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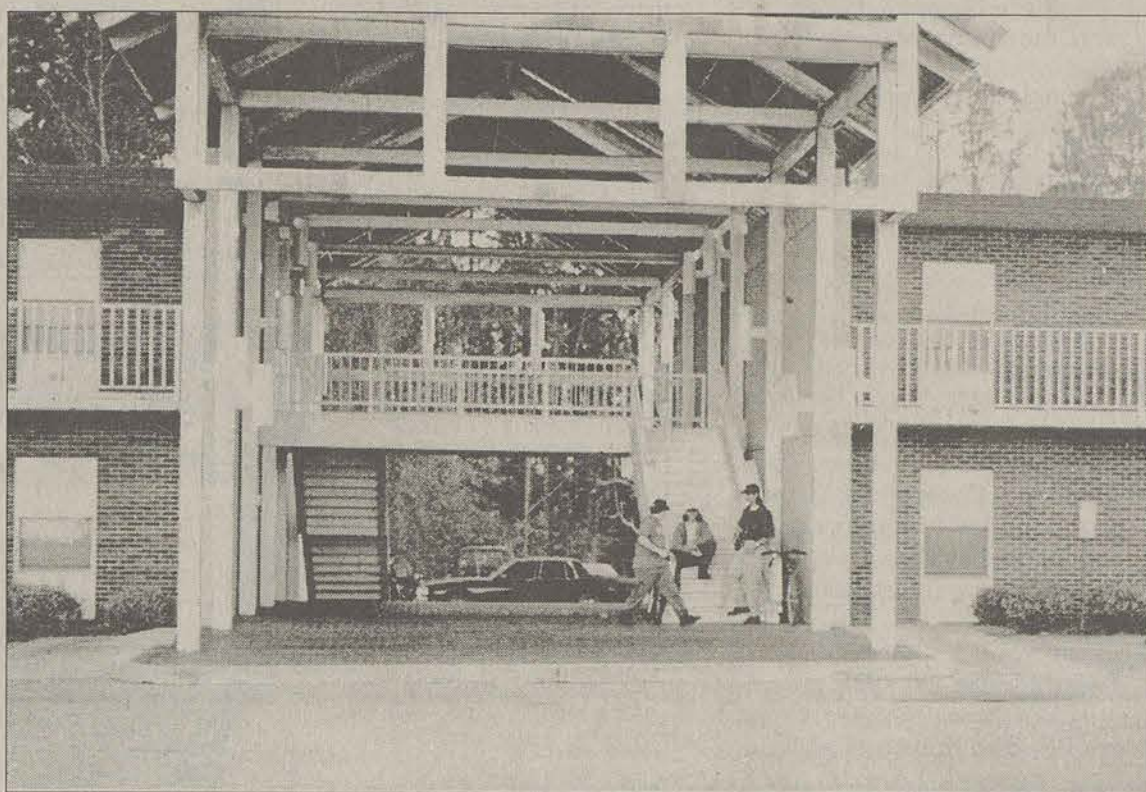

Bike paths, Stratford's lack of laundry facilities to be solved

Students will have to wait until the 1996-97 school year to benefit from solutions to two campus concerns.

The bike paths, which are planned to be installed on campus to address safety on the pedestrian, are awaiting funding. Stratford Hall residents will have to wait until next year to use more convenient laundry facilities, which will go in the new dorm adjacent to Stratford.

There has not been any work done on the bike paths since the plan to place them on campus passed through the president's cabinet in February. Facilities planning cannot go ahead with construction until the budget is funded by the state.

Earl Cashon, director of Union, said the plan is ready to go and that the school is awaiting state funding.

The cost of the plan, according to an early estimate from facilities planning, is projected to be approximately \$672,000. That figure would decrease by \$300,000 if administrators decide not to include a loop around the sports complex.

"We didn't do that well this year in funding is what I'm hearing from the university standpoint," Cashon said.

Former SGA vice president of auxiliary affairs Heather Karlson said that if the school doesn't get the funding the administration should allow bikes to remain on campus.

Stratford Hall residents will have to settle for sharing the laundry facilities of the new residence hall, G-87, which is supposed to open in 1997. Construction on the new dorm recently began with the foundation being laid.

Several proposals have been taken to the GSU administration, but none has solved the problem.

One of the plans, which was presented by Karlson, would have allowed for a drop-off and pick-up solution. This plan was never set up.

"It wasn't SGA's responsibility to set up the plan," Karlson said. "That was left up to auxiliary services, and they

never did it."

GSU President Nicholas Henry also offered residents of Stratford Hall the option of moving into another hall with in-house facilities. Students were told they would not be charged any housing fee increase if they wanted to move.

According to Greg Schlierf, assistant director of housing, only one student made an inquiry into such a possibility, and no Stratford Hall residents moved.

"We were surprised no one moved," Schlierf said.

Director of Housing Patricia Burkett said moving students to new dorms was the only viable option.

"We are not able to add laundry facilities to that building," she said. "When the new facility opens in the fall, laundry facilities will be available there."

Organizers plan for more activities, control at next year's Playerz' Ball

Founders of the three-year-old Playerz' Ball say that next year they will try to organize more activities and control property damages and the crowd, which plagued store owners the first weekend of May.

Playerz' Ball, which was started by GSU students, and attracted crowd estimates at 1,200, caught store owners, city and university police and some students off-guard.

The May 3 weekend brought large crowds that spilled over into the streets in front of Level One nightclub.

Statesboro Police tried unsuccessfully to disperse the people who crowded the streets by blocking off Chandler Road, from Chandler Square to the entrance of In-the-Pines. Three hours later, the University Police sent five units to help Statesboro police break up the crowd.

Statesboro Police Chief Richard Malone said that some students reported vehicular damages inflicted by some of the crowd as they were driving near Southern Villa Apartments and Level One. He also

said there was illegal parking. However, no thefts were reported to Statesboro police.

