Drive.

The plan includes paving the lot directly across from the Forest Drive Building and the west commuter lot behind the Southern Center.

When the paving is complete, Plant Road will be moved and the vacant space will be made into a parking lot, combining all the parking lots along Forest Drive.

In addition, the west commuter lot and the parking lot

by the technology building are supposed to be expanded.

Also slated for construction is a parking lot next to the ROTC rappelling tower.

Further parking lot construction will take place on what is now the Marvin Pittman playground, and as soon as it closes construction will begin, Chambers said.

The cost of the project is approximately \$1.5 million.

## SGA finishes faculty guide, discusses attendance policy

SGA announced last Wednesday it has finished the Student Guide to Peer Performance and has made the final revisions to its proposed attendance policy.

Gavin Shook, vice president of academic affairs, said at the April 3 meeting that the final touches are being put on the guide and it will be ready for distribution after the quarter is over.

The guide is a reference book for students that lists all GSU professors and gives a breakdown of each professor's grade distributions, offers student opinions, and allows professors to comment on their teaching style.

The attendance policy proposal is expected to be submitted to the Faculty Senate for their approval.

Shook said he would not release a copy of the proposal for fear that if he did, the Faculty Senate might not want to accept it.

Shook discussed some of its major points during Wednesday's SGA meeting. SGA has proposed to allow students who have a grievance about absences or grades affected by absences to go straight to an appeals board. Currently, students only have the option of going to their professor and then to the department head, and that is where the appeals process ends.

The other point he discussed was concerning the rule that GSU does not issue excuses for class absences. The University Catalog reads, "In case of absences as a result of illness, representation of the university in athletic and other activities or special situations, instructors may be informed of reason for absence, but these are not excuses."

The new proposal would allow students to be excused for such reasons.

The Faculty Senate is scheduled to vote on the attendance policy later this week.

When she remained in the office, it dawned on the robbers that something was up so they fled.

FLINT — Richard G. Crabe lives alone and insists his house doesn't have a leak. Still, he received a water bill for \$2,864.98.

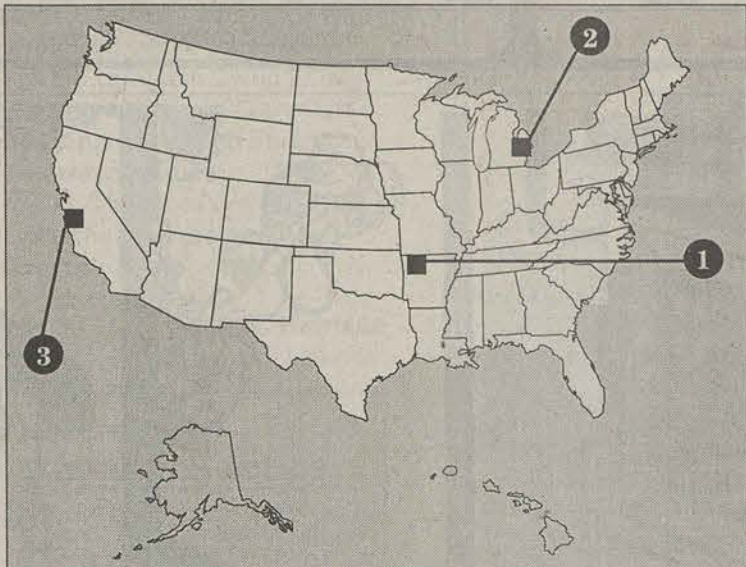
"I could import water cheaper from Switzerland," said Crabe, 54.

He said his bills have skyrocketed since fall. February's bill was \$1,500. He said there's no way he could have flushed the toilet, washed clothes or taken enough showers to boost his bill an additional \$1,300 for March.

"There has to be something really wrong, but I don't want to be the one to pay for the major mistake," Crabe said.

A new Flint water complaint board will start listening to wacky cases, like Crabe's, possibly by July. The board will consist of three residents and four staff members, said City Administrator David H. Ready.

Crabe said he began having problems after a new meter was placed outside his house a few years ago. He said he has had a few high water bills, but none near \$2,800.

Coroner dies while picking up body

MONTEREY PARK — A Los Angeles County coroner's investigator collapsed and died while picking up the body of suicide victim, authorities said.

