## Findings of Sigma Chi investigation inconclusive

An unofficial investigation into the allegations that racial slurs and threats were made at a Sigma Chi fraternity party on May 13 was found to be inconclusive.

University officials say that the next step would be for Judicial Affairs to conduct an investigation, but that one of the parties involved would have to first file an official complaint with that office.

Jane Campaigne, coordinator of Greek Affairs, said she conducted an unofficial investigation into the incident in which a member of Sigma Chi or a person attending the party was allegedly heard using a racial pejorative and making racial threats.

If the allegations are proven to be true then it would be a violation of the student conduct code. Vice President of Student Affairs Jack Nolen said that if the allegations are true it would violate the section of the conduct code concerning dis-

ruptive behavior.

Ed Bayens, judicial affairs officer, could not be reached for comment as of press time, but Campaigne said she believed that no official complaint had been filed with Judicial Affairs.

Donna Hambrick, one of the complainants, said she thought the university was stalling on doing something about the allegations, but she was happy that an investigation was being made into the alleged incident.

"I think they are dragging their feet and they aren't doing everything they could do about it," Hambrick said. "I was pleased to see that they were doing something about it."

She said she doesn't plan to file charges with Judicial Affairs.

"Because it's so late in the game, I'm not going through all that trouble," Hambrick said.

During her investigation, Campaigne said that she col-

## Change in fire codes cause of delays in Recreation Activity Center completion

A recent decision by the regional fire marshal will delay completion of the Recreation Activity Center and may add to construction costs.

The state fire marshal had approved a certain classification for the building after viewing the completed plans, but when the regional fire marshal inspected the building in April, he said the classification was incorrect.

Vice President of Student Affairs Jack Nolen said that he didn't think it was regular proce-

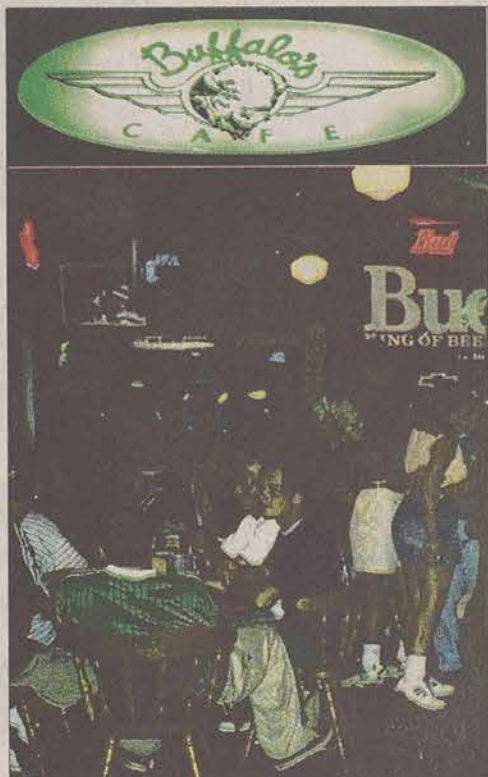

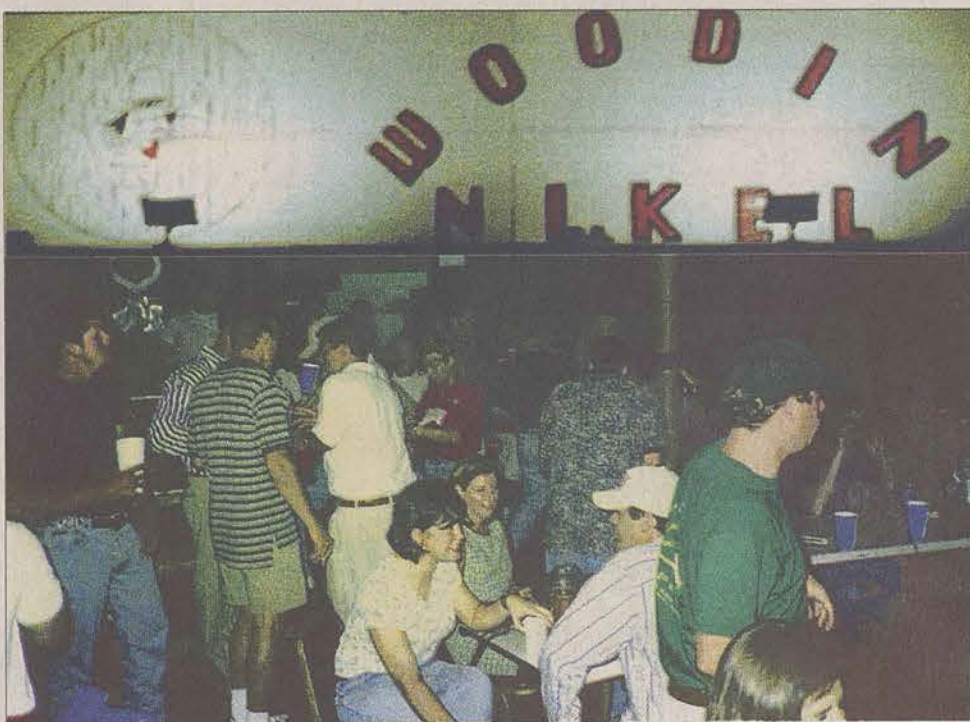

## Teachers, parents frustrated over varying drug, weapons policy

ATLANTA— Kelly Taylor monitors everything her three young children take to school, even a small, seemingly harmless cough drop.

If caught with a lozenge, the kids could face suspension under the Clayton County school district's zero tolerance policy for drugs.

If the Taylors lived in Valdosta, however, a cough drop wouldn't get them in trouble.

Some parents and teachers are frustrated about the lack of consistency and say school districts have gone overboard in deciding what things should be barred from school.

"We want a zero tolerance policy, but we feel some of the policies go a little too far in what they say is zero tolerance," said Sheila Mobley, president of the Georgia Federation of Teachers. "Anything you basically bring in could be used as a weapon."