Stephan Thompson, a Level One promoter and one of the founders of Playerz' Ball, said he believes the crowd mistak-

only thought the police closed down the club.

"Maurice (Jackson) told me that our closing had nothing to do with the police," he said.

Jackson, the owner of Level One, was unavailable for comment.

Convenience store owners near campus were unable to handle the crowd's flow during the weekend after the crowds gathered and employees feared thefts. The Cork and Bottle, which usually closes at midnight, closed at 11:30 p.m. during the weekend after approxi-

mately 50 people littered the parking lot and a car was damaged, a cashier said.

"We don't know for sure, but I had a feeling that people were stealing and somebody pushed some beer bottles, which were (later) found broken," the cashier said.

The manager of the EnZone gas station said a crowd of people were making noise and loitering. His employees called the police, and the crowd left soon after the police came, but someone did hit a pump with a car. Cashiers at EnZone also suspected theft but did not close early on either night.

However, none of the stores reported anything to the police. The managers of each store will know if there was theft after checking inventory books.

Thompson and his roommates had a cook-out with music at the party.

Junior Adrienne Booker, who attended the cook-out, said that people ran after hearing gunshots.

Neither the rent attendants at Players Club nor Malone said they received any reports of gunshots and there were no reports of injuries or property damages.

Police search for armed robbery suspect

AGSU student was involved in an armed robbery last night in the Russell Union game room.

The student, an employee of the Union working in the game room, was approached by a black male at 10:47 p.m. on Tuesday night.

"A black male came into the Union building and approached the man behind the counter," said Ken Brown, director of public safety. "The man pulled out a pistol and the victim fell to the floor behind the counter. The man fired off one shot, which hit the door behind the counter. The suspect grabbed the money

from the register and fled the building."

The victim was counting money in the register when the incident occurred.

The suspect is reported as being a black male, approximately 5'8" to 5'11". He weighs somewhere between 120 and 220 pounds. The suspect was wearing



a dark colored, long sleeve shirt and was carrying a chrome plated pistol.

The suspect left the scene with \$187 in cash, taken from the game room register.

The penalty for armed robbery is five to 20 years. If the charge is reduced to aggravated assault, the sentence is one to 20 years.

Voter registration drive to be held next week

Tim Young, chairman of the College Republicans, is hoping that the addition of so many GSU student voters will settle the liquor con-

troversy.

"Since I've been at GSU I've heard numerous students complain about the lack of liquor in Statesboro and registering to vote in Bulloch County is the solution," Young said.

To make things easier, students who register will fill out a pre-paid postage form instead of the last form that required students to put a stamp on it and mail it, a factor that the College Republicans felt might have hindered some from registering.

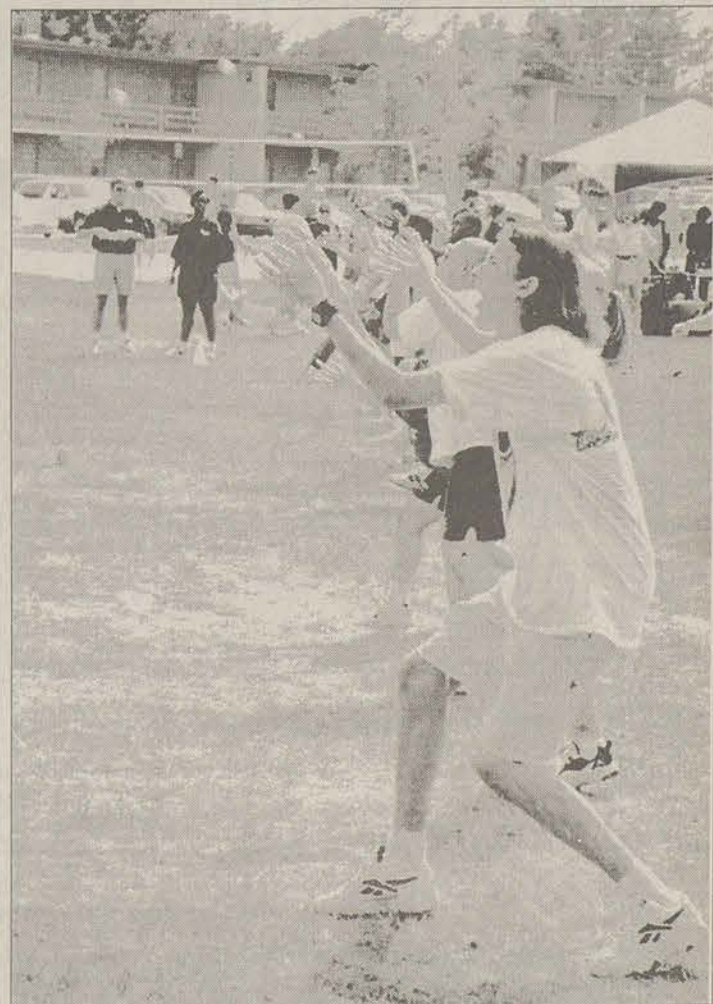
According to Young, the process of registering takes less than five minutes.

The College Republicans said they hope students understand that this vote in November may be the last one for a while, and that if students don't vote, it may not go through.

"If students don't turn out [to register and vote], [they] won't see it again for a long time," Young said.

Jury selection begins for trial of slain Georgia college student

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. — Jury selection began Monday in the trial of one of two Navy SEAL trainees charged with abducting and murdering a Georgia college student last summer.

Billy Joe Brown Jr., 23, of Dayton, Ohio, pleaded innocent in Virginia Beach Circuit Court to charges of murder, abduction with intent to defile, sexual penetration with an object and attempted rape in the slaying of Jennifer L. Evans, 21.

Brown's attorney, Andrew Sacks, opened by asking Circuit Judge A. Bonwill Shockley to move the trial because of the publicity the case has received.

"I'm not prepared to change the venue ... until we can see if we can get an impartial jury," the judge said.