Coroner's investigator Michael A. Shepherd, 51, was sent to retrieve the body of a 27-year-old woman who had hanged herself when "he dropped dead from a heart attack" at 6:42 a.m.,

said coroner's spokesman Scott Carrier.

The woman committed suicide in the basement of an abandoned condominium.

"He made the removal and was out of breath after moving the body up a steep incline," Carrier said.

"He said, 'I'm going to go back and get my briefcase,' and he turned around and collapsed on the spot."

Shepherd, a 21-year employee of the coroner's office, was dead on arrival at Garfield Hospital, Carrier said.

Carjacker returns infant left in car

EAST HARTFORD, Conn. — A car thief called police after realizing the vehicle he had stolen had a 10-month-old passenger, enabling the infant to be quickly reunited with her mother, police said.

Kathy Kaminski had stepped out of her running car to drop off some newspapers when a car thief jumped in and sped off, police said.

Her infant daughter, Emily, was in the back seat.

About 15 minutes later, Hartford police received a phone call

telling them where the car and baby could be found. A witness said the suspect made the call.

Police followed the tip and found the baby unharmed and the car unlocked and running.

Joel Javier Cruz, 17, of Hartford, was charged with risk of injury to a minor, reckless endangerment, larceny, robbery and unlawful restraint. He was ordered held on \$200,000 bond.

"My wife and I are very thankful that this man had the common decency and good sense to call 911," said the girl's father, Gary Kaminski.

### GSU should decide carefully how to use South Building lot

With the closing of the South Building, GSU is undecided on what will be done with the empty space. GSU has already moved most of the departments out of the building, which is expected to be moved out soon.

With the construction of the new College of Technology and College of Business and Forest Drive, the temporary South Building has become useless to GSU. Many of the classes and departments that were once in the South Building have now been moved into these buildings.

As of now, when the building is moved off, the land will remain vacant. Officials say that the land is not an "easy accessible place" but said that eventually new buildings will be built there.

What sort of new buildings should we expect?

One suggestion could be the expansion of the Communications Arts Building to include room for a decent theater as well as more classrooms.

GSU has been leasing the South Building, and now with its removal and money from the state legislature to buy the Forrest Drive and Family Consumer Sciences buildings, which GSU has also been leasing, the school is saving almost \$1.2 million.

Couldn't this money be used to help fund an expansion of the communication arts department or even a new theater? What about giving them a permanent building? Perhaps the new land could also serve as a parking lot.

This could be an ideal solution and would be tremendously helpful to students. There are already not enough parking spaces for students, and with GSU's enrollment increasing from time to time, this would seem logical.

But in the meantime, the South Building lot's fate is unknown. There are many things that need work and improvement on campus. We hope that GSU will closely consider all options available.