All Georgia school districts now have policies to comply with the laws, but not all have been able to achieve zero tolerance in their respective school's.

In the zero-tolerance districts, students caught with drugs or weapons can be suspended, expelled or assigned to an alternative school.

Savannah-Chatham County Superintendent Patrick Russo said his system's zero tolerance policy, enacted four years ago, was the state's first.

Incidents of drugs and weapons have decreased since 1993, which indicates the zero tolerance policy is making a difference in the Savannah-Chatham County area.

## Southern Realty residents voice complaints about service

## Congress hears appeals for and against multirace classification

WASHINGTON—America's two-century-old dilemma in dealing with race continues to plague policy-makers, who now must decide whether to include a "multirace" category on federal forms.

On the one hand, a growing number of people are of mixed race and do not want to choose a single classification.

But federal law provides no protection for people of mixed race and shifting those now listed as minorities to "multiracial" could dilute efforts to prevent discrimination.

"The pain caused by forcing the children of an interracial couple to choose between the mother's race and the father's race is very real. So is the pain caused by discrimination," Rep. Carolyn Maloney, D-N.Y., said at a hearing before the House Government Oversight management subcommittee. "A solution that eases one pain, while making the other worse is no solution at all."

The Office of Management and Budget is expected to rule sometime this summer on whether to add a multiracial category to federal forms, including Census 2000. Americans now can choose one of four classifications: American Indian and Alaska Native, Asian and Pacific Islander, black or white.

"The reality is that not all Americans fit neatly into one little box," Susan Graham of Atlanta told the subcommittee.

Her 12-year-old son, Ryan, added: "My mom is white and my dad is black, and most forms ask me to choose between those races. I feel very sad, because I can't choose, I am both."

But his request drew opposition from organizations representing blacks and Hispanics,

both concerned that creating such a category would hinder efforts to combat discrimination.

Harold McDougall of the NAACP said he supports people's rights to determine their own racial identification, but said

Census and other federal forms may not be the place for that.

He noted that Census statistics are used to help enforce laws against discrimination in employment, lending, housing and schools and said that effort may be hurt by people switching from one racial category to multiracial.

"It's what you look like, not what you say you are, that determines whether you meet racial discrimination in this country," McDougall observed.

Eric Rodriguez of the National Council of La Raza, a Hispanic

group, also opposed adding the new category.

The multiracial category "is neither a racial nor a protected class under the law; therefore the collection of such data may not serve any statutory purpose," he told the subcommittee. He added that the category is likely to attract many confused people who are not sure of the meanings of race and ethnicity.

The number of children in mixed-race families jumped from fewer than 500,000 to 2 million between 1970 and 1990, prompting the proposal for the new listing.

Seven states now recognize multiracial designations, Mrs. Graham said: Ohio, Illinois, Georgia, Michigan, Indiana, Florida and North Carolina.

## Appeals Court rejects deputy's free speech defense for swearing at supervisor

ATLANTA—A federal appeals court rejected a Florida deputy's claim that her First Amendment rights were violated when she was demoted for cursing at a supervisor.

Cynthia Morris, a deputy for the Polk County, Fla., sheriff's department, was awarded \$117,600 in damages when she sued Sheriff Lawrence Crow and his second-in-command following her demotion in 1992. The case was appealed after a magistrate judge refused to order a new trial when a jury found in Ms. Morris' favor.

Ms. Morris, whose husband had been fired by Crow, contended her demotion had been prompted by her vocal support for Crow's opponent in the 1992

sheriff's election.

But a three-judge panel of the 11th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals on Wednesday rebuffed Ms. Morris' claim that her comments, including the obscenities, were protected political speech.

In an unanimous opinion peppered by more than a dozen profanities, the court said that Crow was legally protecting his department's morale when he transferred Ms. Morris from her job as a detective to a position in the county jails.

"The First Amendment does not require a public employer to tolerate an embarrassing, vulgar, vituperative, ad hominem attack, simply because the employee recently has waved a political sign, or was waving a sign while conducting the attack," the opinion said.

Ms. Morris could not be reached for comment at the county jail. Attempts to reach her at home were unsuccessful.

Co-workers testified that Ms. Morris often cursed at work to disparage Crow and his administration for firing her husband.

They also recounted an incident on election day in November 1992 when Ms. Morris visited her husband at a polling place, picked up a sign endorsing Crow's opponent and cursed at her husband and a superior officer watching nearby.

"It is not difficult to see how Morris' behavior at the polling place could cause serious disciplinary problems, undermine employee morale, and impair harmony among co-workers. Indeed, it is difficult to imagine how it could do anything else."

## Advocates protest proposed new welfare rules

ATLANTA—Advocates for Georgia's poor complained that welfare caseworkers are sanctioning recipients for minor offenses because proposed new welfare rules are too vague.

The Georgia Citizens Coalition on Hunger and other groups also called inadequate the Board of Human Resources' plan to hold one public hearing on the proposed rules, then vote a week later during a teleconference.

"We know that welfare reform can literally be a matter of life and death for many low-income families. These decisions deserve more than a conference call and a single public hearing," the groups wrote in a letter to welfare chief Michael Thurmond.

Thurmond was in Thomasville for a board meeting and was unavailable for comment, a spokesman said.

Thurmond is in charge of implementing Georgia's welfare changes, which are aimed at forcing

recipients off the welfare rolls and into jobs. The law sets a four-year lifetime limit on cash welfare benefits.

Georgia's welfare reform is slightly tougher than the federal overhaul, which imposes a life-

time limit of five years.

While the clock started ticking on Georgia's four-year deadline in January, key details are just now being ironed out.

The board released proposed new welfare rules May 7 and is accepting public comments about them through early June. The

board also will hold a public hearing Wednesday in Atlanta before the June 9 vote.

Advocates for the poor argue that the proposed rules fail to spell out what constitutes "good cause" for failing to comply with a rule, or what qualifies as a "hardship" to exempt a recipient from the job requirement.

Sandra Robertson of the hunger coalition cited the case of one woman who had her benefits cut for failing to attend a meeting with a caseworker because it was scheduled during her schoolday.