Sacks then raised the issue of a memorial scholarship fund set up by the media relations department of the Virginia Beach Police Department. The money went to Atlanta's Emory University, the school where Evans had been a pre-medical student with plans to become a pediatrician.

The fund has raised more than \$16,000 and will continue to receive donations throughout the course of the trial. Sacks said the fund tainted the impartiality of the police department and the prosecutor. He asked for the commonwealth's attorney to be dismissed from the case and for

the appointment of a special prosecutor.

"It crosses the line," Sacks said of the fund-raising effort. "It could become a very dangerous precedent."

Judge Shockley also denied that motion.

Brown is charged along with his Navy buddy, SEAL trainee Dustin A. Turner, 20, of

Bloomington, Ind. Turner's trial is set to begin on June 25. If convicted, both men face life sentences.

Ms. Evans, of Tucker, Ga., vanished early on June 19, 1995, from The Bayou nightclub in Virginia Beach. Her body was found eight days later in a thickly wooded park in Newport News, about 30 miles from Virginia Beach.

Ms. Evans was last seen leaving the oceanfront club with Turner.

Police quickly zeroed in on Turner and Brown, roommates at the Little Creek Naval Amphibious Base, where they were training for the Navy's commando unit.

In separate interviews with police, each accused the other of strangling Ms. Evans.

Turner said Brown had strangled the woman in the nightclub parking lot.

But Brown maintained that Turner choked Ms. Evans when she resisted attempts by the two to have sex with her. In another version, Brown said Ms. Evans was already dead when he got into Turner's car.

Newt won't get involved in senator duel

JACKSON, Miss.— House Speaker Newt Gingrich declined Saturday to inject himself into the duel between two Mississippians for leadership of the Republican-controlled Senate.

However, Gingrich, in Jackson for a speech to the Mississippi Republican convention, said he would get along fine with either Sens. Thad Cochran and Trent Lott, both contenders for the Senate majority leader post. "They are both dear friends of mine. I don't want to jinx either one of them by commenting beyond that," said Gingrich, who served with Cochran and Lott in the House when he was elected in 1974.

The Mississippi Republicans are the only candidates to succeed Sen. Bob Dole as party leader in the Senate.

A vote is expected some time in June.

Dole announced last week he would step down from the Senate so he could concentrate on his presidential campaign.

Lott, 54, and Cochran, 58, hold the No. 2 and No. 3 Senate leadership positions. The two started

their careers in the House in 1972. Cochran won his Senate seat in 1978, Lott 10 years later.

During their congressional careers, both have been among the party's top fund raisers and have donated funds through political action committees to other

GOP candidates nationwide.

Gingrich said the selection of a new majority leader comes after great gains by the GOP nationwide and in Mississippi. Two of Mississippi's five House members are Republicans, and the GOP has fielded candidates in the other three districts.

National Republicans from

Mississippi include national party chairman Haley Barbour, vice chairman Rep. Evelyn McPhail and House freshman class president Rep. Roger Wicker.

And Gingrich said Rep. Mike Parker, who switched to the GOP from the Democratic Party last fall, led the list of lawmakers who jumped to the GOP.

"I think this is a truly a remarkable achievement. It is truly historic," Gingrich said.

Barbour said the historic significance of the Cochran-Lott race should not be lost on Americans, much less the people of Mississippi.

"We've already gone through the period where we had the No. 2 and No. 3 leaders in the majority party, and that meant our views were that much closer to the head of the table. Now, our views will be at the head of the table," he said.

"It is awfully good for Mississippi, a state which a lot of times has gotten a bad rap from the press, undeservedly, and the quality of these two men speak volumes about the quality of life in our state," he said.

College replaces contaminated buildings

AUGUSTA, Ga.— It will be a long and expensive process to replace six buildings at Augusta College that were found to be contaminated with asbestos.

College officials are proposing to build one new building to replace the contaminated ones, which contain asbestos in crumbling World War II-era roofs. They estimate the cost at \$20 million to \$25 million.

A formal request for money to begin the process will be made to the Board of Regents, college President William Bloodworth Jr. said Monday.

"By September, the university system will forward its capital list to the governor's office," he said. "If the governor says it's a good idea, and the Legislature agrees, we could have funds authorized this time next year to hire an architect. We would hope this one will move speedily."

A previous plan sent to the Board of Regents called for two new classroom buildings, built in subsequent years, to enable gradual retirement and demolition of two asbestos-roofed former warehouses. Other buildings then could be renovated or demolished over time.

That plan is no longer fea-

sible, Bloodworth said.

The roofs on Butler, Markert, Hardy and Skinner halls and the Science and Classroom Office buildings are a legacy of the college's past life as an Army ammunition warehouse complex.

The cement-asbestos mix used to fireproof roofs in the 1940s is crumbling, causing asbestos to build up on sidewalks, in soil and in attics. Tests of classroom areas show acceptable concentrations, but consultants advise ongoing testing and maintenance programs until the buildings can be replaced.

Student Anita Dombkowski

said her first hint of a problem came during the Christmas holidays, when the school was closed.

"I came up one morning to use the computer lab. There were guys in white suits cleaning up. Kind of scary," said Dombkowski, a senior from Augusta.

Other students on campus Monday said they were unaware of the contamination until details were reported Sunday in The Augusta Chronicle.

"Down where I'm from, asbestos in buildings is not good," said Rahji Edness, a freshman from Bermuda. "They should tear it out."

FAA grounds Savannah-based AvAtlantic airline

ATLANTA— With no campaign flights until this weekend, Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole shouldn't be inconvenienced by the Federal Aviation Administration order grounding the airline that had been ferrying him around.

The FAA issued an emergency suspension Monday, grounding Savannah-based AvAtlantic because flight attendants couldn't find the plane's fire extinguisher or life rafts or operate other emergency equipment.

AvAtlantic executives met Tuesday with federal officials, but no agreement was reached, said Kathleen Bergen, an FAA spokeswoman.