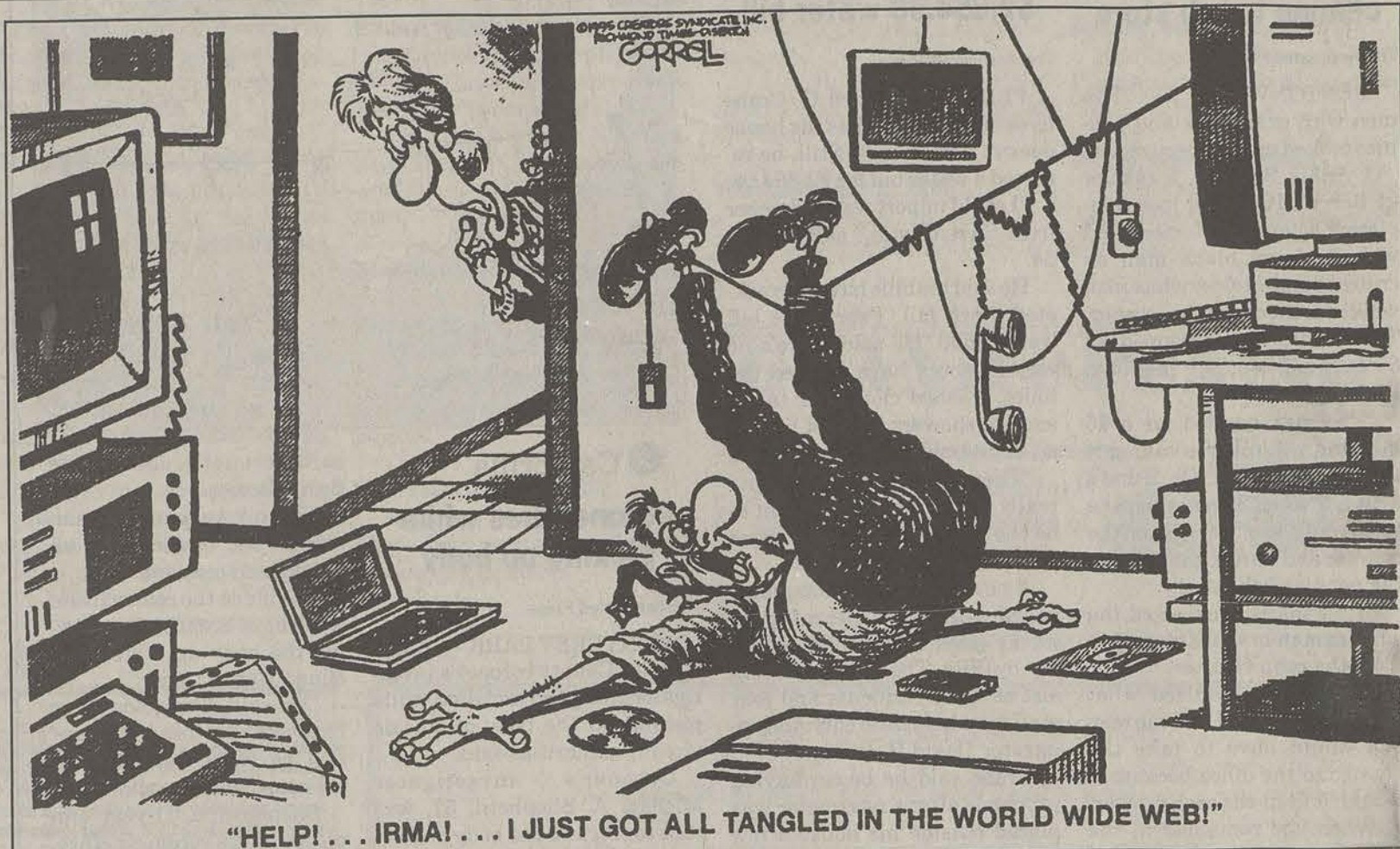

## Our generation lacks compassion for poor

Our professor tried to explain that the father in this family wanted to work, but all he could find were day-to-day jobs. Then, he'd be out of work again with seven hungry children to feed.

The girl in our class wasn't buying it, though. She still maintained that while this man might have been working, the majority of the poor don't want to improve their situations. They prefer to

live as they do.

The professor finally said, "That's easy for you to say."

A rage came up inside of me that I can't explain. I was fuming the rest of the day.

I wanted to ask this girl what made her an expert on poverty. How many nights has she gone to bed hungry? Has she ever lived without a toilet, a bed, or even central heating and air?

Okay, these people want to sleep on the floor. They want to use the bathroom outside. They want to live hand-to-mouth, wondering where their next meal is coming from. Am I the only person who thinks this sounds absolutely ridiculous?

I really can't be upset with this one particular girl alone. She really can't be blamed for adopting that viewpoint; she is simply a product of her environment. If one analyzes the way we view and treat the poor in America, anyone can see that it's not a pretty picture.

Obviously, there are some people who work at good-paying jobs or have some other type of revenue while fraudulently receiving welfare benefits. No one can deny this happens. I hope these are the "poor" who supposedly want to live in poverty. Some have the tendency to lump everyone who receives welfare benefits together collectively as the poor.

### Inconsistencies over the Ten Commandments

By promoting the Ten Commandments, the Tennessee legislature is 190 years behind the times of biblical scholarship. W.M.L. de Wette observed in 1806 that the laws, which are according to the Pentateuch God promulgated through Moses, appear to be unknown in later history recorded in Judges, Samuel and most of Kings.

Those books show a complete ignorance of Mosaic stipulations. There is no suggestion that Yahweh is to be worshipped only at one central sanctuary, no precise regulations about how sacrifices are to be offered and no established priesthood to regulate worship.

Chronicles expands Samuel and Kings so as to include laws conspicuously absent in them and contrary to the behavior of early Hebrew monarchs.

De Wette argues that the laws were framed after, and as a corrective to, the ungodly behavior of the early kings.