Karen Beavor of the Legal Clinic for the Homeless cited the case of another recipient who lost benefits because she faxed her job resume to several companies, rather than delivering it personally.

## For Mercer students, lifelike statue is confidant, good-luck charm

MACON, Ga.—Since its unveiling at the beginning of the year, a bronze statue of Mercer University's namesake has become a confidant and good-luck charm to students on the Macon campus.

"I like to rub his bald head before tests," freshman Matthew Johnston said of the lifelike, 1,000-pound likeness of Baptist philanthropist Jesse Mercer.

The statue sits on a bench with a contemplative look etched on its face. Its left arm rests on top of the bench and a Bible is pressed to its right knee. The

bench leaves plenty of room for a person to sit next to the statue.

Like old pals, students affectionately refer to the statue as "Jesse." And it's not unusual for some to sit beside it for a chat.

"I come by every morning and say hello to Jesse," said sophomore Sue Glaser.

The Mercer statue sits in a brick-lined plaza dotted with wooden benches and streetlights. Some professors hold classes outdoors among the plaza's rows of plants and engraved quotations by Mercer, including this zinger: "Surely there are some Baptists who may be trusted."

When state Baptists founded the school in 1833, they named it in Mercer's honor because he was "well known throughout Georgia for his zeal, liberality and piety," according to a written history of Macon.

The school's students and professor say they see the statue as a steady, solid reminder of Mercer University's heritage and tradition of Baptist theology.

Still, some admit the statue was a little disconcerting at first.

"Jesse scared me the first time I saw him, because he looked so real," said Beth Tillery, a freshman.

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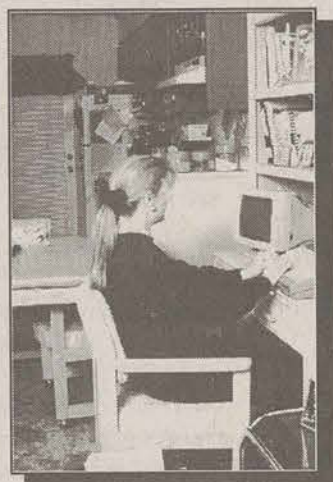
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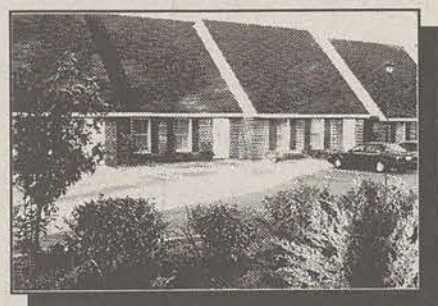
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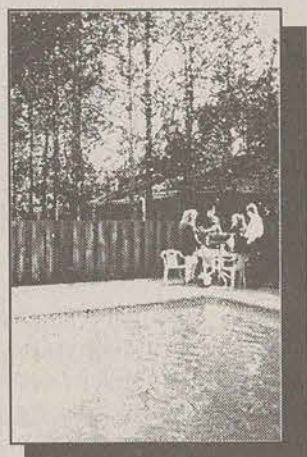

Officials also say the delay may add to the center's construction costs. The RAC is funded by student activity fees, so does that mean the change will mean yet another increase in fees?

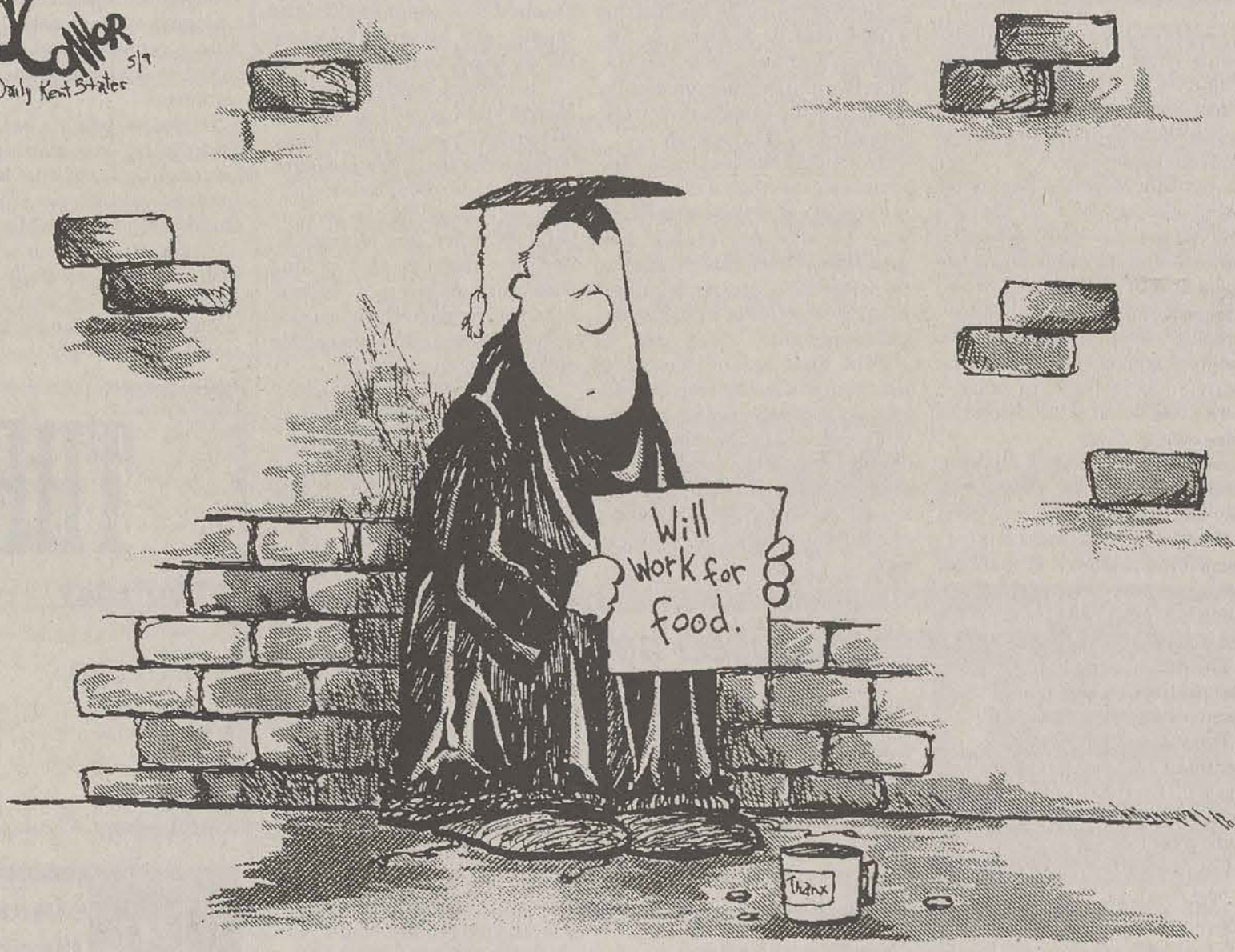
According to Vice President of Student Affairs Jack Nolen, once the details of the problem are worked out, additional construction costs will be discussed.