AvAtlantic, which is owned by HCL Aviation Inc., operated seven Boeing 727 jets for charter and lease to other airlines, including one plane used by the Dole presidential campaign, Ms. Bergen said.

On Sunday, an FAA inspection found a flight attendant couldn't describe how to use the emergency oxygen equipment and couldn't locate or describe the proper use of the plane's fire extinguisher, emergency oxygen bottle, first aid kit, emergency medical kit or life rafts.

The flight attendant also didn't have a current manual or cockpit key and was unable to describe the preflight inspection, according to the FAA order.

Flight attendants at previous inspections also were unable to describe proper safety equipment and procedures, the FAA said,

and inspectors found discrepancies in the airline's records.

Elizabeth Forester, senior vice

president for AvAtlantic, said the company's 100 flight attendants are well trained.

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

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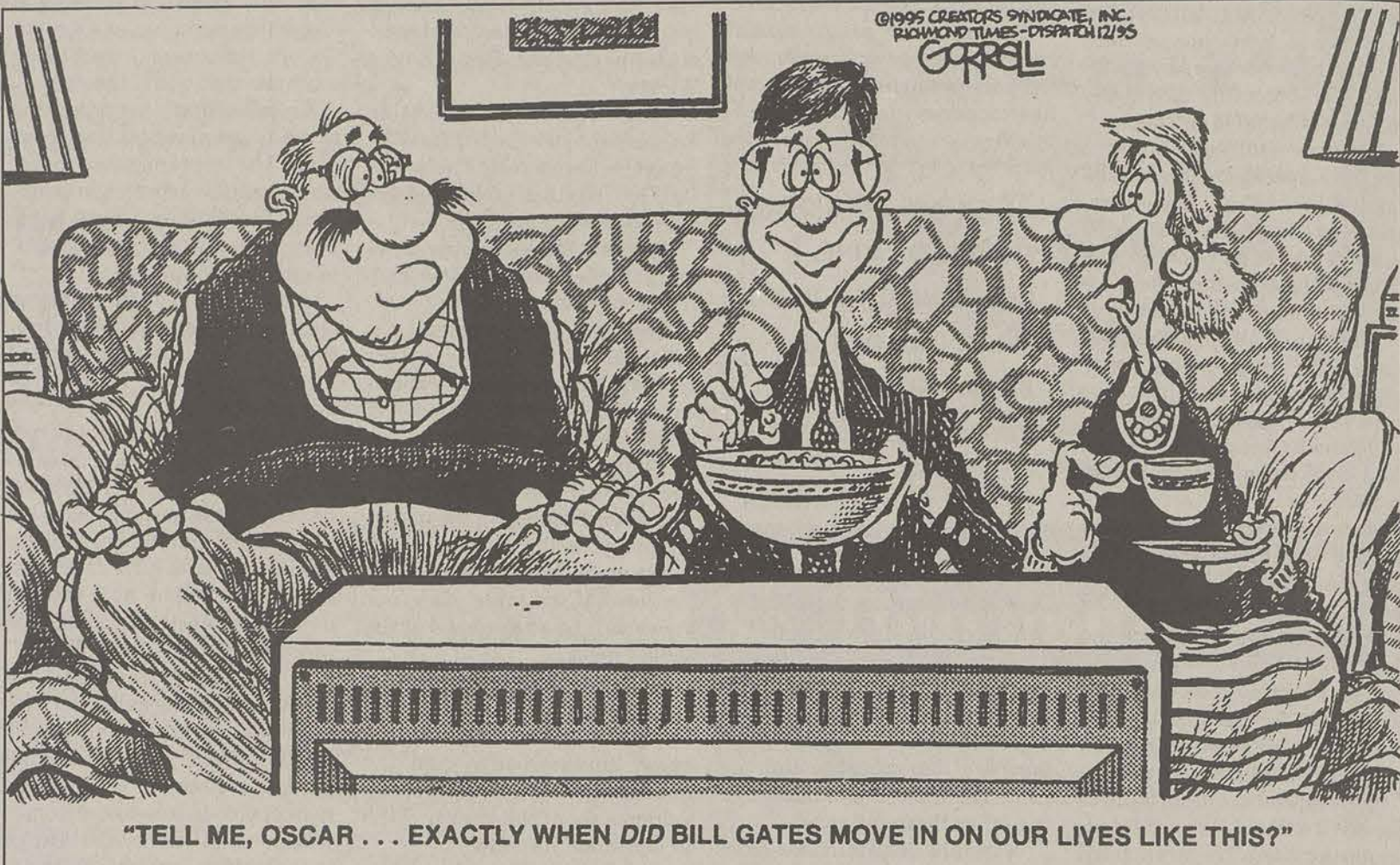

Two Utah senators defend defense spending for the Olympics

SALT LAKE CITY — Utah's two senators have promised to challenge efforts by a fellow lawmaker who wants to limit Defense Department spending on the Olympics.

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., has attached an amendment to the Defense Authorization Act, scheduled for Senate consideration this week, to require organizers of an Olympics or any other sporting event to reimburse the federal government for services not related directly to security.

Salt Lake Organizing Committee (SLOC) officials have responded by soliciting help from Utah Republican Sens. Orrin Hatch and Bob Bennett.

"We're worried, but we're going to win this one. We're going to beat McCain," said Hatch military-affairs aide Robert Lockwood. "We're going to ensure the president retains the constitutional and statutory authority he already has to provide adequate security for the Olympics."

Adds Bennett spokeswoman Mary Jane Colipriest: "The De-

partment of Defense has an appropriate role and responsibility in an event like the Olympics. Given the strong voice the Sen-

ate has given to the anti-terrorism bill, this is an area where they can show that support."

McCain maintains his amendment will do nothing to undermine legitimate security measures, nor will it create an additional financial burden for event organizers.

All it really does, he said, is block "inappropriate and wasteful use of military personnel and resources."