Kings only makes occasional reference to Mosaic laws until it tells of the discovery of the "book of law" in the reign of Josiah in 621 B.C.E., 400 years after David (2 Kings 22).

Even Jeremiah deemed the law book of little account and repudiated its authority (Jeremiah 7:22).

The inconsistency between the starting point of Israeli history, as stated in the opening books of the Bible, and that history itself suggests the book of laws may have been a priestly fabrication introduced long after Israel's Golden Age under David and Solomon.

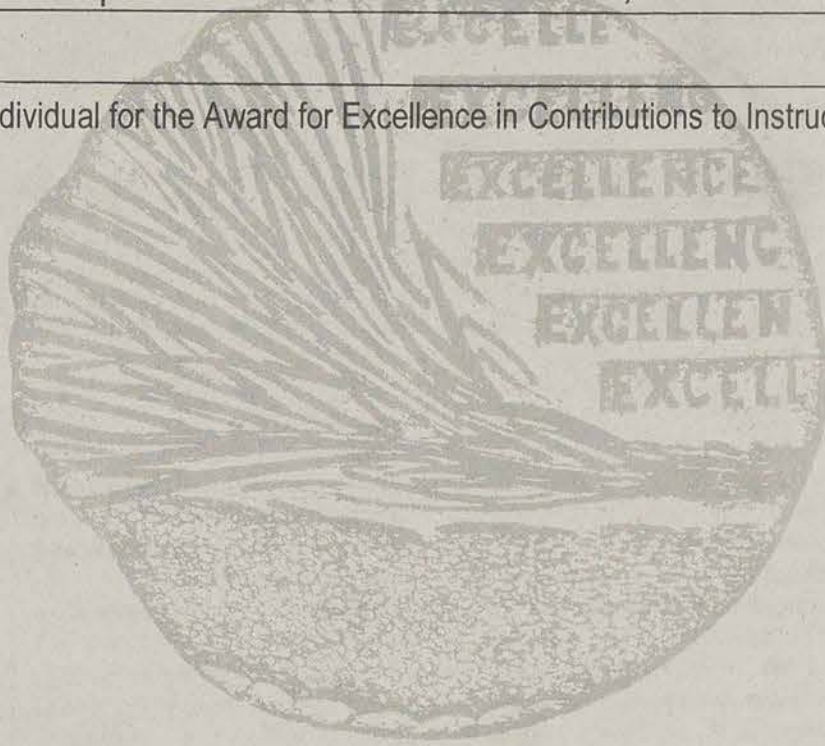

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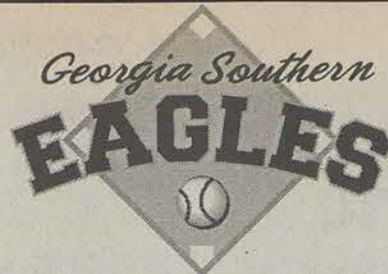

## Eagles take two from Charleston Southern

GSU pounded out 13 hits and 13 runs in a 13-2 Tuesday evening win against Charleston Southern.

After all, with his overpowering offense and explosive pitching and defense, it seems all he has to do at times is sit back and watch.

And on Tuesday, "sit back and watch" was all Charleston Southern head coach Randy Mazey could do. His Buccaneers (13-14) gave up 13 hits in GSU's 13-2 pounding, giving the Eagles their 24th win of the season.

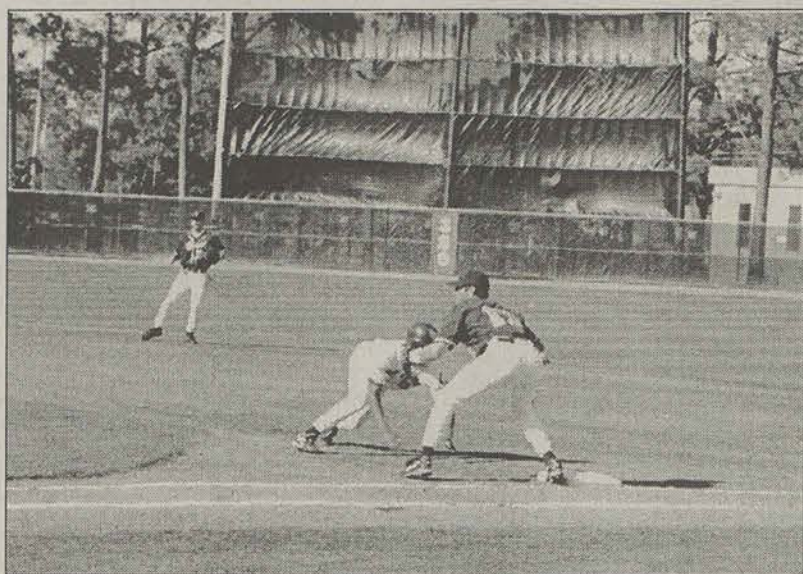
GSU's sophomore hurler, Brian Hall, allowed only six Buc hits and struckout seven to improve his record to 3-0.