# Atlanta Council votes to free tickets, bans selling them

ATLANTA—The Atlanta City Council has decided it will continue to receive free tickets for sports events and concerts, but ban their sale.

A proposal to ban complimentary tickets failed when it received only seven of the 10 votes needed. But the council voted 14-2 to prohibit the sale or exchange of complimentary tickets.

The council also voted to require officials and employees to file a monthly report disclosing the tickets they receive and what they do with them.

"It's better than nothing," Councilman Lee Morris said following a two-hour debate in which he supported a total ban of free tickets.

The decisions mirrored those made by the Fulton County Commission two weeks ago.

The votes in both bodies were prompted by published reports that some members of the governing bodies were selling or trading their tickets for profit.

Councilman Jim Maddox said he saw nothing wrong with getting the tickets, which he said could be used to entertain out-of-town officials, constituents, friends and family.

"I do see a problem in selling them or trading them for personal gain," Maddox said. "It's illegal, it's immoral, it's unethical to sell these tickets."

# Professors sue UGA over appointment to endowed chair

ATLANTA—Two University of Georgia accounting professors have sued over an endowed faculty chair they say was awarded to a professor who lacked the proper credentials.

The suit was filed for professors Carl S. Warren and Earl Davis, who have contributed to the Herbert E. Miller Chair in Financial Accounting. The chair, created in 1988, is intended for a "full professor of the highest competence and distinction" in financial accounting.

"What it's alleging is gross mismanagement of trust funds," said lawyer Christopher Casey, who filed the suit in Superior Court against the Board of Regents, the university's governing body, and the University of Georgia Foundation, which manages funds, and Tull School of Accounting director Russell Barefield.

Accounting professor E. Daniel Smith, who was hired to start in the fall of 1991, was not a CPA, the suit says.

According to the lawsuit, Barefield violated conditions of the trust by interviewing only Smith, a fellow Ohio State University alumnus, before awarding him the chair.

Casey said Smith was improperly paid hundreds of thousands of dollars from the chair's trust fund. Smith resigned last June.

# Savannah senator's business under investigation by attorney general

ATLANTA—The governor and Georgia's attorney general have ordered investigations of a state senator whose business received \$77,000 from a state-funded tourism agency.

An independent audit showed Sen. Diana Harvey Johnson's consulting company received the money over 18 months in 1995 and 1996, Morris News Service reported. State Auditor Claude

Vickers said the audit shows a "serious conflict of interest which raises an ethical question."

Gov. Zell Miller said he'd ordered the GBI to look into the matter. Attorney General Mike Bowers launched his own investigation after seeing the audit.

"The idea behind the appropriation was good, but the execution of the appropriation is being looked at," said Rick Dent, the governor's spokesman. The

money was earmarked to promote tourism at black historical sites in Georgia.

Johnson's company, CAA Consulting, got the money from the Greater Savannah Black Tourism Network, which received the funds from the PeachState Black Tourism Association.

It's the second time this year that Johnson has faced questions about state money going to businesses with ties to her.

Morris News Service reported in March that the lawmaker approved a \$10,000 loan in 1995 from the Legislative Black Caucus, which she chairs, to the Greater Savannah Black Tourism Network, which operates out of her office. The loan was repaid two months later.

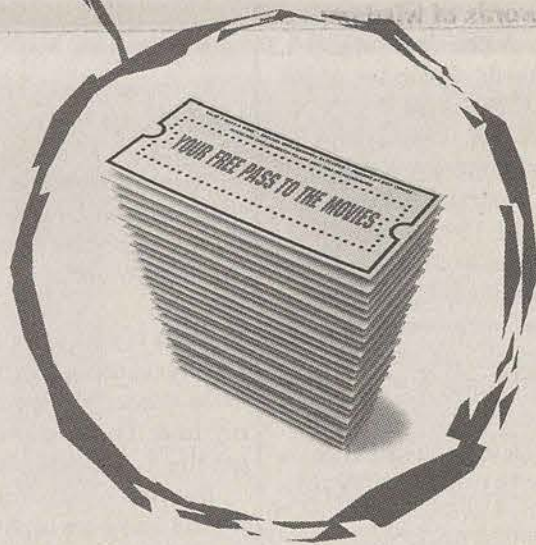
Teddy Lee, executive director of the state Ethics Commission, asked Bowers to look into the complaint by Peter Nichols, the

Chatham GOP chairman. Nichols questioned a \$10,000 state grant obtained by Johnson for the Savannah Tourism Network. An independent audit of Peach State was taken in March

The audit found that of \$91,000 paid to Greater Savannah through Peach State in 1995 and 1996, \$77,000 went to Johnson's business. About \$11,000 of the \$91,000 remains unaccounted for,

## Fifth place has Behm looking for bigger and better

There haven't been too many times when GSU cyclist T.J. Behm was shocked that he was actually leading a race.