"The Department of Defense cannot afford to foot the bills, without reimbursement, for sporting events that make a profit," he argues.

"If an event does not make a profit, this legislation is not applicable."

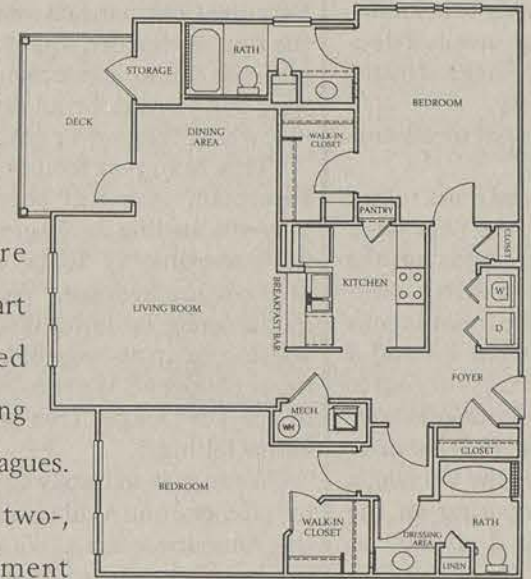
McCain figures Defense Department expenditures around Atlanta's Centennial Games will exceed \$50 million, including dubious projects such as building a water system for a field-hockey venue and a dining facility at the Olympic compound, and printing signs.

SLOC officials, who were counting on about \$30 million from Washington for security for the 2002 Winter Games, are concerned about the potential impact on their budget.

"We will need assistance with security on the federal level and we don't want to have anything detrimental to the games enacted by Congress," said spokesman Mike Korologos.

Gingrich: Clinton 'counterfeit conservative'

HOUSTON — House Speaker Newt Gingrich painted President Clinton as a "counterfeit conservative" who talks a good moderate game, then sabotages those he tries to emulate.

"We're over here standing with the American people (who say) balance the budget, reform welfare with an emphasis on the work ethic, reduce taxation, reduce Washington bureaucracy," Gingrich said.

"And Clinton comes trotting across every day like a counterfeit conservative, gets as close to as he can, as long as it's only words, and as soon as he gets a bill, he vetoes it."

Gingrich, speaking at a fundraiser for Rep. Steve Stockman, R-Texas, said a gap has been forged between select friends of Clinton — trial attorneys, the media, unions and bureaucrats — and the rest of America, who count on the Republican Party for proper action in Washington.

"Steve and I believe when you go to work and you earn money,

it's yours," Gingrich said. "We believe that the government has to be run so frugally and spend its money so wisely that it earns

the right to take a little of your money. That's the attitude on our side.

"Our liberal friends believe that your earned money is theirs. That if they leave you a few crumbs you ought to be grateful because they could have taken it all."

Stockman, who rode an anti-

incumbent fever into office two years ago against 42-year incumbent Democrat Jack Brooks, now faces challenge from attorney Nick Lampson, who counts union members among his supporters.

"I believe the positive message which Newt brought today is going to facilitate victory in the fall," the Republican freshman said.

Gingrich told reporters after his speech that there is room in the Republican Party for those who are "pro-choice."

"Clearly we're going to be a party with a strong right-to-life plank, but there's also room in the Republican Party for people who are pro choice," Gingrich said.

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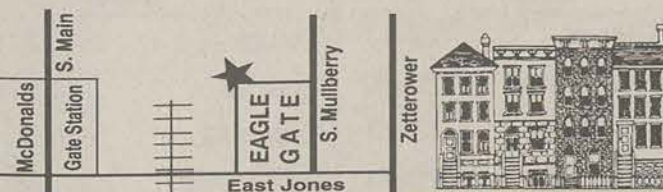

But if you are going to tear down old stadiums and replace them with the new, at least give them a decent name.

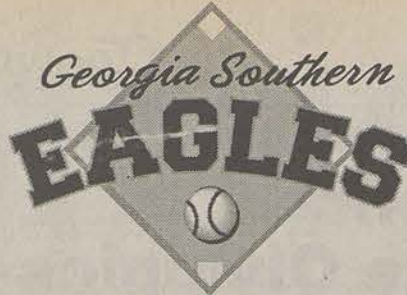
Stadiums can't even be called by an original name anymore. It's either Three Comp Park, US Air Arena, or the Delta Center.

Eagles face Old Dominion in first regional playoff game

As Eagle first baseman Tommy Peterman waited with his teammates in the Lupton Building Monday afternoon for the announcement of their placement in the NCAA regional play-offs, he sat feeling a lot more confident as opposed to when the team gathered last year.

After winning the series with Bethune-Cookman last weekend, the Eagles clinched a spot in the play-offs, unlike last season when they had to wait for an at-large bid, which they never got.

"This is a great feeling," said Peterman, who will enter the play-offs leading the Eagles with 24 homeruns, 77 RBIs, and a .373 batting average. "We were in the same building last year waiting for an at-large bid and it never happened. We're using this to our advantage. This is a lot better fellinging."

"We're just so happy to make it," pitcher Julio Ayala said after the announcement. "We know we're a good team, and we think we can beat anybody in the nation. We have good pitching, good hitting, and good running. We've been looking forward to this all season."

The Eagles will be traveling back to Clemson University to face fourth seed Old Dominion in the first game of the double-elimination tournament starting Thursday at 11:00 a.m.

"This is a good region to be in," Peterman said. "It would have been nice to go somewhere we haven't been, but we're just glad to be where we are. We know the

layout of the field pretty good, and this will also be easier on family members and fans to come support us. This is pretty exciting."

Also in the bracket, Clemson (1) will face Charleston Southern (6), and Tennessee (2) will battle West Virginia (5).

"It's going to be a pretty even tournament," Peterman said. "Looking at the brackets, you see that all the records are basically the same."

The southeast always has good teams in post-season play."

Heading into the regionals,

Head Coach Jack Stallings feels that the Eagles could go in with somewhat of an advantage.