"Brian pitched well, and we swung the bats well," Stallings said. "That's what we need to keep doing. We made some mistakes, but I'm still pleased with the outcome."

The Bucs scored the first run of the game when a throwing error by catcher Steve Wilson advanced Mark Cisar to third. J.P. Noon's grounder scored Cisar and put Charleston Southern on top.

But that was all the offense CSU would see until its one-run seventh inning.

Meanwhile, GSU's Mark Hamlin connected on a solo homerun in the second inning to start the Eagles scoring. Hamlin's next two at-bats both

resulted in triples which sparked a three-run third inning and a four-run fifth and put the game out of reach.

Batting in the fifth slot, Hamlin finished by going 4-for-4 from the plate while scoring four runs. He also lacked one single in an effort to hit for the cycle.

GSU tacked on five more runs in the last two innings to finish off the Bucs in the first game of the two-game series.

"I think we played as well as we can," Stallings said. "There is still room to improve though. We made mental errors by throwing the ball when we shouldn't, but our offense made up for it. It was a good win."

Tommy Peterman went 2-for-4 with three runs scored and one RBI, while Steve Walson added

two hits and one RBI.

Antoine Moran also stole his 26th and 27th base to keep his perfect string of stolen base attempts without being caught alive. He is 27-for-27 on the year.

With 24 wins on their record and only seven losses, the Eagles are again making noise for a position in the college polls, a place they've already occupied previously in the year.

"We can't worry about that, because we have no control over it," said Stallings, who recorded his 1,151st career victory with the win, said. "When we worry about things like that, it only causes distractions. The most important thing we need to concentrate on is the game we are playing, because that is the only thing we can do anything about."

### Braves are well armed to repeat

ATLANTA — Through all the recent changes in baseball, there has been one constant: the Atlanta Braves.

A trade here, a free-agent acquisition there, the Braves never seem to do more than a little fine-tuning each year to ensure their inevitable spot in the playoffs.

Atlanta has been a part of the post-season landscape every year since 1991 (except for the strike-shortened 1994 season, of course), culminating last year with the city's first World Series title. There is no reason to believe the Braves won't be back there again in 1996.

"There's a lot of pressure that goes with showing up from day one of spring training and your only goal is to win the world championship," said Tom Glavine, one of the pitchers who makes the Braves well-armed to do just that. "Obviously, every team comes in with that goal, but for this team we know that, realistically, if we don't win a world championship, it's a bad year."

There was a sense of relief at spring training this year, like a giant monkey had finally been lifted from everyone's back. After losing the World Series in 1991 and '92 and the NL championship series in '93, the Braves were starting to look like the Buffalo Bills of baseball: a good team that would never cross the threshold to greatness.

Then came 1995. The Braves recovered from a slow start to win the East Division by 21 games, then swept a very good Cincinnati team for the NL pennant and beat 100-game winner Cleveland in a six-game World Series.

"It would have been easy for this team to give in to the whole thing, to say we're snake-bitten, maybe we're not destined to win the championship, all those things," Glavine said. "But that never happened here. We never lost sight of the fact that we have a good ballclub, and that we're going to get back to the World Series and win one."

Now that the Braves have won a championship, they have to deal with the inevitable questions about complacency. But if the fire is still burning, this is clearly the best team in the National League.

As has been the case since 1991, Atlanta's success revolves around the finest starting rotation in the game. Tom Glavine is baseball's winningest pitcher over the past five years (16-7, 3.08 ERA last season) but is only the second-best pitcher on his own team.

That's the way it is when one of your teammates is Greg Maddux. There's not much left to say about Maddux, who has won an unprecedented four straight Cy Young awards and is coming off the two best statistical seasons in pitching history (19-2, 1.63 ERA in '95).