He's led plenty of them, and he's won plenty of them. It's not unfamiliar territory for the senior student.

But last Sunday at the Athens Twilight Cross Country Cycling Race, it actually caught him off guard.

It wasn't the fact that he was leading. It was *who* he was leading — Tinker Worez, two-time national champion and nationally well-known cyclist.

Yes, for two miles, GSU's Behm was leading one of the most recognized cyclists in the country, and it surprised him. Much so that it was probably the reason he led for *only* two miles.

Behm suffered a flat tire that put him out of the race. Worez passed him and won.

"I'm not saying I could have held him off," said a laughing Behm, who has won five races at the beginning of the racing season.

"But it was cool. I was actually nervous and I think I got a little excited and wasn't riding my line. That's probably why I got the flat. I mean, it happens."

But Behm's two miles of glory wasn't the only highlight of his weekend.

The top 50 qualifiers two days

earlier advanced to the Criterium race the following day. Behm qualified fifth, one minute behind Worez. He then finished the race in the same fifth place position.

"I was really surprised of my fitness that weekend," he said. "I only get to train about 10 hours a week, when I would like to be going about 20 hours. But it's hard to do that and be a student at the same time."

This summer Behm will travel to Pittsburgh, then to a race in Vermont, followed by the World Cup race in Quebec.

And after December, Behm won't have to worry about the whole student thing anymore. He's going to graduate and then place more of his focus on cycling, which he hopes could lead him to the pros and then to the Olympics.

"I want to first go pro and then go to the Olympics since they now let pros in the Olympics," said Behm, who has only been in the sport for four years. "Hopefully, I can kill two birds with one stone."

"I have the ability and so far I've had the drive. Now I just have to do it. You have to want it bad enough, and I want it."

And for that reason, who's to say those two miles he led against Tinker Worez weren't the first two of many Behm will find himself in front of the pack. Don't be too surprised.

## Study looks closely at Ole Miss image

The atmosphere surrounding University of Mississippi athletics could soon change, and it won't have anything to do with winning or losing games.

A university-backed study to assess and improve the school's overall image is being conducted by a New York-based firm. While primarily to gauge the scholastic image as part of the school's quest for a prestigious academic honor society, the results could affect sporting events.

The study has sparked debate, primarily among Ole Miss athletic backers used to hearing the fight song "Dixie" blare while mascot Colonel Rebel, often outfitted like an old Southern gentleman, helps lead the cheers.

Few are willing to speculate what might happen, but athletic officials welcome the study and appear willing to make any changes deemed necessary.

"You need occasionally to take a look at what you are doing," said athletic director Pete Boone. "It's about time we take a step back and look."

Football coach Tommy Tuberville and basketball coach Rob Evans, who five years ago became the first black coach of a major sport at Ole Miss, often

face the symbols and the more-damaging perceptions while recruiting high school and junior college athletes.

"It's not the symbols, basically it's the perception," Tuberville said. "Coaches use perception against us. Every-

body looks for a negative if you are selling against somebody else, and that's basically what happens to us."

The symbols may be a sense of pride for some, but they are considered racially offensive by others because of their relationship to slavery and the Civil War.

And they are used against Ole Miss by other schools during recruiting.

"It's unfair to our coaches, it's

unfair to our future teams and it's unfair to our fans to be operating with a leg and an arm tied behind their back," Boone said. "That just is another hurdle that our coaches end up having to overcome that other schools don't. And it's all perception."

"Let's don't say it doesn't exist. It does exist and now we can make a conscious decision how we want to address it."

It remains to be seen if Ole Miss will make changes such as the very visible step taken 14 years ago when the school disassociated itself from the Confederate battle flag.

Some die-hard fans still wave the flag at games.

And that helps preserve harmful perceptions that keep some potential athletes from considering Ole Miss.

It would be hard for Tuberville or Evans to know how many recruits they have lost because of the symbols and perceptions, but both admit it does happen.

"My position has always been, whatever is of any significant hindrance to the University of Mississippi, it should be addressed," said Evans, who led the Rebels to their Southeastern Conference Western Division title and their second NCAA tournament appearance this past season.

# Sonics not ready to pack bags for an unhappy Kemp

SEATTLE — In the aftermath of the Seattle SuperSonics' disappointing play-off departure, the Sonics aren't about to panic and unload unhappy Shawn Kemp.

"My instincts tell me that we're still not that far away from competing for a championship," general manager Wally Walker said Friday. "I'd be hard pressed to see \_ and I haven't seen it yet \_ any major changes."

And a trade of Kemp, Gary Payton's All-Star teammate, would be a major change for the Sonics.

After making it to the NBA Finals against Chicago last season, the Sonics were eliminated by Houston in the Western Conference semifinals, but Kemp played well despite his contract problems.

"Shawn's a great player and it's hard to find great players," Walker told a news conference.

"I really don't know where you find a player like him to make your team better."

That said, Walker would like to sit down with Kemp to try to help come up with a solution to the power forward's contract woes.

"I would love to have that discussion," Walker said.

Although Kemp played superbly in the playoffs, he held out of training camp for 22 days and then got into a funk in the second half of the season when he missed planes and practices.

He made \$3 million last season and was disgruntled over the Sonics' offseason signing of center Jim McIlvaine for \$33 million. McIlvaine started 79 games this season, but was

benched for the playoffs.

Walker pointed out that Kemp still has six seasons left on his contract. The Sonics can offer him only a one-year contract extension and they can't do that until Oct. 8, Walker said.

The Sonics' training camp opens Oct. 1 and Walker said he expects Kemp to still be with Seattle by then because the Sonics aren't going to give him away in a trade.

"It would be hard to do something unless there was value received and it was in our best interests," he said.

Walker expects McIlvaine, who was given limited minutes during the regular season, to improve dramatically next season. McIlvaine will play in a summer league.

"Big guys develop a little bit later," Walker said. "I'd be very surprised if you don't see Jim be a much better

player next year. I think you'll see a big progression the next couple of years."

Karl will be back on the Sonics' bench next season despite speculation that another team will try to lure him away. Walker refused to say if the Sonics would give Karl permission to talk to another team.