"Familiarity is very important in any tournament," Stallings said. Unlike 1990 when we went in not knowing anything about the teams, we are going with somewhat of an idea of most of the teams in our bracket. We've played Clemson twice, Charleston Southern four times, and we know about Tennessee. We've also played on that field before, which will also help us."

But quickly the focus is now turned on Old Dominion, a team

that GSU knows as much about as they did Bethune-Cookman last weekend.

"We really don't know too much about Old Dominion," Stallings said. "We know that they have a fine program, and the people in the Colonial Athletic Association that we've played our very complementary of them."

When we played East Carolina earlier in the season, they were saying the Old Dominion was going to be a tough team to beat. Who would have thought we would be playing them in the

play-offs?"

"This team has always been good at focusing on what they have to get done," Stallings said. "There have been some games when it could have been better. I don't know what happened in the second game against Bethune-Cookman, but we obviously had our minds somewhere else. If we stay focused, I think this ball club can do good things."

GSU has played only three teams in the overall NCAA tournament. Clemson, Charleston Southern, and Georgia Tech, who is at a controversial two-seed in the regional at Baton Rouge.

The Eagles finished 2-0 against Clemson, 3-1 against Charleston Southern, and 3-1 against Georgia Tech.

Ayala, whose record of 14-3 leads all Eagle pitchers, has unsurprisingly been given the nod for the opening game.

"I'm just going to prepare the same way I've prepared all season," Ayala said. "I've been looking forward to this for a while. I'm going to go out and do the things that I know I can do."

"This is a good ball club," Stallings said. "I've thought so ever since the beginning of the season and I've said it countless times. But what we've done before means nothing now. Our goal is to win the first game, and then worry about what lays ahead."

We can't worry about the other teams, because we have no control over them.

We need to stay focused on Old Dominion. We've got to play the cards that have been dealt to us."

Braves' McGriff hits his 300th homer, says he has 400 more in him

ATLANTA—Making his usual postgame stop by Fred McGriff's locker to swipe a handful of lotion, Dwight Smith joked that he wanted to do more than just soothe his skin.

"Maybe I can get me some hits from that stuff," Smith said.

McGriff's locker is certainly a good place to start when looking for a few extra hits. There may be a special aura floating in that part of the clubhouse, where the Atlanta Braves first baseman dresses next to the cubicle once occupied by home run king Hank Aaron. "I've still got more than 400 to go to catch Hank Aaron," McGriff said Sunday after his homer in the Braves' 9-5 victory over Cincinnati made him the 71st player in major-league history to hit 300 career home runs.

For almost 10 years, McGriff has been putting up big numbers that go largely unnoticed because he does virtually the same thing every year.

"I've been pretty consistent

over the years, but everybody is looking for that new star, the guy who comes out of the blue to hit 40 or 50 homers," said McGriff, who had seven straight 30-homer seasons until he hit 27 in the abbreviated 1995 schedule. This year, Mr. Consistency

really focused at the plate. He goes up with the idea every time of having a good, aggressive swing. You're not going to see him get fooled too often."

He certainly wasn't fooled Sunday by the Reds. Facing a left-hander the first four times

said McGriff's balance at the plate has been his biggest strength. He never seems to get fooled by a pitch—unusual for a slugger—because his feet stay firmly planted, his weight evenly distributed.

has started the season like he wants to be Mr. MVP.

Prior to Monday's game against the Chicago Cubs, McGriff was hitting .353 (third in the NL) with 11 homers (tied for seventh) and 40 RBIs (tied for fourth).

"He's locked in, man," teammate Chipper Jones marveled. "He's going through one of those periods in his career where he's

he came to the plate, the left-handed McGriff piled up four RBIs on a single, two doubles and his landmark home run.

"Right now, I'm getting some good pitches to hit and I'm hitting them," he said with a shrug. "A month ago, when I was struggling, those same pitches I might have swung and missed or fouled them back."

Hitting coach Clarence Jones

him," Cincinnati starter Pete Schourek said. "He's in a groove, hitting the stuffing out of the ball. We're glad to leave town."

At age 32, McGriff thinks he's just entering his prime.

"I keep learning more and more every day," he said. "I'm trying to make little adjustments. And I'm still young. The baseball card might say I'm 32, but I feel like I'm 25."

Though he downplayed his personal accomplishment, it's obvious McGriff is starting to think about his place in baseball history. If he needs a not-so-subtle reminder, there's that screened-in locker right next to his, the one used by Aaron, whose 755 homers made him the greatest home run hitter in major-league history.

"I hope to get 400 homers and then 500," McGriff said. "That's when you start getting into a pretty elite group. I've just got to keep going and try to stay healthy."

Despite a decade-long run of superlative play, McGriff has never finished higher than fourth in the MVP balloting. Even now, he tends to get overshadowed by the Braves' outstanding pitching, though last week's season-ending injury to David Justice puts the weight of the Atlanta offense squarely on his shoulders.

"Maybe after this year," Jones said with a grin, "people might give him a little better look."

Umpires seek revenge on Schott and Reds' pitchers

ATLANTA—John Smiley suggests that umpires are getting back at Cincinnati Reds owner Marge Schott by giving her pitchers a smaller strike zone.

Smiley took the loss Friday night as the Atlanta Braves beat the Reds 8-2. He left without talking to reporters.

On Saturday, Smiley said home plate umpire Tom Hallion squeezed the strike zone smaller when he was on the mound.

Smiley suggested it had something to do with Schott's statements that she felt cheated when umpire John McSherry collapsed

and died on opening day.

"If you have a personal vendetta against Marge, take it up with her, not the team," Smiley said.

Hallion, who was part of McSherry's crew, said Smiley's suggestion was absurd.

"We're not perfect," Hallion said. "But for him to say that I was intentionally squeezing him because of Marge Schott, that shows me that John Smiley has lost a little bit of his professionalism because he should know better than that."