Ol' Cy must be turning over in his grave, concerned that his award is about to be renamed for Maddux.

"He's the most intelligent individual in pitching that I've ever been around," said Leo Mazzone, the Braves pitching coach.

After Maddux and Glavine, the Braves have two pitchers who would be the No. 1 starter with most teams. John Smoltz (12-7, 3.18) may finally win 20 games now that his right elbow is fully healthy. Left-hander Steve Avery (7-13, 4.67) struggled most of last season but came on strong in the post-season and is still only 25 years old.

Rookie Jason Schmidt, who led the International League with a 2.25 ERA, is taking over the fifth spot in the rotation.

While starting pitching has been a constant strength for the Braves, the bullpen was a perennial problem until last season. Mark Wohlers (7-3, 2.09, 25 saves) finally harnessed his enormous talent and became one of the best relievers in baseball.

"It used to be Mark would go into the game and say, 'Oh my, look who's hitting,'" Mazzone said. "Now he goes into a game and the hitter says, 'Oh my, look who's pitching.'"

With Wohlers firmly entrenched as the closer, Greg

McMichael (7-2, 2.79) shifted to a more comfortable middle-reliever role alongside Brad Clontz (8-1, 3.65) and Pedro Borbon (2-2, 3.09).

Offensively, the Braves ranked next-to-last in the league with a .250 batting average and only ninth in runs scored (645), but they had a knack of getting key hits. Atlanta won 25 games in its final at-bat and David Justice's homer provided the only run in the Game 6 clincher over Cleveland in the World Series.

General manager John Schuerholz decided to keep the core of his offense intact, resigning first baseman Fred McGriff (team-high 27 homers and 93 RBIs) and centerfielder Marquis Grissom to multi-year contracts.

Grissom, acquired in a pre-season trade with Montreal to give Atlanta a true leadoff hitter, had his worst year since 1990, hitting .258 with 12 homers and 29 stolen bases. With the security of a new contract, the Braves expect him to look more like the player who stole more than 70 bases in both 1991 and '92.

Justice also struggled after injuring his shoulder, batting only .253 with 24 homers and 78 RBIs. He's healthy now, but eyebrows were raised in spring training when he was stopped by police in a high-crime area and then announced his divorce from actress Halle Berry.

Anyway, this season could constitute a changing of the guard among the position players.

Third base Chipper Jones, runner-up to Hideo Nomo for the NL rookie of the year award, is on the verge of superstardom after hitting .265 with 23 homers and 86 RBIs. Catcher Javier Lopez (.315, 14, 51) and left-fielder Ryan Klesko (.310, 23, 70), 25 and 24 respectively, will take over full-time roles.

The only concern is Jones' health. He missed all of the 1994 season after hurting his left knee and will miss the season opener while recovering from arthroscopic surgery on his right knee. The Braves insist Jones will make a complete recovery and shouldn't be out for more than the first week.

### Parrish claims Abdul-Jabbar record for games played

CLEVELAND — Robert Parish appeared in his 1,561st NBA game Saturday night, breaking Kareem Abdul-Jabbar's record.

The 42-year-old Charlotte center, who has played on three NBA championship teams and eight All-Star teams, broke the record when the opening jump ball went up.

During the first stoppage in play with 9:48 left in the opening quarter of the Hornets-Cavaliers game, official Tommy Nunez presented Parish with the ball.

He got a 90-second standing ovation from the fans and both teams.

Parish had already scored four points on a short jump shot and a dunk.

The game resumed after a two-minute break.

"It's going to mean a lot to me," Parish said before the game. "I'm proud of the record for what it stands for — consistency and longevity."

"It's a testament to my career. I've been blessed to not have major injuries."

Parish played 39 minutes and scored 14 points on 6-of-9 shooting in the Hornets' 93-89 victory over the Cavaliers.

He had nine rebounds, four assists and three blocked shots. Parish, who will be 43 on August 30, is in his 20th NBA season.

He averaged 21.6 points a game during four years at Centenary College in Shreveport, La., then was a first-round draft choice of the Golden State Warriors in 1976.

The 7-2 Parish was traded to the Boston Celtics after four seasons.

The Celtics won championships with Parish at center in 1981, 1984 and 1986.