Karl negotiated a one-year contract extension for \$3.5 million with the Sonics last year. At that time, the Sonics gave him an option for a one-, two- or three-year contract.

Walker said the Sonics are counting on having oft-injured Nate McMillan, scheduled to have offseason surgery to repair a torn cartilage in his right knee, and Craig Ehlo back next season. Ehlo was not included on Seattle's playoff roster. Both are under contract with the Sonics.

He said he's unsure of the status of

the Sonics' four free agents: Terry Cummings, Eric Snow, Larry Stewart and David Wingate.

"We like all of them, but we don't know if they'll all be back," Walker said.

The Sonics are unlikely to trade up in the NBA draft June 25 because there's no player at the top of the draft who could play a major role in winning a championship next season, Walker said.

With their own pick, No. 23, the Sonics expect to get a player with a future.

"But we're not going to get a finished product," Walker said.

The Sonics are right up against the NBA salary cap, but they have a \$1 million salary cap exemption this summer and they intend to use it, Walker said.

"I think we have a good chance to get a pretty good player with that exemption," he said.

on trombone and lead vocals (rumored to be resident madman), Wade Page on percussion, Clifford Hayes on hyper-bass, Jake Hallman singing and tickling the checkered ivories, Andy "Low-rider" Jones on guitar, Almonz Lemaitre on alto sax, Patrick Doyle on tenor sax, Brian "Cowboy" Avery on baritone sax and the one and only Travis Prim on that groovalicious mellophone, took the stage at about a quarter after 10.

They all looked very dapper in their black dress pants, button down shirts and skinny neckties (a trademark of any quality ska band). They somehow managed to distort the spatial properties of the diminutive Blind Willie's stage to fit nine robust young lads and their equipment, with no visible problems. By breaking the laws of nature like that, these boys from the wrong side of the tracks

had already earned some of my respect.

That respect only grew as they opened up their set with a rousing version of "Factory Concerto," a ska classic. It didn't take very long for her to bring the salad and a basket of crackers. The salad was very good. It had big crunchy croutons on it, which is my favorite part of a salad. I was just about finished with my salad and the first pitcher was about gone when the waitress came back to say they were out of pasta. I thought she meant fettucine, so I attempted to order another pasta dish.

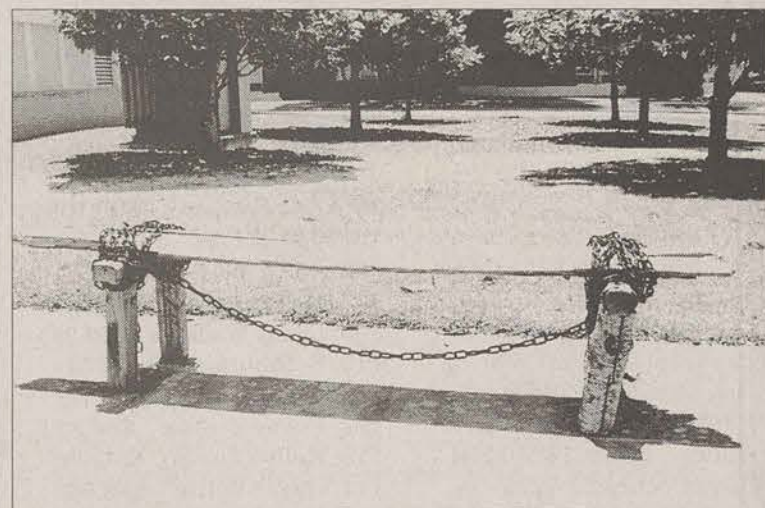

**'The Lost World' packs a huge dyno-packed punch**By Eric Bray

To be honest, I was never a big fan of "Jurassic Park." It reminds me of "Twister": the special effects are initially captivating, but it's not the sort of movie you want to watch several more times after growing accustomed to the imagery.

To an extent, "The Lost World" suffers from this same drawback, except it has more going for it in some respects after the effect wears off.

First of all, the action is gut-wrenching and well-paced. This is a step up from "Jurassic Park," which moves to a fairly slow tempo until it gains momentum in a few sparse scenes.

"The Lost World" dives head first into the action and keeps it moving throughout.

Stunts and action scenes keep the audience members on the edge of their seats.

Second of all, "The Lost World" takes the special effects wizardry that made the first film a hit one step further. The dinosaurs are so incredibly lifelike that you can't help forgetting they aren't real.

Also, these effects are used a lot more, unlike the first film which doesn't actually *show* a dinosaur until well into the movie. The second one, on the other hand, cuts to the chase immediately in addition to offering a wider range of prehistoric species (such as the stegosaurus

and pterodactyl).

The plot of "The Lost World" centers around a second island in which an ecosystem of dinosaurs has developed unnoticed by man.

You've got to wonder how this area could have been overlooked for five years.

Jeff Goldblum ("Independence Day," "Powder") returns from his

However, their interaction is intimate compared to his relationship with his supposed daughter, whose *undaughterly* attitude is made more acute by the ironic fact that she is apparently African American (without any trace of Caucasian features). While this is not impossible, the film neglects to address the issue aside from cheap laughs.

that's as eerily psychotic as his claim to fame as the man who stuffed Steve Buscemi into a wood-chipper in "Fargo."

There's never a doubt that these cruelties will be repaid in the immanent gorefest, which Spielberg cleverly managed to manipulate to a surprising PG-13 rating. Once Stormare picks on a little breed of dinosaurs, you know they'll be picking on his bones later.

In fact, you'd be inclined to think that the story is over when the good guys escape the island if it weren't for the fact that heartless bureaucrat Arliss Howard ("To Wong Foo...") is still alive. And wouldn't you know it, a tyrannosaurus rex makes a trip all the way to San Diego to rectify this situation.

Now, there's a specific point when a movie needs to end, and I'd say Goldblum's escape from the island is climactic enough to call it quits.

But the godzilla-like rampage of a tyrannosaurus through urban terrain pushes the limits of acceptance.