"And to question my integrity over Marge Schott, I almost have

to put him in the same category as Marge Schott. That's ridiculous."

Smiley complained that borderline pitches were called balls. Hallion said he would be glad to discuss his ball and strike calls with Smiley.

"Marge never would come into the equation as far as umpiring a major league game on the field," Hallion said.

"We're professionals. I don't care what she says, what she does or whatever else."

"Marge Schott had nothing to do with my umpiring last night's game."

POE HELLO ATLANTIC RECORDS

Yeah, it's Poe. My favorite girl sporting her ever-so-hip and trendy multiple personality look. How else would you explain going from the heavy-handed rancor of "Trigger Happy Jack" to the quiet Tori Amos-like innocence of the beautiful "Fly Away" in the span of a single album?

Let's go with the night and day symbolism, shall we? Poe White is your picturesque version of a coy, innocent schoolgirl with a head full of spiraling blond curls. In the early morning sunlight, she picks fresh daisies, being careful not to do anything to soil her frivolous lace dress her grandmother has made for her.

This innocence and frailty carries over in quiet tunes hinted with subtle dance rhythms like "Beautiful Girl" and "Fingertips." These songs open up this softer element of Poe and allow her to facilitate her transformation of purity. It also makes us painfully aware of what a great singer she is.

"Hello" is a good track to bear witness to this fact. I'll admit that the song's heavy pavement thumping beats caught up in these quirky looping guitars probably are the essential elements which make it the album's best track. Leather-clad, donning the heavy black eyeliner and lipstick, Poe Black eats sissies like Megadeth for breakfast along with her ham and cheese omelet and a side of toast.

This transition over to Poe Black comes like an unannounced eclipse in the track

Her evil enticing ways are heightened by the fact that Poe is a highly attractive, almost sultry, blond. The real problem is that she knows it.

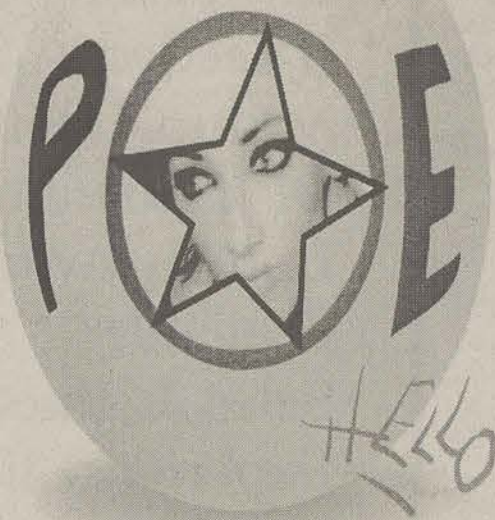

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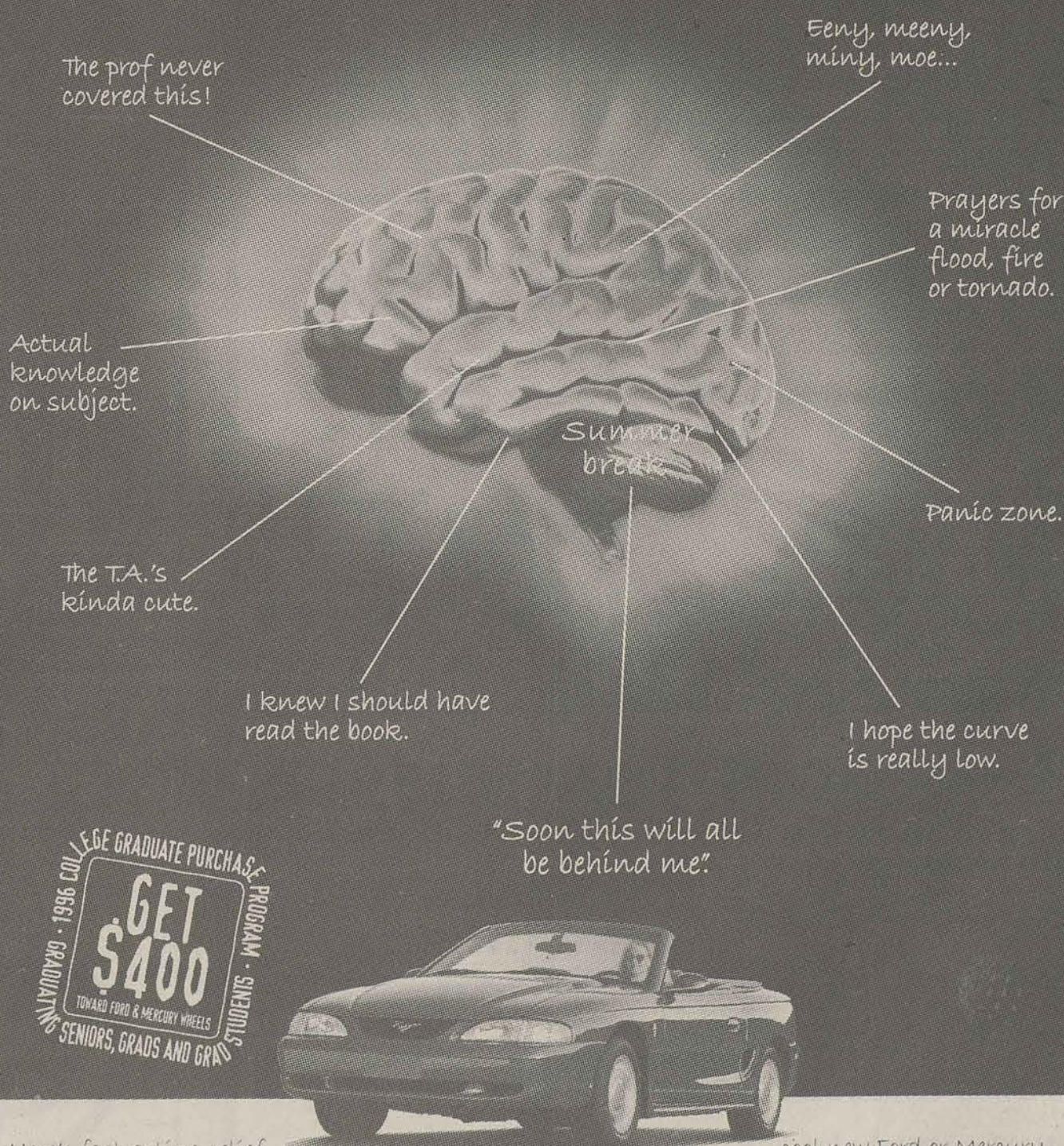

Backdoors take Legends back to the 1960s

At Legends last Friday night there was an eerie feeling in the air.