Charlotte, which is in a battle for a playoff spot in the Eastern Conference, signed Parish as a

ter fielder Antoine Moran when he was thrown out trying to steal second. Moran had stolen 27 in 27 attempts up until the sixth inning. Moran actually stole second, but overslid the bag and was tagged out on the shortstop side of second base.

GSU had many offensive heroes on a night when they pounded out 12 hits. Wilson and Steve Walson both had three hits, and Tommy Peterman added a homerun and a double to his totals.

But the story of the game was the shoddy baserunning by both teams. GSU was nailed on the bases four times in the game. Charleston Southern had two runners cut down at the plate, and another cut down at second trying to advance on a single.

"We had a lack of concentration today on the bases," head coach Jack Stallings said. "We are not as stupid as we looked today."

"I'm happy that we came back and won the game, but we really didn't play well early in the game," Stallings said.

The win pushed GSU's overall record to 25-7 for the year, going to Johnson City, Tennessee to face the ETSU Bucs in a weekend conference series.

The Eagles swept the Buccaneers in Johnson City and moved into first place in the conference with a 28-7 overall record.

free agent on August 4, 1994.

He had season averages of 3.7 points, 3.9 rebounds and 13.7 minutes per game before Saturday's action.

Parish, fifth on the career list for minutes played (45,084), sixth in rebounds (14,583) and 14th in points (23,127), does not know if his career will continue beyond this season.

"I think this summer I'll take a long look at it and decide if I'll play," Parish said.

"First, there will have to be interest in me if I'm to continue playing."

"I don't know how much interest there will be in a 43-year-old. I'm not tired of the game yet."

Parish has a \$3 million contract with the Hornets for next season, but the team can buy out the contract for \$1 million.

The Hornets, who traded standout center Alonzo Mourning to the Miami Heat early in the season, also use Matt Geiger and George Zidek at center.

Parish's start against Cleveland was his 27th in 67 appearances this season, and his 16th consecutive start.

Parish averaged 9.6 points, 9.1 rebounds and 2.75 blocked shots in 29.4 minutes in the 15 previous games.

"He (Parish) is healthy, he's looking good, and he's running up and down the floor after 20 years," said Cleveland's Michael Cage, who started against Parish at center.

"I was somewhat in awe of him as a young person. Now I'm considered one of the elder statesmen after playing 12 years, and he's still playing."

Abdul-Jabbar played six seasons with the Milwaukee Bucks and 14 seasons with the Los Angeles Lakers.

He is the league's career leader in points scored with 38,387.

"Child abuse is a big problem in the United States as well as Georgia and more things need to be done to prevent this from happening," said Grizzle.

The group tries to get local restaurants and businesses in Statesboro to get involved in the project by donating or reducing the price of their chicken wings to be used in the event.

"We ask the places to donate around a total of 500 wings and then we have a big wings contest," said Grizzle. "We had six companies donate over 500 wings this year and we appreciated all the help they gave us."

The organization color-coordinated the wings to prevent participants from knowing where they came from and to give each company a fair chance of having their wings being picked as the best.

"To join in on the fun, people only had to pay \$5 for a ticket and then they received vegetables, blue cheese and two wings from each place, which was a total of 12 wings per person," Grizzle said. "The person would then sit down and eat the wings and vote for the ones they considered were the best wings."

Kappa Delta presented the trophy to the restaurant that gained the most votes and for the second consecutive year it was Dingus Magees.

Brian Myler, head cook at Dingus Magees, said the establishment was proud their wings were picked as the best in Statesboro again.

two previous years because we had more restaurants participating.

"In the past two years, we've only had five participating restaurants, but this year we got a couple extra," Leverette said. "We only hate that Zaxby's had to drop out of the contest at the last moment."

Besides wings and vegetables, the contest included tea donated by Vandy's Barbecue.

"We spent the whole morning cutting up the celery, carrots and getting the blue cheese ready for the contest," said Grizzle.

Kappa Delta sold about 300 tickets (practically every single ticket) and had a really good turnout for the contest with more than just the Greek community

participating.

"We sold a lot of tickets to our alumni members, which we were surprised because it's usually just a Greek thing with members bringing their friends," Grizzle said.

"Our goal is for the event to get bigger and raise more money," Grizzle said.

"In five years or so, I would like to see this become a big community thing," Grizzle said.

"With my assistant this year, Gina Garcher, taking over the event next year, it probably will gain popularity in the Statesboro community with more companies participating."