If this had been left out, the movie would have been profoundly better.

Aside from schlocky film conventions and poor character development, though, "The Lost World" is a white-knuckle ride which packs a punch strong enough to at least contend with its predecessor.

battle with the first set of reptiles to take on the new ones. In my opinion, he's a better choice for the lead than "Jurassic Park" star Sam Neil, who seemed to be sleep-walking through his role in that movie.

Goldblum spruces this one up with his quirky, twitchy mannerisms. After a long dry spell in his acting career, it's good to see he's landing some big roles.

Julianne Moore ("Nine Months," "Assassins") costars as Goldblum's girlfriend and paleontologist on this expedition. Moore's performance is fine, but the relationship between her character and Goldblum's is not explored (and is practically nonexistent at times).

Richard Attenborough returns in the role of millionaire and negligent entrepreneur John Hammond, to fund the expedition, consisting of Goldblum, Moore and newcomer Vince Vaughn ("Swingers"). The "bad guys" on the island, led by Pete Postlethwaite ("The Usual Suspects," "Romeo + Juliet"), are so insidiously evil that they must be inspired by comic book villains.

Postlethwaite is a gifted actor, but as a safari hunter whose sole desire is to inhumanely kill animals, he comes off as one-dimensional. Peter Stormare ("Damage") makes Postlethwaite look like a bleeding-heart humanitarian, though, in a role

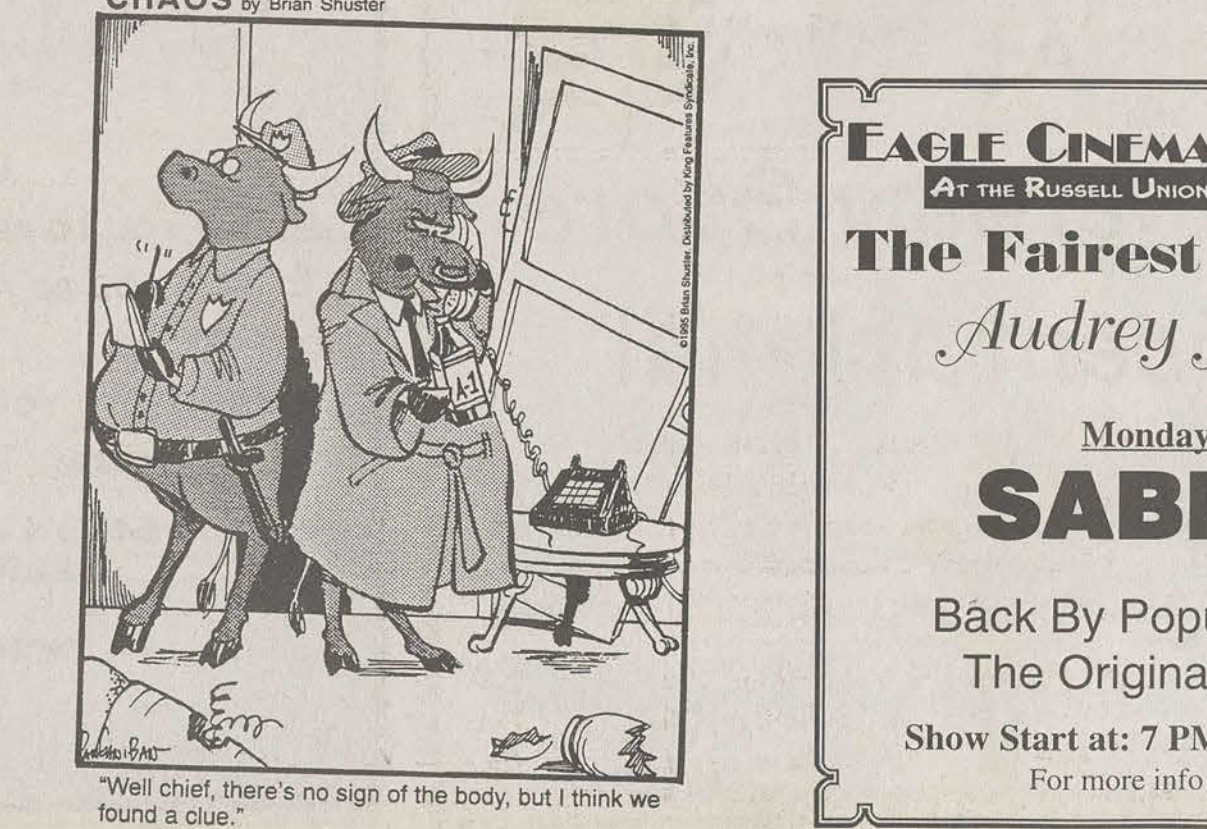

do what needs to be done," he said.

The building, which is funded through student activity fees, is already 70 percent complete, but this could mean tearing out some of the work that has already been done and/or additional construction to comply with the fire safety codes. GSU officials are holding negotiations with the marshal to rectify the situation.

"We want the building to be safe, but we want it completed," George Lynch, assistant dean of students said.

"The unexpected delay is a problem because I feel like the students have waited long enough," he said.

Lynch said that they have presented the marshal with additional information about the building and that he was able to modify his decision slightly.

"He is trying to work with us, but we all want the building to be safe and in accordance with the safety codes," he said.

Nolen said that a lot hinges on

the maximum occupancy of the complex.

"We're indicating that the number originally given was high," he said.

He said that depending on the number of people in the building, additional work, such as spraying fire retardant material or using a different quality of sheet rock, may have to be done.

Because negotiations are not complete, it is not known exactly what needs to be done and the additional cost has not been determined. He said that the fire marshal has told the contractor what needs to be done and the contractor is now looking at the cost.

"I wouldn't want to throw out a number, but if the contractor has to tear out work that has already been done, it could be very expensive," he said.

Nolen said there will be discussions on funding the additional construction when the details are worked out.

"There have already been several meetings with the marshal,

and the original requirements were reduced. We hold out hope that we are successful in negotiations," he said.