The neon and black lights danced off the bar, bringing the all-too-familiar glow in to those who wore white to the only decent concert spot in the 'Boro. The beer was cheap and free-flowing. The pool tables were, as usual, missing cue balls. Even Fort Stewart sent its finest off for the weekend. And the stage was electrified with ... candles?

The candles fought against the ceiling fans overhead, and the smell of incense, among other things, tickled the nose. Then, to

top things off, Jim Morrison walked onstage.

Well, not really Jim Morrison, but Jim Hakim, who formed the first Doors tribute band 16 years ago. But among a backdrop of candles with some of that free-flowing beer running through your veins, you'd never know the difference. The Backdoors are that good.

They sang all the usual staple Doors songs, and even added a few not so usual ones for good measure. They gave a rousing, crowd-pleasing version of "Five to One" that brought the audience to a riotous fever when Hakim, in a perfect Morrison screech, sang, "Yah we're taking

over."

The canonized Doors songs, "Break on Through," "L.A. Woman," and "People are Strange," were dangerously close to the originals. If you closed your eyes you could feel yourself being transported to a time where the Lizard King, Janis Joplin, Jimi Hendrix, and Velvet Underground ruled. Throw into the mix his yells and chants and whisps of poetry between songs and you are expected to look down at yourself and see bell-bottoms.

The band members, who hail from Pennsylvania, uphold the tradition of what a tribute band is all about: honoring a band and an era, not just the music.

'Heaven's Prisoners' leaves much to be desired

Alec Baldwin's popularity seems to have dwindled a little in the past couple of years. Nowadays, when someone refers to how "sexy" a Baldwin is, chances are they're talking about one of his younger brothers.

Don't get me wrong — I'm sure plenty of girls still think he's "dreamy" when they see him on the big screen, but he just hasn't been in the spotlight a great deal these days.

Part of this may be due to the fact that his last few performances ("The Getaway," "The Juror") have been executed with a strong sense of detachment, as if he's not really into the part.

It seems like lately the only roles he *does* have a feel for are as a bad guy.

It's no doubt that his recent assault charges have perpetuated the image of Baldwin's sinister side, which could leave him stuck playing the villain in most future roles.

Or he could start taking on roles like his latest one in "Heaven's Prisoners," which Baldwin also produced. He still can't seem to shake that sense of detachment in this lead either, but with the tough persona he portrays, which exploits his dark

(almost mean) countenance, his blandness comes across as cool.

It's a bit left of center in this movie, but if he can hit the mark in future films, it could work for him. Who knows? He could even establish himself as one of those brooding action stars.

In "Heaven's Prisoners," Baldwin stars as an ex-cop in Louisiana who gets on the wrong side of local organized crime, which results in the death of his wife, played by Kelly Lynch ("White Man's Burden," "Roadhouse").

Setting out for some bayou-style revenge, Baldwin butts heads with a small-time kingpin, portrayed by Eric Roberts ("The Specialist") and his wife, played by Teri Hatcher ("Louis and Clark," "Tango and Cash").

Somehow, we are expected to believe that someone as engaging as Hatcher could be tied down by a schmuck like Roberts.

Well, the truth is, she's not exactly "tied down." Hatcher plays one of the biggest high-class floozies since Mae West.

Speaking of which, Mary Stuart Masterson ("Bed of Roses," "Bad Girls") plays a stripper friend of Baldwin's whose role is somewhat undefined. Basically, she fills in as the lead female after Lynch gets smoked.

For some nameless reason, Baldwin has an unnatural silver streak in his hair, which, completely asymmetrical and surrounded by Baldwin's jet-black do, looks more like a feather than a gray patch. I guess he saw a poltergeist or something.

Speaking of funky hair, Roberts is absolutely ludicrous with tight Brandy braids and his fake Cajun accent.

Roberts' acting is worthy of most B-movies. The only reason he can still find work in Hollywood is because he works cheap and he's Julia's brother.

Actually, this may be the first movie that I don't simply despise him in. That doesn't mean he gives a good performance; it's just fun to laugh at him when he's on screen.

Overall though, "Heaven's Prisoners" is much better than my prior, incredibly low expectations.

It's a bit of a sleeper at times, but the action is hard-hitting and the drama is emotional (and severely depressing).

The movie's detective-story feel is as seedy and palpable as the atmosphere of New Orleans itself.

You may not understand what's going on at times, but at least it's delivered well.

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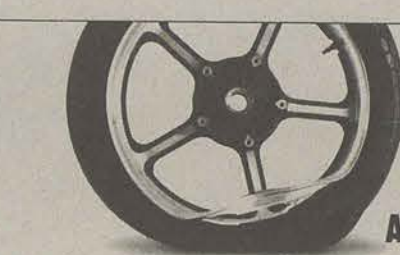

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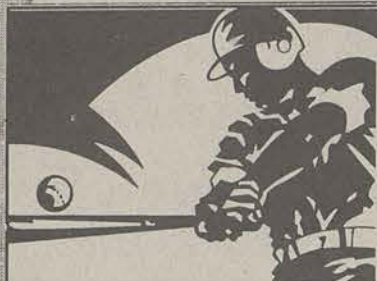