"Gina will have a lot of experience and I think she will be able to improve the project a lot," said Grizzle.

# Gregory Peck calls it quits after 50 years of acting

LOS ANGELES -- After 50 years of playing roles ranging from the upstanding Atticus Finch to the despicable Dr. Joseph Mengele, **Gregory Peck** is ready to just play himself.

On Tuesday, three days before his 80th birthday, Peck said he intends to leave the acting profession.

"I've had a 50-year run, and I don't want to wear out my welcome," he told The Associated Press in a telephone interview from Paris, where he is on vacation with his French-born wife, Veronique.

The Pecks attended the Festival of Thrillers in Cognac, France, where his 1963 film "Cape Fear" was shown, along with a recent Martin Scorsese version.

In the latter, he noted, he played "a bit part as a sleazy Southern lawyer."

Peck won an Oscar for his portrayal of Atticus Finch in "To Kill a Mockingbird."

Peck plans to celebrate his birthday quietly with his wife and two of their children, then spend the rest of the month in Paris.

"We just ad-lib it from day to day," Peck said. "Everything we do is fun. I just couldn't be luckier."

**Helmsley pays \$13 million for land on Star Island**

MIAMI -- The Queen of Mean also is a princess of land deals.

New York hotelier **Leona Helmsley** paid a record 13 million in cash Tuesday for five acres (two hectares) on Miami Beach's exclusive Star Island, *The Miami Herald* reported.

Helmsley wants to build a copy of her Phoenix mansion on the property. The lot comes with tennis courts and dock space for more than one yacht.

Star Island is home to **Gloria Estefan**, rapper **Vanilla Ice** and

basketball center **Rony Seikaly**.

Helmsley, nicknamed the Queen of Mean because of her management style, went to federal prison in 1992 for tax evasion.

She was released in 1993 after serving 18 months of a 21-month sentence, then put on three years' probation and ordered to do 250 hours of community service.

McMillan said.

"A promise is a promise and a fact is a fact. Jesus Christ died so that all who believed, trusted, and accepted Him by faith and surrendering their lives could have eternal life."

Giles grew up in Evansville, Indiana, in a Roman-Catholic family who said he was "totally opposed to Christianity." During his adolescent years Giles

said he used drugs, drank alcohol, and "fornicated and masturbated." These are the subjects he said he vehemently opposes today.

"Those things are tools of the devil," Giles said.

Giles said he was "saved" at a Van Halen concert in 1980. He then dropped out of school at Indiana Tech to follow his calling as a preacher.

In 1982, Giles met Campus Ministry founder Jeb Smock at a revival in Evansville. Smock introduced him to a group called The Destroyers, a group of touring preachers so named because they "destroy the work of the devil."

Giles tours the nation with his group of followers, preaching at 215 college campuses in 42 states.

to be construction of new buildings and so forth."

Several other leased buildings are in the process of being eliminated.

"The legislature gave us the money to buy the Forest Drive academic building and the Family Consumer Sciences Building," he said.

"We are currently in the process of purchasing those. While we are only moving one modular off campus, we are buying those two so we are moving three off of our rent rolls."

With the purchase of the two buildings and the elimination of the South Building, GSU will save \$1.2 million a year.

"If you look at what is left on campus of modular buildings, the lease money is \$624,000 a year," Davis said.

"We have accomplished a lot this year in getting rid of the South Building and purchasing these two buildings."

The new education building will be located on what is currently the "Snake Drive" portion of Forest Drive, and should be complete by July 1998, Philip Hodge, director of facilities planning, said. The cost of that project is estimated at \$10,138,000.

Further plans include a GSU transportation system and making some parking areas only for 24 hours a day, like certain loading dock areas.

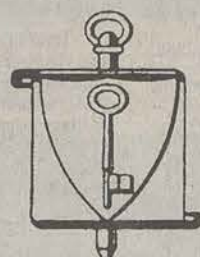
The school has not ruled out the possibility of expanding the Greek village to make a complete semi-circle back to Chandler Road, either, said Associate Dean of Student Affairs James Orr.

Also, the roller blade rink being built in the parking lot of the Scene Shop, located between 301 and Old Register Road, is temporary.

completed by next fall at either the M.C. Anderson Park or near

the Deck Shoppe pool, said William Ehling, director of CRI.