Nolen said he hopes that negotiations will be completed within the next two weeks.

Lynch said that they have been asked to provide data on things such as how long it will take to exit occupants, and it will hopefully be sent by next Friday.

"We are constantly providing data and the fire marshal is interpreting it and modifying requirements to coincide with standards," he said.

Lynch said that the matter needs to be settled by mid-June, when the project is scheduled to move into a new phase of construction.

"Construction is not at a standstill, but there is a only a small amount of work being done now," he said.

He said if there are no more changes in the marshal's decision, the extension of construction time will be approximately 100 days.

plaint was in August, and we complained every month until March, when they finally sent a cleaning lady over to slap some paste on and stick it back to the wall."

And Yoho is not the only one screaming about the slow responses.

Artese McCrae, a GSU student who lives in Southern Villa, says he also has had problems with ants as well as a leakage under his sink and scars on his wall from a bad paint job.

"I've put in work orders, and they never send anybody out here to take care of it," McCrae said. "They came out here to exterminate one time, and it still didn't take care of all the ants. We still had to spray it ourselves."

McCrae said that he has not living at Southern Villa next year, partly due to the problems he's had with Southern Realty this year, and he says that if he had to rate the realty company on a scale of one to 10, he'd give them a three.

Southern Realty Property Manager Lisa Hodges had some explanations for the resident's

complaints.

"If somebody calls in a minor complaint, then it is taken care of immediately," Hodges said. "But we have a \$100 limit, and if it exceeds \$100, then we have to call the owner and the ownership has to be notified."

"The reason for this is they may want to replace an item instead of repair it. In a situation like that, we do have to follow the instructions of the owner. People think we own the apartments, but we just manage them."

Eagle's Nest residents complained that their swimming pool was brown and green and that insects and tadpoles were floating in it.

The same residents said that it should have never taken as long as it did to clean and repair the pool.

Hodges agreed that the pool was in poor condition, but she said it was the vandalism done to the pool that caused the delay in cleaning and repairing it.

Hodges said that they haven't received many complaints this year, and in fact, Southern Realty has had a renewal rate of

more than 43 percent.

"We sent people out to inspect and to talk to the tenants, and there weren't really any problems," she said. "A lot of times, they will complain to other people but won't to us. We want to help, and we don't want to have people not living with us."

And some residents believe Southern Realty has done a good job in keeping the tenants happy.

"We've never had problems with Southern Realty," said student and Park Place resident Melanie Weinberg. "Just last Friday, I put a load of wash in and when I came back, there were suds all over the kitchen. I called and they had someone there in 30 minutes. My carpet was messed up, and the guy made a phone call, and in 30 more minutes, someone was there to repair the carpet. They took care of it."

Southern Realty manages approximately 600 apartments for more than 450 owners, far more than any other realty company that houses GSU students.

## Judge continues to block Ebon Academy sale

FORSYTH, Ga. — A Superior Court judge has continued to hold up the sale of the former Ebon Academy's campus to allow challengers to the deal to review documents.

The academy, which took over the old Tift College campus, was a private boarding school intended for gifted black students.

Students and parents who felt betrayed by the school's sudden closing last January have sued founder Florence Alexander for transcripts and unspecified damages.

A contract for the sale of the school to the General Missionary Baptist Convention of Georgia, the largest black de-

nomination in the state, was taken from the courtroom under seal, but will be opened for the lawyers involved. The deal is

expected to involve about \$18 million.

At a hearing last week, Superior Court Judge Arch McGarity, employees of Atlanta's Capitol City Bank testified about four Ebon-related bank accounts from which they said money was removed at the request of Ms. Alexander.

Ebon PTA President E. Diann Chapman testified that she was never able to get information about the accounts from Ebon staff.

Alexander's lawyers argued that it is out of proportion to control an \$18 million piece of property because of questions about bank accounts that total less than \$100,000.


McGarity responded, "If someone's stealing your hubcaps, it doesn't mean they're stealing your gas, too ... but it does pass the smell test."

The judge granted Harold Melton, an assistant state attorney general, status to represent the state against possible fund-raising violations by Ebon.

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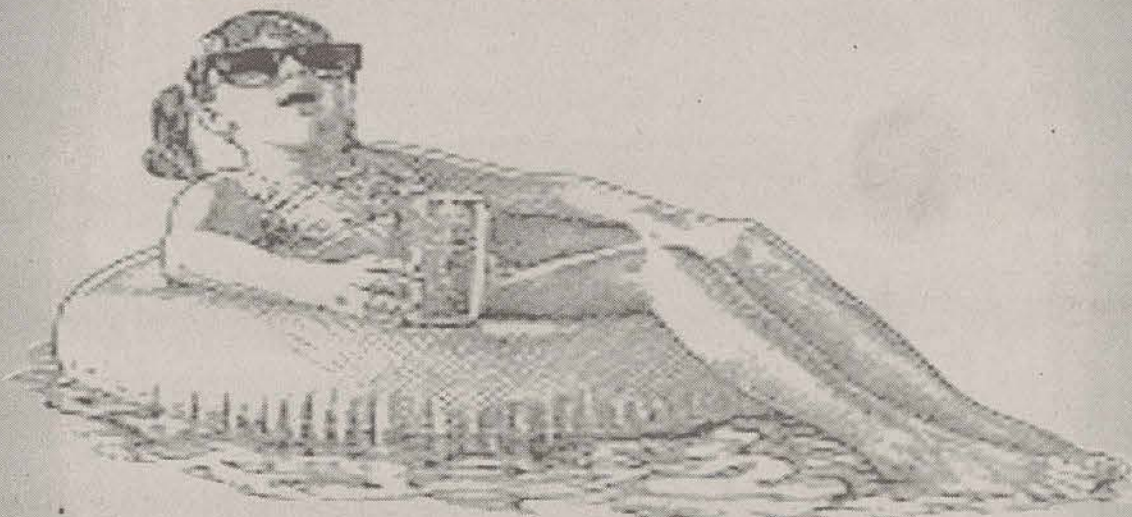
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
